Now entering his 10th season as head men's basketball coach at the University of California, Ben Braun has established a Golden Bear program that has earned respect and admiration both in the Bay Area and across the country.

During his tenure at Cal, Braun has directed the Bears to more postseason appearances and more postseason victories than any coach in school history, including four NCAA Tournament berths and an NIT championship in 1999.

Two of his players have earned Pac-10 Player of the Year honors – Ed Gray in 1997 and Sean Lampley in 2001 – while current sophomore Leon Powe was the 2004 Pac-10 Freshman of the Year. Overall, Braun's charges have received All-Pac-10 status six times, Pac-10 All-Freshman notice on six occasions and Pac-10 All-Academic accolades 12 times.

The 1997 Pac-10 Coach of the Year and a finalist for the 2003 Naismith National Coach of the Year, Braun begins the 2005-06 campaign with a 166-110 record with the Bears and a 28-year career mark of 499-345. He ranks second to Nibs Price (1925-54, 449-294) in both tenure and wins in Cal annals, while his Cal winning percentage (.601) is the best at the school since Hall of Famer Pete Newell guided the Bears to a 119-44 mark from 1955-60.

As a result of that success, Braun has twice been rewarded with contract extensions, including his current eight-year contract.

"When a University makes a commitment to you, I think the proper thing to do is to make the commitment back to the University," said Braun.
"I feel very proud to say I'm here for the long haul and to make that commitment back to the University of California.

"Cal is a dream job, a place I've chosen to call my home," Braun added. "To be able to work in an environment and area you enjoy living, to be at a University that you're proud of, to be able to work with quality young men and an outstanding coaching staff, I could not ask for more."

Generally regarded as one of college basketball's top teachers and strategists, Braun brought his energetic style of coaching to Cal in September 1996.

During his initial season at Cal in 1996-97, Braun took a team that was predicted to finish in the conference's lower half, molded it into one that tied for second in the league and reached the NCAA regional semifinals with tournament victories over Princeton and Villanova. In addition, the 23-9 overall mark gave Braun a school record for most wins by a Bear coach in his first year with the program.

In 1998-99, Braun's club became the first team ever at Cal to beat three Top 10 schools in the same season, defeating North Carolina, UCLA and Arizona during the course of the year. Then, after earning a bid to the NIT, the Bears went on a 5-0 run to capture the title – Cal's first postseason tournament championship since the Bears won the 1959

NCAA crown. Cal finished the 1998-99 campaign with a 22-11 record.



A year later, Braun took a freshmandominated squad back to the postseason as the Bears reached the quarterfinals of the NIT. On Jan. 15, 2000, he picked up his 400th career victory with a 71-65 win at Oregon State.

In 2000-01, the Bears returned to the NCAA Tournament, finishing with a 20-11 record, and Lampley – Braun's first recruit at Cal – became the school's all-time leading scorer late in his senior campaign, finishing with

1,776 points.

The Bears again won 23 games and tied for second in the Pac-10 race in 2001-02. Cal reached the semifinals of the conference tournament by defeating UCLA in the opening round and earned a No. 6 seed in the NCAA playoffs, where the Bears toppled Penn before falling to Pittsburgh.

In 2003, Cal again reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament behind All-Pac-10 forwards Joe Shipp and Amit Tamir. Shipp ended his career with the No. 3 position on the Bears' all-time scoring list, while teammate Brian Wethers finished in the No. 15 position.

Although just 51 years of age, Braun already has 28 years of experience as a head coach,

including 11 highly successful years at Eastern Michigan, where he guided the Eagles to four postseason berths, including three NCAA appearances. During his tenure there, Braun accumulated a record of 185-132, averaging almost 18 wins per season, and was named Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year three times.

In addition, Braun coached at Siena Heights College for eight years, taking the NAIA school to a 148-103 record and five postseason tournaments.

Under Braun's direction, his players have proven equally successful both on the court and in the classroom.

"It is important that our players be

academically sound as well as athletically motivated," said Braun. "We don't want one dimensional players in our program. Our goals go beyond championships. We want to be the best in everything we do. As long as our players put forth maximum effort, they're bound to experience success."

Nowhere was that more evident than with the 2001 Pac-10 All-Academic team. Three Bears – Morgan Lingle, Dennis Gates and Ryan Forehan-Kelly – were first-team selections, while Donte Smith was an honorable mention pick, giving Cal more than twice as many academic members as any other school in the conference. In 2002, both Gates and Smith repeated on the Pac-10 All-Academic unit, while Tamir was a first-team choice in 2003 and '04.

Braun began his career as an assistant coach at Park High School in Racine, Wis. Within two years, he accepted the head coaching job at Siena Heights. After an 8-21 debut season in 1977-78, his teams posted a 140-82 record over the next seven years, including four 20-win campaigns. His squads qualified for National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA)

postseason tournaments five times. During his time at Siena Heights, he not only coached, but taught English and Physical Education classes at the school. In the summer of 1999, Braun was inducted into the first class of the Siena Heights Athletic Hall of Fame.

Braun accepted the position of associate head coach at Eastern Michigan prior to the start of the 1985-86 season, but midway through the year, on Jan. 15, 1986, he was elevated to interim head coach. Success came quickly, as within two years he had the Eagles in the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever.

In 1989, Braun served as head coach of the U.S. men's basketball team at the Maccabiah

Games. He took an internationally inexperienced squad into the championship round before bowing to the host Israeli team in the final.

During his career, Braun has coached 12 players who have gone on to play in the NBA, including Grant Long (EMU) of the Detroit Pistons. At Cal, he has coached Ed Gray, who was a first round draft pick of the Atlanta Hawks, center Michael Stewart (Toronto Raptors), forward Sean Marks (Miami Heat), center Francisco Elson (a 1999 second round pick by the Denver Nuggets) and forward Sean Lampley (a 2001 second round selection by the Chicago Bulls). Tony Gonzalez, now an All-Pro tight end for the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs,

also played basketball for Braun in 1996-97.

A native of Chicago, Braun graduated from New Trier High School, where he starred in both basketball and baseball. He went on to play one year of basketball at the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse before he transferred to the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He earned a teaching degree in English in June of 1975 with a minor in African-American Studies. Five years later, he earned his master's degree in guidance and counseling from Siena Heights.

BEN BRAUN CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Led Cal to four NCAA Tournaments (1997, 2001, 2002, 2003) – tying the school record for most NCAA appearances by a Cal coach
- Guided Cal to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 1997 and to the second round in both 2002 and '03
- Coached Cal to the 1999 National Invitation Tournament championship – the Bears' first postseason title since winning the NCAA crown in 1960

Ninth Year at California

Louis Reynaud, a native Californian who was born and raised in San Francisco, is in his ninth season with the Golden Bear program and fourth as associate head coach after serving five years as an assistant coach.


Reynaud is well known in the coaching profession and has the reputation as an excellent coach and administrator with outstanding organizational and leadership skills. There are very few areas in the Cal basketball program in which Reynaud is not directly involved. Among his many duties are recruiting, scouting and game preparation, supervising support staff, and overseeing the valuable "Gold Team" walkons. Reynaud also supervises a unique group of student managers. He is the position coach for the Bears' post players.

Prior to coming to Cal, Reynaud compiled an 84-31 record as head basketball coach at nearby De La Salle High School and led the Spartans to league titles in 1994 and '96. Reynaud was a two-time Bay Valley Athletic League Coach of the Year, and his 1996 team captured the Division I NorCal championship and finished second in the state, earning a No.1 ranking in the Bay Area for the first time in school history.

Reynaud had his first head coaching opportunity at St. Patrick-St. Vincent High School in Vallejo from 1990-93. He directed the Bruins to a 69-39 record, three 20-win seasons and one Sac-Joaquin Section title. From 1986-90, Reynaud served as assistant varsity basketball coach at De La Salle HS.

In 1997, Reynaud was selected as head coach of the West Squad at the Magic Johnson Round Ball Classic for high school All-Americans, and he directed the prestigious ABCD summer camp for five years.

In addition to his coaching experience,



Reynaud served as Dean of Students at De La Salle from 1993-97 and as Dean of Students at St. Patrick-St. Vincent HS from 1990-93.

As a high school player, Reynaud was a standout at Archbishop Riordan High School in San Francisco and played for the late Lyle Newcomer at Skyline College in San Bruno.

Reynaud received his bachelor's degree in liberal studies along with his teaching credential from San Francisco State in 1982 and a master's degree in health/physical education from St. Mary's College in 1995. Reynaud and his wife, Cheryl, have one daughter, Lauren, and reside in the East Bay.

Fifth Year at California


Joe Pasternack begins his fifth year as an assistant coach after serving the previous two years as a member of the Golden Bear support staff.

Pasternack came to Berkeley in 1999 as Cal's video coordinator, where he was involved in game preparation, breaking down game film and other administrative duties.

During the summer of 2001, head coach Ben Braun elevated Pasternack to an assistant coach. First Year at California


Former Golden Bear guard Dennis Gates, who starred for California from 1999-2002, has returned to his alma mater and begins his first season as an assistant coach this year.

Gates was a member of Cal's 1999 National Invitation Tournament championship squad and played key roles on the Bears' NCAA Tournament teams in 2001 and '02. In 114 career games, he had 34 starts and finished with an average of 3.8 points per game, as well as 100 steals and 148 assists.

During his tenure as a player, Cal compiled an 83-46 record, winning 20 games in a season three times. In 2002, the Bears reached the semifinals of the Pac-10 Tournament and the second round of the NCAA Tournament. In addition, Gates was named to the all-tournament team at the Golden Bear Classic that year after hitting a three-pointer in the closing seconds to beat Penn State, 76-73, in the championship game.

Since graduating from Cal in 2002, Gates spent one year each on staff with the NBA's Los Angeles Clippers, Marquette University and Florida State. He served as an intern assistant coach under Alvin Gentry and Dennis Johnson with the Clippers in 2002-03, then was a graduate assistant on Tom Crean's staff at Marquette in '03-04, helping the Golden Eagles to the third round of the NIT, and a GA under Leonard Hamilton at Florida State last season.

A native of Chicago, Gates was a two-time first-team Pac-10 All-Academic choice. He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology in just three years and competed as a master's candidate in education during his senior campaign. Gates received Cal's Most Inspirational Player Award in 2001, the Pete



Newell Award as the team's best defensive player in 2002 and was twice named the

Bears' Outstanding Student-Athlete (1999, 2001).

In addition, Lee has worked on a contract-basis for the last eight years with the San Jose Sabercats as assistant director of game operations.

A native of Oakland, Lee is an avid basketball player herself. She received her bachelor's degree from UC Davis in rhetoric and communications with a minor in education in 1997.

Justin Tanisawa, a former team manager for the Bears as an undergraduate at Cal, is in his third season as the program's video coordinator, where he is involved in game preparation, breaking down game film and other administrative duties.

Tanisawa spent the 2002-03 season in a similar capacity at San Diego State.

While at Cal, Tanisawa was a manager during the 2001 and '02 seasons. During that time, he

also coached at the Cal, USF and San Diego State summer camps, in addition to working at the 2002 Pete Newell Big Man Camp.

A graduate of Burlingame High School, where he was an all-league performer in basketball, Tanisawa originally attended UC San Diego for two years. He then transferred to Cal, receiving his bachelor's degree in art practice in 2002.

ERIC HOWITT EQUIPMENT MANAGER



Eric Howitt is in his third season as equipment manager for the Cal men's basketball team.

Howitt, who also works with the Golden Bear baseball and women's soccer squads, came to Cal after serving as an assistant equipment manager at UCLA, where he worked with the football, men's tennis, rowing and women's golf programs.

A 1999 graduate of Oregon State with a degree in forestry recreation resources, Howitt worked

with the OSU equipment staff from 1996-2001. He later served as an assistant equipment manager at Florida Atlantic in 2001 and at Cincinnati from 2001-02.


