# 1959 NCAA CHAMPIONS

**I**t has been more than 40 years since the winter of 1959, when the California basketball team wrote what is truly one of the great "Cinderella" stories in collegiate history en route to capturing the NCAA championship title.

The author of the thriller was the immensely talented Pete Newell, whose mere presence brought Harmon Gym patrons to their feet. (Newell was the resident genius in the art of team play; a head coach who was a master at utilizing every bit of talent he had at his disposal.)

Beyond Newell, it was a team of unknowns. There was not a single All-American within its ranks, not even a first team All-Coast selection. But before all else, it was a team, and spell that with a capital "T." As Bob Brachman of the San Francisco Examiner put it, "... It was truly an all-around inspirational production by a bunch of guys named 'Joe.'"

"That 1959 season was the essence of what the game of basketball is all about," said Newell. "It was a totally selfless group. It takes a certain type of kid to put the team above himself."

California battled its way through the Pacific Coast Conference, blasted Utah and St. Mary's in the Western Regionals and then marched into Louisville, scorned and sneered at by the experts, and walked away with the national title.

Despite the pair of impressive victories at the regionals and a 14-game winning streak, the Golden Bears arrived in Kentucky without much fanfare. The resident "experts" were

highly critical of their controlled style of play, one which allowed them to lead the nation in points allowed as they sacrificed just 51.0 per game. One Louisville paper tabbed California as a "plow horse," while another critic described the routines by the pompon girls as "faster than their basketball team."

First on the agenda for the Golden Bears was upsetting Cincinnati and All-American Oscar Robertson. But Newell came up with a simple formula for shutting down the Big "O," and that was the Big "D," a combination of defense and Darrall Imhoff. Robertson was held to 18 points (5-16 FG), and only one field goal in the second half, while Imhoff pumped in 22 points to pace all scorers.

The win propelled California into the finals against West Virginia and another All-American guard, Jerry West. And once again, the names of Dalton, Imhoff and Al Buch could be listed among the heroes.

But, as the near-capacity crowd of 18,498 could attest, the Golden Bears spine-tingling 71-70 victory over the Mountaineers belonged to each and every member of the team.

The Bears were afforded a hero's welcome upon their return to the Bay Area, as more than 3,000 California loyalists jammed San Francisco International Airport.

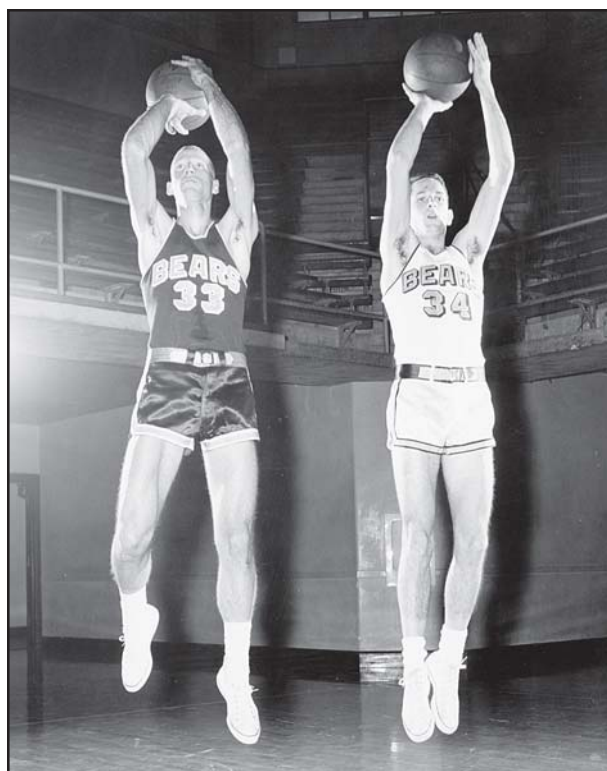

# 1999 NIT CHAMPIONS

Throughout the 1998-99 season, head coach Ben Braun called his Golden Bears a work in progress, constantly evolving as the season developed.

At times, Cal looked unbeatable, as in the Bears' wins over Top 10 teams North Carolina, UCLA and Arizona. In other instances, they struggled, going just 3-7 at the start of the Pac-10 season.

But in the end, the Bears finished on top. Finally putting everything together as a team, Cal captured the 1999 National Invitation Tournament title with a 5-0 run through the postseason. The championship was the first on a national stage for the Bears since they claimed the 1959 NCAA crown.

Cal drew Fresno State in a first round home game March 10 at the New Arena in Oakland, and for much of the contest, it looked like the Bears' year would end right there. Trailing for almost the entire game and down 49-37 with 15 minutes to go, Cal finally woke up. The Bears went on a 16-1 run to take the lead and never lost control of the game, finishing with a 79-71 win.

Forward Sean Lampley put up the biggest numbers of the season against the Bulldogs, ending with 28 points and 14 rebounds. Forward Carl Boyd, who had 10 of his 14 points after

intermission, and guard Geno Carlisle, who added 15 of his 19 points after the break, also aided the second half surge.

In the second round March 16, Cal made a return trip to DePaul. On Nov. 28 at the Rosemont Horizon, the Blue Demons edged the Bears, 75-72, and DePaul seemed to be on its way to another victory, forging a 28-11 lead midway through the first half and a 37-24 advantage at intermission. But Cal came out of the break on a 14-1 run to tie the score, and when center Francisco Elson tossed in a short jumper with 2:10 left, the Bears took a 58-57 lead. DePaul never scored again and Cal advanced to the quarterfinals with the one-point victory.

Two nights later, the Bears hosted Colorado State at the New Arena for the right to go to the semis at Madison Square Garden. This time, Cal jumped out to an early lead, going up 35-13 at one point in the first half. CSU, though, kept fighting and eventually took a 62-61 lead with 2:00 on the clock. But the Bears were not to be denied and scored the final 10 points of the game for a 71-62 win and left the

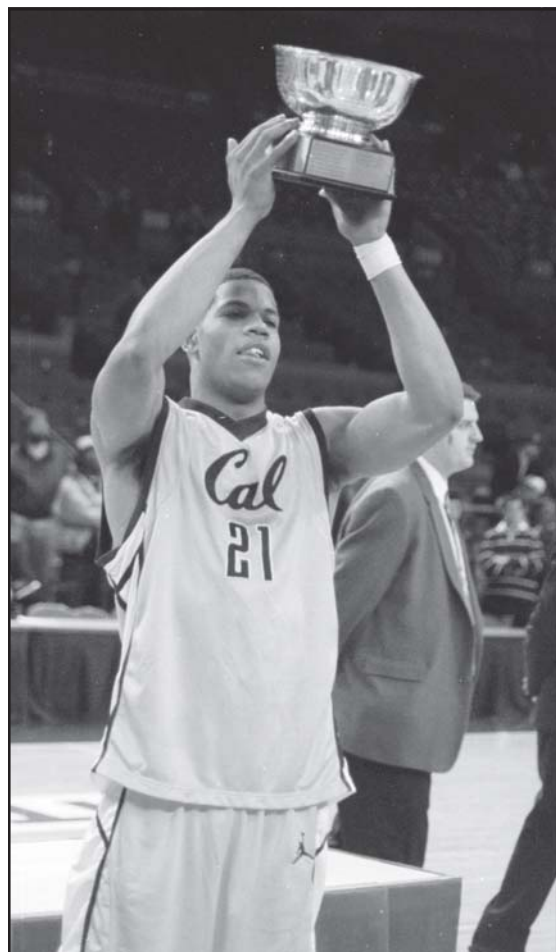
court to strains of "New York, New York" by the Cal Straw Hat Band.

In the semifinals, Cal met up with its old nemesis, Oregon. Motivated by their two losses to the Ducks during the regular season, the Bears ran away with an 85-69 victory. Cal led just, 35-32, at the half when forward Mike Gill literally took over the game. He scored all of his career-high 22 points in the second half to lead the Bears into the championship against Clemson.

In the final, the ACC's Tigers, using their size advantage, dominated the boards and grabbed a 35-27 halftime lead over Cal. Just as they had done in the earlier rounds of the NIT, the Bears fought their way back into the game. Cal limited Clemson to less than 30 percent shooting from the floor in the second half, but the Bears were still down, 60-58, with under a minute to play.

In Cal's final possession, Carlisle drove the lane, but had his shot blocked. In the scramble that ensued, Carlisle retrieved the ball on the left wing and turned toward the basket. Coming down the key, he lofted a shot over Clemson center Tom Wideman. The ball went through the hoop to tie the score, and Wideman was whistled for a foul on the play. With 4.7 seconds on the clock, Carlisle stepped to the free throw line and sank the shot for a 61-60 Bear lead. When a desperation shot by the Tigers missed the mark, the entire Cal team erupted in celebration.

Lampley, who had 16 points and six rebounds in the championship game victory, was voted tournament MVP, while Gill was also honored with a spot on the all-tournament team.

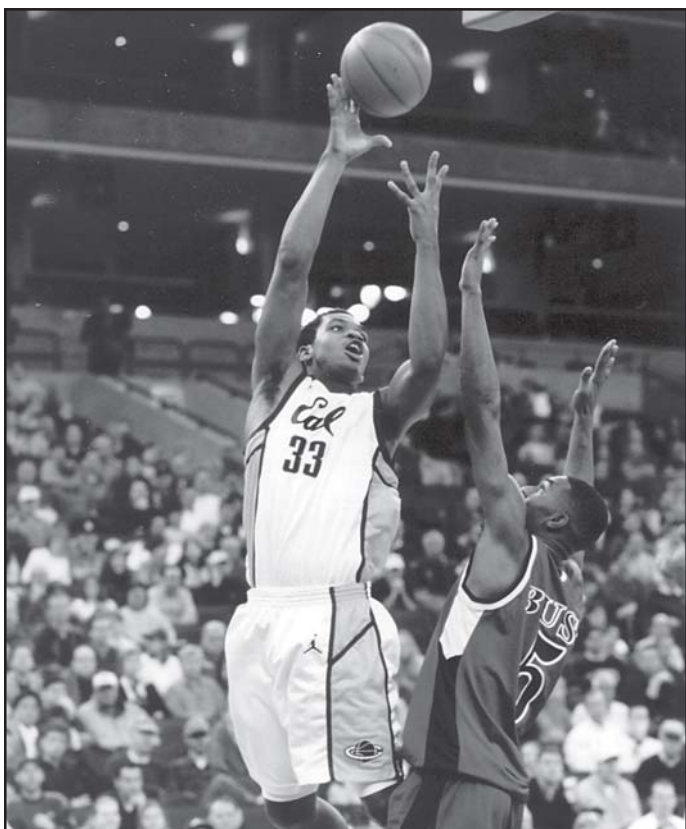

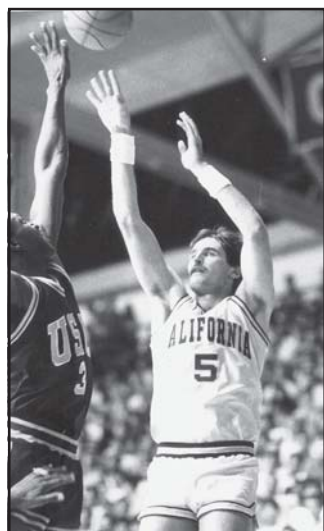

## THE PETE NEWELL LEGEND

Legendary coach Pete Newell, who led California to the 1959 NCAA title and a runner-up finish in the 1960 tournament, was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1978. Head coach of the Golden Bears from 1954-55 to '59-60, Newell's teams won four consecutive conference titles (1957-60), and he was voted the national coach of the year in 1960. He finished his Cal career with a 119-44 record. Newell also coached the U.S. Olympic team to a gold medal in the 1960 Rome Games. On Dec. 21, 1987, the playing surface at Harmon Gym was renamed "Pete Newell Court" in his honor and the floor at Haas Pavilion retains that name.

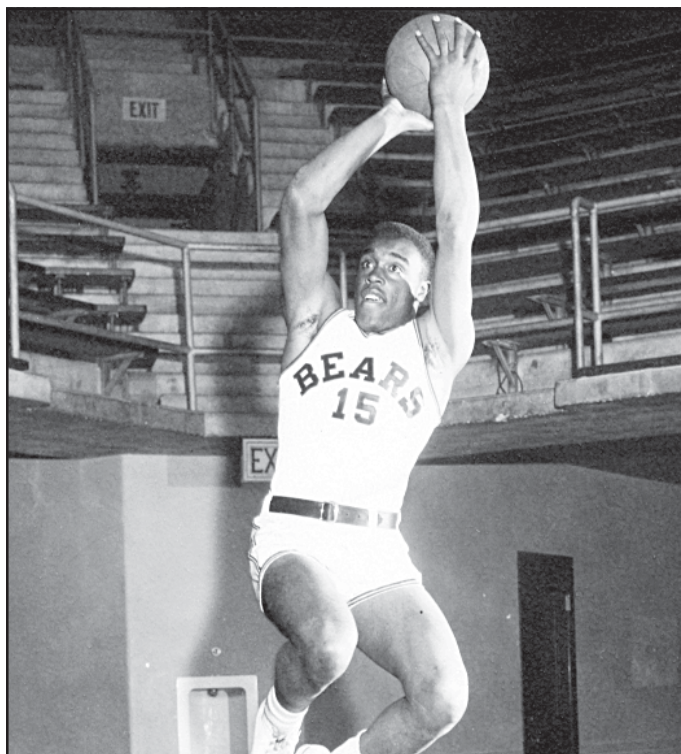
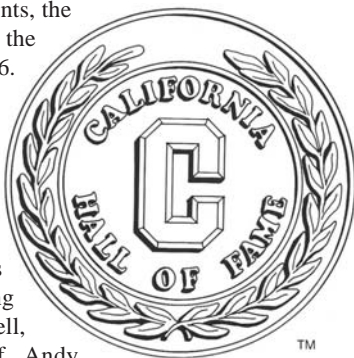
# CAL ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

With an athletic history that spans almost 150 years, the University of California has produced some of the greatest coaches, athletes and performances our country has ever seen. From world record-holders to Olympic champions, Golden Bears have succeeded on almost every imaginable stage.

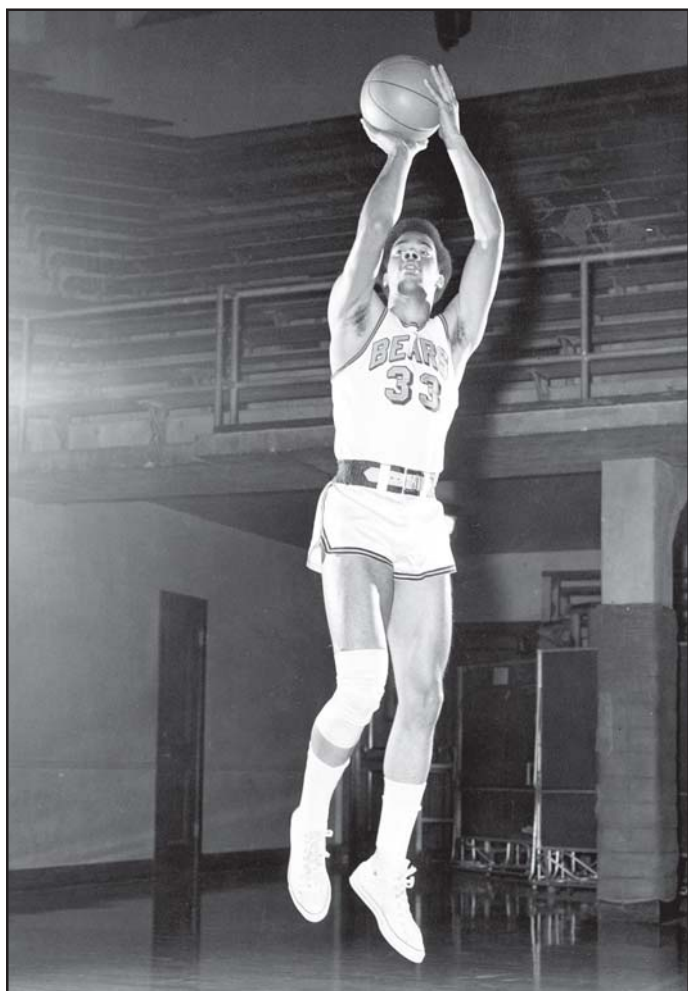
To recognize those achievements, the Athletic Department established the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986. Located on the mezzanine level of Memorial Stadium, the Hall features 193 individuals and five crews, each of whom represent the best of Cal's rich athletic heritage.

Among those who grace the walls are 24 basketball players, including such storied names as Pete Newell, Kevin Johnson, Darrall Imhoff, Andy Wolfe, Earl Robinson and Nibs Price.

In addition to the Memorial Stadium location, Hall of Fame memorabilia is also on exhibit in display cases on the first floor of Haas Pavilion.

# PROMINENT CAL PLAYERS

## SHAREEF ABDUR-RAHIM

The first freshman to earn Pac-10 Player of the Year honors, Abdur-Rahim led the league in scoring during his only season in Berkeley. The 6-9 forward was voted National Freshman of the Year by several publications, including Basketball Weekly and Dick Vitale, and he was chosen a third team Associated Press All-American. Abdur-Rahim scored at least 30 points four times, with a high of 33 against Northern Arizona in his first game in a Cal uniform. He also registered a best of 18 rebounds vs. Washington State and paced the Bears with 52 steals on the year. Abdur-Rahim declared for the draft in the spring of 1996 and was taken third overall by the Vancouver Grizzlies.

## PHIL CHENIER

A standout guard for the Bears during the 1970 and '71 seasons, Chenier finished with a 13.5 ppg average, which ranked among the Bears' Top 10 career marks at the time. He also ranked among Cal's career leaders with 3.6 assists per game. Chenier earned first team All-Pac-8 honors in 1971 when he averaged 18.3 ppg during the conference season, including a career-best 32 against Washington. He entered the NBA after his junior year and went onto a distinguished nine-year career with the Washington Bullets, becoming a three-time All-Star selection. Chenier was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997.

## VERN CORBIN

Inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992, Corbin was one of the top centers of his era. He was a three-year starter for the Bears and helped the team to three consecutive PCC titles. Cal was a perfect 13-0 in 1927 and finished 17-3 in '29. Corbin earned All-Coast honors following his junior and senior seasons.

## RUSS CRITCHFIELD

One of the top guards in Cal history, Critchfield earned team MVP honors three straight years from 1966-68. An honorable mention All-American as a junior, he was a first team choice by the Helms Athletic Foundation in 1968. Critchfield also claimed first team all-conference honors twice. He finished his career with 1,437 to rate among the school's all-time Top 10 and he had a scoring average of 19.4 ppg. He twice tallied 36 points, first against Texas in 1965 and again vs. Oregon in '68. Critchfield later served as an assistant coach at Cal from 1977-85, and he was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1995.

## GEORGE DIXON

A talented and versatile athlete who made his mark in both basketball and rugby, Dixon led the Cal basketball team to undefeated seasons in 1926 and '27 while being voted the best guard in the Pacific Coast Conference. He earned All-America mention in both '26 and '27. As a rugby player, Dixon won an Olympic gold medal as a part of the U.S. team that defeated France in the final in Paris in 1924. In 1986, he was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame.

## TAYLOR DOUTHIT

More noted for his prowess on the baseball diamond than on the court, 1988 Hall of Famer Douthit still earned three letters in basketball in 1922, '23 and '24. He also was a three-year letterman in baseball and went on to a 10-year Major League career with the St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati Reds, playing in three World Series.

## HAL EIFERT

A three-year starting forward from 1932-34, Eifert, who entered the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986, was regarded as one of the finest players on the West Coast during his era. He earned first team Pacific Coast Conference honors in both 1933 and '34 and set a Cal record with 252 points while claiming first team All-America recognition 1934.

## LARRY FRIEND

A first team Helms Athletic Foundation All-America in 1957, Friend also earned all-conference and team MVP honors that season. He averaged 18.9 ppg as a senior in leading the Bears to a 21-5 record and an NCAA Tournament appearance. The 6-4 forward finished his career with 1,061 points and was Cal's top scorer in both 1956 and '57. He joined the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1994.

# PROMINENT CAL PLAYERS

## ED GRAY

A 6-3 guard for the Bears from 1996-97, Gray earned Pac-10 Player of the Year and third team Associated Press All-America honors as a senior after averaging a school-record 24.8 ppg. He established the Cal mark with 48 points at Washington State Feb. 22, despite playing just 25 minutes and breaking a bone in his foot with just over a minute left in the game. The injury sidelined him for the rest of the year, but did not diminish an otherwise spectacular season. Among his other school records are highest career scoring average (20.0 ppg) and most 30-point games (6, tie). As a junior, he was voted Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year. Gray was selected with the 22nd pick of the first round of the 1997 NBA Draft by the Atlanta Hawks.

## CHUCK HANGER

A 1992 inductee into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame, Hanger paced Cal in scoring in both 1947 (10.1 ppg) and 1948 (14.5 ppg). In 1948, he earned Southern Division PCC honors as well as the team's Co-Most Inspirational Player award. Also a track & field standout, he captured the conference title in the high jump with a leap of 6-4 in 1948, later tying for third in the event at the NCAA championships. Upon graduation, Hanger delivered Cal's commencement address at Memorial Stadium.

## BOB HERWIG

Captain of Cal's basketball team in the mid-1930s, Herwig's main focus was on the football field, where he earned All-America honors as a center in 1937. A three-year letterman, he played on Cal's "Thunder Teams," including the 1937 squad that finished 10-0-1 and claimed the national championship. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1964 and the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1988.

## DARRALL IMHOFF

Imhoff earned All-America and all-conference honors in 1959 and '60 as standout center for the Bears from 1958-60. A member of the 1959 team that won the NCAA championship (hitting the winning basket with 17 seconds left to give Cal a 71-70 victory over West Virginia), he was also on the 1960 squad that finished second, losing to Ohio State in the final. Imhoff won a gold medal as part of the U.S. Olympic team in Rome in 1960, and he went on to a 12-year NBA career with All-Star Game appearances in 1966 and '67. Imhoff was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1988.

## CHARLES JOHNSON

Johnson was captain of Cal's teams from 1969-71 and finished his career with 1,025 points in 73 career games, a 13.9 ppg average. He also paced the Bears in assists twice and pulled down more than 500 rebounds (7.0 rpg). Johnson was an all-conference guard in 1969, and he entered the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

## KEVIN JOHNSON

Cal's No. 3 all-time scorer with 1,655 points, the 6-1 Johnson was a four-year starter at point guard from 1984-87. He earned first team All-Pac-10 honors as both a junior and a senior and was an honorable mention All-American both seasons, as well. In 1986, he led Cal to the NIT, the program's first postseason berth in 26 years. He was a first round draft pick of the Cleveland Cavaliers in 1987, but spent most of his NBA career with the Phoenix Suns. In 1992, Johnson became the first Cal basketball player to have his jersey retired when his No. 11 was raised to the rafters above Pete Newell Court. He was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000.

## JOE KAPP

A two-year letterman in basketball, Kapp played under Pete Newell during the 1957 and '58 seasons, helping the Bears to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances. On the football field, Kapp earned first team All-America honors at quarterback in 1958 when he led the Bears to the Rose Bowl. Kapp later played eight years in the CFL before moving to the NFL where he took the Minnesota Vikings to the 1970 Super Bowl. He served as Cal's head football coach from 1982-86 and was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992.

# PROMINENT CAL PLAYERS

## JASON KIDD

Although his Cal career spanned just two seasons, Kidd had perhaps the greatest impact ever on the Cal basketball program. The 6-4 point guard was voted the National Freshman of the Year in 1993 after leading the country in assists with 110 and guiding the Bears to the NCAA Sweet 16. As a sophomore, Kidd was voted Pac-10 Player of the Year and first team Associated Press All-American when he dished out a national-high 272 assists (9.1 apg) and recorded four triple-doubles. He had a school-record 18 assists at Stanford in 1994 and set a Cal mark with eight steals vs. Washington in 1993. His career total of 204 steals is also a school record, snapping the previous Cal mark in only his 46th game. Kidd's career scoring high was 27 points, first set at Arizona as a freshman and matched against Santa Clara in the 1993-94 season opener. After leaving Cal, he was taken with the second overall pick of the NBA Draft by the Dallas Mavericks.

## GROVER KLEMMER

A talented all-around athlete who lettered at Cal in track & field, football and basketball from 1941-43, Klemmer set the world record in the 400 meters with a time of 46.0 and 440 yards in 1941. He won on the national AAU/TAC 440 titles in both 1940 and '41 and was a member of Cal's world record-setting mile relay team in 1941. Klemmer entered the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1988.

## SEAN LAMPLEY

Lampley, the first player recruited by head coach Ben Braun, finished his career as Cal's all-time leading scorer with 1,776 points. Voted the 2001 Pac-10 Player of the Year, the 6-7 forward averaged 19.5 ppg and 7.2 rpg during his senior campaign. When he graduated, Lampley was the only player in the Cal record book to rank among the school's Top 10 in scoring (1st), rebounding (4th) and assists (10th). He had 30 double-doubles in four years, including two with points and assists. Lampley scored a career-best 32 points in an overtime win at Oregon State in '01, and he pulled down a high of 18 rebounds vs. Fresno State in the first round of the 1999 NIT. That year, he led Cal to the NIT championship and was selected tournament MVP. His hometown Chicago Bulls drafted Lampley in the second round in 2001.

## O.C. "CORT" MAJORS

One of only nine athletes in California history to earn letters in three different sports, Majors was part of the football, basketball and track & field squads at Cal from 1918-20, gaining induction into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1990. On the football field, he was captain of Cal's 1920 team that beat Ohio State in the Rose Bowl, while he was a shot put specialist in track and a two-year letterman at guard in basketball. Majors later served as president of the Big C Society, chair of the Athletic Council, and president of the California Alumni Association.

## BOB McKEEN

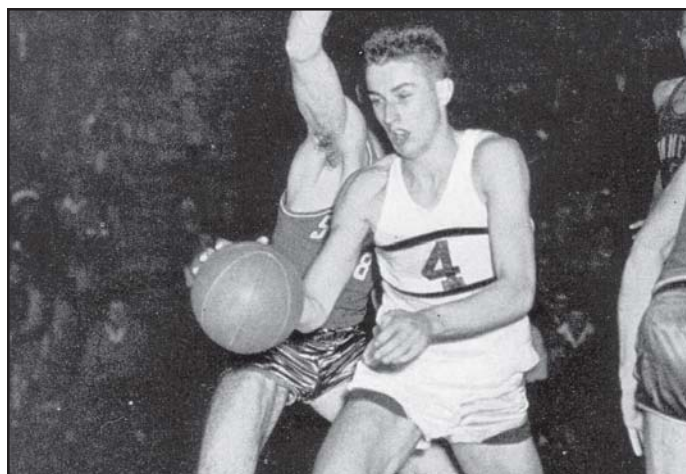
A standout player for the Bears for four years, McKeen lettered from 1952-55 and left as Cal's all-time leading scorer (1,654 points). He garnered All-America distinction in 1955, in addition to All-Coast and all-conference. McKeen still ranks as Cal's top career rebounder with 1,019 caroms. He topped the 30-point barrier five times, including a best of 40 points vs. Utah in 1954, and he had a pair of 20-rebound performances. McKeen was enshrined in the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989.

## MARK McNAMARA

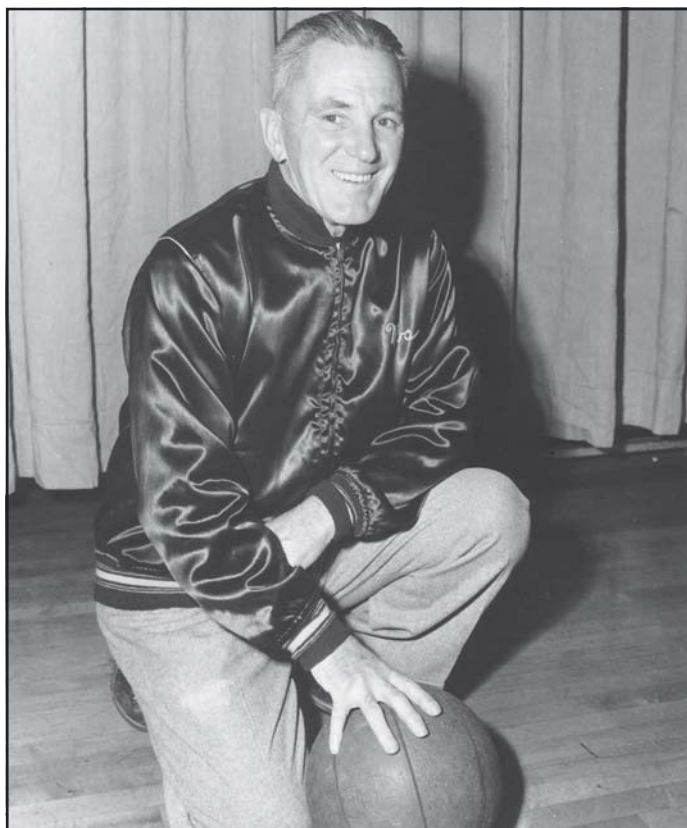
McNamara, a 6-11, 235-pound center, spent two seasons with the Bears after transferring from Santa Clara. He became the first player in school history to score 1,000 in his first two seasons with the Bears, finishing with 1,041 points. A 1982 first team All-Pac-10 selection, McNamara was also a two-time team MVP. He set a school record by totaling at least 30 points six times during his career, with a best of 37 points vs. Seattle Pacific in 1980. McNamara was a first round NBA draft choice by Philadelphia, and he staying in the league through 1989, playing with the 76ers, San Antonio, Kansas City and the Los Angeles Lakers.

## LAMOND MURRAY

One of the most prolific scorers in school history, Murray left Cal after his junior year for the NBA with the No. 1 spot on the Bears all-time list with 1,688 points (since broken). A two-time All-Pac-10 choice, he was voted second team All-American by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association in 1994. After averaging 24.7 ppg in three NCAA Tournament games in '93, the 6-7 forward paced the Pac-10 his junior year with 24.3 ppg and a school-record 729 points. Murray scored a career-high 38 points in his final regular-season game at Washington State, the fifth 30-point game of his career. He had at least 20 points in eight consecutive games during one stretch and reached the 20-point barrier a total of 46 times. The Los Angeles Clippers took Murray with the seventh selection of the 1994 NBA Draft.

## CLARENCE "NIBS" PRICE

A coaching fixture at Cal for more than 30 years, Price served as head coach of both the football and basketball teams during his career. In football, he was 27-17-3 from 1926-30 and led the Bears to the 1930 Rose Bowl. Price also handled basketball duties from 1924-54 and is the

school's all-time victory leader, finishing with a 449-294 mark. He took the Bears to the Final Four in 1946. Price graduated from Cal in 1914 after lettering on the baseball team. He was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986.

## JOHN & RUPE RICKSEN

The twin brothers were superb two-sport stars at Cal during the early 1950s, starring in tennis and basketball. They were both NCAA quarterfinalists in singles, Rupe in 1951 and John in '53. As a double tandem, they reached the NCAA semifinals in 1951 and the quarters in '52 and '53. John was a first team all-conference player in basketball in 1953, while Rupe was assistant coach under Pete Newell from 1957-59, including Cal's NCAA title team in '59. The brothers were inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999.

## EARL ROBINSON

A 1988 Cal Athletic Hall of Fame inductee, Robinson was a 6-1 guard on Cal's 1957 and '58 teams that won a pair of conference titles and advanced to the NCAA regionals. He served as captain of the 1958 squad and earned All-Coast honors in both '57 and '58. On the baseball diamond, Robinson was a Cal's shortstop on the Bears' 1957 national championship team. He batted .352 that year to claim All-America accolades. Robinson played with both the Los Angeles Dodgers and Baltimore Orioles before returning to Cal as an assistant basketball coach from 1963-65.

## ANDY WOLFE

A forward and guard for the Bears from 1946-48, Wolfe earned All-America honors as a senior and All-Southern Division PCC honors in 1946, '47 and '48. A member of the 1946 team that won the PCC championship and placed fourth in the NAAs, he was the first Cal player to score at least 1,000 points, finishing his career with 1,112 points. He joined the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in 1987.
