PROGRAM FOR STUDENT- ATHLETES

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed under the University's Student Life Educational Development cluster, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally-located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials, and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.

Geared around the

understanding of the amount of time student-athletes must devote to practice, training, physical therapy and team travel, the program creates an environment where students can cultivate good study habits, receive individual or group tutoring and obtain counseling from academic advisors.

One of the real success stories for the University of California in recent years is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes – the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and Athletic Department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program geared to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically-oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor and in the classroom.

DEREK VAN RHEENEN

DIRECTOR

Van Rheenen joined the ASC staff after serving on the Cal faculty since 1997, where he taught courses in American studies and in the College of Education. His areas of expertise include the intersection of athletics, academics, sport and American culture, and the history of intercollegiate athletics.

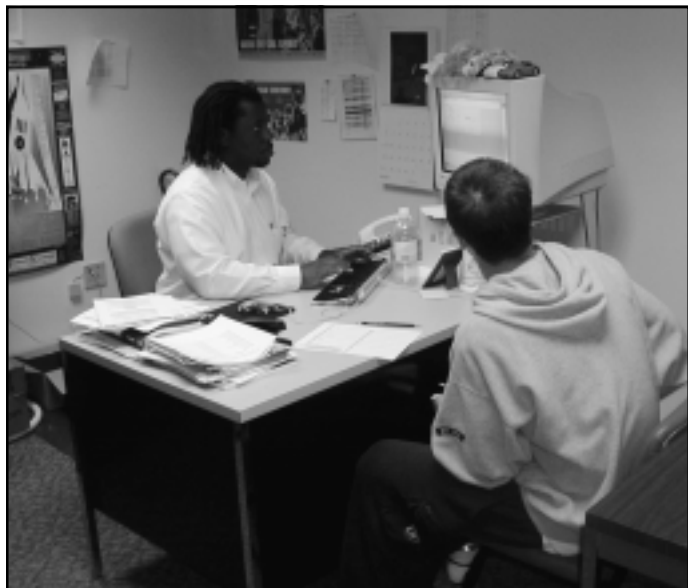
As an undergraduate at Cal, Van Rheenen was a four-year starter for the Bears and a three-time all-conference player in the mid-1980s. As a senior, he was selected Cal's MVP and an Academic All-American.

Following graduation, Van Rheenen competed with the U.S. National "B" team and with the San Francisco Blackhawks professional team. He also served as an assistant coach for the Bears for several years.

Van Rheenen received his bachelor's degree from Cal in political economies of industrial societies (PEIS) and German in 1986. He added a master's degree in education in 1993 and a Ph.D. in interdisciplinary studies in 1997, both from Cal.

BRUCE SMITH ACADEMIC ADVISOR



Bruce Smith serves as the academic advisor to the men's basketball team, helping the players understand and comply with university and NCAA rules and guidelines. He assists team members in choosing courses and majors, developing time-management skills, and resolving personal and academic issues.

Prior to joining the Cal staff, Smith taught high school English in Providence, R.I., and Los Angeles.

Smith received his bachelor's degree in American civilizations at Brown University in 1993, where he was also a member of the football team. After earning a Master's degree in instruction and curriculum at USC, he began working toward his Ph.D. in language, literacy and culture at Cal's Graduate School of Education.

Smith and his wife, Melinda, reside in the East Bay.

TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The tutorial component promotes and enhances students' academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The program focuses mainly on freshman and sophomores, and the Center uses between 50-60 tutors per semester to guarantee that as many courses as possible are covered. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when they have more time to devote to studying.

ADVISING PROGRAM

The advising component offers a broad range of services and programs to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with University, college and NCAA rules, developing time management skills and resolving personal issues unique to student-athletes. During the freshman year, advisors typically try to help student-athletes make a successful academic transition from high school, while during the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. For the final two years, advisors take more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made and referring juniors and seniors to areas on campus that can help with internships, graduate school applications and career planning.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

In addition, the Athletic Study Center offers a six-week Summer Bridge adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components for the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is Peer Advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus life guidance for new intercollegiate athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes and assist in developing programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.

An integral part of Cal basketball is the strength and conditioning program. The program's philosophy is geared towards helping each student-athlete achieve the highest level of athletic development.

By teaching how all the components of strength and conditioning fit together, student-athletes understand how to maximize force production. This includes enhancement of speed, strength and flexibility that results in improved power. Motivating, educating and helping to reach maximum athletic development is the primary focus of the Cal program.

The Cal weight room at Haas Pavilion includes six Olympic platforms, more than 5,000 pounds of Olympic bars and bumper plates, and an array of aerobic and anaerobic equipment. The facility is brightly designed and

overlooks Evans Baseball Diamond to the west. Cal also has a 2,000-square foot weight room in Memorial Stadium with similar Olympic equipment that offers panoramic views of the entire region, including San Francisco and the Bay.

The training regimen at Cal is a year-round process that emphasizes the speed, strength and flexibility. With closely monitored workouts that involve a great deal of individual instruction and attention, student-athletes are taught the correct techniques to increase their ability to perform at their peak during competition.

Cal's program stresses comprehensive training in order to improve both strength and speed. Flexibility is a key component because it is essential for proper lifting. It also improves the running mechanics needed

for acceleration and deceleration, both essential for playing basketball.

Athlete workouts are closely monitored by the conditioning staff, who work in collaboration with the entire sports medicine team (doctors, athletic trainers, physical therapists, nutritionists, etc.) to ensure the health and safety of all of student-athletes.

In this way, Cal's strength and conditioning program is a vital component linking the "full circle" of a student-athlete's physical development from conditioning through rehabilitation and re-conditioning.

Wong spent his first two years with the Golden Bear program as a graduate assistant, before being promoted to a full-time position in 1999.

In addition to men's basketball, Wong has also worked with several other Cal teams, including baseball, men's soccer, men's and women's swimming & diving, field hockey and women's golf. He has also assisted with track & field, water polo and football.

Wong graduated from Cal in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in human biodynamics, becoming the eighth member of his family to receive a degree from UC Berkeley. He is currently working toward a Master's degree in kinesiology at Cal State Hayward.



SPORTS MEDICINE



Golden Bear student-athletes are privileged to be supported by one of the top medical staffs in college athletics along with some of the most modern training and rehabilitation equipment in the country. The comprehensive program features state-of-the-art facilities as well as a staff of acclaimed practitioners of all areas of sports medicine.

In addition to facilities at both Haas Pavilion and Memorial Stadium, Cal athletes also use University Health Services, which oversees and supervises sports medicine services to all injured or ailing Golden Bear athletes.

The \$18 million Tang Center, which houses the Health Services, provides access to physician clinics, laboratory services, X-ray and other ancillary services such as nutrition and counseling. The athletic medicine area is supervised by Bill Coysh, Ph.D., who is involved in the day-to-day management of the program as well as being actively engaged in sports psychology.

The expert staff of team physicians is headed by Dr. Cindy Chang, M.D. The staff features specialists from the fields of orthopedic surgery, family medicine, internal medicine, physiatry and podiatry. The medical staff, with their diverse backgrounds and areas of expertise, have treated injured athletes on every level of competition, including Olympic and professional athletes.

Cal's athletic training staff boasts nine certified athletic trainers, a physical therapist and 20 student athletic trainers. The staff tends to the day-to-day health care needs of Cal athletes in 27 different sports. With more than 100 years of experience in evaluating, treating and rehabilitating injuries and illness, Cal's training staff certainly qualifies as one of the best in college athletics.

Whether it's for taping, physical therapy or rehabilitation of an injury, Cal athletes have the full confidence that Cal's medical staff will provide the best care available with one of the most progressive treatment and rehabilitation programs in the country. Not only are trainers provided for home and away athletic contests, but practices are also staffed on a full-



time basis.

Cal student-athletes have access to a pair of athletic training facilities, both at the

new Haas Pavilion and at Memorial Stadium. In both instances, the spacious training rooms are located adjacent to the weight training rooms and house rehabilitation equipment, hydrotherapy space and an extensive pre-practice preparation area.

Cal's comprehensive health care program is designed to meet the every need of today's student-athlete competing for the school.

CINDY CHANG HEAD TEAM PHYSICIAN



Now in her eighth year at Cal, Cindy Chang serves as head team physician for Cal's 28 athletic teams. Prior to coming to Cal, she was a team physician for the Ohio State Buckeyes and an assistant professor in Ohio State's medical school.

Dr. Chang was elected to the Board of Directors for the American Medical Society of Sports Medicine, and appointed to the Medical Education Committee for the American College of Sports

Medicine. Chang served as a physician at the U.S. Olympic Training Center and was a member of the U.S. medical staff for the Winter Paralympic Games in Nagano, Japan, in 1998.

As an assistant clinical professor at UC Davis and UCSF, she earning both her bachelor's ('84) and medical ('89) degrees from Ohio State, Chang completed her family practice residency at UCLA before returning to Ohio State for a fellowship in sports medicine. She and her husband, Chris (Cal '88), live in Berkeley with their children, Carlin and Joseph.

ERIC WIEDERHOLD ATHLETIC TRAINER



Eric Wiederhold is in his fifth year at Cal and his fourth season as athletic trainer for the Golden Bear men's basketball team.

Wiederhold, who also works with the men's and women's swimming and cross country teams at Cal, has previously worked with football, men's and women's gymnastics, and men's and women's crew. He also directs Cal's student trainer program.

Prior to arriving at Cal, Wiederhold was an assistant athletic trainer at West Valley College in Saratoga, and he led an injury prevention course at San Jose State University. An athletic trainer intern with the NFL's San Francisco 49ers from 1996-97, he has also worked as head athletic trainer at Santa Teresa HS in San Jose.

Wiederhold, 29, received his bachelor's degree from Pacific Lutheran in 1995 and his master's degree in keniology from San Jose State in 1997. He resides in Oakland.



The San Francisco Bay Area is a major metropolitan area of approximately six million people and one of the most scenic regions in the United States. The City has been named the world's top city twice by readers of *Condé Nast Traveler* and the top U.S. city seven times since 1988.

The San Francisco Bay is spanned by two landmarks, the Golden Gate and San Francisco-Oakland Bay bridges, and graced by four islands: Alcatraz, Angel, Yerba Buena and Treasure. The area is easily navigated by car, BART (Bay Area Rapid Transit), bus or ferry, making it easily accessible to all.

Located across the Bay Bridge from San Francisco, Oakland is a city of more than 380,000, jam-packed with exciting attractions, stimulating arts, and a climate that is ranked number one in the country by Prentice Hall's Places Rated Almanac. Oakland's charm exceeds its man-made wonders, as its tumbling hills, vast forests, hiking and riding trails, beautiful lakes and numerous parks provide a natural escape for those

who prefer nature over an urban environment.

Berkeley, just a 12-mile drive from San Francisco, is situated on 18.8 square miles with a population of 105,000 people. A study in contrasts, Berkeley is a small town with a big-city character.

In the Berkeley hills, Tilden Regional Park offers more than 30 miles of hiking trails, a public golf course, swimming at Lake Anza and plenty of places to picnic. As part of its wealth of cultural life, Berkeley boasts the award-winning Berkeley Repertory Theatre, an opera company, a nationally celebrated symphony and a ballet company.

Just north of San Francisco, across the shining jewel of the Bay Area – the Golden Gate Bridge – lies Marin County and the North Bay. Stunning views of hills and mountains cascading into the bay and the ocean at every turn, Marin County boasts some of the most beautiful scenery in the world.

The Golden Gate National Recreation Area, the only U.S. national park in a major metropolitan area, is the largest urban park in the world. Muir Woods National Monument offers peaceful walks and hikes through majestic groves of towering redwoods, while Point Reyes National Seashore offers spectacular bird and whale watching.

Sports fans can see it all in the Bay Area – professional football (San Francisco 49ers, Oakland Raiders), professional basketball (Golden State Warriors), professional baseball (San Francisco Giants, Oakland Athletics), professional hockey (San Jose Sharks), and outstanding collegiate competition.

ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS



Baseball: Led by a pair of All-Pac-10 performers in catcher John Baker and first baseman Conor Jackson, Cal completed the 2002 season with a 29-27 record. Baker was a finalist for the Johnny Bench Award as the nation's top catcher, while Jackson was a finalist for the Dick Howser Trophy given to the nation's top collegiate player.

Men's Basketball: Cal posted its best record since 1996-97 – 23-9 overall – and tied for second place in the Pac-10. The Bears reached the semifinals of the league tournament and advanced to the second round of the NCAA playoffs. Cal was ranked 25th in the Associated Press poll at the end of the regular season.

Women's Basketball: Senior Ami Forney and sophomore LaTasha O'Keith received honorable mention All-Pac-10 honors as the Bears' top two scorers.

Men's Crew: Cal captured its fourth consecutive varsity eight national title at the IRA championships in New Jersey. The JV eight also took the gold medal, while the freshman boat placed fourth.

Women's Crew: The Bears posted their highest NCAA team points finish with a third-place showing at nationals. Cal's varsity eight and JV eight both came in third, with the varsity four winning gold.

Cross Country: Cal's young teams gained valuable experience in 2001 that they hope to translate into greater success this fall.

Field Hockey: Cal concluded the season with a 14-5 mark, the second-best tally in school history, and reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1994. The Bears, who were ranked 17th in the country at season's end, claimed their third straight conference title.

Football: Quarterback Kyle Boller and tailback Joe Igbere entered Cal's all-time top 10 for passing and rushing yards, respectively. Offensive tackle Langston Walker was drafted in the second round by the Oakland Raiders.

Men's Golf: Led by first team All-Pac-10 choice Peter Tomasulo, Cal placed 12th at NCAA regionals, falling just two shots shy of qualifying for the NCAA championship rounds.

Women's Golf: The Bears placed 15th at the NCAA championships – the highest finish in the history of the program. Vikki Laing and Sarah Huarte earned first team All-Pac-10 honors, and Nancy McDaniel was named the National Golf Coaches Association Western Coach of the Year.

Men's Gymnastics: Cody Moore won the NCAA title on the pommel horse to lead Cal to a third-place finish at nationals.

Women's Gymnastics: Mylan Dodd earned an invitation to NCAA regionals as an all-arounder.

Lacrosse: Cal earned a Top 25 ranking early in the year and placed second in the conference, finishing with an 11-7 overall record.

Rugby: With Kort Schubert winning MVP honors, the Bears captured their 12th straight national title. Cal has claimed 19 of 23 championships since 1980.

Men's Soccer: Seven players garnered All-Pac-10 recognition and Cal earned its first NCAA Tournament berth since 1996.

Women's Soccer: Behind two-time All-American Laura Schott, Cal advanced to its 10th NCAA Tournament. Schott led the Pac-10 in points (33) and goals (15) for the second straight year.

Softball: Cal swept through postseason play to win the Women's College World Series with a 6-0 win over Arizona. Pitcher Jocelyn Forest, the Most Outstanding Player of the WCWS, and third baseman Candace Harper both earned All-America honors.

Men's Swimming: Led by national titles from Anthony Ervin in the 100 free and the Bears' 400 free relay, Cal finished sixth at the 2002 NCAA championships. Ervin was named the Pac-10 Swimmer of the Year and freshman Duje Draganja was the Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year.

Women's Swimming: Paced by Natalie Coughlin, the NCAA and Pac-10 Swimmer of the Year who set four American records at the NCAA championships, Cal finished eighth in the country. Coughlin was also a finalist for the Sullivan Award as the nation's top amateur athlete, and Teri McKeever was the 2002 Pac-10 Coach of the Year.

Men's Tennis: Ranked 13th in the country at the end of the season, Cal put together the highest winning percentage in school history in 2002 (18-6). John Paul Fruttero and Robert Kowalczyk teamed to form the nation's ninth-ranked doubles tandem.

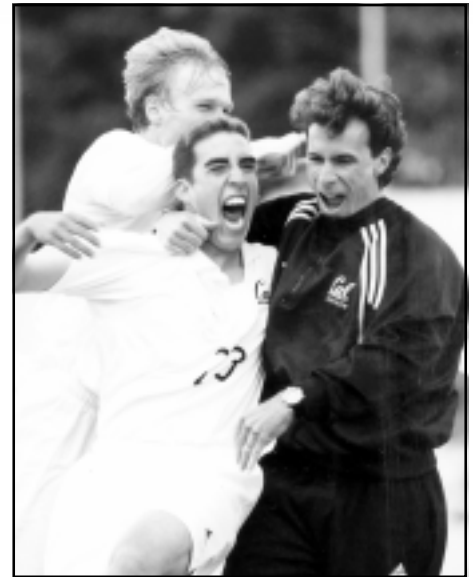
Women's Tennis: Led by Pac-10 doubles champions Raquel Kops-Jones and Christina Fusano, the Bears reached the Round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament and were rated 13th after the season.

Track & Field: Seniors Erin Belger (third in the 800 meters), Jennifer Joyce (seventh in the hammer throw) and Bubba McLean (eighth in the pole vault) garnered All-America honors for the Bears.

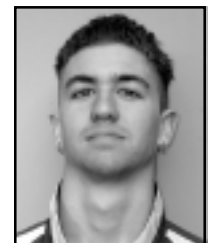
Volleyball: Freshman middle blocker Camille Leffall earned Pac-10 All-Freshman honors, the first Cal player to claim the award since 1996. Leffall also established a new school season hitting percentage record of .381.

Men's Water Polo: Cal finished the 2001 campaign 15-7 and ranked second in final national poll. The Bears, led by All-Americans Spencer Dornin and Attila Banhid, gave eventual national champion Stanford its only loss of the season, a 4-3 Bear victory in the Big Splash.

Women's Water Polo: Cal, paced by All-Americans Brenna Fleener and Ericka Lorenz, finished the 2002 season 18-8 and were fifth in the final national rankings.



Cal men's soccer reached the 2002 NCAA Tournament for the first time in six years.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



On the strength of an NCAA championship in softball, Cal placed 20th in the final 2002 Sears Director's Cup standings - the Golden Bears' third consecutive finish in the Top 20.

The Sears Cup measures a school's overall level of success based on performances of teams in 20 selected sports and ranks all 323 NCAA Division I institutions.

In addition to softball, which claimed the first NCAA team championship in school history, Cal also earned third-place finishes in women's crew and men's gymnastics, sixth place in men's swimming and eighth in women's swimming.

However, Cal's finish could have been even higher except that four teams that finished among the top five in the nation did not contribute to the standings. Both rugby and men's crew defended their national titles, but neither sport competes under the NCAA umbrella. In addition, men's water polo was ranked second in the final poll and women's water polo was fifth, but the Bears were not among the four teams invited to their respective NCAA championship tournaments, and thus received no Sears Cup points.

Credentials will be held at the Media Will Call table the day of the game unless other arrangements are made. Professional teams wanting to scout games in Haas Pavilion may purchase tickets through the Media Relations Office.

MEDIA WILL CALL

The Media Will Call Table is located on the east side of Haas Pavilion, just north of the main entrance. It opens 1 1/2 hours before tip-off and remains open through halftime. Identification is required to pick up credentials or tickets.

MEDIA PARKING

A limited number of media parking passes for lots near Haas Pavilion are available in advance from the Media Relations Office. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible, and passes can be left at the media parking lot entrances.

BEARS ON TELEVISION

The Cal Athletic Department and  KRON TV (Channel 4) out of San Francisco have partnered to broadcast Golden Bear basketball games through the 2005-06 season.


KRON will televise up to 10 men's basketball games per year, both home and away. The contract, which began in 2001, runs through the 2005-06 season.

In addition to men's basketball, KRON televises selected football games in the fall and has the right to show any other Cal sporting event.

Besides KRON, Cal will appear on several other networks over the course of the year, including Fox Sports Net, ABC and CBS.

BEARS ON RADIO

Cal basketball games move to a new radio home this season, with all games broadcast on  KFRS Radio (610 AM) out of San Francisco. All 28 regular-season contests, plus any postseason games, will be aired live. Coverage of the Golden Bears begins 20 minutes before tip-off with the Cal Basketball Pre-game Show. After each game, head coach Ben Braun will recap the action on the post-game report. During the season, the Ben Braun Show, hosted by JD and Cammy, airs on Tuesday mornings on both 610 AM and KFRS's FM outlet, 99.7.

Roxy Bernstein is in his sixth season as the voice of the Bears.  A Cal graduate, Bernstein began broadcasting Cal games during the 1996-97 season. In addition, he has hosted Cal's post-game radio call-in show and is the Bay Area reporter for ESPN Radio. He has also called play-by-play for the NHL's San Jose Sharks and NHL Radio, and was the lead radio announcer for the San Francisco Demons of the XFL in 2001.

Cal's post-game show, Bear Talk, returns with host Marty Lurie this season. The call-in program begins 20 minutes after the final buzzer and is a fast-paced half hour featuring analysis of the game and interviews with players and visiting alumni, plus reactions to the game from the fans. Bear Talk originates from the Haas Club Room adjacent to the court following all Cal home games.

Entering the 2002-03 season, the Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions." Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 65 NCAA team titles over the past eight seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.

Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 65 team titles over the past eight seasons have come in 21 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has led the nation in NCAA championships 37 of the last 42 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievement, the Pac-10 has captured 317 NCAA titles (240 men's, 77 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 191 titles.

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual Sears Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. Stanford won the 2001-02 Sears Cup, with UCLA coming in at No. 5, Arizona at No. 9, USC and Arizona State tying for 13th and Cal finishing 20th.

The Bears' finish could have been even higher except that four teams that finished among the top five in the nation did not contribute to the standings. Both rugby and men's crew defended their national titles, but neither sport competes under the NCAA umbrella. In addition, men's water polo was ranked second in the final poll and women's water polo was fifth, but the Bears were not among the four teams invited to their respective NCAA championship tournaments, and thus received no Sears Cup points.

NCAA team champions from the Pac-10 in 2001-02 came from: California (softball), Stanford (women's tennis, women's volleyball, men's and women's water polo) and USC (men's tennis). Overall, the Conference had 22 teams finish in the top three at NCAA championship events.

The Pac-10 men's basketball tournament returned after a 12-year hiatus, and Arizona won its fourth consecutive Pac-10 tournament crown and earned the league's automatic NCAA Tournament berth.

The Conference enjoyed success in softball once again as seven teams made it to the NCAA Regional Tournament, marking the fourth consecutive season the Pac-10 has sent at least seven teams to regionals. With California winning the softball championship, it earned the school's first women's NCAA title and became the eighth school in the Pac-10 to claim a women's crown.

On the men's side, Pac-10 members have won 240 NCAA team championships, far ahead of the 182 claimed by the runner-up Big Ten. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-10 - 15 basketball titles by five schools (more than any other conference), 48 tennis titles, 45 outdoor track and field crowns, and 24 baseball titles. Pac-10 members have won 23 of the last 33 NCAA titles in volleyball, 28 of the last 43 in water polo, and 20 total swimming and diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA men's individual champions as well, claiming 1062 NCAA individual crowns. In fact, three of the top five schools nationally in producing men's NCAA individual titlists are from the Pac-10 - No. 1 USC (284), No. 3 Stanford (230) and No. 5 UCLA (160).

The roots of the Pacific-10 Conference go back nearly 87 years to December 15, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. Original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916. One year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the Conference, and Stanford University joined in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California and the University of Idaho. Montana joined the Conference in 1924, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-team league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45, when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference. The PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and a new Conference was formed - the Athletic Association of Western Universities. Original AAUW membership consisted of California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State became a member in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. In 1968, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports.

Currently, the Pac-10 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two other women's sports.

The Pacific-10 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.
