California Spoils A&M's Holiday Plans

The Golden Bears cruised to a 45-10 victory over Big XII opponent, Texas A&M, in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl held in San Diego on December 28, 2006. In fact the 35-point win was the biggest margin of victory for Cal in bowl history. In what would be his final game in a Bear uniform, junior **Marshawn Lynch** rushed for 111 yards and two touchdowns, and was selected as the game's co-offensive MVP. Teammate **Justin Forsett**, who was the game's leading rusher with 124 yards, also found the endzone in the fourth quarter. The 100-yard performances by Lynch and Forsett marked the first time Cal had two 100-yard rushers since Oct. 22, 2005, when Lynch and Forsett each ran for over 100 yards against Washington State. Quarterback **Nate Longshore** had a sound statistical game completing 19-of-24 passes for 235 yards and a touchdown, en route to co-offensive MVP honors. Not to be overshadowed by the offense, linebacker **Desmond Bishop** recorded a game-high 12 tackles (8 solo/4 asst) to earn Defensive MVP honors. The win also gave the Bears their third in their last four bowl games played.

Another Successful Year in the Tedford Era

California produced another successful campaign in 2006 that ended with a 10-3 record, a No. 14 national ranking, a Pac-10 Co-Championship, and a 45-10 victory over Texas A&M in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl. With its 10-3 record, Cal posted its fifth straight winning season for the first time since 1947-51. Leading the way for the Golden Bears were seven first-team All-Pac-10 selections, including the league's Offensive Player of the Year Marshawn Lynch and the Defensive Player of the Year Daymeion Hughes. In addition, sophomore DeSean Jackson earned all-league first team recognition at two positions - wide receiver and punt returner. The other first team honorees were linebacker Desmond Bishop, defensive tackle Brandon Mebane and center Alex Mack. The conference co-championship is the first for Cal since the 1975 season when the Bears tied with UCLA, while the fourth straight bowl appearance is the longest streak in program history.

Individual Bear Highlights

For the first time in program history, Cal swept the Pac-10 Offensive (Marshawn Lynch) and Defensive (Daymeion Hughes) Player of the Year honors in the same season ... the Bears had seven All-Pac-10 first team selections and five second team honorees ... DeSean Jackson ranked first in the nation in punt return average (18.20/gm) and led the nation with four punt-return touchdowns ... he set a school-record with 455 total punt return yards (O'Neal, 447 yards in 1999) ... his 18.2 punt return average was also a school-record for a single-season (Paul Keckly, 15.3 in 1948) ... Jackson set season (4) and career (5) Pac-10 records for punt return TDs with his 95-yard return against Arizona ... Jackson finished the 2006 season with a team-best 1,060 yards receiving (third in the Pac-10) ... in fact Jackson ranked fifth in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards per game (120.9) ... Lynch finished his junior campaign with a Pac-10 best 1,356 rushing yards ...

he is just the second player in Cal history with two 1,000-yard seasons ... he is just the fourth to go over 3,000 career rushing yards (3,230) ... Lynch topped the Pac-10 in touchdowns with 15, while Jackson finished tied for second with 13 ... Lynch finished his career with 35 touchdowns in 35 career games (fourth on the career scoring chart for touchdowns), while Jackson will have 21 touchdowns in 24 career games entering the 2007 season ... Hughes led the Pac-10 with eight interceptions (four returned for touchdowns) and finished tied for second in the nation in that category ... Hughes finished his career with 15 interceptions and 29 passes deflected ... his eight interceptions in 2006 were the second-most in a season at Cal while his 15 career INTs also rank second in Golden Bear history ... Nate Longshore finished second in the Pac-10 in touchdown passes (24) and passing efficiency (141.6), and third passing yards (3,021) ... In fact Longshore became just the second guarterback in program history to throw over 3,000 yards in a single season (Pat Barnes - 3,499 yards in 1996) ... Desmond Bishop finished 2006 as the Pac-10 leader with 126 tackles for 9.7 tackles per game average -- also tops in the conference ... Bishop finished his two-year career with 215 tackles, including 19 games with seven or more tackles and eight career double figure tackle performances ... Tom Schneider was a perfect 52-of-52 on PATs and a 13-of-15 on field goals inside the 50

Team Notables

Cal has won 28 games over the last five years (Jeff Tedford's tenure), the second-most in the Pac-10 ... The Bears finished the season ranked third in the nation in interceptions (21) ... 2006 marked the fifth time in program history that Cal had an eight-game winning streak (single season) ... 2006 also marked the first time since 1949 that Cal started 6-0 in conference play ... Cal had 28 scoring drives in 2006 that took less than two minutes ... Cal has had at least one 100-yard rusher in 41 of 63 games under Tedford, meanwhile, its opponents have had just 15 games with 100-yard rushers ... Cal had 58 pass plays of 20 or more yards ... the Golden Bears also had 49 other plays (rushing, punt returns, kickoff returns and interception returns) of over 20 yards ... Cal had 28 scores in '06 that took less than two minutes ... the Bears also had 19 scoring drives that lasted less than 2:00, as well as three interception return TDs, four punt returns for touchdowns, a safety and a fumble return score ... Cal had 16 different players catch passes in 2006 and 14 different players score touchdowns ... the Bears allowed a Pac-10-low 13 sacks all season ... Cal set a school-record for punt return average (17.3 per game) last season ... Cal finished the 2006 campaign with three sellouts -- it's also the first time in over 50 years the Bears have been over 50,000 fans for 18 straight home games.

Pac-10 Co-Champions

2006 marked the first time since the 1975 season that California earned a share of the Pac-10 Conference championship ... Cal secured the co-championship after its 26-17 victory over Stanford (Dec. 2) coupled with a UCLA upset victory over USC in Pasadena also on Dec. 2 ... Both Cal and USC finished 7-2 in league play ... In 1975, Cal tied with UCLA for the league title, but the head-to-head loss to the Bruins denied a Rose Bowl bid. Cal's 27-14 league mark over the last five years (Jeff Tedford's tenure) is the second-best record in the Pac-10 in that time ... This is the 12th conference title for the Bears and just the seventh in the last 75 years. Here's a look at Cal's title teams:

Bowl Bits

California's appearance in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl marked the fourth straight year the Bears have advanced to a bowl game ... Prior to its current run of success, Cal's best stretch of bowl appearances was from 1948-50, when it earned three straight Rose Bowl bids under legendary head coach Pappy Waldorf ... Tedford's Bears were one of just three Pac-10 teams to go to a fourth straight bowl game in 2006 (USC and UCLA).

Other Bear POYs

Running back Marshawn Lynch and corner-back Daymeion Hughes were selected the Pac-10 Conference Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year respectively -- It is the first time Cal has won both awards in the same year. Lynch and Hughes joined a select group of Golden Bear stars who have won Pac-10 Player of the Year honors -- Chuck Muncie was the league's top player in 1975; Ron Rivera won the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year in 1983; Mike Pawlawski was the Offensive Player of the Year in 1991; and O'Neal was the league's top defender in 1999.

All-Conference Honors

California had a total of seven players honored on the all-Pac-10 first team and five more second team honorees. Marshawn Lynch and Daymeion Hughes were joined on the first team by senior linebacker Desmond Bishop, senior defensive tackle Brandon Mebane, sophomore wide receiver **DeSean Jackson** and sophomore center Alex Mack. In addition, Jackson was named a first-team all-conference performer as a punt returner, the first Cal player to be first team at two positions since Deltha O'Neal (1999, CB/RET). Senior defensive end Nu'u Tafisi, senior special teams standout Byron Storer, junior offensive lineman Mike Gibson, junior punter Andrew Larson and junior tight end Craig Stevens were all selected to the all-league second team. Earning honorable mention recognition were senior offensive lineman Andrew Cameron, senior linebacker Mickey Pimentel, senior offensive lineman Erik Robertson, junior wide receivers Lavelle Hawkins and Robert Jordan, sophomore linebacker Zack Follett and sophomore quarterback Nate Longshore.

Power Points

In the five years under Jeff Tedford, the Golden Bears have averaged 34.0 points per game, by far the most in any four-year stretch in school history. In fact, Tedford-coached teams own four of the top five slots in single-season scoring in the modern era of football in Berkeley.

The Big Game

The annual showdown between California and Stanford is the ninth oldest rival in NCAA football, dating back to 1892. Stanford leads the series, 54-44-11, but California has won the last five games by a combined score of 152-49. In 2004, Cal was a 41-6 winner with the 35-point margin of victory tying Cal's 1921 victory (42-7) for the Bears' largest winning margin in the series. Prior to the arrival of Jeff Tedford, Stanford won seven straight Big Games.

Tedford and the Cardinal

Jeff Tedford is now 5-0 vs. Stanford. He is behind only Andy Smith for the best start by a Cal coach in the series. Andy Smith began his Cal career with a 6-0 record against Stanford from 1918 through 1923. Smith did not face Stanford in his first two seasons on campus. His win streak ended with a tie in the seventh meeting. Pappy Waldorf began his career with a 3-0-1 record against Stanford and concluded his career with a 7-1-2 record in the Big Game. Cal had not won five straight Big Games since 1919-1923.

Lynch Delivers on the Ground

Marshawn Lynch led the Pac-10 in an impressive trifecta in 2006 - he led the league in rushing yards (104.3 per game, 14th in the nation), all-purpose yards (137.3 per game, 16th in the nation) and touchdowns (15). Lynch is also just the fourth player in California history with 3,000 career rushing yards and the second with multiple 1,000-yard rushing seasons. The Oakland product finished his career with a school-record 17 100-yard rushing games (eight in 2006). His most memorable moment may have been on Oct. 21 against Washington when he had 102 second-half rushing yards. In the final 6:50 of regulation and into the overtime period, Lynch rushed for 38 yards and two touchdowns while catching two passes for 32 yards to lead the Bears to the victory.

Hughes Collecting Hardware

Daymeion Hughes capped off his spectacular senior season with some impressive honors. The Los Angeles product was named the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year as well as being selected to the American Football Coaches Association All-America First Team. In addition, he was named a finalist for the prestigious Ronnie Lott Trophy, which recognizes on and off the field performances. Hughes finished tied for second in the nation with eight interceptions in 2006.

Go DJ

DeSean Jackson continued to show why he was one of the most exciting and dynamic players in the country in 2006. Jackson had four punt return touchdowns his sophomore campaign (five in his career) — both school and Pac-10 records. He set a school-record with 455 total punt return yards (O'Neal, 447 yards in 1999), while his 18.2 punt return average was also a school-record for a single-season (Paul Keckly, 15.3 in 1948). The NCAA record for punt return TDs is eight by Wes Welker (Texas Tech, 2000-03) and Antonio Perkins (Oklahoma, 2001-04). Amazingly, the Long Beach product has just 26 career punt returns, meaning he has scored on 19 percent of his returns. Heading into the 2007 season, Jackson will be the NCAA active leader in punt returns for touchdowns (5) and average per return (19.38).

Bishop Delivered the Sermon

Desmond Bishop piled up huge numbers in 2006, leading the Pac-10 with 126 tackles en route to being selected first team All-Pac-10. Bishop had a career-high 16 tackles in the overtime victory against Washington - a victory he clinched with an interception on the goal line in overtime - and added 13 tackles on Nov. 18 against USC. He had his third interception of the year on Nov. 4 against UCLA, picking off a Bruin pass on the Cal 10-yard line with 14 seconds to go in the first half. Bishop finished his two-year career with 215 tackles, including 19 games recording seven or more tackles, and eight career double-figure tackle games.

2006 PAC-10 LEADERBOARD (Final)

The Golden Bears led the Pac-10 in scoring (32.8), punt return average (16.6), red-zone offense (90.5%) and net punting (38.3), while ranking third in passing (253.2), and second in total offense (415.6), sacks allowed (13), and red-zone defense (72.2%).

Individually, **Marshawn Lynch** led the Pac-10 in rushing (104.3), all-purpose yards (137.3) and touchdowns (15). **DeSean Jackson** led the conference in punt-return average (17.5) and ranked tied for second in touchdowns (13); he was fifth in receiving yards per game (81.5). **Nate Longshore** was second in the league in passing touchdowns (24) and second in pass efficiency (141.6). **Tom Schneider** was tops in PATs (52-of-52). **Daymeion Hughes** led the league in interceptions (8) and in passes defended (19). **Desmond Bishop** led the league in tackles (126) and ranked fourth in tackles for loss (15.0). Zack Follett led the conference in forced fumbles (4).

Since Jeff Tedford was named the head coach of the Golden Bear football team after the 2001 season, it would not be an overstatement to refer to California's football renaissance over the past five years as one of the most impressive turnarounds in college football history.

The Golden Bears were just 1-10 in 2001, but by 2004, Tedford had guided them to the top five in the Associated Press poll. California's attendance has jumped from approximately 33,000 fans per game in 2001 to more than 60,000 each of the past three seasons. The Bears will play in bowl games in four straight years after playing in four bowl games the previous 22 seasons.

In his first five years, Tedford led Cal to a 42-20 record following a period in which the Bears had won a total of 12 games over five years. He has led Cal to four straight bowl games for the first time in history and five straight winning seasons for the first time since 1947-52.

In those five seasons, he has twice been honored as the Pacific-10 coach of the year, becoming the first Cal coach to win the award twice. Tedford was rewarded with a new five-year contract by Cal on Dec. 6, 2004.

Going Long

Nate Longshore and the Golden Bears were especially efficient with the long ball this year. California had 58 pass plays of 20 yards or more while its opponents had just 37. 51 of those deep balls were thrown by Longshore, including 19 to **DeSean Jackson**.

Schneider Gives it the Boot

Placekicker **Tom Schneider** produced a standout 2006 campaign for the Golden Bears. He had one of his best performances in the Big Game vs. Stanford when he booted four field goals, including a 55-yarder which tied the Cal school record. That performance led to a Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week nod. Schneider scored 97 points for the Golden Bears (third in the Pac-10 and eighth most for a single-season), and was 15-of-20 on field-goal attempts, including a near perfect 13-of-15 inside 50 yards. He was a perfect 52-of-52 on extra points. For his career, Schneider has scored 257 points, fourth all-time at Cal. Schneider is on pace to break Cal's all-time scoring mark (288 points) held by former kicker, Doug Brien (1991-93).

Punting Power

Junior-college transfer **Andrew Larson** stepped right into the Division I game and shown some serious punting ability for California as he was named to the All-Pac-10 second team. The newcomer punted 49 times for 2,087 yards - an impressive average of 42.6 yards per punt. However, his net punting is the true measure of his value. Opponents returned just 19 punts for a total of 132 yards, giving Cal a Pac-10 best net-punting mark of 38.2 yards.

First 6-0 Since 1949

California opened the Pac-10 season with a 6-0 mark for the first time since the 1949 season, the second of three straight undefeated conference seasons - as well as the second of three straight Rose Bowl appearances. The Bears have won more than six conference games three times in school history (7-0 in 1949, 7-1 in 2004 and 7-2 in 2006).

Selling Out

California sold out three games this year (Oregon, UCLA and Stanford); it is the first time in over fifty years that Cal has sold out multiple games in the same season. This year's sellouts against Oregon and UCLA were just the fourth and fifth non-Big Game sellouts in the last 50 years. The other three sellouts all came against USC (1977, 1979 and 2005). The Golden Bears have sold out the Big Game against Stanford 15 times in the last 50 years.

50,000 Fans Again

The sellout against Stanford marked Cal's 18th straight home game with over 50,000 fans. That streak includes every home game in the last three years and is even more impressive when compared to the days before the current streak. In the first 13 home games under head coach **Jeff Tedford** (in 2002 and 2003), Cal attracted over 50,000 fans just twice. The Stanford game was also the 10th game of 60,000+ fans under Tedford, surpassing the total of nine from the 11 years prior to Tedford's arrival.

Winning Streaks

Cal's eight-game winning streak was one of just five in school history of eight games or more (same season against collegiate opponents).

The Tedford Era

Jeff Tedford, now in his fifth year at the helm of the Bears, has quickly brought the program into another "Golden" Age. The Bears' current four-plus year record of 43-20 (.683) is among the best-ever at California.

Protecting the QB

Despite losing three 2005 starters to the NFL and having three current starters miss games due to injury, the California offensive line developed into a true strength for the Golden Bears in 2006. Both Washington State and Arizona State came into their games against Cal as the national leader in sacks, while UCLA had two of the top 10 sack men in the nation. All three teams managed just one sack against the Golden Bears. The Bears allowed a Pac-10-low 13 sacks all season. The impressive performance of the line resulted in four linemen earning All-Pac-10 recognition - Alex Mack (first team), Mike Gibson (second team), Andrew Cameron (third team) and Erik Robertson (third team).

Linebacker Legion of Doom

While first-team all-conference selection **Desmond Bishop** racked up impressive numbers, his teammates helped solidify the argument that Cal had of one of the best linebacking corps in the country in 2006. Against Washington, Cal's backers had 43 tackles, including seven for losses to go with five interceptions. In the Big Game vs. Stanford, the linebackers had 28 takedowns, six tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks, three pass break-ups and one forced fumble. In addition to Bishop's 126 tackles this season, **Mickey Pimentel** and **Zack Follett** tallied 64 and 62 tackles respectively, while **Worrell Williams** compiled 51. **Justin Moye, Greg Van Hoesen** and **Anthony Felder** finished 2006 in double digits in tackles. The linebackers have also combined for six interceptions, including one returned for a TD by Pimentel. Follett and Pimentel were both honorable mention all-conference honorees.

Attendance Record

The Golden Bears established a new record for average attendance this year with an average of 64,318 fans per game. Including three sellouts this season, California had a total of 450,223 fans at seven home games. The previous record for the Bears was in 2004 when they averaged 64,019.

Tailback Triple Threat

While **Marshawn Lynch** and **Justin Forsett** give the Golden Bears a potent one-two punch at running back, **Marcus O'Keith** may have given the Bears the top running back trio in the nation. California's "Tailback Triple Threat" have combined for 861 carries, 5,604 yards (6.51 yards per carry), 47 touchdowns and 25 100-yard rushing days during their tenure.

Ticket Takers

Since the arrival of **Jeff Tedford**, California's season ticket count has been on a steady climb. The Bears sold 16,200 season passes in 2002, Tedford's first year. His second season resulted in sales of 22,500. In 2004, the number again jumped substantially, up to a then-school-record 34,100. Last year, California set another mark with 40,134 season tickets sold and again this season, the record has been broken. The official season ticket number for 2006 is 40,262.

Cal Corrals Fifth Straight Winning Season

Since posting the worst record at Cal in 104 years (1-10) in 2001, the Golden Bears have rolled to five straight winning seasons since the arrival of head coach Jeff Tedford. In Tedford's first season (2002), he guided the Bears to a 7-5 mark – the school's first winning record in nine years. The 2004 club climbed as high as No. 4 in the nation and finished 10-2. Last year, Cal won eight games and in 2006, the Bears finished 10-3, marking the first time the Golden Bears have had five straight winning seasons in over 50 years (Pappy Waldorf's juggernaut teams reeled off six straight winning marks from 1947-52).

Forty for Five

For the first time in California football history, the Golden Bears scored 40 or more points in five straight games. Prior to the '06 season, the Bears had broken 40 points in four straight games on two other occasions. During the 1993 season Cal piled up wins over San Diego State (45-25), Temple (58-0), San Jose State (46-13) and Oregon (42-41). Back in 1920's undefeated season, Cal cruised to victories over the Mare Island Marines (88-0), St. Mary's (127-0), Nevada (79-7) and Utah (63-0).

Graduation Day

The Golden Bears had 11 members who officially earned their degrees on Dec. 9: Eric Beegun, Randy Bundy, Andrew Cameron, David Gray, Steve Kelly, Taylor Kunzi, Tim Mixon, Marcus O'Keith, Erik Robertson, Scott Smith and Byron Storer. Tyler Krieg has his undergraduate degree from Duke and is currently pursuing his master's degree at Cal.

More TV Time

The Big Game was Cal's 10th televised game of the season. Five different networks have televised the Bears this year (ESPN, ESPN on ABC, TBS, Comcast Sports, Fox Sports Net). The Holiday Bowl appearance was televised by ESPN.

Start Me Up

16 different Golden Bears earned their first career starts in 2006. Redshirt freshmen Cameron Morrah (TE) and Syd'Quan Thompson (CB) were both starters in their first collegiate games at Tennessee, while sophomore Alex Mack (C), senior Bryan Deemer (OG), junior Justin Moye (LB), junior Brandon Hampton (ROV) and junior Thomas DeCoud (FS) also had starting debuts against the Volunteers. In the Minnesota game, redshirt freshman Cody Jones (DL) started at defensive end for the first time. Sophomore offensive tackle Mike Tepper made his starting debut against Portland State. Against Arizona State, junior-college transfer Mike Gibson and senior Mickey Pimentel both made their first career starts, while sophomore Bernard Hicks and true freshman Tyson Alualu each made their starting debuts against Oregon State and Brian De La Puente made his first career start against Washington State. Sophomore linebacker Zack Follett had his first career start against Stanford. FB Will Ta'ufo'ou made his first career start in the Holiday Bowl against Texas A&M.

Thirty-Something

The Bears have won 36 games over the past four seasons. It is the most victories by California over a four-year period since the 1948-1949-1950-1951 teams combined to win 37 games. Nationally, Cal's 18 wins over the last two years (entering 2006) ranked 13th nationally, and the 26 wins during the three-year period was No. 18 in the country.

Bears No. 9 Preseason AP Ranking is Highest Since 1952

California's No. 9 ranking in the 2006 Associated Press Preseason College Football Poll was its highest preseason ranking since the 1952 team was ranked No. 8 in the nation. The No. 9 ranking is the third-highest overall preseason ranking for Calbehind **Pappy Waldorf's** 1951 and 1952 teams. The 1951 club was ranked No. 5 in the nation in the preseason. This season marks just the 10th year that Cal has held a preseason ranking from the AP, including the current stretch of three straight years. Under head coach **Jeff Tedford**, California has been ranked No. 13 (2004), No. 19 (2005) and now No. 9 in AP Preseason Polls.

Spread the Wealth

The Golden Bears had 16 different players catch passes in 2006 and 14 different players score touchdowns. Last year for the entire season, the Bears had just 14 players with receptions. The last time Cal had as many as 16 men with catches was 2004 when 18 had receptions. In the Portland State victory alone, Cal had 12 different players catch passes. Dating back to 1997, Cal

has had just one game with as many as 10 different receivers catching passes.

Marshawn10.com

Cal fans and the media can kept up with all the highlights of **Marshawn Lynch's** junior season by visiting www.Marshawn10. com. The star tailback is a top candidate for numerous awards, including the 2006 Heisman Trophy. The website features highlight video from his first two seasons in Berkeley and will include highlights from each game of the 2006 campaign as the season progresses. Statistics, a complete bio and other information will offer fans and media the opportunity to get to know the running back. In addition, his honors and records and a list of quotes from college football experts, coaches and players from around the nation are available for perusal.

Preseason Hype

California received plenty of attention from the preseason magazines this year. The Golden Bears were ranked in the Top 10 in many football preview publications, including a No. 6 rating in Street & Smith's College Football 2006 Yearbook. In addition, seven different Cal players were tabbed as preseason All-Americans: linebacker Desmond Bishop, cornerback Daymeion Hughes, tailback Marshawn Lynch, defensive tackle Brandon Mebane, cornerback Tim Mixon, tight end Craig Stevens and defensive end Nu'u Tafisi. Hughes was rated as the No. 1 cornerback in the nation by Phil Steele's College Football Preview and Lynch was ranked No. 2 among running backs by The Sporting News.

KNOXVILLE - California was victimized by big plays and a bigger crowd as the Golden Bears dropped their 2006 season-opener, 35-18, to Tennessee in front of 106,009 fans in Neyland Stadium. It was the largest crowd to ever watch a California football game.

Tennessee struck first with a 12-yard passing TD, then the Volunteers broke free for four straight big plays - a 42-yard pass and a 80-yard pass play followed by a 50-yard strike down the middle and a tough 43-yard rush through traffic. Before the Golden Bears could settle into any offensive rhythm, the Volunteers held a 35-0 advantage and the hostile crowd was in a frenzy.

Cal cracked the scoring column with a 32-yard Tom Schneider field goal in the third quarter and then closed the contest with two touchdowns. Joe Ayoob found DeSean Jackson deep and the sophomore receiver made a nifty move to dodge a flying Volunteer defender and find the end zone for a 40-yard score. Late in the game, Ayoob connected twice with Jackson and once with Marcus O'Keith to set himself up for a one-yard scamper into the end zone.

The Volunteer defense, which ranked second in the nation against the rush in 2005, held Cal to just 64 rushing yards as Marshawn Lynch carried just 12 times for 74 yards (an average of 6.2 yards per carry). Safety Thomas DeCoud led the Bears with a career-high 13 tackles and Brandon Hampton snared his second career interception.

BERKELEY-The California Golden Bears rebounded from their opening week loss with an impressive 42-17 victory over Minnesota at Memorial Stadium. Nate Longshore established himself as the Golden Bears' starting quarterback by completing 22-of-31 passes for 300 yards and four touchdowns with no interceptions.

Minnesota cracked the scoring column first with an easy-looking drive on its first possession. However, Cal responded with a nine-play drive capped by Longshore finding Robert Jordan for a 24-yard TD. The Bears then opened the second quarter with a quick drive highlighted by a Lavelle Hawkins 42-yard reception and a two-yard TD grab by DeSean Jackson.

The Gophers knotted the game on a 99-yard kickoff return, but the Bear defense tightened and held Minnesota to just a field goal the rest of the way.

Meanwhile, Longshore continued to pick apart the secondary, finding Jackson for two more touchdowns, a 48-yarder down the sideline and an 11-yarder across the middle.

Čalifornia closed things out behind the gritty running of Marshawn Lynch (27 carries for 139 yards) and Justin Forsett (12-77) and hard-nosed defense. The vaunted Gopher running attack was held to just 109 rushing yards and Daymeion Hughes had a pair of key interceptions.

Jackson finished with 114 receiving yards, in addition to his three touchdowns while Hawkins had career-bests of nine catches for 125 yards.

Linebacker Desmond Bishop made 16 tackles and capped his day with a game-ending interception for the Golden Bears, who celebrated wildly after surviving for their seventh straight victory.

Lynch made a 17-yard TD run with 1:52 to play, and Cal appeared to be safe after trailing much of the day against the Huskies and new quarterback Carl Bonnell, who threw five interceptions in his first start in two years.

But Bonnell drove the Huskies 48 yards to the Cal 40, where he uncorked a long throw to the end zone with 6 seconds left. The ball was deflected into a Huskies' hands and he lunged over the goal line to knot the game.

Although Memorial Stadium was deathly quiet when Cal lost the overtime coin flip, Lynch rolled to a 22-yard score on the Bears' second play. Washington then got to the Cal 6, but Bishop intercepted a short pass and returned it about 80 yards with the entire Cal roster chasing him down the field.

Nate Longshore passed for 291 yards but no touchdowns as Washington shut down Cal's big-play offensive stars - except Lynch, who rushed for 102 yards after halftime.

After scoring 192 points in the first halves of their last six games, Cal managed only Tom Schneider's field goal two seconds before halftime.

The Bears went ahead in the third quarter, but Bonnell put Washington back in front on a 7-yard TD sneak with 14:13 to play. Cal thought it had taken control with a field goal followed by a 13-play, 86-yard scoring drive, capped by Lynch's run and Justin Forsett's 2-point conversion.

BERKELEY - Marshawn Lynch caught one of Nate Longshore's three touchdown passes and ran for another score as No. 10 Cal won its eighth straight, 38-24 over the Bruins on Saturday night.

Robert Jordan had two touchdown catches and DeSean Jackson romped 72 yards on his school-record fourth TD punt return for the first-place Golden Bears, who moved one big step closer to their first conference title since 1975.

Although UCLA outgained Cal and controlled play for long stretches, Cal has several players capable of rendering those long stretches pointless. Longshore was 20-of-24 for 266 yards, and Lynch had 126 total yards.

Jackson finished off the Bruins with his third punt return for a score this season, tying the Pac-10 record in the third quarter.

Patrick Cowan passed for 329 yards and ran for a score in his fourth start as UCLA outgained Cal 516-433, but repeatedly failed to capitalize on strong drives in the Bruins' fourth consecutive loss.

Jackson, who already has scored 19 touchdowns for Cal as a sophomore, provided another electric moment. He caught Aaron Perez's punt and took two steps to his left, then reversed his field and picked up a crushing block from Thomas DeCoud before juking Perez and outrunning the rest of the Bruins to the end zone.

Memorial Stadium was filled with 72,516 fans for its second sellout of the season - and just the fifth for any opponent except Stanford since the 1950s

In addition, two interceptions were called back by flags on a late game-tying drive by Arizona. It all added up to a 24-20 Cal loss in the desert.

Cal had a pair of touchdowns from the spectacular DeSean Jackson to open a 17-3 halftime advantage. The sophomore opened the scoring on a 95-yard punt return - the fifth punt return touchdown of his career, then, after a 46-yard field goal from the ever-reliable Tom Schneider, Jackson took a short Nate Longshore delivery and burst past the defense for a 62-yard score.

However, the second half was a different story as Arizona kept itself in the game and chipped away at the Bears' advantage. After a third-quarter score made it 17-10, the Wildcats methodically moved the ball downfield once again, scoring on another short run early in the fourth on a drive that featured flagged interceptions by Bernard Hicks and Daymeion Hughes.

With the score knotted at 17, Arizona took the lead for good on a 39-yard interception return. Cal nearly answered quickly as Longshore found Lavelle Hawkins, but Hawkins could not keep his feet into the end zone, falling at the one. After three unsuccessful ties at the TD, Cal had to settle for another Schneider field goal.

Cal had one final opportunity, but a tipped Longshore pass was intercepted to clinch the upset victory for Arizona.

Jackson finished with 285 all-purpose yards, while Marshawn Lynch ran for 102 yards - his school-record 16th 100-yard game, which also pushed him over 1,000 yards for the season.

LOS ANGELES - Twenty minutes from the Rose Bowl. The California Golden Bears went toe-to-toe with the USC Trojans for over three quarters, but USC used a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to foil Cal's hopes for its first Rose Bowl since 1959. Instead, USC won 23-9 and captured the Pac-10 championship for the fifth straight season.

Nate Longshore, who completed 17-of-38 passes for 176 yards in the loss, directed the go-ahead drive in the second quarter for the Golden Bears. After pinpoint passes to DeSean Jackson (36 yards) and Robert Jordan (29 yards), Longshore found Lavelle Hawkins, who managed to hold on despite a brutal sandwich from two Trojan defenders, for a six-yard score and a 9-6 advantage.

The two defenses held strong until late in the third quarter with just over 19 minutes to play, when USC connected on a 49-yard field goal to knot the game at nine.

In the fourth quarter, Cal could not get clicking and USC's offense, bolstered by a vocal sellout crowd of 91,672, began to make big plays. Trojan quarterback John David Booty completed 18-of-31 passes for 238 yards, including touchdown strikes of 25 yards to Dwayne Jarrett and 37 yards to Steve Smith on a back-breaking fourth-down conversion with 8:23 to go.

Cal had a pair of touchdowns called back during the game. In the first quarter, linebacker Mickey Pimentel returned an apparent fumble over 80 yards to the end zone, but the play was ruled an incomplete pass. Late in the fourth quarter, Marshawn Lynch appeared to have a 70-yard touchdown run, but replay showed his knee had been down after nine yards.

After falling behind by a field goal in the first quarter, Cal had a huge defensive play from Brandon Mebane, who burst through the Trojan line to stuff the running back in the end zone for the Bears' first safety since 2002.

BERKELEY - Tom Schneider booted four field goals and the California defense held Stanford to just 269 yards as the Golden Bears upended the Cardinal, 26-17, in the 109th edition of the Big Game before a sold out Memorial Stadium. It was the fifth straight win in the rivalry for Cal, which closed the season undefeated at home, and it was also the Bears' third sellout of the year, a first in over 50 years.

The Bear offense struggled to click on the cold, blustery day, but Schneider continued his outstanding season and a hard-hitting defense led by Zack Follett and Desmond Bishop kept Stanford from ever holding a lead.

Schneider opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 55-yard field goal to match the Cal school record. After Stanford knotted the game at three, another Schneider three-pointer put the Bears on top for good. Then with 2:32 to go in the half, a big hit by Follett forced a fumble which was scooped up by Syd'Quan Thompson and escorted into the end zone, despite the fact the freshman lost his shoe to a would-be tackler.

Stanford did not go away however, using a big kickoff return to set up a TD of its own, making it 13-10 at the break.

The two teams traded touchdowns in the third quarter with Cal quarterback Nate Longshore delivering a perfect pass to Lavelle Hawkins for a 32-yard score before Stanford quickly answered with a deep ball of its own.

However, down the stretch, it was the Cal defense and Schneider wrapping things up. The junior placekicker booted two more field goals while the Golden Bears held the Cardinal to just nine yards of offense in the fourth guarter.

Sophomore receiver DeSean Jackson was the offensive star, racking up 127 yards on seven catches, despite the swirling winds. It was Jackson's seventh 100-yard receiving game of his young career.

In fact the 35-point win was the biggest margin of victory for Cal in bowl game history. The win also gave the Bears their third in their last four bowl games played.

In what would be his final game in a Bear uniform, junior **Marshawn Lynch** rushed for 111 yards and two touchdowns, and was selected as the game's co-offensive MVP. Teammate **Justin Forsett**, who was the game's leading rusher with 124 yards, also found the endzone in the fourth quarter on an eight-yard dash. The 100-yard performances by Lynch and Forsett marked the first time Cal had two 100-yard rushers since Oct. 22, 2005, when Lynch and Forsett each ran for over 100 yards against Washington State.

Quarterback **Nate Longshore** had a sound statistical game completing 19-of-24 passes for 235 yards and a touchdown, en route to co-offensive MVP honors. Longshore also scored a touchdown on the ground when he plunged into the endzone from one yard out in the first quarter to even the score at 7-7.

Not to be overshadowed by the offense, linebacker **Desmond Bishop** recorded a game-high 12 tackles (8 solo/4 asst) to earn Defensive MVP honors

The Cal defensive unit was spectacular, allowing just 10 points, including a shutout in the second half. San Diego native, **Mickey Pimentel** recorded seven tackles, while **Eddie Young** intercepted a Ty Branyon pass (his first career INT) in the fourth quarter highlighting the other top defensive notables.
