POST-GAME CEREMONY

The championship trophy will be presented on the field at Qualcomm Stadium immediately following the contest, along with the offensive and defensive players of the game.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

The post-game interview room is located in Media Room (2) adjacent to the team locker rooms, at Ramp C. Following a tenminute cooling off period, the losing coach and selected players will be escorted to the interview room and begin their press conference. The head coach will make opening statements, followed by a question-and-answer period. The winning head coach and selected players will follow with the format identical to that of the losing team.

PRESS CONFERENCE

There will be one press conference during bowl week that will include the head coach from each school at The Omni Hotel on Tuesday, December 27 at 10:30 a.m. Each coach will make opening statements, followed by a question-and-answer period.

STADIUM NAME

Qualcomm Stadium will be temporarily renamed "Snapdragon Stadium" for two San Diego Chargers' games on Dec. 18 and 21 as well as the Holiday Bowl before reverting back to Qualcomm Stadium.





GAME NOTES

CAL MEETS TEXAS IN BRIDGEPOINT EDUCATION HOLIDAY BOWL

CAL vs. TEXAS WEDNESDAY, DEC. 28 (5:00 P.M. PST)

Cal (7-5, 4-5 Pac-12) and Texas (7-5, 4-5 Big 12) will meet for the first time in 41 years in the 2011 Bridgepoint Education Holiday Bowl. Both teams enter the game with identical overall and conference records. Cal finished fourth in the North division of the Pac-12, while Texas tied for sixth in the Big 12. Only two seasons ago, the Longhorns played in the BCS National Championship Game, falling 37-21 to Alabama at The Rose Bowl.

Cal finished the 2011 campaign with three victories in its final four contests, with its only loss during the stretch by a slim 31-28 margin on the road to a Stanford team that is headed to the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State after finishing the regular season ranked No. 4 in the BCS Standings, AP Top 25 and USA Today Poll. The Bears started their final month of the regular season with home victories over Washington State and Oregon State, and finished November with an emphatic 47-38 road victory in their regular-season finale over an Arizona State team that had been nationally ranked most of the season.

Texas began its 2011 season with four straight victories and was 6-2 before dropping three of its final four regular-season contests. Two of the three losses came to nationally-ranked teams on the road at Kansas State and against Baylor at home. The Longhorns also fell on the road at Missouri. The lone win during the stretch came in their rival game at Texas Tech.

Texas holds an all-time series lead of 4-0 over Cal, and was ranked in the nation's top 10 in each previous meeting, including the last matchup in 1970 in Austin when a second-ranked Longhorns club prevailed, 56-15. A No. 10 UT team also took the first meeting in 1959 in Austin, 33-0, while the other games were contested in Berkeley with No. 4 Texas squads winning 28-3 in 1961 and 17-0 in 1969.

Cal and Texas will see more of each other in the near future as the teams have scheduled a home-and-home series for the 2015 and 2016 seasons, with the Bears visiting Austin on Sept. 12, 2015, and UT making a return trip to Berkeley on Sept. 10, 2016.

MORE ON THE BEARS-LONGHORNS MATCHUP

- Cal and Texas have put up strong numbers on defense, with the Longhorns No. 14 in total defense (315.33 ypg) and the Bears No. 26 (339.42 ypg).
- Cal's defense will go up against a Texas offense that is powered by the nation's No. 19 rushing team (210.42 ypg) but only No. 85 in passing (193.58 ypg).
- Cal's balanced offense that is No. 37 in total offense (418.67 ypg), No. 38 in passing (251.50) and No. 48 in rushing (167.17 ypg) will face a Texas defense that has been stingy against the run at No. 11 (103.67 ypg) and No. 47 in pass defense (211.67 ypg).

CAL'S QUICK HITTERS

- Cal's 2011 team features an All-American and Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year in linebacker Mychal Kendricks, while three others (WR Keenan Allen, P Bryan Anger, OL Mitchell Schwartz) joined Kendricks as first-team All-Pac-12 selections.
- Cal is bowl eligible in 2011 for the ninth time in 10 seasons under Jeff Tedford and playing in its eighth bowl in the last nine campaigns.
 - Cal has clinched its eighth winning season in the last nine years in 2011.
- Cal is playing in the Holiday Bowl for the third time, having defeated Texas A&M (45-10) in 2006 after a loss to Texas Tech (45-31) in 2004.
- Cal has an all-time bowl record of 10-9-1 dating back to the team's first bowl game on January 1, 1921, a 28-0 victory over Ohio State in the Rose Bowl.
- Head coach Jeff Tedford is one win away from his 80th career and Cal victory as he wraps up his 10th season as Cal's head coach.

BOWLING AND WINNING

Cal has done a lot of both lately with the Bears bowl eligible for the ninth time in the last 10 seasons and playing in their eighth bowl in the last nine campaigns in 2011. Cal has also clinced a winning record for the ninth time in the last 10 campaigns. Cal was bowl eligible for eight straight seasons (2002-09) and played in a school-record string of seven straight bowls from 2003-09. The Bears also equaled another school record with eight consecutive winning seasons before all the runs finally came to an end in 2010 when the Bears finished 5-7 and out of the bowl picture. In its seven consecutive bowl appearances, all under head coach Jeff Tedford, Cal posted a 5-2 (.714) record that also included a school-record four straight bowl wins from 2005-08. Tedford is only Cal head coach to ever record more than two bowl victories.

A DECADE OF SUSTAINED SUCCESS UNDER TEDFORD

Cal averaged eight wins per year in the first nine seasons (2002-10) under head coach Jeff Tedford and ranked tied for third among Pac-10 teams in victories during that period. The Bears have an opportunity to extend their average of eight wins per season to 10 in a row and close out their first decade under Tedford with 80 victories if they can defeat Texas in the Holiday Bowl. KENDRICKS RACKS UP THE HONORS

Mychal Kendricks (Sr., LB) has been the Bears' top award winner following the 2011 regular season. He has been named a second-team All-American by both Phil Steele and College Sports Madness, third-team by Yahoo! Sports and honorable mention by SI.com. At the conference level, he was named the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year by the conference coaches, who also named his first-team All-Pac-12 along with College Sports Madness, the ESPN Pac-12 Blog, Phil Steele and Yahoo! Sports. Kendricks is tied for third in the Pac-12 in tackles per game (1.08 tflpg) and tackles (8.0 tpg), while leading the team in both with totals of a career-high 96 tackles and 13.0 tackles for loss. He also co-leads the squad with a pair of interceptions that he has returned for a team-high 62 yards, while adding 3.0 sacks, two pass breakups and two fumble recoveries that he has returned for 33 yards. Kendricks has posted four double-digit tackle games in 2011, including a career-high-tying and team season-high 15 stops at Washington. He also had 13 tackles at Stanford along with a season-high-tying 2.5 tackles for loss (-18 yards) and his first full sack of the season when he dropped Heisman Trophy runner-up Andrew Luck for a 14-yard loss. Kendricks was a fourth-team midseason All-American and first-team midseason All-Pac-12 choice according to Phil Steele.

Kendricks is Cal's active career leader in tackles (248), tackles for loss (35.0), sacks (13.5) and fumble recoveries (7) in 50 games played and 28 starts. He has added four interceptions, a forced fumble, five pass breakups and one blocked kick.

Kendricks became the seventh Cal player to earn Pac-10/12 Player of the Year honors. Previous selections include Chuck Muncie (1975), Ron Rivera (1983, Co-Defensive), Mike Pawlawski (1991, Co-Offensive), Deltha O'Neal (1999, Defensive), Daymeion Hughes (2006, Defensive) and Marshawn Lynch (2006, Offensive).

KENDRICKS JOINED BY 14 OTHERS ON ALL-PAC-12 TEAM

Mychal Kendricks was joined by 14 others selected in a vote of the conference coaches as All-Pac-12 selections, including first-team picks Keenan Allen (So., WR), Bryan Anger (Sr., P) and Mitchell Schwartz (Sr., OL). Trevor Guyton (Sr., DL) was a second-team selection. An additional 10 Cal players – D.J. Campbell (Sr., DB), Sean Cattouse (Sr., DB), Justin Cheadle (Sr., OL), D.J. Holt (Sr., LB), Marvin Jones (Sr., WR), Anthony Miller (Sr., TE), Isi Sofele (Jr., RB), Matt Summers-Gavin, (Jr., OL), Giorgio Tavecchio (Sr., PK) and Aaron Tipoti (Jr., DL) – earned honorable mention honors.

"I'm very proud of the student-athletes that were recognized as all-conference players," head coach Jeff Tedford said. "All of these guys have worked very hard to put themselves in position to not only help the team but achieve personal recognition."





ALLEN AMONG NATIONAL AND PAC-12 LEADERS

Keenan Allen ranks second in the Pac-12 and tied for 12th nationally with his per-game average in receptions (7.42), as well as third in the Pac-12 and 12th nationally with his per-game average in receiving yards (105.08). The third-team midseason All-American choice according to Phil Steele led the nation in receiving yards per game for two weeks after contests against USC and Utah. He has career and team-high totals of 89 receptions, 1,261 receiving yards and six touchdown catches. His reception and receiving yard totals are both second on Cal's all-time single season lists, while his touchdown total is only one score from entering the school's all-time single-season list. All three are already career highs. His average of 14.2 yards per reception leads the team's receivers with at least one catch per game and is also a career best. Allen posted a then-career high of 10 catches and a career high 197 receiving yards (fifth all-time on Cal's single-game list) against Washington, with the 197 receiving yards marking the seventh most by a Pac-12 player in 2011. He then set another career-high two games later against USC with 13 grabs for 160 yards, with the 13 receptions tying for third on the school's all-time single-game list. His five 100-yard receiving games are tied for third in the Pac-12. He has had at least five catches and 61 yards receiving 11 of his 12 games in 2011, with the only exception being when he was held to season lows of three catches and 29 receiving yards against Oregon State. Allen also paces the club with 1,340 all-purpose yards and an average of 111.67 per game that ranks 11th in the Pac-12 and 74th nationally. In addition, he is fourth on the team in scoring with 36 points. Allen was one of 10 Biletnikoff Award semifinalists for the honor given annually to the nation's top receiver, as well as a candidate for the Paul Hornung Award bestowed upon the nation's most versatile player.

ALLEN CHASIN' AND BREAKIN' RECORDS

Keenan Allen's current 2011 totals of 89 receptions and 1,261 receiving yards are 11 receptions and 243 yards shy of Cal's single-season records in those categories set by Dameane Douglas in 1998 (100 receptions) and Geoff McArthur in 2003 (1,504 receiving yards). His current totals both rank second on Cal's all-time single-season lists. After 23 games in just under two seasons at Cal, Allen is threatening to move onto the school's alltime top-10 lists with his career totals of 135 receptions (three shy), 1,751 receiving yards (296 shy) and 11 touchdown catches (two shy). He already has six career 100-yard receiving games to rank tied for sixth all-time at Cal. Allen has set one record at Cal in 2011 when he caught a 90-yard touchdown pass from Zach Maynard at Washington that was the longest pass play in school history.

SOFELE CAL'S LATEST 1,000-YARD RUSHER

Isi Sofele gave Cal its' ninth 1,000-yard rusher in the last 10 years when he reached the mark while rushing for a career high 190 yards and a touchdown on 23 carries against Oregon State. He has since moved to sixth on Cal's single-season rushing list with a total of 1,270 yards on the ground on 232 (5.5 ypr). Sofele is 86 yards away from the fifth spot on the list that Marshawn Lynch currently holds with his 1,356 yards in 2006. He also has a team-high nine rushing touchdowns, a team-high-tying nine total touchdowns, and is tied for second on the squad in scoring with 54 points. In his last six games, Sofele has found paydirt in five of them. His 105.83 yards per-game rushing average has him ranked fourth in the Pac-12 and 20th nationally. Sofele has five 100-yard rushing games to rank tied for fourth in the Pac-12 in that category and has posted at least 74 yards rushing in 11 of his 12 contests in 2011, reaching the mark in every game other than USC. In addition, he has one double-digit run in all 12 of his contests. Sofele is second on the team with his 1,329 all-purpose yards, with his per-game average of 110.75 ranking 12th in the conference and 77th nationally.

JONES HAVING ANOTHER SOLID SEASON

Marvin Jones, who has led the team in both receptions and receiving yards each of the past two seasons, is having another solid season with 54 receptions, 758 receiving yards and three touchdown catches that are all second on the team behind Keenan Allen (tied for second in touchdown catches). Jones is also second behind Allen among all of Cal's players with one catch or more per game with an average of 13.9 yards per catch.

His 54 receptions are a career high, while his 758 receiving yards are only seven shy of the career high 765 he recorded in 2010.

Jones is ninth in the Pac-12 and 78th nationally with his 63.17 receiving yards per game average, while his 4.50 receptions per contest are 14th in the conference and tied for 93rd nationally.

Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (148), receiving yards (2,182) and receiving touchdowns (13). The receptions and receiving yards are eighth on Cal's all-time list, while the receiving touchdowns are tied for 10th. He also has six career 100-yard receiving games to rank tied for sixth.

JONES AND ALLEN CATCH STREAKS

Marvin Jones extended his catch streak to 37 consecutive games at Arizona State (school record is 42 by Robert Jordan from 2004-07). Keenan Allen also has a streak going that covers each of the 23 games he has played at Cal since 2010.

MAYNARD'S FIRST SEASON AS STARTING QUARTERBACK

First-year starting quarterback Zach Maynard has completed 212-of-372 (57.0%) of his passes for 2,802 yards, with 17 touchdowns and 11 interceptions for a 129.43 quarterback rating. Maynard is currently sixth on Cal's all-time single-season list for passing yards and needs 198 yards in the air in the Holiday Bowl to become only the third Cal passer to ever throw for 3,000 yards in a season. He is another 21 yards shy of Nate Longshore's 3,021-yard season in 2006 that is the second-most passing yards in Cal history. Pat Barnes holds the school's single-season record with 3,499 in 1996. In addition, Maynard ranks fourth on the school's single-season list with 2,949 of total offense and is within range of both the second and third-places seasons on the list posted by Aaron Rodgers (3,113, 2003) and Nate Longshore (2,969, 2006). Pat Barnes also holds the school record with 3,416 yards of total offense in 1996.

Maynard came on strong at the end of the 2011 campaign as evidenced by the dramatic rise in his completion percentage, touchdown to interception ratio and quarterback rating. Over the last four games, he has completed 68.1 percent of passes, thrown for five touchdowns to one interception, and posted a 154.25 rating. Over his first eight contests, he hit on 53.4 percent of his passes, had nearly as many interceptions (10) as touchdowns (12), and a rating of 121.31.

On the season, Maynard has thrown for at least 200 yards and completed at least 15 passes in nine of his 12 starts, including each of his first seven contests. He arguably posted his signature game at Stanford when he was 20-of-29 (69.0%) for 280 yards and two touchdowns without throwing an interception, posting slightly better stats than Stanford's Heisman Trophy runner-up Andrew Luck. Maynard has either thrown or run for a touchdown in 11 of 12 contests, while both throwing and running for a score four times. He has also rushed 76 times for 147 yards and four touchdowns on the season. On three occasions, he has rushed for over 35 yards including a career-high 52 in the season opener vs. Fresno State and 40 in the regular-season finale at Arizona State.

ANDERSON'S ROLE INCREASING AS BACKUP TAILBACK

C.J. Anderson has been emphasized in Cal's offensive attack more over the past four games, compiling a combined 197 yards on 32 rushes (6.2 ypr) with a team-high four touchdowns all on the ground, and catching five passes for 167 yards (33.4 ypc) during the period. Anderson had a huge game in the regular-season finale at Arizona State, becoming the first Cal player to score three touchdowns in a game in 2011. In that contest, Anderson rushed 10 times for 48 yards and two scores while also catching a pass from Maynard for a short gain that he turned into a 74-yard play and his first career receiving touchdown. On the season, he has rushed 68 times for 343 yards (5.0 ypr) and caught seven passes for 186 yards (26.6 ypc). He has nine touchdowns (eight rushing, one receiving) to co-lead the team and is tied for second on the club in scoring with 54 points.

HOLT STEADY AGAIN IN 2011

D.J. Holt, who shared the team's Bear Backers MVP Award on the defensive side of the ball with Mychal Kendricks and was an honorable mention All-Pac-12 choice, is second on the squad for the second consecutive year with his 81 tackles. In addition, he has added a career-high 10.5 tackles for loss (-40 yards) that are also second on the 2011 club, with at least 1.0 TFL in each of his last nine games. His per-game averages of .88 tackles for loss and 6.75 tackles rank eighth and tied for 10th in the Pac-12, respectively. Holt has added 2.0 sacks (-13 yards) to double his career total, two pass breakups and two quarterback hurries while starting all 12 games. For his career, Holt is tied for first among active Cal players in forced fumbles (3) and second in tackles (217). He has also added 20.5 tackles for loss (-66 yards), 4.0 sacks (-26 yards), two fumble recoveries and eight pass breakups.

ANGER AGAIN AMONG NATION'S BEST

Bryan Anger, who broke a 23-year-old single-season Cal record with a 45.6 yard punting average in 2010, has once again proved he is among the nation's best in 2011. For each of the past three seasons (2009-11), he has earned first-team all-conference honors and also captured the J. Scott Duncan Award as the team's Most Valuable special teams player. Anger is one of only four players in the history of Cal football to be named first-team all-conference for three consecutive seasons. Given the College Football Performance Awards Elite Punter Trophy for his performance over the last two seasons, Anger has had yet another banner season in 2011 in his fourth campaign as the team's starting punter. He is averaging 44.57 yards per punt in 2011 to rank second in the Pac-12 and 11th nationally for those with the NCAA's minimum number of punts per game. His 2011 average is also fifth on Cal's all-time single-season list and has improved his career average to 43.54 yards per punt, second on Cal's all-time list. He earned an honorable mention spot on Phil Steele's 2011 midseason All-American squad. If Anger can keep his 2011 punting average above his 42.7 he will finish his career with three of the top seven seasons ever by a Cal punter.

TAVECCHIO HAVING MEMORABLE SENIOR SEASON

Giorgio Tavecchio has made 19-of-22 field goal attempts for a Pac-12 high 86.4 percentage and also leads the conference in field goals per game (1.58), ranking tied for 11th nationally in the latter category. Tavecchio paces Cal in scoring with 92 points (tied for 49th nationally) and has moved into fifth place on the school's all-time scoring list with 252 career points. He is the first Cal player to pace the Pac-12 in field goals made since Doug Brien led the conference and the nation in 1991 with an average of 1.73 per game. No Cal player in recorded history has ever led the conference in field goal percentage. He is also sixth in the Pac-12 in scoring and third in scoring among kickers with a per-game average of 7.7. In addition, his career-high 17 points at Arizona State in the regular-season finale are tied for the most by a Pac-12 player in 2011 and earned him Pac-12 Special Teams Player of the Week honors for the second time in his career. He also has a career-long 54-yard field goal at Oregon in 2011 that is the longest by a Pac-12 player this season, while his nine extra-point makes and attempts vs. Presbyterian both equal the most by a conference player in 2011.

Tavecchio, who has played in 45 contests at Cal from 2008-11, is within reasonable striking distance of the third-place position currently held by Jim Breech (260 points, 1947-77). Tom Schneider (257 points, 2004-06) is currently fourth. Tavecchio has made 47-of-63 (74.6%) field goal attempts and 111-of-119 (93.3%) extra-point tries. He has also kicked off 242 times in his career for 14,585 yards and an average of 60.3 yards per kickoff with 14 touchbacks, leading all active Cal players in each category. Tavecchio made the first 65 extra-point tries of his career before the streak was snapped on his second PAT attempt in the seventh game of his junior year against Arizona State. He also has eight career tackles.

OTHER INDIVIDUAL NOTABLES

- Second-team All-Pac-12 selection Trevor Guyton should have his own note. He was the only player to garner three team awards, earning the Joe Roth Award given to the player best exemplifying courage, attitude and sportsmanship, in addition to the Brick Muller Award as the top lineman on defense and being selected on the defensive side of the ball for a Cort Majors Captains Award. Guyton co-leads Cal with 4.5 sacks (-23 yards) and ranks third on the club with his 10.0 tackles for loss (-36 yards), with his per-game averages of .83 tackles for loss and .38 sacks checking in tied for ninth and tied for 15th in the conference. He also co-leads the squad in forced fumbles and fumble recoveries with two each, with his .17 fumble recoveries per game tied for sixth in the Pac-12. Guyton's 42 tackles are first among Cal's defensive linemen and sixth on the team overall. For his career, he has equaled D.J. Holt's three forced fumbles for the most of any active Cal player. He also has 91 tackles, 22.5 tackles for loss (-91 yards), 10.0 sacks (-66 yards) and two fumble recoveries, one of which he returned 19 yards for a touchdown against Fresno State in the 2011 season opener.
- Sean Cattouse is third on the club with a career-high 71 tackles and shares the team lead in both interceptions and fumble recoveries with two each, returning his two picks for 20 yards. Cattouse has added 3.5 tackles for loss (-7 yards), 1.0 sack (-2 yards) and two pass breakups. He leads all active Cal players for his career with seven interceptions that he has returned for 44 yards and 17 pass breakups, while adding 180 tackles, 7.0 tackles for loss (-11 yards), 2.0 sacks (-3 yards) and two fumble recoveries.
- D.J. Campbell ranks fourth on the team with a career-high 63 tackles and shares the squad's lead in both interceptions and fumble recoveries with two each, with his .17 fumble recoveries per game tied for sixth in the Pac-12. He has career totals of 102 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss (-24 yards), 2.0 sacks (-17 yards), one forced fumble, four fumble recoveries and seven pass breakups.
- Steve Williams and Marc Anthony are making a run at the school's all-time single-season list in pass breakups. Williams is tied for 10th with 11, while Anthony has 10 and is only one outside of the school's all-time top 10 for a single season. Anthony's total has come in two fewer games and with the addition of one interception he is tied for fourth in the conference in passes defended per game (1.10). Williams has added a pair of interceptions and ranks fifth in the Pac-12 with an average of 1.08 passes defended per game.
- Michael Calvin is having the most productive season of his career with 19 catches, 260 receiving yards and his first career touchdown reception. His catches, receiving yards and average of 13.7 yards per reception are all career bests.
- Anthony Miller is having a solid season with 23 catches for 254 yards and a three of his five career touchdown receptions. He has also received significant support from his backup tight end Spencer Hagan, who has contributed all 12 catches, 94 receiving yards and two touchdown receptions of his career.
- Ernest Owusu co-leads the team with 4.5 sacks (-25 yards), while adding 7.5 tackles for loss (-30 yards) to rank fourth on the club and 27 tackles, which is second among the team's defensive linemen. His .38 sacks per game are tied for 15th in the Pac-12, while his 0.63 tackles for loss per contest are 25th. Owusu also has two pass breakups, a quarterback hurry and a forced fumble in 12 games played and eight starts. All of his numbers are career highs.
- Josh Hill is having the biggest season of his career with 48 tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss (-11 yards), 1.0 sack (-4 yards), a team-high-tying two interceptions that he has returned for 32 yards with one of them against Utah being Cal's only interception return for a touchdown this season, five pass breakups and one forced fumble. All of the numbers Hill has recorded in 2011 while playing in all 12 games and starting six are either career highs or tied for career highs.

BIG PLAYS ARE BACK

Big plays have returned to the Cal offense in 2011. The Bears have had 62 plays (41 passing, 21 rushing) from the line of scrimmage that have covered 20 or more yards in 2011, easily surpassing the total of 39 the Bears posted in 12 regular-season games last year. With an average of 5.2 plays per game covering 20 or more yards in 2011, Cal is only slightly behind the pace of a stellar big-play season in 2009 when the Golden Bears had 72 plays that covered at least 20 yards for an average of 5.5 plays per game. Zach Maynard has been involved in a team-high 40 of the 62 plays this season, while other big-play playmakers on offense have included Keenan Allen (17), Isi Sofele (14), Marvin Jones (12), C.J. Anderson (6), Anthony Miller (4), Michael Calvin (4), Allan Bridgford (3) and Will Kapp (1). The longest play of the year was a school-record 90-yard pass from Maynard to Allen at Washington, while the longest rushing play was Isi Sofele's 56-yarder against Oregon State.

BIG PLAYS ARE BACK ON DEFENSE, TOO

For the second consecutive season, Cal is among the conference and national leaders in sacks. Through the first 12 games of 2011, the Bears have 32.0 sacks and are third in the Pac-12 and 17th nationally in sacks per game (2.67). A year ago, Cal led the Pac-10 and ranked No. 13 nationally with an average of 2.86 sacks per game. Cal's tackles for loss numbers are way up in 2011 with a total of 92.0 as the Bears' per-game average leads the Pac-12 and ranks fifth nationally (7.67). Last year, Cal was sixth in the Pac-10 and 42nd nationally (6.33).

SPREADING OUT THE SACKS

A group of 16 players have contributed to Cal's 32.0 total sacks in 2011. Trevor Guyton and Ernest Owusu co-lead the team with 4.5 sacks and an average of .38 per game that is tied for 15th in the Pac-12. David Wilkerson had added 4.0 sacks in nine games and is actually ahead of Guyton and Owusu in the conference rankings at 10th with a per-game average of .44. Others that have recorded sacks in 2011 include Mychal Kendricks (3.0), Cecil Whiteside (3.0), D.J. Holt (2.0), Kendrick Payne (2.0), Chris McCain (1.5), Aaron Tipoti (1.5), Sean Cattouse (1.0), Deandre Coleman (1.0), Ryan Davis (1.0), Josh Hill (1.0), Robert Mullins (1.0), Mustafa Jalil (0.5) and C.J. Moncrease (0.5).

SECOND IN PAC-12, SEVENTH NATIONALLY IN PUNTING

Cal is ranked second in the Pac-12 and seventh nationally in net punting, with the latter the highest ranking in recorded history for the Golden Bears. Cal's net average is four positions better than the No. 11 individual national ranking punter Bryan Anger holds. The Bears have a net yards per punt average of 40.24 and have improved significantly in each of the two seasons under special teams coordinator Jeff Genyk, picking up 11 spots from their No. 30 position (37.31 nypg) the year before Genyk's arrival to No. 19 in 2010 (38.51 nypg) and another 12 spots to their current No. 7 position.

THE DEFENSIVE SIDE OF THE BALL

Cal is second in the Pac-12 in total defense (339.42 ypg) and leads the conference in pass defense (209.08 ypg), ranking 26th and 43rd nationally, respectively. The Bears also pace the Pac-12 and are ranked fifth nationally in tackles for loss (7.67 tflpg), as well as are third in the conference and 17th nationally in sacks (2.67 spg). In addition, the Bears share the league lead in opponents' first down, allowing only 17.8 per game. In the back-to-back wins over Washington State and Oregon State that started their successful final month of November, Cal only allowed a combined 13 points and held the Cougars and Beavers to an average of 48.0 rushing yards per game. Cal has held five opponents under 70 yards rushing in 2011.

CAL'S OFFENSE IMPROVED IN 2011

Cal's offensive unit has shown tremendous improvement in 2011, increasing its total production from 334.00 yards per game and a No. 90 national ranking in 2010 to 418.67 yards per game and a No. 37 national showing this season. The passing game moved nationally from No. 94 (175.08) to No. 38 (251.50 ypg). The running game was also slightly better, going from 158.92 yards per contest (No. 52) to 167.17 (No. 48).

BEARS AS THE BEST, AGAINST THE BEST

Cal is 15-8 when playing as a top-10 team and 36-21 when ranked in the top 25 of at least one set of rankings since head coach Jeff Tedford took over in 2002. Cal has played 32 nationally ranked teams during the Tedford era and posted a 13-19 record in those contests. The Bears are 0-2 in 2011 against nationally ranked teams with losses at Stanford (No. 8 AP, No. 9 BCS/USA Today and Oregon (No. 9 AP/USA Today) on Oct. 6 and Nov. 19 in their only games against ranked teams in 2011. In 2009, the Bears recorded back-to-back wins in consecutive weeks over nationally ranked teams for the first time since 1950, defeating No. 18 Arizona (Nov. 14) at Memorial Stadium before winning at No. 14 Stanford (Nov. 21). Cal has dropped five consecutive games against ranked teams since, falling to No. 23 Utah in the 2009 Poinsettia Bowl, last season to No. 6 Stanford and the top-ranked Ducks, and then again to Oregon and Stanford in 2011. Cal will take on one more ranked team in 2011 against Texas (No. 24 BCS) in the Holiday Bowl.

Prior to the 2011 campaign, Cal had been ranked among the nation's top 25 teams at one point in each of the previous seven seasons and eight times in nine campaigns from 2002-10. The Bears have yet to be ranked in 2011 but were among teams receiving votes in the USA Today Poll twice in weeks three and four, and the AP Top 25 in week four.

HOME AND THE ROAD

Cal posted a 4-1 record in its five 2011 regular-season home contests while playing at AT&T Park. Cal was 1-0 in neutral site games in 2011 (a 36-21 win over Fresno State in the season-opening Battle by the Bay at Candlestick Park) and 2-4 in road contests. The Bears will return to Memorial Stadium in Berkeley, which is currently undergoing an extensive renovation and retrofit, for their 2012 home contests.

TIED FOR THIRD NATIONALLY IN 90-YARD PLUS DRIVES

Cal is tied for third nationally in 2011 with five scoring drives of more than 90 yards that have all resulted in touchdowns. The Bears had drives of 92 and 91 yards in their season opener against Fresno State, 91 on the first possession at Washington, and 91 and 96 vs. Oregon State. Cal established season highs season highs in plays (16), yards (96) and time elapsed (9:01) on the second drive of 90-plus yards against the Beavers.

OFFENSIVE LINE NOW AT 145 COMBINED STARTS

The Bears' 2011 offensive line features a significant amount of starting experience. The Bears have had the same five starters in 11 of their first 12 games in 2011, with the only exception Brian Schwenke being replaced at left guard by Justin Gates in the ninth game of the season against Washington State when Schwenke missed the game due to an illness. The six players that have starting experience for Cal having combined to make 145 collegiate starts - Mitchell Schwartz (50), Justin Cheadle (34), Matt Summers-Gavin (24), Schwenke (23), Dominic Galas (13) and Gates (1).

SCORE 30 OR MORE POINTS, USUALLY WIN

Cal is 61-5 all-time when putting 30 points or more on the scoreboard under head coach Jeff Tedford, with a 6-0 mark in 2011. Cal has scored 30 or more points in six of its seven victories this season, with the wins coming over Presbyterian (63), Arizona State (47), Colorado (36), Fresno State (36), Utah (34) and Washington State (30). The Bears had won 30 consecutive games when they scored at least 30 points prior to a 52-31 loss at Nevada on Sept. 17, 2010. When the Bears don't score at least 30 points, their record under Tedford is 18-42, including a 1-5 mark in 2011 with losses to Stanford (28), Washington (23), Oregon (15), at UCLA (14) and vs. USC (9). The Bears did defeat Oregon State, 23-6, despite not scoring 30 or more points.

TURNOVER MARGIN A KEY

The turnover battle has been emphasized since head coach Jeff Tedford's arrival at Cal in 2002 and rightly so. The Bears are 45-8 when committing fewer turnovers than opponents during the Tedford era, compared to 17-10 when tied and 17-28 when opponents win the battle. In conference games, Cal is 28-6 with a positive margin in turnovers, 10-7 when the turnover table is tied and 10-24 with a deficit. However, the numbers in 2011 have not following the trend quite as strongly as in previous seasons as the Bears have won three games (Fresno State, at Colorado, Washington State) despite not winning the turnover battle. Cal did win the turnover battle in victories over Presbyterian, Utah, Oregon State and Arizona State. Turnovers also played a critical role in losses against USC and at UCLA, with Cal turning the ball over a season-high-tying five times in each contest. Cal also turned the ball over twice in a loss at Stanford, while the Cardinal turned it over only once. Cal has won the turnover battle twice (at Washington, at Oregon) in its five losses.





CAPITALIZING ON OPPONENTS' TURNOVERS

Cal has scored 82 points either on or on the drive immediately following their 23 turnovers in 2011. The Bears' defense directly counted for 12 of the 82 points on a 19-yard fumble return by Trevor Guyton vs. Fresno State and a 32-yard interception return from Josh Hill against Utah.

ON THE TUBE

Cal has played on television in 66 of its last 68 games, with the team's only two non-televised games during the span home contests vs. Washington State (Oct. 24, 2009) and Presbyterian (Sept. 17, 2011). The team's Holiday Bowl against Texas is scheduled to be nationally televised by ESPN, giving the Bears five nationally-televised ESPN games in 2011 and a sixth national broadcast on FSN at Washington. A total of 107 games, including the 2011 Holiday Bowl, will have been televised in the first 10 seasons under head coach Jeff Tedford.

WINNING THE TIME OF POSSESSION GAME

Cal is third in the Pac-12 with an average time of possession of 32:01. Cal has outpossessed its opponent in eight of its first 12 games in 2011, including six of its seven wins.

CAL IN THE NFL

A total of 215 former Cal football players have been drafted or have experience on an AAFC, AFL or NFL roster as of Dec. 15, 2011, including 33 players that are currently on NFL rosters according to ESPN.com, which is the second-most among Pac-12 schools behind only USC. A complete listing of former Cal players in the NFL and more information about their professional football careers is located on pages 28-29.

RODGERS, BISHOP SUPER BOWL CHAMPS; RODGERS MVP

Former Cal football players Aaron Rodgers and Desmond Bishop are reigning Super Bowl champions after Green Bay defeated Pittsburgh, 31-25, at Cowboys Stadium in Super Bowl XLV on February 6, 2011. Rodgers was the first former Cal player to be named the game's MVP, and is also the first of the record four former Cal quarterbacks to start the game to be victorious.

FOUR SELECTIONS ADD TO STRONG NFL DRAFT HISTORY

Four former Cal players were selected during the 2011 NFL Draft. Cameron Jordan was the first Bear picked when he was taken in the first round by the New Orleans Saints with the No. 24 overall pick. Shane Vereen and Chris Conte were selected on the draft's second day, with Vereen going to the New England Patriots in the second round (No. 56 overall) and Conte being chosen in the third round by the Chicago Bears (No. 93 overall). Mike Mohamed was picked up by the Denver Broncos in the sixth round (No. 189 overall).

"I'm happy for all these guys," head coach Jeff Tedford said. "All of them are really, really happy. It's gratifying to me for the reason that they entrusted their careers to come to Cal to see their dreams come true."

Cal Draft Notes: Cal's four players selected in 2011 were the most Bears taken in an NFL Draft since six were picked in 2008 ... Cal had three players in the top 100 to rank tied for sixth among schools nationally ... Cal has had 36 NFL Draft selections in the last 10 drafts ... Jordan was Cal's 26th first-round pick and the eighth in the last 10 drafts ... Jordan became the second consecutive defensive lineman chosen from Cal in the first round in as many years, joining the No. 10 overall selection of Tyson Alualu by Jacksonville in 2010 and making the Cal only the second team in the Pac-12 to have ever had defensive linemen selected in the first round in back-to-back drafts (USC is the other) ... Cal has had four first-round draft picks in the last three drafts, with at least one in all three.

ACADEMIC PROWESS CONTINUES

Cal has posted 103 Pac-12 All-Academic honors in the first 10 seasons under head coach Jeff Tedford, second-most in the conference during that span. Nine Cal student-athletes were honored on the 2011 Pac-12 All-Academic Football Team, including four first-team selections in Mark Brazinski, Ernest Owusu, Mitchell Schwartz and John Tyndall.

In 2008, Alex Mack earned the Draddy Trophy (later renamed the Campbell Trophy) honoring college football's top scholar-athlete, while Mohamed was a finalist for the honor often referred to as the "Academic Heisman" in 2010 after earlier being given an NFF Scholar-Athlete Award. Giorgio Tavecchio was a semifinalist for the honor and a candidate for an NFF Scholar-Athlete Award in 2011.

Bryan Anger, Mychal Kendricks and MItchell Schwartz have all played in 50 career games. Schwartz has started all 50 but Syd'Quan Thompson's school record of 52 starts set from 2006-09 remains out of reach for Schwartz as the Bears have only one game remaining on their 2011 schedule. D.J. Holt has played in 49 career games and will have a chance to join his teammates in the 50-game club at the Holiday Bowl.

LAST GAME IN CAL UNIFORM FOR 21 PLAYERS

The 2011 Bridgepoint Education Holiday Bowl will serve as the final game in a Cal uniform for 21 players. The list includes Bryan Anger, Michael Calvin, D.J. Campbell, Sean Cattouse, Justin Cheadle, Ryan Davis, Coleman Edmond, Justin Gates, Trevor Guyton, D.J. Holt, Marvin Jones, Will Kapp, Mychal Kendricks, Brock Mansion, Anthony Miller, C.J. Moncrease, Robert Mullins, Ernest Owusu, Mitchell Schwartz, Giorgio Tavecchio and John Tyndall. All but Mullins are seniors who will exhaust their collegiate football eligibility after the Holiday Bowl. Mullins is scheduled to graduate and does not intend to use his final season of eligibility.

LOSSES TO TOUGH TEAMS

Three of Cal's five losses in 2011 came to a trio of teams in Stanford, USC and Oregon teams that are ranked fourth-sixth in the final regular-season AP Top 25. The other two defeats came on the road at bowl-bound teams Washington and UCLA, with the Bruins also the winner of the Pac-12 South division and a participant in the inaugural Pac-12 Championship Game. The combined record of the five teams that have defeated the Bears in 2011 is 45-17 (.726).

- Anthony Ferrario is a former student worker for the football team's video coordinator.
- Austin Hinder is the grandson of Cal Athletic Hall of Famer Jim Hanifan, also a long time NFL and collegiate coach.
- Marvin Jones and his girlfriend Jazmyn Mathis just had their second child, Mareon, and live together along with their first son, Marv III
 (turning three years old in January), in student housing. Jones is also on track to graduate in December in only three and a half years
 at Cal.
- · Bryce McGovern is a true freshman walk-on who has played, mostly on special teams but also as a backup receiver.
- Viliami Moala is a 360-pound nose guard who has also been one of the back three players protecting the punter.
- Richard Rodgers' father, Richard Rodgers, Sr., was prominently involved in "The Play" as the player who made the last of the five laterals.
- · Isi Sofele is one of eight siblings.
- · Bud "Dog" Turner is in his 42nd season involved with Cal football and likes to say that he is "halfway through his career"
- Jacob Wark is also a backup first baseman on Cal's baseball team that went to the College World Series in 2011.
- There are four sets of brothers on the team Keenan Allen and Zach Maynard, Kameron and Kaulin Krebs, Bill and John Tyndall, and Jordan and Tyler Rigsbee.
- Five players from Greensboro, North Carolina (Keenan Allen, Maurice Harris, Gabe King, Zach Maynard, Chris McCain).
- The same high school in Phoenix (North Canyon High School) has produced our long snappers for seven consecutive seasons with Nick Sundberg (2005-08, now with the Washington Redskins) and Matt Rios (2009-Present).
- Benjamin Calder and Darren Ervin were high school teammates at Lamar High School in Houston.
- · Josh Hill and Kendrick Payne were high school teammates at Klein Forest High School in Houston.
- · Adrian Lee and Steve Williams were high school teammates at Skyline High School in Dallas.
- Two of Cal's placekickers Vincenzo D'Amato and Giorgio Tavecchio are of Italian heritage.
- Cal has two players Alejandro Crosthwaite (Rosarito Beach, Mexico) and Matt Williams (Liverpool, England) that list hometowns
 outside the United States.

2011 NATIONAL SIGNING DAY

Cal signed 11 prep All-Americans and 22 student-athletes to National Letters of Intent to join the Cal football program on National Signing Day on February 2, 2011. Cal's 2011 signing class ranked as high as No. 13 according to according to Athlon. Scout had Cal at No. 14 and Rivals at No. 17, while ESPN listed the Bears at No. 18 and MaxPreps at No. 20.

The 2011 class included six players selected for the U.S. Army All-American Bowl – LB Jason Gibson (Gardena, CA/Junipero Serra HS), DB Stefan McClure (Vista, CA/Vista HS), DL Viliami Moala (Sacramento, CA/Grant HS), OL Jordan Rigsbee (Chico, CA/Pleasant Valley HS), DL Brennan Scarlett (Portland, OR/Central Catholic HS) and DB Avery Sebastian (McDonough, GA/Eagle's Landing Christian HS). DL Todd Barr (Lakewood, CA/Lakewood HS) played in the Under Armour All-America Game.





PAC-12 CONFERENCE CHANGES

The Pac-12 has taken major steps to transform itself into a dynamic new enterprise by forming two football divisions that maintain traditional rivalries, creating the first-ever Pac-12 Championship Game, establishing schedule models for all other sports and agreeing to move to an equal revenue sharing plan for the first time in conference history. The Chancellors and Presidents of the 12 member institutions have also voted to create a new North-South division structure that allows the conference to continue to play its traditional rivalry games, including the long-standing annual games among the California schools, delivers a football championship game to the home field of the top team in the regular-season conference standings and is easy for fans to follow. The new divisions that commenced in 2011 feature California, Oregon, Oregon State, Stanford, Washington and Washington State in the North; and Arizona, Arizona State, Colorado, UCLA, USC, and Utah in the South. Each school plays five divisional games and four cross-divisional games each year. To preserve all of the historic rivalries, including those among the California schools, the new scheduling format locks in annual inter-divisional games between Northern and Southern California teams that date back to the 1930s.

On May 4, 2011, the Pac-12 announced it is teaming up with ESPN and FOX Sports Media Group on a landmark agreement for a broadcast and national cable television package that extends and expands long-time partnerships with both companies. At the same time, Pac-12 Commissioner Larry Scott announced the creation of a new media company, Pac-12 Media Enterprises, which will own the Pac-12 Network, the Pac-12 Digital Network, and Pac-12 Properties. This new company will control and distribute on its platforms and on all devices, the Pac-12 games not licensed to ESPN and FOX Sports, and will hold other media and event rights. This entity will be wholly owned and controlled by the Pac-12 Conference and will exist side-by-side with the newly announced ESPN and FOX Sports arrangements.

Although terms of the ESPN and Fox Sports agreements were not disclosed, Scott called it a "landmark deal" on several fronts. He pointed out that the Pac-12's member institutions would, for the first time ever, share equally in the revenue from the new arrangement, and that the equal revenue distribution would start immediately when the deal goes into effect in 2012.


BACK TO BERKELEY IN 2012

California Memorial Stadium, which stands as one of the most enduring symbols of the University of California campus, has served as a gathering point for students, alumni, faculty, staff and other supporters since its opening just before the 1923 Big Game vs. Stanford. Now, a renovation and seismic retrofit of the historic structure will bring the building up to modern standards and provide a safe environment for hundreds of thousands of fans to enjoy Golden Bear football games on an annual basis for years to come – all while maintaining the architecture and character of the celebrated facility.

Preliminary work on the project, including installation of temporary bracing around the outer wall, hazardous material removal and interior demolition, began in June 2010. Major construction got underway in December 2010, starting with demolition of the interior bowl, soil excavation and wall shoring. The stadium will be game-ready to host Cal football in September 2012, with work completed in early 2013.

The \$321 million renovation, which impacts all but the outer wall and the east-side seating area, capitalizes on the expertise of seismic engineers and campus experts that found a unique solution to protect the stadium and its users in case of an earthquake. Design features include concrete "seismic blocks" at the end zone where the Hayward Fault bisects the facility and a press box that can sway in a large-scale temblor. The solution came as a result of collaboration between the campus Seismic Review Committee, the architectural team and the structural engineers hired for the job.

When Memorial Stadium reopens, Golden Bear fans will notice a significant number of upgrades to the facility, including three club levels for those participating in the Endowment Seating Program, a new press box, wider concourses, improved ADA access, and more restrooms and concession stands. Capacity will be reduced from 71,799 seats to just over 63,000.






CALIFORNIA MEMORIAL STADIUM RENOVATION HIGHLIGHTS

- Modernized fan amenities, including wider concourses and additional restrooms and concession areas on the west side.
- New wheelchair seating with better accessibility and access around the stadium.
- The historic façade, one of the signature features of Memorial Stadium, will be retained. Damaged concrete will be repaired, detail work will be restored and a new finish to match the original 1923 look will be applied.
- Modernized public address and lighting system.
- · Restored flagpoles atop the stadium rim.
- State-of-the art scoreboards with enhanced video and graphics capabilities within the existing structures at the north and south ends of the stadium.
- A new 34,000-square-foot press box atop the west side.
- Endowment Seating Program area (approximately 3,000 seats) that will include chair-back seating and access to three club levels (Field Club, Stadium Club and University Club).
- Bench-back seating in donor sections outside the ESP area with additional leg room.
- Old wooden seating will be replaced with aluminum bleachers throughout the stadium.
- Playing surface will be lowered approximately four feet to improve sightlines for fans seated in lower rows.

The Simpson Center for Student-Athlete High Performance is a revolutionary student-athlete training, coaching, and applied sports science and sports medicine center that embodies the High Performance Initiative, Cal's innovative performance philosophy designed to build competitive advantage, maximize efficiency and enhance the student-athlete experience (see CalHighPerformance.com for more details).

A 142,000 square-foot facility, the Simpson Center will directly serve 450 student-athletes and their coaching and support staffs, as well as provide access for all Cal student-athletes. Among the many services offered in the complex will be: academic support; performance training and assessment; therapy, rehabilitation and reconditioning; nutrition and food service; and a medical clinic.

The central High Performance Zone will be a fully integrated training space with world-class strength & conditioning, sports medicine and sports science facilities and services. Developed with flexibility and adaptability in mind, high quality equipment and an open layout will provide training options to prepare for the highest levels of competition.

The Olympic Wing of the Simpson Center that houses 12 sports opened with a ribbon cutting ceremony on Oct. 12, 2011, after more than two years of construction. Football, sports medicine and strength & conditioning will move into the building from their temporary headquarters just east of Memorial Stadium in January.

Former Cal players Cameron Jordan, Shane Vereen, Mike Mohamed and Chris Conte were selected in the 2011 NFL Draft.

Jordan (New Orleans Saints, 24th overall) was selected in the first round, and is the 26th player in Cal history to be selected in the first round, while seven Bears have been taken in the first round and 36 selected overall since Jeff Tedford became the team's head coach prior to the 2011 season.

Vereen and Conte were selected on the draft's second day, with Vereen was going to the New England Patriots in the second round (No. 56 overall) and Conte being chosen in the third round by the Chicago Bears (No. 93 overall). Mohamed rounded out Cal's selections when he was picked up on Saturday's final day of the draft by the Denver Broncos in the sixth round (No. 189 overall).

CAL 36, FRESNO STATE 21

(AT CANDLESTICK PARK)

SAN FRANCISCO – The California defense harassed Derek Carr and the Fresno State offense all game to win their season opener, 36-21, over the Bulldogs in the Battle By the Bay at Candlestick Park, the Golden Bears' first-ever game played at that venue and is believed to be the first-ever collegiate football game played there.

While Cal was in control after scoring three touchdowns in the first quarter, it was a defensive score that put the game away in the third.

Linebacker Cecil Whiteside came off the edge and got to Carr before he could get rid of the ball. He knocked it out of Carr's hand and the ball fell right to Trevor Guyton, who ran it back 22 yards for his first-career touchdown that made it 33-14.

The Bulldogs didn't manage to reach 200 total yards until a meaningless touchdown drive late in the fourth quarter.

Cal fared much better with its new quarterback. Transfer (Buffalo) Zach Maynard threw an interception in his first pass but bounced back to throw for 266 yards and connect with Marvin Jones on two touchdown passes.

Isi Sofele ran for 83 yards and two touchdowns, Jones had 118 yards receiving and Keenan Allen caught eight passes from his half-brother for 112 yards to give the Bears an emphatic start to the season a year after posting a losing record.

The Cal fans had much more to cheer about—especially after Maynard recovered from the early interception that helped give the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead.

Maynard completed 16 of his 35 pass attempts and had a knack for the big play as he capitalized against a Fresno State defense missing injured safety Phillip Thomas.

Maynard's mobility helped him win the job, and he showed it off with a couple of long runs, including a 48-yarder on Cal's opening drive of the second half that set up his second TD throw. The 23-yarder to Jones made it 26-14 and made that early interception a footnote to this game.

Despite outgaining Fresno State 310-122 in the first half, the Bears only led 19-14 at the break after a botched snap by Dominic Galas led to a fumble in the end zone by Sofele that Christin Wilson recovered for a touchdown.

NOTES

- This was the third all-time meeting between Cal and Fresno State. The Bears are now 1-2 all-time against the Bulldogs. The previous meetings were in 1995 (25-24, Fresno State) and 2000 (17-3, Fresno State). This was also the first time 10th-year head coach Jeff Tedford, who played quarterback at Fresno State, faced his alma mater as a head coach.
- This was the first-ever Cal game played at Candlestick Park, and is believed to be the first-ever collegiate football game played at Candlestick, as well.
- Cal has an all-time record of 73-39-4 in season openers over the first 116 campaigns of Cal football that began in 1982. Cal has won seven of its last eight season openers. The Bears' most recent neutral-site season opener was a 41-13 loss to Florida in Tampa, Fla., on Sept. 13, 1980.
- The Bears are now 19-11 in regular season neutral-site games since Memorial Stadium was built in 1923, including a 3-5 record in season openers. In the only other regular season neutral site contest during the Tedford era, Cal lost to Kansas State in 2003 at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City, Mo.
- Cal's 19 first-quarter points were the most by a Cal team in the first quarter since
 Cal scored 24 points in the first quarter against Washington State on Oct. 24,
 2009. It was also the most points in any quarter by Cal since the Bears scored
 21 in the fourth quarter of a 52-7 win over Colorado on Sept. 11, 2010.
- LB Mychal Kendricks, a Fresno native, led all tacklers with nine and had 2.5 tackles for loss. Fellow LB D.J. Holt added seven tackles, two for a loss.
- TB Isi Sofele scored the second rushing touchdown of his career, and the first
 for the team this season, on the second drive of the game. In the next Cal
 series, Sofele rattled of a 39-yard touchdown run, recording the first two Cal
 scores of the year. The 39-yard scamper was the longest of his career. His first
 career touchdown came on a 22-yard run against Eastern Washington. Sofele
 finished with 24 carries for 83 yards.
- WR Marvin Jones caught two touchdown passes for the second multi-touchdown game of his career (UCLA, 2009). Jones finished the game with five catches for 118 yards and two touchdowns. It was Jones' fifth career 100-yard game.
- WR Keenan Allen hauled in a career-high tying eight receptions for 112 yards, his second 100-yard game. The last time two Cal receivers had 100 yards receiving was in 2006 when DeSean Jackson and Lavelle Hawkins accomplished the same feat on Sept. 19, 2006.
- DL Trevor Guyton recovered a fumble (forced by Cecil Whiteside) and returned it for his first collegiate touchdown. Whiteside also registered his first collegiate sack.
- DB Josh Hill, LB David Wilkerson and LB Ryan Davis registered their first collegiate sacks and Steve Williams picked off his second career interception. Hill also had two tackles for loss.
- $\bullet \quad \text{The Cal defense held Fresno State to only convert two of its 14 third-down attempts}.\\$

GAME 2 SUMMARY

CAL 36, at COLORADO 33(OT)

September 10, 2011 • TV: CSN California • Attendance: 49,532

BOULDER – Keenan Allen hauled in a 5-yard TD pass in overtime from his half brother, Zach Maynard, lifting California to a thrilling 36-33 win over Colorado on Saturday despite a record-setting offensive day by the Buffaloes.

Maynard lofted a pass into the corner for Allen, who easily beat Colorado defensive back Parker Orms to set off a wild celebration by the Bears near the goal line.

The catch by Allen came moments after Will Oliver connected on a 22-yard field goal in overtime for Colorado, his fourth of the game. Oliver also nailed a 32-yarder with 30 seconds remaining to extend the game for the Buffaloes.

Tight end Anthony Miller caught two of Maynard's four TD passes, and C.J. Anderson scored on a 19-yard scamper in the fourth quarter.

The victory was Jeff Tedford's 74th as Cal's head coach, tying him with Andy Smith (1916-25) for most in school history.

The Bears faced a first-and-30 at the CU 35 in overtime, but Maynard completed a pass to Allen for 32 yards near the goal line. Two plays later, the tandem hooked up again for the game winner.

Once Anderson's score gave the Bears the lead back with 9:55 remaining, Cal cornerback Steve Williams found a way to bottle up Paul Richardson, knocking down two crucial passes late in the contest.

The Buffaloes opened the second half with a long scoring drive, culminating with tight end Ryan Deehan's 37-yard TD catch.

Oliver staked Colorado to a 3-0 lead after connecting on a 27-yard field goal in the first quarter. In five previous meetings, the team that scored first never relinquished the lead. But that trend was quickly halted Saturday.

Cal jumped right back in front when Maynard marched the Bears down the field and hit fullback Nico Dumont for a 2-yard score on the first touch of Dumont's career. Giorgio Tavecchio's extra point was blocked.

Just before halftime, Miller hauled in a one-handed grab in the end zone to help the Bears to a 16-6 lead.

NOTES

- Marvin Jones picked up the 100th catch of his Cal career with his first catch of the game.
- Isi Sofele finished the day with 20 rushes for 84 yards. He had 24 carries for 88 yards and the two scores the previous week against Fresno State.
- Keenan Allen made the two biggest catches of the day in Cal's overtime drive. He
 hauled in the game-winning touchdown from Zach Maynard after snagging a huge
 catch inside the 5-yard-line two plays before. He finished the day with six receptions
 for 104 yards (including a season-high 37-yard reception) and a touchdown. It was
 his second straight 100-yard performance and the third of his career. Allen also
 completed a 27-yard pass to quarterback Zach Maynard.
- Zach Maynard completed 18-of-35 passes for 243 yards with four touchdown passes and one interception. He completed passes to six different receivers. His four touchdown passes were the most by a Cal quarterback since Kevin Riley had four in a home game vs. Colorado on Sept. 11, 2010. Maynard also had a 27-yard reception from wide receiver Keenan Allen.
- Mychal Kendricks and D.J. Holt paced the Bears with 7.5 tackles against Colorado. Kendricks also chipped in a tackle for loss (-5 yards).
- Anthony Miller picked up two touchdown catches for the first time in his career.
 Miller's two TD grabs doubled his career total to four.
- Nico Dumont scored on a two-yard touchdown pass from Zach Maynard with 14:14
 remaining in the second quarter. The catch came on the first touch of Dumont's career,
 marking the first time a Cal player has scored on the first touch of his career since
 Anthony Miller's two-yard TD reception from Nate Longshore with 2:41 remaining
 in Cal's 24-17 Emerald Bowl win over Miami, Fla., on Dec. 27, 2008.
- Cal improved to 57-5 all-time when putting 30 points or more on the scoreboard under head coach Jeff Tedford, adding to its win total with the 36-33 overtime victory at Colorado. When the Bears haven't scored at least 30 points, their record under Tedford is 17-37.
- The overtime game was the first time Cal played an overtime game since Oct. 21, 2006, when the Bears defeated Washington, 31-24. Marshawn Lynch scored the game-deciding touchdown. On the following Husky drive, Cal garnered an interception to end the game.
- Cal's victory at Colorado marked the first time the school had won an overtime road game in four opportunities all-time, the most recent being a 27-20 loss at Oregon on Nov. 5, 2005. Cal had previous overtime losses at UCLA in 2003 and Arizona (two overtimes) in 1997. The Bears are 6-4 all-time in 10 overtime contests thru the win at Colorado, sporting a 5-1 mark at home victories at Memorial Stadium over Oregon State (1996, 3ot), Arizona (1996, 4ot), UCLA (2000, 3ot), USC (2003, 3ot) and Washington (2006). The only time the Bears have ever lost an overtime game at home came in 2000 when Stanford was a 36-30 winner in the Big Game.

GAME 3 SUMMARY

at CAL 63, PRESBYTERIAN 12

SAN FRANCISCO – Zach Maynard threw for 215 yards and three touchdowns, and California made Jeff Tedford the program's winningest coach with a 63-12 romp over Presbyterian on Saturday in the first home game at AT&T Park.

Isi Sofele ran for a career-high 110 yards and two touchdowns and Brendan Bigelow returned a kick 88 yards for a score to give Tedford his 75th victory. He passed Andy Smith, who had held the record since 1925.

Maynard finished 15 for 25 passing and only played one half for the Golden Bears in the first of five games this season at the San Francisco Giants' cozy waterfront ballpark. Cal's longtime home, Memorial Stadium, is being renovated.

A crowd that came across San Francisco Bay colored the park in blue and gold and spread banners over some of the Giants' decor.

After three penalties stalled the opening drive, Cal wasted little time on its next possession. C.J. Anderson rushed for a 9-yard touchdown through the infield dirt to cap a three-play, 50-yard drive that gave the Bears a 7-0 lead.

Sean Cattouse followed with an interception on a pass by Presbyterian's Ryan Singer. Two plays later, Sofele powered his way into the end zone from a yard out to put Cal ahead 14-0.

Cattouse leaped up to snag his second interception – the seventh of his career and the most among Cal's active players – near the Bears sideline early in the second quarter. Three players later, Marvin Jones sprinted across the field on a crossing pattern and slipped past two defenders for a 51-yard touchdown that extended Cal's lead to 28-0.

The Bears quickly drove 55 yards on five plays highlighted by Keenan Allen's 21-yard touchdown catch from Maynard just before the break. Bigelow returned the opening kickoff in the second half for an 88-yard touchdown that put the Bears ahead 49-12, and the rout was on.

NOTES

- With the 63 points today, it was the first time Cal scored 50 or more points since
 Oct. 23, 2010, against Arizona State and the first time the Bears went over 60
 since Sept. 6, 2008, (66-3 at Washington State). The most points scored in the
 Tedford era was 70 in 2002.
- Cal is now 58-5 all-time when putting 30 points or more on the scoreboard, 39-2 when scoring 40 or more, 14-0 when topping 50 and 3-0 when going over 60 points under head coach Jeff Tedford. When the Bears don't score at least 30 points, their record under Tedford is 17-37.
- Entering today's contest, Cal had recorded 17 plays (14 passing, three rushing) from the line of scrimmage that have covered 20 or more yards this season. Against Presbyterian, Cal had seven plays of 20-plus yards 25-and 23-yard runs by Isi Sofele, a 22-yard catch by Michael Calvin, a 21 (touchdown) and 27-yard receptions by Keenan Allen and 33-yard and 51-yard (touchdown) receptions by Marvin Jones.
- One week after picking up the 100th catch of his Cal career, Marvin Jones finished
 with seven receptions for 123 yards and a touchdown against Presbyterian.
 He now has six career 100-yard performances. One of his catches was good
 for 51 yards, his fifth play of 50 or more yards with the Bears. He now boasts
 13 career touchdowns that tied him for eighth all time at Cal. The other half of
 Cal's receiving tandem; Keenan Allen collected six catches for 85 yards and a
 touchdown
- Isi Sofele finished the day with 17 rushes for a career-high 105 yards and a touchdown. It was Sofele's first-ever 100-yard rushing performance.
- Zach Maynard completed 15-of-25 passes for 215 yards, three touchdown passes and one interception. He has now completed 49 of his 95 pass attempts this season. Maynard had one pass intercepted and returned for a touchdown. The last time a Cal pass was picked off and returned for a score happened on Sept. 17, 2010, when Nevada's Marlon Johnson intercepted former Cal quarterback Kevin Riley.
- Cal held Presbyterian to 48 total offensive yards, which is the fifth fewest yards allowed in a game by Cal in school history. The modern era record is 22 against the Cal Aggies on Oct. 16, 1937.
- Ernest Owusu notched his first sack of the season in the first quarter. It was his first sack since Oct. 30, 2010, at Oregon State. Owusu now has 4.5 sacks in his collegiate career.
- In his Cal debut, Brendan Bigelow returned the second half kickoff 86 yards for a touchdown. Cal's last kickoff returned for a touchdown came on Sept. 15, 2007, by Lavelle Hawkins against Louisiana Tech. Bigelow also had two rushes for 15 yards.
- Sean Cattouse notched his first and second interceptions of the season. It was
 the first multi-interception game of his career and his first interception since
 Oct. 23, 2010, against Arizona State. He is Cal's active leader in interceptions
 with seven. The last time a Cal player recorded two interceptions in the same
 game was Mike Mohamed on Sept. 19, 2009, at Minnesota.

at WASHINGTON 31, CAL 23

SEATTLE – Despite garnering the longest pass play in school history, California lost its first game of the season to Washington, 31-23.

Zach Maynard found Keenan Allen wide open on a busted coverage running straight down the hash marks early in the first quarter. Allen broke an attempted tackle by Quinton Richardson and tumbled into the end zone for a 90-yard touchdown to give Cal an early 7-0 lead. The scoring toss was the longest reception in school history.

Both teams traded field goals to open the second half before Washington regained control. Keith Price connected with a wide-open Chris Polk down the middle of the field for a 70-yard touchdown to swing the momentum back in Washington's favor as the Huskies took a 31-23 lead.

Cal faced a short fourth down from the Washington 36-yard line with under seven minutes left to play. But Maynard's pass to Isi Sofele was broken up by Cort Dennison to give Washington the ball and grind a couple minutes off the clock before Cal got the ball back with 4:19 to go.

On the game's final drive, Maynard converted on three straight third downs to move Cal into Washington territory. A pass interference call on Desmond Trufant gave Cal a first down at the Washington 21-yard line with 48 seconds left. Maynard, who threw for 349 yards and a touchdown on the day, connected with Allen for 19 yards down to the Washington 2-yard line.

An incompletion and a pair of runs left Cal facing fourth down from the 2-yard line. Maynard's fourth-down pass for Allen sailed high and out of the end zone as Washington held on for the victory with a stout defensive stand.

Following Allen's record-setting touchdown in the first quarter, Price led the Huskies on an 8-play, 65-yard scoring drive culminating in a 2-yard touchdown run from Keith Price to give the Huskies a 14-7 lead at the 3:30 mark in the first quarter.

After a 29-yard field goal by Giorgio Tavecchio, Cal held Washington on a short third down from their own 41-yard line, but the Bears elected to accept a holding penalty on Seferian-Jenkins and back the Huskies up. Price connected with Kevin Smith for 12 yards on a long third down as Washington kept the drive alive. Five plays later, Price found Seferian-Jenkins for a 20-yard touchdown to take a 21-10 lead.

Tavecchio connected from 36-yards out to pull within eight and California got the ball right back after Price fumbled on the first play of Washington's next drive. Maynard completed passes of 17 yards to Allen and 15 yards to Covaughn DeBoskie-Johnson to get inside the Washington 5-yard line. C.J. Anderson scored from a yard out to close the gap to 21-20 with just over a minute to play in the first half.

NOTES

- Keenan Allen's 90-yard touchdown reception set the Cal record for longest pass play in school history and tied for the sixth longest play from scrimmage at Cal (five rushes were longer). The previous record was 88 yards from Joe Roth to Wesley Walker against Georgia on Sept. 11, 1976. The most recent pass play that was 75 yards or more was an 80-yard completion from Aaron Rodgers to Geoff McArthur against UCLA on Oct. 16, 2004.
- Allen's 90-yard reception helped him garner his third 100-yard receiving performance of the season and the fourth of his career. He ended the day with 10 catches for a career-high 197 yards and a touchdown. His 197 yards are the fifth-highest total in Cal history and most for a Golden Bear since Geoff McArthur had 245 in the 2003 Big Game at Stanford (16 catches).
- Cal is now 6-4 in conference openers under head coach Jeff Tedford.
- When the Bears don't score at least 30 points, their record under Tedford is 17-38.
- Cal has now recorded 27 plays (21 passing, six rushing) from the line of scrimmage that have covered 20 or more yards this season. Against Washington, Cal had three plays of 20-plus yards a 90-yard touchdown reception by Keenan Allen, a 22-yard pass to Isi Sofele, a 22-yard Sofele rush
- Marvin Jones finished with 6 receptions for 79 yards against Washington. One
 of Jones' completions was a nice grab where he just dragged his toe inbounds.
 He now has six career 100-yard performances. He now boasts 13 career
 touchdowns that tied him for eighth all time at Cal.
- Zach Maynard completed 23-of-43 passes for 349 yards and one touchdown.
 The yardage total is his highest as a Golden Bear, topping the 266 yards he
 had in the season opener vs. Fresno State. It was the first 300-yard game for
 a Cal quarterback since Kevin Riley threw for 351 yards at Arizona State on
 Oct. 31, 2009.
- Giorgio Tavecchio has been a perfect 5-for-5 on field goals this season and made all three of his attempts against Washington. He booted a 29-yarder in the first quarter, a 36-yard field goal in the second quarter and a 25-yarder in the third quarter.
- Mychal Kendricks posted a season-high 14 tackles (9 solo), plus a fumble recovery. His career high is 15 stops.

EUGENE – Cal fell to No. 9 Oregon, 43-15. Isi Sofele was solid for the Golden Bears rushing for 119 yards, averaging 9.9 yards per carry. Keenan Allen had 9 catches for 170 yards and a touchdown.

Giorgio Tavecchio made three field goals - including a career-best 54-yarder - for Cal, which led 15-14 at the half, but couldn't sustain its momentum against the country's top scoring offense.

Oregon true freshman De'Anthony Thomas caught a pair of touchdown passes and ran for another score for the Ducks.

Cal took a 3-0 lead on Tavecchio's 27-yard field goal on the first series of the game, but James answered with a 53-yard dash for a score and the Ducks looked to be taking off.

Tavechhio added another field goal, this time a 38-yarder, to make it 7-6. A rain storm moved in over Autzen and slowed play a bit, but Oregon extended its lead on Thomas' 17-yard touchdown run late in the first quarter.

Tavecchio's career-long 54-yard field goal cut it to 14-9. Also on Cal's special team, Bryan Anger recorded a season-high 59-yard punt.

The Bears stopped Oregon on a fourth down on their own 41. Quarterback Zach Maynard led an efficient march that was capped by his 12-yard touchdown pass to Kennan Allen that gave the Bears a 15-14 lead.

Tavecchio attempted a 40-yard field goal before the end of the first half, but it was blocked.

After the half, Oregon quickly regained the lead with Darron Thomas' 23-yard pass to De'Anthony Thomas. The Ducks extended it on Kenjon Barner's 68-yard touchdown run and Darron Thomas completed a pass to De'Anthony Thomas for the 2-point conversion.

Darron Thomas hit De'Anthony Thomas again with a 21-yard touchdown before James was injured on the fourth-quarter drive that was capped by Darron Thomas' 3-yard scoring pass to Lavasier Tuinei.

Darron Thomas completed 13 of 25 passes for 198 yards and three touchdowns.

NOTES

- The white helmets worn by Cal tonight marked the first time in school history that the Golden Bears have sported white helmets. The only other times when Cal did not wear the traditional blue helmets were during the Mike White era in the 1970s and the Roger Theder era in the late 1970s-early 80s when the Bears wore gold helmets with either a white "C" (White era) or the blue Cal script (Theder era) on the side of the helmet.
- Tonight's game marked the fourth weeknight game in the Jeff Tedford era at Cal, all on the road. The Bears are now 1-3 on weeknights - at Utah 31, Cal 24 (Sept. 11, 2003), Cal 41, at New Mexico State 13 (Sept. 23, 2005), at Nevada 52, Cal 31 (Sept. 17, 2010) and at Oregon 43, Cal 15 Thursday.
- · Cal is 9-7 in 16 regular-season games coming off a bye under Tedford.
- Cal had seven offensive plays of at least 20 yards, giving the Bears 34 for the year. They had a total of 39 such plays all of last year. Against Oregon, the plays were: 25-, 27-, 28- and 31-yard receptions by Keenan Allen and 22-, 25- and 34-yard runs from Isi Sofele.
- Marvin Jones finished with 6 receptions for 66 yards against Oregon. Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (123), receiving yards (1,865) and receiving touchdowns (13). The receptions are 13 shy of the top 10 at Cal and the receiving yards 182 away from the record book. He also extended his run of 30 consecutive games over every Cal contest the last three years with at least one reception, while Keenan Allen's streak covers each of the 16 games he has played in over the past two seasons.
- Keenan Allen scored his fourth touchdown of the season in the second quarter.
 He has now scored in the last four consecutive games. He finished the night
 with nine catches for 170 yards, his fourth 100-yard effort in five games this
 season. Allen has had at least 85 yards receiving in every game in 2011.
- Isi Sofele finished the day with 12 rushes for a career-high 119 yards. He now
 has 499 yards on the year through five games, with four consecutive games
 of at least 84 yards. He posted 63 yards, including a 34-yard run, in the first
 quarter, and ended the first half with 93 yards on the ground.
- Giorgio Tavecchio's 54-yard field goal in the second quarter was just one yard shy of the school record of 55 yards set by Robbie Keen vs. Washington in 1988 and matched by Tom Schneider vs. Stanford in 2006. Tavecchio joins four others who have booted 54-yard field goals Randy Pratt vs. UCLA in 1983; Mick Luckhurst vs. Oregon State in 1980; Ron Vander Meer vs. Illinois in 1974; and Archie Nisbet vs. Washington State in 1922. Tavecchio's previous best was 53 yards at Washington last year. He is now 8-of-9 on field goals this season.
- Ernest Owusu has two tackles for loss for -12 yards, part of his career-high seven tackles, including two for loss, while Josh Hill matched his personal best with eight stops. The interception by D.J. Campbell late in the second half was the first of his career. D.J. Holt also had a season-high 11 tackles.

SAN FRANCISCO – The Trojans kept Cal off the scoreboard until late in the third quarter, and the Bears struggled with turnovers in their eighth straight loss in the series against USC, 30-9.

Zach Maynard committed four of Cal's five turnovers, and the Bears dropped their sixth straight conference game dating back to last season.

Maynard threw for 294 yards and ran for a touchdown and his half-brother, Keenan Allen, had a career-high 13 catches for 160 yards but it wasn't enough to overcome the litany of mistakes.

Cal was behind 23-0 early in the third quarter before the offense finally got going, with Maynard leading the Bears to a 27-yard Giorgio Tavecchio field goal and then scoring on a 3-yard run with 6 seconds left in the third to cut it to 23-9.

But Maynard's third interception midway through the fourth quarter led to Curtis McNeal's 2-yard touchdown run that made it 30-9 with 5:14 remaining.

The Bears turned the ball over four times in the first half and failed to convert a fake punt as they fell behind 20-0 at the break.

Cal's defense did a decent job defending Barkley and the Trojans' high-powered offense but USC took advantage of short fields for its scores.

Allen fumbled on Cal's fourth play from scrimmage to set the tone for the game, but the Bears survived that miscue thanks to an odd play call by USC coach Lane Kiffin

On fourth-and-goal from the 8, the Trojans lined up in an off formation and snapped the ball diagonally to Rhett Ellison, who dropped it for a fumble that was recovered by Cal's Trevor Guyton.

The Trojans capitalized on the next turnover as Nick Perry forced a fumble by Maynard that led to Andre Heidari's first field goal.

USC then broke the game open with 17 points in the second quarter, getting a 39-yard TD catch from Lee over fellow freshman Stefan McClure, a field goal after Chris Galippo intercepted Maynard's pass deep in Cal territory and a 7-yard TD pass from Barkley to Brandon Carswell after punter Bryan Anger was stopped on a fake that made it 20-0.

Barkley completed 19 of 35 passes for a season-low 195 yards. Robert Woods, the nation's top receiver, was held to five catches for 36 yards.

Cal's only sustained drive of the first half ended in the final minute when Maynard threw into triple coverage and was intercepted in the end zone by Dion Bailey.

Bryan Anger booted a season-high 61-yard punt. His previous season best was a 59-yarder the previous week at Oregon.

NOTES

- Tonight's game was the fifth weeknight game in the Jeff Tedford era at Cal, the previous four have all been on the road. The Bears are now 1-4 in weeknight night games after tonight's 30-9 USC victory. The rest of the weeknight results were at Oregon 43, Cal 15 (Oct. 6, 2011), at Utah 31, Cal 24 (Sept. 11, 2003), Cal 41, at New Mexico State 13 (Sept. 23, 2005), at Nevada 52, Cal 31 (Sept. 17, 2010). The Bears play at Arizona State in the regular season finale on Friday, Nov. 25.
- Despite the final score, Cal outgained USC in yards, 329-313.
- Keenan Allen finished the night with a personal-best 13 catches for 160 yards.
 It was his fifth 100-yard performance of the season, sixth of his career and the fourth in a row.
- This is the first time in the Jeff Tedford era that Cal has gone 0-3 to open conference play.
- The five turnovers (four in the first half) by Cal were a season-high. The Bears began the night with a total of four turnovers on the season. The last time Cal surrendered five turnovers was against Oregon on Nov. 1, 2008.
- The first-half shutout was the first time Cal didn't score in the first half since last year's Big Game against Stanford.
- Bryan Anger booted a season-high 61-yard punt. His previous season best was a 59-yarder last week at Oregon. He has now kicked eight punts 50 or more yards on the year.
- Marvin Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (129), receiving yards (1,954) and receiving touchdowns (13). The receptions are seven shy of the top 10 at Cal and the receiving yards 93 away from the record book. He also extended his run of 31 consecutive games (every Cal contest the last three years) with at least one reception, while Keenan Allen's streak covers each of the 17 games he has played in over the past two seasons.
- Zach Maynard completed 25-of-43 passes for 294 yards, three interceptions and his first career rushing touchdown. Maynard has thrown for at least 200 yards, completed 15 passes and tallied a touchdown either passing or rushing in each of his six starts. All five of his completions (seven attempts) in the first quarter went to Keenan Allen (43 yards).
- D.J. Campbell collected a career-high eight tackles, one for a loss (-1). Mychal Kendricks led all players with 10 tackles, one for a loss (-1). Sean Cattouse also chipped in eight tackles. Steve Williams tied his career high in pass breakups with three.

SAN FRANCISCO – Zach Maynard threw for one touchdown and ran for another and California's defense completely shut down Utah's offense to help the Golden Bears get their first Pac-12 win of the season, 34-10, over the Utes. Isi Sofele ran for 84 yards and a score, Keenan Allen caught a TD pass and

Isi Sofele ran for 84 yards and a score, Keenan Allen caught a TD pass and Josh Hill returned an interception 32 yards for a score as the Bears controlled the entire game.

Jon Hays threw three interceptions and lost a fumble, and Utah had just 58 yards of offense in the first three quarters.

The Utes offense generated nothing against Cal's defense.

Hays was 11 for 22 for 148 yards with the four turnovers, running back John White was held to 39 yards on 15 carries a week after gaining 171 yards at Pittsburgh and the Utah managed a paltry 178 yards for the entire game.

Maynard completed 19 of 29 for 255 yards. Allen had eight catches for 78 yards. Allen secured his 100th career reception with his second catch of the day. Earlier this season, Allen equaled DeSean Jackson as the fastest Golden Bear to reach 1,000 career receiving yards when he accomplished the feat in his 16th career game at Cal, which Jackson also did in 2006.

Cal scored 20 points in the second quarter to seize control of the game and proceeded to put it away quickly in the second half. After the defense came up with another three-and-out to start the third quarter, Maynard capped an 87-yard drive with a 4-yard keeper that made it 27-0.

Hays was drilled by David Wilkerson and threw his second interception in Cal territory later in the quarter. After being briefly replaced by Griff Robles, Hays was intercepted again on the opening play of the fourth quarter with Hill returning it for the score to make it 34-0.

Cal held Utah to two first downs, 3 total yards and negative 6 yards rushing on the way to taking a 20-0 halftime lead. Sofele's 5-yard run early in the second quarter got the Bears on the scoreboard. Aaron Tipoti then forced a fumble with a hard hit on Hays on the next play from scrimmage, setting up the first of Giorgio Tavecchio's two first-half field goals.

Utah finally got into Cal territory for the first time late in the second quarter, with help from two personal fouls against the Bears. But on first down from the 30, Mychal Kendricks intercepted Hays and returned the ball 32 yards to the Utah 42. Maynard threw a 30-yard pass to Marvin Jones and then Allen took a short pass and ran in for a 12-yard touchdown with 27 seconds left in the half.

NOTES

- The win was Cal's first meeting against Utah since the Utes defeated the Golden Bears, 37-27, in the 2009 Poinsettia Bowl. This was also the first-ever Pac-12 conference meeting between Cal and Utah. With Cal's victory today, the Bears now lead the series, 5-3.
- Keenan Allen finished the night with eight catches for 78 yards and one touchdown.
 Allen, who entered the game leading the nation in receiving yards per game (138 ypg), has now scored in five of the last six games. Allen made Cal's single-season top-10 lists in two categories receptions (60, 7th) and yards (906, 8th).
- Allen secured his 100th career reception with his second catch of the day.
 Earlier this season, Allen equaled DeSean Jackson as the fastest Golden Bear to reach 1,000 career receiving yards when he accomplished the feat in his 16th career game at Cal, which Jackson also did in 2006.
- Anthony Miller's 44-yard reception in the third quarter was the longest of the season for him and the second longest of his career (45 yards).
- Marvin Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (134), receiving yards (2,023) and receiving touchdowns (13). The 134 receptions are two shy of the top 10 at Cal and the 2,023 receiving yards are just 24 yards short of the top 10. He also extended his run of 32 consecutive games (every Cal contest the last three years) with at least one reception, while Keenan Allen's streak covers each of the 18 games he has played in over the past two seasons.
- Zach Maynard completed 19-of-29 passes for 255 yards and one passing touchdown. In each of his seven starts, Maynard has thrown for at least 200 yards, completed 15 passes and tallied a touchdown either passing or rushing. Maynard also scored his second career rushing touchdown in as many games on Saturday.
- Giorgio Tavecchio has made 11 of 13 field goals this season. Against Utah, Tavecchio was 2-for-3 (35, 37). He made Cal's all-time top-10 list in scoring with 214 points, ranking him ninth.
- Bryan Anger booted a season-high 62-yard punt. His previous season best was a 61-yarder last week against USC. He has now kicked nine punts 50 or more vards this year.
- Late in the first half, Mychal Kendricks intercepted his first pass of the season, third of his career, and returned it 32 yards, the longest interception return of the season for Cal. At the outset of the fourth quarter, Josh Hill returned an interception 32 yards for his first-career touchdown. They were the longest interceptions returned for a touchdown since Mike Mohamed returned a pick 41 yards for a score against Colorado on Sept. 11, 2010.

PASADENA - Freshman safety Tevin McDonald made the first three interceptions of his college career, Derrick Coleman scored three touchdowns, and UCLA beat Cal, 31-14. McDonald's interceptions set up two touchdowns and a field goal.

The Bruins scored 24 of their 31 points after turnovers in handing Cal its fourth loss in five games. The Bears committed five turnovers, four on interceptions thrown by Zach Maynard, who was 14 of 30 for 199 yards.

The Golden Bears held the lead 7-0 midway through the second quarter, after Isi Sofele scored on a 1-yard run in the first quarter. But the Bruins rattled off 17-straight points to hold a 17-7 lead at half.

C.J. Anderson punched in a 1-yard touchdown for Cal less than two minutes into the third quarter to bring the Bears within three, but they could get no closer.

Coleman scored on runs of 2, 20 and 24 yards while rushing for 80 yards on 16 carries. Kevin Prince gained a career-high 163 yards on 19 carries and completed 9 of 18 passes for 92 yards.

D.J. Campbell paced Cal on defense with a career-high 11 tackles and his second fumble recovery in as many games. Campbell picked up the fumble when UCLA muffed a punt at the outset of the second half. The fumble recovery preceded Anderson's touchdown to pull the Bears within three.

While the Bruins held standout receiver Marvin Jones to just one catch for 11 yards, extending his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 33, Anthony Miller stepped up big for the Bears, producing a career-high-tying five catches for a season-high 67 yards.

Cal's All-American candidate Keenan Allen once again led the Bears in receiving with seven receptions for 83 yards. He also had one rush for 12 yards. Allen entered the game leading the nation in receiving yards per game (129.4 ypg). Allen moved up on Cal's single-season top-10 lists in two categories - receptions (67, 5th) and yards (989, 6th).

Bryan Anger booted a season-high punt for the third consecutive game with 64-yarder in the first quarter, the first of his five punts on the day. He also had three punts of 50 or more yards and has 12 on the year. Anger also placed three punts inside the 20.

NOTES

- The loss marked the first time Cal lost to UCLA since 2007. UCLA holds a 50-31-1 in the all-time series that began in 1933.
- Keenan Allen finished the night with seven catches for 83 yards. Allen entered the game leading the nation in receiving yards per game (129.4 ypg). Allen moved up on Cal's single-season top-10 lists in two categories - receptions (67, 5th) and yards (989, 6th). He also extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 19, all his games at Cal.
- Marvin Jones extended his streak of games with at least one catch to 33 consecutive contests as his only catch came on the first play of the second half. Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (135), receiving yards (2,034) and receiving touchdowns (13). The 135 receptions ranks just outside the top-10 all-time at Cal, while the 2,034 receiving yards are also just outside the top 10.
- Zach Maynard completed 14-of-29 passes for 199 yards and four interceptions. It was the first time this season that Maynard did not throw for at least 200 yards, complete at least 15 passes or score a touchdown either passing or rushing. UCLA's Tevin McDonald was on the receiving end of three of those four interceptions. The last time an opponent had two or more interceptions in a game against Cal was on Oct. 13 against USC when Dion Bailey picked off Maynard twice. The last time Cal surrendered four interceptions was on Dec. 27, 2008, in the Emerald Bowl against Miami. Fla. Combined with Maynard's fumble, it was the second time this season that the Bears have allowed five turnovers in a game (USC). Maynard boasted a 39-yard run that was the second longest of his career (43 vs. Fresno State).
- Anthony Miller tied his career high with five receptions for a season-high 67 yards.
- With his two extra points, Giorgio Tavecchio has 216 career points that ranks ninth all time at Cal. He is eight points away from Chuck Muncie (224). He has made 11 of 14 field goals this season after his lone try at UCLA was no good.
- Bryan Anger booted a season-high punt for the third consecutive game with 64-yarder in the first quarter, the first of his five punts on the day. His previous season bests in order were a 62-yarder vs. Utah on Oct. 22 and a 61-yarder against USC on Oct. 13. He also had three punts of 50 or more yards and has 12 on the year. - Robert Mullins made his second career start and tied his career-high with four tackles, while Josh Hill also tied a career high with three pass breakups.
- Dan Camporeale garnered his first career fumble recovery.
- Chris McCain secured his first career sack.
- The Bears had 14 points off of turnovers (both touchdowns).

SAN FRANCISCO – California quarterback Zach Maynard threw for 118 yards and a touchdown, Isi Sofele ran for 138 yards and a touchdown, and California routed Washington State, 30-7, to move within one victory of becoming bowl eligible. Maynard hit Anthony Miller for a 19-yard touchdown pass on the first series of

the game by the Golden Bears.

Quarterback Marshall Lobbestael and the Cougars faced constant pressure from the smothering Cal defense and managed only a five-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter by Rickey Galvin.

Will Kapp, the son of former Cal coach and Bears 1959 Rose Bowl quarterback Joe Kapp, ran 43 yards for his first career touchdown on fourth-and-1 early in the third quarter for the Bears' lone points of the second half.

Sofele carried 23 times on the way to his third 100-yard game of the season, and C.J. Anderson added a five-yard touchdown run as Cal outgained the Cougars, 411-224. Washington State managed only 22 yards in the first quarter, including four yards passing.

Maynard made solid decisions and completed 10 of 17 passes. He was sacked once, but didn't throw an interception.

Keenan Allen's 29-yard catch set up Sofele's touchdown late in the first quarter and put Allen over 1,000 yards receiving, the sixth player in Cal history to do so in a season. He finished with eight receptions for 85 yards.

Giorgio Tavecchio kicked a 43-yard field goal, but had an extra-point try blocked. It marked his fifth failed PAT this season compared to three missed field goals in 15 attempts

Cal's attacking defense made things difficult all day for a Washington State passing game that came in ranked second in the conference, averaging 316.1 yards per game.

NOTES

- Saturday's win marked Cal's seventh straight victory over Washington State.
 The Golden Bears are 7-1 against the Cougars in the Jeff Tedford era. Cal now holds a 43-25-5 lead in the all-time series that began in 1919.
- Entering the game, the Washington State passing game was ranked second in the Pac-12, while the Cal pass defense was ranked first in the conference and 32nd in the nation. The Cal defense held the Cougar passing attack to 155 yards.
- For the third time this season, Cal held an opposing offense to 55 yards, or fewer, in the first half (Utah, Presbyterian) and for the second time this season, the Bears held an opponent scoreless in the first half (Utah). The 23-point Cal lead in the first half was the second largest point differential for the Bears in a first half this season (30 points vs. Presbyterian).
- Keenan Allen finished the night with eight catches for 85 yards. Allen moved up on Cal's single-season top-10 lists in two categories receptions (75, T-3rd) and yards (1,074, 4th). The 75 receptions are the most since Geoff McArthur caught 85 in 2003. He also extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 20, all his games at Cal. Allen also became the sixth receiver in school history to register 1,000 yards receiving in a single season. The nine games it took Allen to reach 1,000 yards in a season are the quickest in school history. The 1,074 receiving yards are the fourth most in a single season in school history.
- Isi Sofele rushed 23 times for a career-high 138 yards with a touchdown. It was Sofele's seventh touchdown of the season. He also topped 100 yards for the third time, this season. On the season, he has rushed for 839 yards.
- Marvin Jones extended his streak of games with at least one catch to 34 consecutive contests. Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (137), receiving yards (2,053) and receiving touchdowns (13). The 137 receptions 2,053 receiving yards both rank 10th all-time at Cal.
- Will Kapp boasted a career-high 43-yard touchdown run in the third quarter. It
 was his first-career touchdown run and the 43-yard run tied for a team high for
 longest rush of the season (Zach Maynard). Kapp entered Saturday's game
 with 19 career rushing yards.
- Zach Maynard completed 10 of 17 passes for 118 yards with a touchdown pass to Anthony Miller.
- C.J. Anderson registered his fifth touchdown of the season; the second time
 this season that Anderson has scored in back-to-back weeks. The first time he
 scored in back-to-back games, he tallied a touchdown in three straight games.
 Late in the fourth quarter, Anderson broke loose for a career-long 34-yard run.
- Anthony Miller scored his third touchdown of the season on an 18-yard touchdown pass on Cal's opening drive of the game. Miller scored his other two touchdowns at Colorado on Sept. 10.
- With his three extra points and one field goal tonight, Giorgio Tavecchio has 222 career points and ranks ninth all time at Cal. He is two points away from Chuck Muncie (224) for eighth. Tavecchio has been good on 12 of his 15 field goal attempts this season after making a 43-yarder just before halftime on Saturday.
- For the fourth consecutive game, Bryan Anger booted a 60-yard punt (60 yards).
 He also added a 59-yarder to give him 14 punts of 50 or more yards on the year.

SAN FRANCISCO – Isi Sofele rushed for a career-high 190 yards and one touchdown, quarterback Zach Maynard threw for one score and ran for another, and California beat Oregon State, 23-6.

The win, the Golden Bears' third in four games, makes them bowl eligible after sitting out the postseason last year. It also snapped Cal's four-game losing streak to the Beavers.

Backup running back C.J. Anderson ran for 96 yards and wide receiver Michael Calvin, a fifth-year senior, caught his first career touchdown for the Bears.

Sofele, whose previous high of 138 yards was set in last week's win over Washington State, easily eclipsed that mark while anchoring a ground game that dominated the Beavers.

Cal outgained Oregon State, 296-27, on the ground and held the ball for more than 36 minutes while beating the Beavers for the first time since Sept. 30, 2006. Sofele had a 29-yard touchdown run negated by a holding penalty, and Anderson had scoring runs of 44 and 19 yards wiped out by yellow flags.

Safety D.J. Campbell intercepted a deflected pass thrown by Sean Mannion at the Bears 4-yard line to stop one drive, safety Sean Cattouse recovered a fumble at the 3 and linebacker Mychal Kendricks picked off a Mannion pass with 45 seconds left to end the Beavers' night.

Maynard got off to a shaky start before he got the Bears rolling with a pair of long scoring drives.

After Oregon State punted and pinned the Bears at their own 9-yard line, Sofele got them out of the hole quickly with a 56-yard burst up the middle on a trap play. Sofele ran twice more for 14 yards and Maynard completed one pass and took a sack before finding Calvin for a 19-yard touchdown.

Maynard later directed a 16-play, 96-yard scoring march that just over nine minutes off the clock.

Cal overcame three penalties on the drive, including back-to-back false start calls inside the Beavers 10-yard line, but got a big break when Oregon State line-backer Rusty Fernando hit Keenan Allen in the back of the head with his forearm after Allen had been stopped well short of the end zone on a third-and-goal play.

That gave the Bears an automatic first down, and Maynard made it pay off when he scampered into the end zone on a keeper around the left side to make it 14-3.

NOTES

- The win snapped Cal's four-game losing streak against Oregon State. The Golden Bears are 3-7 against the Beavers in the Jeff Tedford era. Cal holds a 34-30 lead in the all-time series that began in 1905. Including the win in the 2008 Emerald Bowl at AT&T Park, Tedford now claims an all-time record of 5-1 at AT&T Park.
- Cal had two 90-plus-yard scoring drives in the game, including Cal's longest drive of the season (16-96-9:05). They were Cal's fourth and fifth 90-plus-yard drives in 2011
- Isi Sofele rushed for a career high in rushing yards in the second straight game, this time for 190 yards, including a career-high 56-yard run in the first quarter. He broke 1,000 yards on the season, becoming Cal's ninth 1,000-yard rusher in the past 10 years. He currently has 1,029 yards on the season. That 56yard run was also Cal's longest run of the season. He also notched his eighth touchdown of the season and topped 100 yards for the fourth time in 2011.
- This is the third time Cal has rushed for over 200 yards as a team this season, and for the second consecutive game. Last week, Cal rushed for 292 yards against Washington State along with tonight's 296. The last time the Bears ran for 200 yards in back-to-back games was in 2009 at UCLA (289) and vs. Washington State (309).
- C.J. Anderson posted his career-best rushing total of 96 yards. He also notched his third career catch for a career-high 22 yards.
- · The six points allowed were the fewest allowed by Cal all season.
- Keenan Allen finished the night with three catches for 29 yards. Allen moved up on Cal's single-season top-10 lists in two categories - receptions (78, 3rd) and yards (1,103, 3rd). He also extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 21, all his games at Cal.
- Marvin Jones extended his streak of games with at least one catch to 35 consecutive contests. Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (140), receiving yards (2,076) and receiving touchdowns (13). The 140 receptions rank eighth all-time in school history and the 2,076 receiving yards rank 10th all-time at Cal.
- Michael Calvin's 19-yard touchdown reception from Zach Maynard was the first touchdown of his career.
- D.J. Campbell garnered his second career interception on a deflected pass in the third quarter. His first INT came at Oregon.
- Sean Cattouse picked up his second career fumble recovery in the fourth quarter. His other fumble recovery came at Washington.
- With his field goal and two extra points, Giorgio Tavecchio has 227 career points that ranks eighth all time at Cal, surpassing Chuck Muncie (224). Tavecchio has been good on 13 of his 16 field goal attempts this season after going onefor-one on Saturday.

AT STANFORD 31, CAL 28

STANFORD – Zach Maynard finished with 280 yards passing and two touchdown throws for the Golden Bears, but Cal fell short to Stanford, 31-28, in a rain-soaked Big Game.

The Golden Bears faced the Cardinal for the 114th edition of the Bay Area rivalry. Cal scored 15 points in the fourth quarter, including a C.J. Anderson 1-yard touchdown with 14 seconds left. But Stanford recovered the onside kick to clinch the contest.

Andrew Luck threw for 257 yards and two touchdowns, and No. 8 Stanford survived a shaky start, overcoming an early interception by Cal cornerback Steve Williams. Luck tossed scores to Levine Toilolo and Ryan Hewitt.

With a steady stream of rain falling, Luck connected with Toilolo for a 4-yard touchdown on the opening drive of the third quarter to extend the Cardinal's lead to 21-13. Stanford quickly got the ball back.

Luck found Toilolo for a 41-yard gain and finished off the drive with a 10-yard touchdown pass to fullback Hewitt to put Stanford in front 28-13.

In the fourth quarter, Maynard led a 68-yard drive ending with a three-yard TD pass to Spencer Hagan on third down. After a 2-point conversion on a pass to Marvin Jones, Cal cut Stanford's lead to 28-21 with 10:53 left.

Stanford grinded out 7:40 with a 14-play, 57-yard drive with a series of short runs and passes.

Jordan Williamson, who missed a 33-yard field goal wide left in the first half, kicked a 35-yard field to give the Cardinal a two-score cushion.

That proved pivotal when Anderson's TD run for the Bears with 14 seconds left pulled Cal within 31-28. But Stanford tight end Coby Fleener recoved the onside kick. Stanford recovered Maynard's wayward pitch back on the game's opening drive and took over at its own 37. Three plays later, freshman Ty Montgomery took a reverse and sprinted 34 yards down the sideline to put the Cardinal ahead 7-0.

Williams stepped in front of a falling Montgomery to intercept Luck's pass midway through the first quarter and return it 49 yards for a score that was called back because of an illegal block in the back.

But three plays later, Maynard found Keenan Allen for a 17-yard TD pass and a 10-7 Bear advantage. Giogio Tavecchio kicked his second field goal of the game from 19 yards to give Cal a 13-7 lead in the second quarter.

Isi Sofele rushed for 96 yards on 21 attempts for the Bears, while Sean Cattouse and Mychal Kendricks each tallied a game-high-tying 13 tackles. Kendricks added 2.5 tackles for loss for -18 yards and a sack for -14. Cattouse had a tackle for loss (-2 yards) and a pass breakup.

NOTES

- With tonight's Stanford victory, the Cardinal improved their lead in The Big Game all-time series to 57-46-11. Jeff Tedford is now 7-3 all time in The Big Game.
- Isi Sofele rushed 21 times for 96 yards. The Bears are 6-1 when Sofele carries
 the ball at least 18 times. In addition, Sofele has posted at least 74 yards on
 the ground in 10 of the 11 games this season.
- With his six receptions for 97 yards, Keenan Allen moved up to second on Cal's single-season list in receiving yards with an even 1,200 yards, surpassing Dameane Douglas (1,150 1998) for second. Geoff McArthur (1,504 2003) is the leader. Allen remained in third on Cal's single-season receptions list, now with 84, and is just one shy of tying McArthur for second. Allen also posted his sixth touchdown of the season (11th of his career), and extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 22, all his games at Cal.
- Marvin Jones extended his streak of games with at least one catch to 36 consecutive contests. Jones is Cal's active career leader in receptions (143), receiving yards (2,128) and receiving touchdowns (13). The 143 receptions and the 2,128 receiving yards both rank eighth all-time at Cal.
- C.J. Anderson punched in a one-yard touchdown, good for his sixth score of the season. He also garnered a career-high 73 receiving yards, including a career-high 39-yarder.
- Zach Maynard completed 20 of his 30 passes for 280 yards and two touchdown passes
- Spencer Hagan boasted his second career touchdown in the fourth quarter.
 His first touchdown came against Presbyterian.
- Steve Williams garnered his third career interception, second of this season, in the first quarter that led to Cal's first touchdown of the game. Williams' other INT came against Fresno State.
- Mychal Kendricks notched his second sack of the season, part of his season-high-tying 2.5 tackles for loss. Kendricks had 13 tackles in all, same as Sean Cattouse and that was a season-high in tackles for him. Cattouse notched his career-high mark in tackles with 15 in the 2010 Big Game. D.J. Holt also chipped in nine tackles.
- Giorgio Tavecchio has been good on 15 of his 18 field goal attempts this season
 after going two-for-two on Saturday. He is the first Cal kicker to make 15 field
 goals since Tom Schneider in 2006. Tyler Fredrickson also had 15 in 2003.
 The last kicker with more was Mark Jensen with 19 in 2002. Tavecchio has
 235 career points that ranks eighth all time at Cal.

TEMPE – California closed out the regular season with a 47-38 win over Arizona State, ensuring its ninth winning season in 10 years.

Cal rolled over Arizona State's defense from the start, racking up 484 total yards and scoring on nine of 12 drives.

C.J. Anderson had touchdown runs of 1 and 3 yards, and scored on a 74-yard pass. Isi Sofele ran for 145 yards and another score, and Giorgio Tavecchio hit four field goals.

Zach Maynard threw for 241 yards and a touchdown and ran for another score. The Cal defense forced four turnovers.

Cal scored on its first three possessions: a 48-yard field goal by Tavecchio, an 18-yard run by Sofele and a 16-yard run by Maynard that put the Bears up 17-7 in the first guarter.

The Bears went up 27-14 late in the second quarter on a 1-yard run by Anderson and a 27-yard field goal by Tavecchio.

Arizona State rallied quickly, though, scoring twice in 29 seconds to end the half. The Sun Devils extended their lead to 31-27 on Alex Garoutte's 47-yard field goal early in the third quarter but Cal took the lead for good on a three-yard run by Anderson, then extended its lead to 41-31 on Anderson's 74-yard catch-and-run. Maynard set up the long play by scrambling left to draw the defense in, then flipped over the top to Anderson, who took care of the last 60-or-so yards on his own.

Following an ASU touchdown, on their next drive, Marshall fumbled the ball back to Cal. Tavecchio followed with a 30-yard field goal to give the Bears a nine-point lead with just over three and half minutes left. Josh Hill sealed it by intercepting Osweiler at Cal's 12 with just over 2 minutes left, giving Cal its third win in four games to close out the season.

Sofele passed Shane Vereen (1,167, 2010), Russell White (1,177, 1991), Adimchinobe Echemandu (1,195, 2003) and Marshawn Lynch (1,246, 2005). Next up on the Cal chart is Lynch with 1,356 yards in 2006.

With his 5 receptions for 61 yards, Keenan Allen currently stands second on Cal's single-season list in receiving yards with 1,261 yards. Geoff McArthur (1,504, 2003) is Cal's all-time leader. Allen passed McArthur on Cal's single-season receptions list, now with 90.

- Marc Anthony picked off his first pass in 2011 (third of his career) and returned it 14 yards. Anthony's last INT came against Washington last season.
- Giorgio Tavecchio has been good on 19 of his 22 field goal attempts this season after going 4-for-4 on Friday. The last kicker with more field goals in a season was Mark Jensen with 19 in 2002.
- The 28 points scored by ASU in the first half were the most Cal has allowed in any first half this season. With the Bear's 27 points, the teams combined for 55 first-half points. The last time this happened was on Oct. 17, 2009, when Cal led UCLA, 35-20 at the half.
- The 85 combined points were the most in a Cal game in 2011, the most since 83 combined points were scored on Sept. 17, 2010, at Nevada (Nevada 52-31).

CAL-TEXAS SERIES HISTORY

AT TEXAS 33, CAL 0 OCTOBER 3, 1959

In the first-ever meeting between Cal and Texas, the Longhorns shut out the Golden Bears at Memorial Stadium in Austin, Texas.

The Longhorns jumped out to an early 13-0 lead in the first quarter, and never looked back.

The most dominating stat in the game was the team rushing total. Texas outrushed Cal, 395-111. The Longhorns had three running backs gain at least 50 yards, while no Bear hit the 50-yard mark. Three of the Texas touchdowns came on rushing plays of 40 yards or more - 42, 44, 40.

TEXAS 28, AT CAL 3 SEPTEMBER 23, 1961

Two years after their first meeting was a lop-sided affair in Austin, Texas, Cal did not produce any better results in the second meeting, and first at Memorial Stadium in Berkeley.

Texas got on the board first with a one-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Unlike the first meeting, the Bears avoided a shutout with a 23-yard field goal in the second quarter. The field goal cut the deficit to four, which it remained at the half.

The Longhorns increased their lead with a 29-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, and later iced the game with back-to-back touchdown passes.

The story of the game was similar to the first meeting, Texas pounded Cal running the ball, outgaining them on the rush, 304-55. Texas' leading rusher, Jerry Cook, carried the ball 13 times for 110 yards.

TEXAS 17, AT CAL 0 SEPTEMBER 20, 1969

Eight years after the previous meeting, Texas returned to Berkeley and swept the Bears for the second time in the series.

The continuing trend in this series, Texas beat Cal with the ground attack. The Longhorns scored both of their touchdowns on running plays in the first half, and later added a field goal in the third quarter.

Four Texas rushers registered at least 50 yards on the ground. In this contest, Cal was able to get the running game working for itself, as well, with two rushers (Gary Fowler and Robert Darby) garnering 83 and 62 yards, respectively, on the ground.

Texas would go on to win the national championship that season.

AT TEXAS 56, CAL 15SEPTEMBER 19, 1970

The most-recent contest in this series also had the most scoring. Cal boasted its highest scoring total against Texas with 15 points, all coming in the fourth quarter.

The Bears stopped a streak of seven unmatched Longhorn scoring drives with a 33-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter that was later followed by a two-yard run to give Cal its first two touchdowns in the series

Still, the Bears were no match for the defending national champion Longhorns who boasted eight rushing touchdowns in the game.

Texas finished with 443 net rushing yards to Cal's 116. The Bears did top the Longhorns through the air with 240 passing yards to 113 for Texas.

Steve Sweeney hauled in seven receptions for 94 yards for Cal, while the Bears' quarterback, Isaac Curtis, completed 11 of 15 passes for 174 yards and a touchdown.

HEAD COACH JEFF TEDFORD



JEFF TEDFORD

Head Coach • 10th Season at Cal

Jeff Tedford is the winningest coach in Cal football history, has established Cal as one of the elite football programs in the Pac-

12 and lifted the Golden Bears into the national discussion on a consistent basis during his tenure as the school's head coach. The Bears have won the fourth-most games of any conference school during his tenure, and prior to the current 2011 season have finished ranked among the nation's top 25 in four of the last seven seasons and been in the top 10 at some point in five of the last seven.

Cal posted a school-record run of seven straight bowl appearances from 2003-09 and after not making a bowl in 2010 is bowl eligible again in 2011 for the ninth time in the last 10 seasons, and playing in a bowl for the eighth time in the last nine. The Bears are 5-2 in the postseason under Tedford, making him the only Cal mentor with more than two bowl victories, including a school-record string of four consecutive postseason wins from 2005-08. Cal also put together a school-

record-tying eight consecutive winning campaigns from 2002-09 and has secured another winning season in 2011 to begin another streak. Cal has twice posted a school-record-tying 10 wins under Tedford, the sixth and seventh times in school history, in 2004 and 2006.

Tedford has posted a career record of 79-47 (.627) in a school-record 126 games at Cal, having set the school's win record with his 75th victory vs. Presbyterian at AT&T Park on Sept. 17, 2011. He is also the school's all-time leader for road wins (28) and conference victories (48). To top it off, he is 7-3 in the Big Game, equaling Pappy Waldorf's school record of seven wins against Stanford.

The Bears have had 36 players selected in the NFL Draft during nine drafts since Tedford has been the head coach at Cal, including eight first-round picks. As of Dec. 14, 2011, Cal's 33 active NFL players according to ESPN.com rank second among Pac-12 schools.

He has also earned a reputation as a strong recruiter, with his last two classes in 2010 and 2011 being ranked as high as No. 11 and No. 13



"This is a dream come true ... nationally. Prior to the 2011 campaign, Sporting News bestowed the honor of the Pac-12's best recruiter on Tedford.

But Tedford's teams have not only got it done on the field, they've also got it done in the classroom. His players have been recognized as conference All-Academic honorees 103 times in 10 seasons. Of the 182 seniors who played for Tedford in his first nine campaigns, 160 (88%) have earned their college degrees and/or gone on to NFL careers.

Tedford's success with the Cal program has resulted in local devotion and national attention. Cal averaged more than 57,000 fans per contest for seven consecutive seasons from 2004-10 before moving to the 45,000-seat AT&T Park in 2011 while Memorial Stadium undergoes an extensive renovation and retrofit prior to reopening for the team's 2012 home contests. The seven-year stretch included a string of 43 consecutive games in front of at least 50,000 fans at Memorial Stadium (Sept. 11, 2004 - Nov. 20, 2010). In 2006, the Bears set school records for average fans per home game (64,318) and overall spectators (450,223). The following year in 2007 Cal established a school record with 41,366 season-ticket holders.

Nationally, Cal has had multiple Heisman Trophy candidates under Tedford's tutelage, with J.J. Arrington (2004), Marshawn Lynch (2006), DeSean Jackson (2007) and Jahvid Best (2009) among top candidates at some point in the season, and Arrington finishing eighth in the final voting.

Other national recognition has come the Bears way in recent years. Alex Mack was the winner of the 2008 Draddy Award (often referred to as

the "Academic Heisman"), while Mike Mohamed was one of 16 players across the country in the National Football Foundation's Scholar-Athlete Class of 2010 and a finalist for the prestigious honor won by Mack now known as the William V. Campbell Trophy. Giorgio Tavecchio was a semifinalist for the same honor in 2011. In 2006, the Bears had a pair of players collect national awards. Jackson was the recipient of the inaugural Randy Moss Award as the top returner in the country, while Daymeion Hughes earned The Lott IMPACT Trophy, given to a defensive player to equally recognize his athletic performance and personal character.

Despite his success and notoriety, Tedford remains devoted to being a mentor.

"Football is more than a game," he said. "I think it teaches so many values for young people as they move on into life – teamwork, sacrifice, dedication, hard work – all those things are very valuable to their futures. I'm going to be a person that they can trust and talk to while they're here. But I really hope that when they leave, they understand that they can come back to Cal and ask for anything and count on me and our entire staff in any situation."

His legendary work ethic, exemplified by the well-used air mattress in his office, shows the coach's drive, which is not geared towards individual success. His true goals are success as a team and success for his student-athletes.

"Jeff is the hardest worker I have ever encountered in this business," said Cal Director of Athletics Sandy Barbour. "He is not going to be outworked, because he believes he owes that to his student-athletes."

That relentless drive developed in Tedford as a

young football player at Warren High School. After a solid prep career, the undersized quarterback went on to a standout two-year stint at Cerritos College (1979-80) before a record-setting two-year stay at Fresno State (1981-82). During his days as a Bulldog, he established several school passing records, including career marks for passing yardage (4,872) and touchdown passes (35), while earning honorable mention All-America notice in 1982 when he set single-season Fresno State standards for passing yardage (2,993) and TD passes (24).

After receiving a bachelor's degree in Physical Education from Fresno State in 1983, Tedford played professionally in the Canadian Football League for six seasons with Hamilton, Calgary, Saskatchewan and Winnipeg. He appeared in the league's championship game (Grey Cup) with Hamilton in 1984.

Tedford has used his own signal-calling experience to build a reputation as a quarterback guru. During his 19-year coaching career at California (2002-present), Oregon (1998-2001) and Fresno State (1992-97), Tedford has been integral in the development of six quarterbacks that became first-round picks in the NFL Draft – Kyle Boller, David Carr, Trent Dilfer, Joey Harrington, Aaron Rodgers and Akili Smith.

Rodgers, an under-the-radar junior college transfer like Tedford, ranked No. 8 nationally in pass efficiency in 2004 when he completed 66.1 percent of his passes for 2,566 yards and 24 touchdowns with only eight interceptions for the Bears. He put up similar numbers the previous season when he completed 61.6 percent of his passes for 2,903 yards and 19 touchdowns with only five interceptions. After being drafted by the

- Set single-season school marks for total offense (6,061) and first downs (321), as well as a modern-era record for scoring (457).
- Led the Pac-10 in rushing for the first time in 45 seasons with 2,356 yards and a 168.3 yard per game average.
- Posted first bowl win at Cal in 10 years, defeating Virginia Tech by a score of 52-49 in the Insight Bowl.
- Set single-game school bowl records for most points (52), total yards (530), passing yards (394), completion percentage (77.1, later broken), TDs (7) and rushing TDs (5, later tied).
- Beat a team ranked as high as No. 3 nationally for the first time in 52 years with a 34-31 victory in three overtimes over No. 3 USC at Memorial Stadium.
- Defeated Washington in Berkeley for the first time in 28 years, with the 54-7 win the widest margin of victory by a Cal team in a conference game in 81 years, setting Cal's single-game record for total offense with 729 yards in the contest.

2004

- Named Pac-10 Coach of the Year for the second time, something no other Cal football head coach has ever done.
- Reached Cal's highest national ranking (No. 4) in 52 years.
- Posted school's best regular-season record (10-1) since 1950 club was 9-0-1 in the regular season.
- First perfect home record (5-0) in 55 years since the 1949 team was 6-0 at Memorial Stadium
- Most road wins (5) in school history.

- Earned first back-to-back bowl trips since 1990 and '91 seasons.
- Set single-season school record for total offense (492.4 ypg), ranking No. 1 in the Pac-10 and No. 5 nationally.
- Broke single-season school mark for yards per play (7.0), almost one yard better than old standard of 6.1 in 2003.
- Led Pac-10 in rushing (256.8 ypg) for second straight year, which were the first two times since 1958, and ranked No. 6 nationally.
- Allowed fewest points per game by a Cal defense since 1968, ranking eighth nationally at 16.0 ppg.
- Recorded first back-to-back defensive shutouts in 36 years (38-0 at Arizona, 27-0 vs. Arizona State).

2005

- Finished No. 25 in the AP and coaches' polls, marking the first time Cal had appeared in final polls in consecutive seasons since doing it five years in a row from 1947-51.
- Finished the season ranked ninth nationally with 235.3 rushing yards per game to mark the Bears' second straight season as one of the nation's top-10 rushing teams.
- Won fourth straight Big Game for the first time since the 1936-39 campaigns and again at Stanford, marking Cal's first two straight road victories in the series since winning six straight on The Farm from 1937-51.

2006

- Recorded a school-record-tying 10 wins, just the seventh time in school history the Bears had posted the total.
- Recorded a fourth straight season with at least eight victories.
- Named a finalist for the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year Award, which honors the coach who best exemplifies responsibility and excellence on and off the field of play.
- Led Cal to its fifth straight Big Game win for the first time since the club won five in a row from 1919-23.
- Led Bears to a perfect home record (7-0) for the second time in three years.
- Beat Washington for the fifth straight time after having previously dropped 19 straight in the series.

2007

- Led Bears to a top-10 in-season ranking for the fourth straight campaign.
- Six players selected in the 2008 NFL Draft a school-record for the seven-round version of the draft.
- Tailback Justin Forsett rushed for 1,546 yards
 the third-most in school history.
- Opened the year with a thrilling 45-31 victory over No. 15 Tennessee on national television.
- Also defeated No. 11 Oregon on the road with the ESPN College GameDay crew in attendance.
- Directed Bears to a No. 2 national ranking their highest since 1951.
- All 13 of Cal's games were televised the first time in program history that every contest was on television.

2008

- Set a record with a fourth consecutive bowl victory while reaching a bowl game for the sixth consecutive year.
- Posted a winning record for the seventh straight campaign.
- Posted a 7-0 home record, the third time in five seasons Cal was unbeaten at home.
- Finished No. 25 in coaches' poll to mark fourth top-25 finish in five years.
- Tailback Jahvid Best rushed for 1,580 yards the second most in school history – to extend the school record of consecutive years with a 1,000-yard rusher to seven.
- Produced Draddy Trophy (now known as the William V. Campbell Trophy) winner Alex Mack.

2009

- Recorded eighth consecutive winning season to equal a school record (1918-25), while also extending school-record string of bowl appearances to seven.
- Equaled Cal's modern-era record for victories (67) and the school's record for Big Game wins (7) with a victory at Stanford on Nov. 21 in his 100th game as head coach.
- Became one of only three Cal football coaches to reach the 100-game mark.
- Led Bears to back-to-back wins in consecutive weeks over nationally-ranked teams for the first time since 1950, beating Arizona at home and winning at Stanford.

2010

- Started the season 2-0 to rank No. 24 in the coaches' poll and make it each of the last seven seasons and eight of the past nine in which the Bears have been ranked in the nation's top 25 at some point in the season.
- Featured a defense that led the Pac-10 and ranked in the top 25 nationally in sacks (2.83 spg, No. 13), total defense (319.08 ypg, No. 18) and pass defense (187.00 ypg, No. 21), recorded five first-half shutouts, held its opponents to 10 or more total points on four occasions and held opponents below 200 yards of offense three times.
- Scored 50 or more points on three occasions (UC Davis, Colorado, Arizona State).
- Led Cal to victories in each of its first four home games at Memorial Stadium and played the final game at the venue until 2012 when the stadium reopens following an extensive renovation and retrofit.

2011

- Posted a 3-1 record in the final month of the regular season.
- Opened the season with three consecutive victories, including a hard-fought 36-33 overtime win at Colorado.
- Featured All-American and Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year Mychal Kendricks, and fellow first-team all-league selections Keenan Allen, Bryan Anger and Mitchell Schwartz.
- Had the top pass defense (209.08) in the Pac-12 and the conference's second-ranked total defense (339.42 ypg).
- Finished the regular season with a 4-1 record in temporary home venue of AT&T Park.





Green Bay Packers in the first round of the 2005 NFL Draft, Rodgers has become one of the top quarterbacks in the NFL and followed his first Pro Bowl selection in 2009 by earning Super Bowl XLV MVP honors after leading the Packers to a victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Dilfer was selected sixth overall by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 1994 NFL Draft and played for five teams over 14 NFL seasons in a career that was highlighted by leading the Baltimore Ravens to a win in Super Bowl XXXV following the 2000 campaign.

In addition to his success with quarterbacks, Tedford's teams have featured balanced attacks and become notorious for their ferocity on the ground. In nine of his first 10 seasons at Cal, Tedford has had at least one running back post a 1,000-yard rushing season, including a string of seven consecutive years with a 1,000-yard rusher from 2002-08 and then again in 2010. In 2004, Arrington broke Chuck Muncie's singleseason school record with 2,018 yards, which led the country (168.2 ypg) as Arrington rushed for at least 100 yards in each of his 12 contests. In 2007, Justin Forsett's 1,546 rushing yards were briefly the second-best in Cal history, but Best's four-game flourish (814 yards) at the end of 2008 gave him 1,580 for the year to move past Forsett. Lynch had back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons in 2005 and 2006, while Adimchinobe Echemandu (1,195 yards in 2003), Isi Sofele (1,270 yards in 2011), Shane Vereen (1,167 yards in 2010), and Joe Igber (1,075 yards in 2002) have also reached the mark under Tedford.

While offense has been Tedford's forte, California's defense has toughened considerably

during his reign as well, allowing an average of just 22.5 points per game during his first 10 seasons, second-best in the conference over that period. His 2004 team ranked eighth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 16.0 points per game. In 2005, the Bears led the Pac-10 in scoring defense, giving up only 21.2 points per contest. In 2008, Cal led the Pac-10 in the two key categories of red zone defense (68.2%) and takeaways (34). The Bears were second in the conference in rush defense (112.0 ypg) in 2009. Cal had a stellar season on defense in 2010. leading the league and ranking among the top 25 nationally in sacks (2.83 spg, No. 13 NCAA), total defense (319.08 ypg, No. 18 NCAA) and pass defense (187.0 ypg, No. 21 NCAA). Through 12 regular-season games in 2011, Cal has the Pac-12's top pass defense (209.08 ypg) and a total defense that is ranked second in the conference and 26th nationally. Cal has continued to make big plays on defense in 2011 as the Pac-12's top team in tackles for loss (7.67 tflpg, No. 5 NCAA) while ranking third in the conference in sacks (2.67 spg, No. 17 NCAA).

Prior to his arrival in Berkeley, Tedford was an offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon, serving in that role for four seasons, including the 2001 campaign when the Ducks finished with a No. 2 national ranking.

During his tenure in Eugene the Ducks posted the Pac-10's best record (38-10) while finishing progressively better each year (8-4 in '98, 9-3 in '99, 10-2 in '00 and 11-1 in '01). In his first season as offensive coordinator in 1998, the Ducks set school records in passing yards, total offense and points scored. Tedford's passing acumen

was clearly evident in the rapid development of Smith, who earned Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Year accolades as he finished second in the nation in pass efficiency and was later chosen third overall in the 1999 NFL Draft by Cincinnati.

Duck quarterbacks A.J. Feeley and Harrington combined to pass for 3,131 yards and 24 TDs on the Sun Bowl champion team that ranked 13th nationally in scoring in 1999, while the 2000 club tied for the Pac-10 crown and defeated Texas in the Holiday Bowl. Tedford's last Oregon squad in 2001 showcased one of the nation's premier quarterbacks in Harrington, who won Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Year honors and finished fourth in the Heisman balloting.

In 1992 as the quarterbacks coach at Fresno State, Tedford began honing the skills of Dilfer. Under Tedford's guidance, the Bulldogs' quarterback earned first-team All-WAC honors for an offense that led the nation in scoring (44.2 ppg), ranked second in total offense (541.9 ypg) and beat USC in the Freedom Bowl. A season later, Tedford became the Bulldogs' offensive coordinator, and Fresno State ranked third nationally in scoring and total offense while earning an Aloha Bowl invitation. Dilfer ranked first nationally in passing efficiency (173.1 rating) and won the WAC Offensive Player of the Year award. He was later chosen by Tampa Bay with the sixth overall selection of the 1994 NFL Draft.

"I believe Jeff's one of the finest minds in all of football," said Dilfer, who currently serves as a football analyst for ESPN after a 14-year NFL playing career from 1994-2007. "He's certainly the finest coach I've ever been around. He's a great leader and great teacher. He has very high expectations for himself and the people around him. And he will work tirelessly to meet those expectations. Jeff taught me more about toughness and the game of football than any coach I've ever played for, and I've had some awfully good coaches."

Tedford's coaching career began with two seasons as volunteer assistant at Fresno State (1987-88) before he joined Calgary of the CFL for three seasons (1989-91), including the 1991 team that advanced to the Grey Cup title game.

Despite his success as a coach and mentor, Tedford still follows a basic philosophy.

"We try to focus on one game at a time and try to reach our full potential," he said emphatically.

And he still values each and every member of his football team.

"Whether it is the guys who are suited up, the guys who are going to play 50-60 plays or the guys who aren't going to play at all, I want them all to understand that they are very important to the success of the program," he said. "Their contributions are invaluable."

Tedford's hard work and dedication not only inspire his players, it has also made him a role model to the young men in the Cal program.

"Coach Tedford wasn't just a coach, I think of him as more like a father figure," said Desmond Bishop, an All-Pac-10 linebacker and key member of the Green Bay Packers' Super Bowl XLV winning squad. "He taught us lessons about life. He taught us to have integrity, to have character. He prepared us to be men."

College football may never again witness the dominance displayed by California's legendary "Wonder Teams" of the 1920s, and the 1920 football team, in particular, will be remembered as one of the all-time great teams in the sport's history. Under coach

Andy Smith, the Golden Bears completely dismantled opponents en route to an 8-0 record and their first Rose Bowl appearance. Despite their record and the fact that they had outscored opponents by a margin of 482-14, the Bears entered the contest as an underdog. Possibly because some Easterners had not yet developed much respect for student-athletes on the West Coast, a respected Ohio State team was predicted to beat California by six points.

The Bears wasted little time in refuting such predictions, as Pesky Sprott scored a touchdown early in the first quarter to give California a 7-0 lead. That only proved to be the beginning of what was to become a rout, as Smith's team was able to score two more touchdowns in the second quarter while a ferocious Bear defense held Ohio State scoreless for a 21-0 halftime lead. One of the scores came on a piece of Wonder Team trickery, as Sprott pitched the ball to end Brick Muller on a reverse who heaved the ball over 50 yards to Brodie Stephens for the touchdown. That play helped California break the game open and is thought of as one of the most famous plays in the history of the Rose Bowl. The Golden Bears subsequently earned the unofficial national title.

California's Wonder Team of 1921 defeated every opponent they faced in the regular season, scoring a total of 167 points against conference opponents while only allowing 10. California took a 9-0 record into its second straight Rose Bowl, and although the Bears

were predicted to record an easy victory, steady rains had reduced the field to a quagmire, and coach Andy Smith predicted a 0-0 tie. The Bears only gained 49 yards in total offense with two first downs while Washington & Jefferson had a 36-yard touchdown run called back on an offside penalty. The Bears original strategy to use a wide-open passing attack was impossible given field conditions, and they instead relied on power. The results were almost disastrous for the Bears, but Archie Nisbet averaged 39.7 yards on 13 punts and deserved much credit for keeping the Presidents from the end zone.

The Washington & Jefferson athletes were older than the average college player, and California originally objected to having to play a team from a school whose scholarship requirements were far below that of California. The relatively unknown school representing the East was able to keep the Bears from scoring in the swamp-like condition of the field and put an end to California's winning streak at 18 games.

GEORGIA TECH 8 CALIFORNIA 7

The Rose Bowl of 1929 will be remembered forever as one of the most amazing and most talked about games played in the history of collegiate football. California faced an undefeated Georgia Tech squad in a very closely contested battle that was made

most memorable thanks to a single play by California's Roy Riegels. After a scoreless first quarter, the Bears threatened by moving the ball to Georgia Tech's 25-yard line. They were unable to get any farther, however, and possession was lost on downs. The next play became one of the most famous (or infamous) of all time. Riegels, California's All-American center, placed his name in the game's lore when Georgia Tech's Stumpy Thomason was hit by the Bears' Benny Lom at the Georgia Tech 30. Riegels scooped up the fumble and started in the right direction, but suddenly he spun around and headed the wrong way. Riegels had reached the Cal one-yard-line before Lom was able to spin him back around, only to be tackled by Georgia Tech. The play led to a safety when the Engineers blocked Lom's subsequent punt.

Georgia Tech had a 2-0 lead at halftime, then scored again in the third quarter for an 8-0 lead going into the fourth quarter. The Bears finally scored late in the fourth quarter when Lom passed to Irv Phillips in the end zone.

California returned to the Rose Bowl with the "Thunder Team" of 1937. With a devastating offensive backfield and a rock-solid defense, the Golden Bears trampled their opponents in the regular season, posting a 9-0-1 record and scoring a total of 201

points while allowing only 33. The Bears, under coach Stub Allison, recorded six shutouts against opponents and utilized a punishing ground game which not only earned the team the nickname "The Thunder Team" but landed the undefeated squad a berth in the Rose Bowl.

In the Rose Bowl of 1938, the Bears recorded an impressive victory over Alabama, 13-0. California relied on its brilliant backfield of Vic Bottari and Sam Chapman to pave the way on offense. And on defense, the Bears rendered the Crimson Tide offense ineffective, holding Alabama scoreless. Following a fumble recovery by Perry Schwartz in the second quarter, the Bears marched 61 yards and scored on a four-yard run by Bottari. The only other score came early in the third quarter, when Bottari added a second touchdown on another four-yard run, making the final margin 13-0. California had completed an undefeated season for the first time since the Wonder Teams of the 1920s, and was rewarded with its most recent national championship.


NORTHWESTERN 20 CALIFORNIA 14

Pappy Waldorf will always be remembered as one of the greatest coaches ever at California, and his 1948 team was the first of three consecutive squads he would lead to the Rose Bowl. The Bears of 1948 crushed their opponents en route to an undefeated

10-win regular season and a berth in the Rose Bowl of 1949. The Bears scored nearly three times as many total points as they allowed, and proved themselves as the top team on the West Coast.

The Rose Bowl of 1949 was billed as a battle of wits, as it pitted Pappy Waldorf against one of his former players, Northwestern coach Bob Voights. It proved to be an outstanding game, as the Bears matched the running of Jackie Jensen and Jack Swaner against Frank Aschenbrenner, Ed Tunnicliff and Art Murakowski of Northwestern. Aschenbrenner opened the scoring with a 73-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, but Jensen returned the favor with a 67-yard scoring run of his own on the next series. The game may have been decided on a controversial touchdown in the second quarter, when Murakowski scored from one yard out as he fumbled into the end zone. With Jensen sidelined by leg cramps, the Bears took the lead, 14-13, in the third quarter on a run by Swaner. Northwestern came back, however, to score the winning touchdown on a 43-yard run by Tunnicliff with 2:59 left in the game. Although the Bears lost the game, the final Associated Press Poll still ranked California fourth in the nation.

The Golden Bears entered the 1950 Rose Bowl with a perfect 10-0 regular season record and what many considered to be the West Coast's finest post-World War II team. Under coach Pappy Waldorf, the 1949 Bears were an even more dominant team

than the previous year's Rose Bowl team. Cal scored an average of over 30 points per contest while only allowing slightly over 11 points per game in the regular season.

The Bears had built a 7-0 halftime lead on a seven-yard run by Jim Monachino, but Ohio State scored 14 unanswered points to open a 14-7 lead at the end of the third quarter. Monachino stunned the Buckeyes early in the final period when his 44-yard touchdown run tied the score at 14-14, but the Bears were to be denied once again. A bad punt by Bob Celeri gave Ohio State the ball deep in California territory late in the game and Ohio State's Jim Hague kicked a 17-yard game-winning field goal with 1:57 left in the contest. The Bears had managed to lose two consecutive Rose Bowls, but if it was any consolation, the final Associated Press Poll ranked the Golden Bears third in the country.

Pappy Waldorf took his Golden Bears team of 1950 to a third consecutive Rose Bowl. Again the Bears entered the Rose Bowl as an undefeated team that had laid waste to the Pacific Coast Conference. And once again California's string of hard luck Rose Bowl

defeats continued. The Bears appeared ready to give coach Waldorf his first post-season victory, as they entered the game with a 9-0-1 record, having outscored opponents 218-76 during the regular season.

On the third play of the game, Pete Schabarum exploded on a 73-yard touchdown run that was wiped out because of a penalty. The Bears went ahead 6-0 in the second quarter on a 39-yard touchdown pass from Jim Marinos to Bob Cummings, and it looked as if the Bears might get that elusive Rose Bowl victory. After halftime, however, the Wolverines dominated the action and with only 5:37 left in the game, Michigan took its first lead. Moments later they added a second touchdown to secure a 14-6 win.

Although Pappy was never able to lead California to a Rose Bowl victory, the Golden Bears compiled a 53-9-1 record under coach Waldorf from 1947-52. Even after the Bears lost to Michigan in 1951, California was ranked as high as the fourth best team in the nation in the final polls (No. 4 UPI, No. 5 AP), making it three straight seasons that the Bears had finished among the top five teams in the country.

California's last Rose Bowl appearance was one that many Old Blues would like to forget. Behind quarterback Joe Kapp and halfback Jack Hart, the Bears defeated both USC and UCLA en route to a 7-3 regular season record and the Pacific Coast

Conference title. Cal was the premier team on the West Coast and on January 1, 1959, the Bears faced lowa in the Rose Bowl.

Cal wasn't given much of a chance of upending lowa and that played out true to form as the Hawkeyes recorded a convincing 38-12 victory. The Bears could do little to stop lowa's powerful rushing game, as the Hawkeyes broke the Rose Bowl record for rushing yardage (429) and total offense (516). Iowa's Bob Jeter erased another Rose Bowl record with an 81-yard touchdown run and finished with 194 yards on only nine carries. Iowa had a commanding 20-0 halftime lead, then increased it to 32-6 after three quarters. Hart was able to score a pair of second half TDs on two runs, but it was hardly enough to turn the tide.

Bears won their first two and last two games of the year, all on the road, including impressive victories over Washington State and Stanford to bring home the Axe.

Facing Temple in the Garden State Bowl was no easy task for the Bears, as California failed to answer the Owls' rushing attack and suffered a 28-17 defeat. The Owls took control of the game early, scoring on their first three possessions to open a 21-0 first quarter lead. Campbell put the Bears back in the game on a pair of second quarter touchdown passes to Matt Bouza and Joe Rose. The scored remained 21-14 Temple until the fourth quarter when Mick Luckhurst's 34-yard field goal pulled California within four at 21-17. That was as close as the Bears were able to come, however, as Temple scored another touchdown late in the game to secure the win.

regular season, California put an end to "The Streak" by beating UCLA at Memorial Stadium and making a late rally to tie USC in Los Angeles. Under coach Bruce Snyder, the Bears awakened from their hibernation of the 1980s and were hungry for their first bowl victory in more than half a century.

The Bears offense, which was very potent during the regular season, had its poorest showing of the season, netting only 261 total yards. Fortunately, California's defense rose to the occasion to yield a season-low 15 points. Quarterback Mike Pawlawski fired a 25-yard touchdown pass to Brian Treggs in the second quarter to give the Bears a lead they would never relinquish. Robbie Keen nailed a 46-yard field goal in the third quarter, and fullback Greg Zomalt bulled into the end zone from four yards out early in the fourth as the Bears built a 17-9 advantage. In the final minutes of the game, the Bears had to hold off a Cowboy rally that included a 70-yard punt return for a touchdown. However, California stuffed the two-point conversion attempt to seal the victory.

Led by Mike Pawlawski and Russell White, the Golden Bears put more points on the board than any California squad since the Wonder Team of 1920. The Bears brought a 9-2 record into their first Jan. 1 bowl game in 33 years, capping a season in which

they scored a modern-day record 86 points against Pacific, won dramatic come-from-behind games at Arizona and UCLA, and scored more points than any team in history against USC, a 52-30 whipping at Memorial Stadium.

California faced a very tough Clemson squad that had one of the strongest defenses in college football. The Bears, however, exploding for 17 first quarter points to leap to open a comfortable lead before the Tigers knew what hit them. Among the first quarter highlights was a 72-yard punt return for a touchdown by Brian Treggs that just about crushed any hope Clemson had of a comeback victory, as a ferocious Bear defense kept the Tigers at bay for the rest of the afternoon. White rushed for a 103 yards on 22 carries against a run defense that had not allowed a 100-yard runner in nearly four years, and the Golden Bears proved to a national television audience that they were indeed one of the elite Top 10 teams in the nation.

Riding a roller coaster of a regular season that began with five straight wins only to be followed by four consecutive losses and then three more victories, California received a bid to the inaugural Alamo Bowl in San Antonio, Texas. The Bears scored on four of

their first five possessions and completely shut down the lowa offensive attack, limiting the Hawkeyes to just 90 yards of total offense in the 37-3 victory.

After three Doug Brien field goals gave Cal a 9-0 lead 20 minutes into the contest, quarterback Dave Barr hit Mike Caldwell for a six-yard score. Linebacker Jerrott Willard followed by picking off a pass and rumbling 61 yards for the touchdown as time ran out in the first half to give Cal a 23-0 margin heading to the locker room. Barr, who passed for two more scores in the second half to Iheanyi Uwaezuoke and Brian Remington, finished the game 21-of-28 for 266 yards, while Lindsey Chapman led the rushing attack with 89 yards. As a team, the Bears ended the contest with an impressive time of possession advantage of 43:14 to 16:46. The victory lifted Cal into the final national polls (No. 24 Coaches/No. 25 AP).

contest, but Navy rallied for a pair of touchdowns in the final eight minutes.

The game got off to a bang when Cal's Deltha O'Neal returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a score. Then the Bears settled into their offense, seeming to score at will in the first half, putting together drives of 81, 73, 35 and 61 yards en route to taking a 35-28 halftime lead. Quarterback Pat Barnes threw for three scores, two to wideout Bobby Shaw and one to tight end Sean Bullard, and O'Neal added a 31-yard TD scamper.

However, Cal could manage only a 41-yard Ryan Longwell field goal in the second half, before Navy put on its late rush that culminated on a 10-yard game-winning TD run by backup QB Ben Fay with 1:41 left in the contest.

After 98 points and 1,081 yards of offense, the Insight Bowl came down to a 35-yard field goal try, and Tyler Fredrickson made the final kick of his Cal career as time expired to give the Bears a 52-49 victory over Virginia Tech.

Cal's Aaron Rodgers flirted with 400 yards passing in an aerial duel that saw both teams rally from 14-point deficits. Rodgers was 27-of-35 passing for 394 yards and two TDs. He also ran for two scores and was named the game's offensive MVP.


Chase Lyman, starting in place of injured wide receiver Geoff McArthur, caught five passes for a Cal bowl-record 149 yards, including a 33-yarder from Rodgers for a touchdown.

Rodgers, who was 15-for-17 for 245 yards in the second half, scored on an eight-yard option play to put Cal ahead 42-28 with 48 seconds left in the third quarter. Virginia Tech came back as DeAngelo Hall reversed his field for a 52-yard punt return TD that tied the game at 49-49 with 3:11 remaining.

The winning drive came after Virginia Tech's subsequent kickoff went out of bounds, giving Cal the ball on the 35. Rodgers completed three passes to the Hokie 20-yard line, and a five-yard run by J.J. Arrington set up Fredrickson's winning field goal on the game's final play.

Perhaps pining for a Rose Bowl bid that was snatched away by voters in the final week, Cal came up against the vaunted Texas Tech aerial attack led by Sonny Cumbie and fell, 45-31, in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl. Cumbie threw for a career-high

520 yards and three touchdowns, as 21st-ranked Texas Tech upended the Golden Bears.

Cal's J.J. Arrington became just the third running back in Pac-10 history and the first for California to rush for 2,000 yards in a season when he reached the milestone against the Red Raiders. The senior carried 25 times for 173 yards against Tech to finish the year with a school-record 2,018 yards. His two-yard run in the first quarter was his 15th rushing touchdown of the year, breaking Cal's season record that has later been tied by Justin Forsett (2007) and Jahvid Best (2008).

Tech had four scoring drives that took under two minutes each. Trailing 14-7 after the first quarter, the Red Raiders scored 24 straight points and held a commanding 31-14 lead by early in the third quarter.

Cal quarterback Aaron Rodgers threw an 11-yard TD pass to Garrett Cross and scored on a 1-yard sneak, both in the final quarter.

Marshawn Lynch rushed for career highs of 194 yards and three touchdowns to win the game's MVP award, and DeSean Jackson caught two scoring passes before Cal's defense held off BYU for a 35-28 victory.

Junior Steve Levy passed for 228 yards in his second career start for the Bears, who held off BYU's fourth-quarter comeback in a high-octane game that featured 915 total yards.

Cal took a 35-14 lead into the final quarter after Lynch's 35-yard scoring run and Jackson's exceptional 22-yard diving TD catch in the third. But BYU quarterback John Beck responded with scoring passes to Jonny Harline and Todd Watkins, whose nine-yard grab with 5:35 left cut Cal's lead to the final seven-point margin.

The Bears missed a 50-yard field goal with 2:20 to play in the fourth, but the Cougars moved just seven yards before Beck's arm was hit by Cal lineman Phillip Mbakogu on the ensuing series. Daymeion Hughes intercepted the wobbling pass to seal the victory.

The Bears' stars were the difference. Jackson scored on a 42-yard romp through the BYU secondary three seconds before halftime, while Lynch had scoring runs of 3, 23 and 35 yards along with a handful of jaw-dropping second-effort rushes. His 194 yards rushing and three touchdowns on the ground also were Cal bowl records.

In his final game in a Golden Bear uniform, Marshawn Lynch rushed for 111 yards and two touchdowns to earn the game's co-offensive MVP


honors. Justin Forsett was the game's leading rusher with 124 yards, and also found the end zone in the fourth quarter on an eight-yard dash.

The Falcons' crisp option offense kept the Golden Bears guessing through the first 20 minutes as Air Force scored on two drives, then pushed in another seven

points after a Bear miscue on a kickoff.

However, with Cal backup quarterback Kevin Riley stepping in under center, the Cal offense came to life. The freshman signal-caller connected with DeSean Jackson for a 40-yard score and found fellow standout receivers Lavelle Hawkins and Robert Jordan for touchdowns to pull the Bears within three, 24-21, midway through the third quarter.

Cal ran a relentless ground attack behind tailback Justin Forsett, who scored a pair of TDs before Riley put the game away with a nifty option run for a 42-30 advantage.

Riley earned MVP honors by connecting on 16-of-19 passes for 269 yards and three TDs. Forsett tallied 140 yards rushing and Thomas DeCoud paced the defense with 10 tackles. Jordan caught six catches for 148 yards.

Cal jumped out to an early 14-0 first quarter lead on a pair of Jahvid Best touchdown runs but Miami

eventually came back to tie the contest at 17-17 in the fourth quarter. The game remained tied until late in regulation when Nate Longshore connected with Anthony Miller on a two-yard scoring strike with 2:37 to go. The winning touchdown was set up moments earlier when Zack Follett forced a fumble deep in Hurricane territory and Cameron Jordan returned it to the Miami two-yard line.

Miami was able to put together eight plays on an ensuing drive but time ran out on the Hurricanes after reaching the Bears' 37-yard line.

Best capped a tremendous season for Cal by rushing for an Emerald Bowl record 186 yards and two touchdowns, marking his fourth consecutive 100-yard rushing game and eighth of the season.

The Golden Bears also set several other school bowl records, including the team's 10.0 tackles for loss, Follett's bowl-record-tying 4.0 tackles and 2.0 sacks, a 74-yard first quarter passing play between Longshore and Verran Tucker, and Jordan's seven-yard fumble return.

The Golden Bears jumped out to a two-touchdown lead but could not prevail as Utah's Jordan Wynn threw for a career-high 338 yards and three touchdowns to rally the Utes to a 37-27 victory over California in the Poinsettia Bowl.

The Bears, in a bowl game for the school-record seventh straight year, had their four-game postseason winning streak snapped. The Utes scored 27 straight points to win their ninth straight bowl game, the longest streak in the country and tied for the second-longest ever following the 2009 season.

Shane Vereen, who scored twice, became the seventh Cal back to gain more than 100 yards in a bowl, finishing with 122 yards on 20 carries. Vereen started the scoring with a 36-yard touchdown run and Eddie Young intercepted Wynn on the first play of Utah's next drive, returning it 31 yards for a score.

But Utah's defense shut down Cal while the Utes offense on its last four possessions of the first half. Cal finally scored again on a 1-yard run by Vereen with 39 seconds left in the third quarter to put the Bears within six at 27-21 before Utah kicked a 25-yard field goal to pull away.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

SANDY BARBOUR DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



As Director of Athletics, Sandy Barbour oversees an athletic department that ranks as one of the most successful in the country with a mission that seeks to match its level of excellence with that attained by the entire university.

Built upon four pillars – to teach, to serve, to com-

pete and to excel – Cal Athletics strives to combine high athletic achievement with the academic rigors of the No. 1 public university in the country, and to do so with integrity, passion, respect, teamwork, innovation, diversity and professionalism. The department is charged not only to be a campus and community leader, but also to be a place where individuals can grow to their utmost potential.

Under Barbour's leadership, the Golden Bears have developed into a model program that has excelled in academics and increased its revenues in tickets, sponsorship and fundraising while becoming a mainstay among the top 10 in the annual Directors' Cup standings. Cal placed in that elite group for the sixth straight year with its all-time best third-place finish in 2010-11, a historic year with Cup points earned by the national champion men's and women's swimming & diving teams, national runner-up finishes from volleyball and men's and women's water polo, College World Series trips by baseball (T5th) and softball (T5th), and top-five finishes by women's crew (3rd), men's gymnastics (4th) and men's soccer (T5th). Even without rugby's national championship and men's crew's third-place finish, neither of which count toward final Directors' Cup standings, 20 programs contributed to Cal's total.

"Sandy Barbour was my first appointment at Berkeley, and I consider it a privilege to have her as our Director of Athletics," Chancellor Robert J. Birgeneau said. "Under her leadership, our studentathletes are excelling on and off the field, supported by a department committed to excellence, equity and comprehensive compliance with the rules."

Since Barbour began her tenure in Berkeley on Sept. 15, 2004, Cal programs have captured 15 national team championships and 67 individual titles.

In 2009-10, the men's basketball team earned its first Pac-10 conference title in 50 seasons, while the women's basketball program won the Women's National Invitational Tournament.

In addition, the Golden Bear football team appeared in seven straight bowl games from 2003-09, with a four-game bowl win streak from 2005-08 and a share of the Pac-10 champion-ship for the first time in 21 seasons in 2006. After finishing the 2010 season outside the bowl picture, the Bears are back in 2011 with a berth in the Hoilday Bowl.

Overall, Cal supports a 29-sport program with more than 900 student-athletes and a budget of approximately \$70 million.

On the academic front, more than half of Cal's 29 programs maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher, with 18 of them earning cumulative GPAs

higher than their historical average last year. Nine teams scored perfect Academic Progress Rates for the 2008-09 academic year and eight teams received national recognition for their Academic Progress Rates over the last two years. More than 175 student-athletes have earned academic all-conference recognition in each of the last seven years and over 70 percent of head football coach Jeff Tedford's first recruiting class has graduated.

Amid these achievements, Barbour has led the department's efforts to raise funds, design and begin construction on the long-awaited renovation and retrofit of California Memorial Stadium as well as the Simpson Student-Athlete High Performance, which opened in October of 2011.

One of the "100 Most Influential Women in Business" in the Bay Area according to the San Francisco Business Times, Barbour was named a regional Athletic Director of the Year for 2008-09 by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), and she was a finalist for National AD of the Year at the Sports Business Awards. Barbour was previously chosen a 2006 Woman of Distinction by the East Bay Business Times and the 2006 National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators (NACWAA) Division I-A National Administrator of the Year.

Barbour is an active member of several committees on both the national and conference levels. In July 2010 she was selected as the Pac-10 representative to the NCAA Division I Leadership Council, a four-year appointment. She chairs the Pac-12 Revenue Sharing Committee and serves on the conference's Compliance & Enforcement and Diversity Leadership Initiatives. Barbour is also on the NACDA Executive Committee, the NCAA Diversity Leadership Strategic Planning



Committee, the NCAA Women's Basketball Discussion Group and the WBCA Defensive Player of the Year Selection Committee.

In the past, Barbour has also served as the chair of the Pac-10 Budget and Finance Committee, as a member of the Pac-10 Executive Committee and the Pac-10 Television Committee, and was vice president of the conference in 2007-08.

Prior to moving to Berkeley, Barbour was the deputy director of athletics at Notre Dame, serving as the university's senior athletic administrator from July 2002 to September 2004. She previously held an associate athletic director position there starting in 2000.

Barbour's career in intercollegiate athletic administration spans 30 years, beginning as a field hockey assistant coach and lacrosse administrative assistant at the University of Massachusetts in 1981. She has since served as assistant athletic director at Northwestern and in 1991 was recruited to Tulane as an associate athletic director.

In 1996, Barbour was appointed Tulane's director of athletics at age 36, and during her three years overseeing the program, Green Wave teams won 12 conference championships. In her first year in the position, the school captured four conference titles, a feat never before accomplished in Tulane history. She also hired Tommy Bowden as head football coach during her first year. Bowden proceeded in 1997 to post the Green Wave's first winning season (7-4) in 16 years, and then directed the school to a 12-0 record, a Conference USA championship and a No. 7 national ranking the following season as the 1998 Liberty Bowl champions.

In her position at Notre Dame, Barbour oversaw facilities and event operations for the school's 26-sport program, including football game management and the department's two golf courses. She was also responsible for developing, maintaining and implementing Notre Dame's \$127 million athletics facilities master plan.

Additionally, her role at Notre Dame included responsibilities for women's lacrosse, men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, men's and women's swimming and men's golf. She also assisted with the administration of women's basketball.

Born Dec. 2, 1959, in Annapolis, Md., Barbour grew up in a military family. Her father was a career aviator in the U.S. Navy, and her family lived in various U.S. locations as well as in Western Europe during her childhood.

Barbour graduated cum laude in 1981 with a B.S. degree in physical education from Wake Forest, where she was a four-year letterwinner and served as captain of the field hockey team. She also played two varsity seasons of women's basketball.

Barbour earned advanced degrees at both Massachusetts (an M.S. in sports management in 1983) and Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management (an MBA in 1991).

Between masters' programs, Barbour served as assistant field hockey and lacrosse coach at Northwestern from 1982-84. She also held the position of director of recruiting services during that period, before being promoted to assistant athletic director for intercollegiate programs in 1984, a position she held until 1989.

Prior to joining Tulane, Barbour worked in programming and production for FOX Sports Net in Chicago during the summer of 1990.
