



2009 MEN'S GOLF OUTLOOK

Sophomore Stephen Hale

BEARS LOOK TO CARRY MOMENTUM INTO NCAAS AND BEYOND

ith five of its top-six golfers back for the 2008-09 season, joined by two-time All-Pac-10 selection **Michael Jensen** after a redshirt year and junior all-conference transfer **John Murphy**, the Golden Bears are ready for a big spring after putting together an impressive fall season.

California advanced to the NCAA Regionals at the end of 2007-08 season for the 10th time in the last 12 years after posting a third-place finish at the 2008 Pac-10 Championship, hosted by Cal at the Meadow Club in Marin. It was the Bears' best finish since 2000 in the event.

The loss of seniors **Brandon Beck** and **Freddy Wolfe** to graduation has been offset by the return to solid health of its veterans, the ascendancy of Cal's underclassmen and the arrival of Murphy and four true freshmen, all of whom are pushing each other to higher levels of achievement.

After ending the spring of 2008 ranked No. 46 in the nation by *Golfweek Magazine*, the Bears charged through the fall of 2008 with a first at the San Francisco (USF) Invitational at the Olympic Club, a second at the Husky (Washington) Invitational and a third at the Wolverine (Michigan) Invitational, then responded to adversity by bouncing back from a tough opening round with a strong seventh at The Prestige (Stanford/UC Davis) to end the calendar year ranked No. 28 by Golfstat and No. 29 by *Golfweek*.

The difference on paper between last spring and this fall does not do enough justice to the fight Cal displayed to come away from the spring as well as it did. "If you look at last season, we had had a difficult fall [2007] with injuries and inexperience," said Head Coach **Steve Desimone**. "We got healthy and then some of the younger guys on this team — **Stephen Hale** and **Eric Mina**, for example — really began to pick it up, and we played like a top-25 team all spring. It was a tremendous run. We were in position to win three or four tournaments, including the conference championship."

The coaching staff challenged the team to continue to improve between spring and fall and Cal did just that. This past summer,

four of the Bears' returning players, **George Gandranata**, Stephen Hale, **Andrey Mindirgasov** and Eric Mina, competed in the 2008 U.S. Amateur Championship at Pinehurst Resort in Pinehurst, N.C. It was the greatest number of participants Cal has ever had qualify for this prestigious event.

Along the way the Bears gained a significant addition with the arrival of junior John Murphy, a transfer from Old Dominion, where he was selected Most Outstanding Performer in the Colonial Athletic Association Conference his freshman year.

"We knew, based on what our players had done over the summer and the addition of John, that this was going to be a very, very good golf team with a tremendous upside, and that's right where we are now," Desimone said.

Cal's strength as a good ball-striking squad hopes to be matched by improved short games and better putting, which Desimone believes can be the difference between a very good season and a great one.

"The teams that play the best are the ones that make the most putts, because in terms of ball-striking, there's not a big difference between the teams that are ranked in the top five and the ones that are ranked in the top 30," Desimone said. "It's usually who's putting the best, and we can win any tournament at anytime if we putt well. It's as simple as that."

This fall may have put the collegiate golf world on notice that the Bears are charging upward, but that hasn't prevented the program from understanding it has to stay hungry to improve and compete with the upper echelon of the Pac-10.

"We know who the quality programs are," said Desimone of the conference. "I don't see any team out there that I think is unreachable; more importantly, I know the guys believe that. Overall, our job is to really keep the guys on message, and then we'll see what happens as we go through the spring and head toward the Pac-10s and the NCAAs."

The Bears put together the kind of fall campaign to back up Coach Desimone's assessment. "We won at the Olympic Club and had excellent chances to win at Washington

and Michigan," Desimone said. "We made a great run at Michigan down the stretch and almost pulled out a victory. As for The Prestige – the Norman course at PGA WEST, two or three bad shots on a couple of holes, and next thing you know, you take yourself out of the tournament. Unfortunately, that's exactly what we did. Once we settled down, we really played some good golf."

There may be an upside to leaving the fall season with a difficult outing that left something to prove. And the proving grounds will be plenty.

"Every one of the fields in the spring we'll be in will be extremely strong," Desimone said. "I would rank the spring schedule, in terms of difficult challenges, as strong as anything we had coming out of the national championship year in 2004."

The spring season gets under way Feb. 2-3 at the Arizona Intercollegiate, with a top-notch field playing on a desert course that can be very difficult depending on the weather. Desimone described it as "a lot of target golf. If you hit it well, the golf course is there; but if not, you're in the desert and you can have some real problems."


"If you look at the national stats, our strength is from tee to green. As straight as we hit it, ball-striking courses suit our games very well. I am confident we will be very competitive in Tucson. When you have a good ball-striking team, you feel like you can play any golf course and play it well." said Desimone.

The competition continues in late-February with the USC Collegiate Invitational, offering another very good field on the challenging North Ranch Country Club course. The UNLV-hosted Southern Highlands Collegiate Championship that follows March 13-15 will be "a very good measuring stick for us,"

Desimone said. The No. 2-ranked event in quality of field a year ago, it may offer the best field the Bears see this spring.

"By the time we get to mid-March, we're going to know a lot about this team," said Desimone. "Our play will hopefully be propelling us to what should be a great spring."

The team is led by senior co-captains Michael Jensen and **Kent Yamane**, both great off the tee with excellent all-around games. Being one of the most consistently solid players in Cal Golf history, Jensen won the individual championship at the Olympic Club last September, his first tournament victory as a Golden Bear. Yamane's game has continued to improve over time, which was evident with a good showing at the Husky last fall. He seems poised to crack the top 5 and make major contributions this spring.



The senior class is rounded out by George Gandranata, a 2007-08 all-conference player, and Erick Thorson. Gandranata has been a mainstay in the lineup the last three and half years, a tremendously hard worker and a key component to the Golden Bears' improvement over the last two seasons. Desimone describes Thorson as "a tireless worker and one of the most improved players we've ever seen in the program. He's pushing hard to crack to the top 5."

The well-balanced roster continues with a junior class featuring Murphy and 2007-2008 all-conference honoree **Evan Derian**, "one of the best ball-strikers in the history of the program," according to Desimone, who aims

for full return to health this spring. Fellow junior Andrey Mindirgasov will redshirt this year after qualifying for the U.S. Amateur last summer.

The sophomore section of the team consists of Stephen Hale, who garnered the highest honor ever by a true freshman at Cal as a second-team All-Pac-10 selection in what was the best conference in the country last year. Eric Mina played some very good golf last season and stayed in lineup once he broke into it. **Feldman Tan**, who qualified for a couple of tournaments last year, will redshirt this season as he stays on course to enter the Haas undergraduate school of business.

The redshirt freshmen include **Jeff Hamm** and **Ian Dahl**, both of whom have knocked heavily on the door for qualifying during the fall after playing solid summers.

The true freshmen include Jamie Coré, a Canadian who figures to benefit from a 12-month playing schedule; Devin Hexner, a local talent who honed his game at the Olympic Club; Anthony Machi, another local (Castlewood CC) who has a solid allaround game and has shown to be competitive in tournament qualifying; and Akshay Maliwal, who arrived in the U.S. this fall from Singapore and has demonstrated a strong work ethic and real improvement in his game.

The program continues to be a model member of the Athletic Department off the course as well. Derian was named to the Pac-10 Men's Golf All-Academic First Team after another extremely good academic year to go with his 72.8 stroke average for the Golden Bears in 2007-08.


Since 2000, Cal has now had 15 academic all-conference selections, including current professional golfers Peter Tomasulo and Michael Wilson, both three-time honorees, and current Golden Bear assistant coach Walter Chun, also a three-time selection who was recognized this

summer as winner of the 2008 Jan Strickland Award, an honor presented annually to the nation's top assistant coach in men's golf by TaylorMade-Adidas Golf.

For the first time, there will be six rather than three regional NCAA host sites this spring, one of which will be Lake Merced, with USF as the host. While no one knows if Cal will end up competing there, it's a fact the Bears consider it one of their home courses and have played it very well over the years.

The most important thing, Desimone said, is that this team continues to work hard, which has "put us in good position for NCAA postseason competition already."

CALIFORNIA COACHING STAFF



STEVE DESIMONE

Head Coach • 30th Season University of California, 1970

Head Coach Steve Desimone, now in his 30th year at the helm of California Men's Golf, is the man largely responsible for the level of success enjoyed by the Golden Bears program. The 2004 season was magical for Desimone as the veteran coach was able to achieve the ultimate prize - the NCAA Men's Golf Championship. It was through his hard work and dedication that the Cal Golf program was in a position to win a National Championship.

Cal produced one of the greatest stories in the history of NCAA golf in 2004, coming back from eight strokes down to UCLA in the final day to win by six strokes over the Bruins. It was the culmination of a season in which the Bears had to overcome several injuries, but they were able to play the best golf when it meant the most - at the NCAA Championship. As a result of his team's impressive accomplishment, Desimone was named Golfweek Magazine's Collegiate Coach of the Year, and was honored as 2004 Grand Master of the Year by the Northern California Golf Association.

The Bears' program has made tremendous strides since the spring of 1980. It went from a club sport in the early '80s to one of the elite golf programs in the country, having won over 30 tournament titles under Desimone's leadership. Cal now has competed in 13 NCAA Western Regional Championships and five NCAA Championships (1995, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2004), including back-to-back-to-back appearances from 1998 through 2000.

Desimone graduated from Cal in 1970 after playing for the Bears' men's basketball team as an undergraduate. He then served in the United States military before returning to Cal to complete a double major in history and physical education and earning his Master's degree in Physical Education. Upon leaving Cal, Desimone became the

Athletic Director at the College Preparatory School in Oakland where he remained until 1988. Desimone eventually returned to Cal in 1980 as head coach, and from 1980 to 1988, shared responsibilities between the University and the College Preparatory School. In 1989, Desimone moved to Cal on a full-time basis.

When Desimone came aboard as head coach in 1980, he was intent on taking Cal Golf to a higher level. The first steps taken were to form the Cal Golf Committee in 1980, the primary support group for the golf team, and to return the program from a club team to NCAA status, which was accomplished in 1982. Soon after, Desimone began crafting Cal into the nationally respected golf program it has become today. In addition to developing a winning program, he has helped produce seven All-Americans (Ben Furth, Charlie Wi, Garrett Larson, Dan Arroyo, Han Lee, Jeff Hood and lastly, Peter Tomasulo, who was selected twice in 2003 and 2004) and seven All-America Scholars (Furth, Bill Albers, Dan Coyle, Walter Chun, Scott Carlyle, Tomasulo, and Michael Wilson - Furth, Albers, Chun, Carlyle, Tomasulo and Wilson were each selected twice). Carlyle was also selected a first team Academic All-American in 2004.

By 1986-87, Desimone had Cal ranked among the Top 25 teams in the nation for the

first time in the history of the program. One outstanding performance that season was a dramatic comeback at San Diego State's Frank Scott Memorial Tournament. Trailing fourth-ranked Fresno State by 17 shots going into the final round, the Bears rallied to win their first major championship in 17 years. Cal's success that year helped Desimone win the honor of Pacific-10 Conference Co-Coach of the Year.

During the outstanding 1989-90 season, Desimone brought the Bears golf program to an unprecedented level. The team earned its first NCAA playoff berth in 26 years. Cal competed in the 1964 tournament, but earned its first actual berth in 1990 after the NCAA switched to a selection/qualifying format. Cal played in 13 tournaments that year, placing among the Top 10 in all but two, including three team titles and a third-place tie at the Pac-10 Championships. In addition, the Bears were ranked among the Top 20 teams in the nation throughout the season. The major contributor to the Bears success that year was Cal Golf's first All-American and a Cal Sports Hall of Famer - Ben Furth.

The following season came to a disappointing conclusion for Desimone and the Bears. A career-ending back injury to Furth brought to an end the hope that 1990-91 would surpass Cal's great season the preceding year. Off the course, however,

another important step in the rebuilding of Cal Golf was undertaken. With the generous support of the Cal Golf Committee, a small amount of financial aid was offered to incoming student athletes for the first time in 15 years.

This was a critical step because it finally demonstrated the Bears were committed to competing nationally in all respects.

The 1994-95 season stands as the second best in the history of Cal Golf. The team finished second to Arizona State at the Pac-10 championships, being selected for its third berth in the NCAA Western Regional in six years. The Bears qualified for the NCAA Championships in Columbus, Ohio, and finished that great season with a sixth-place at the finals. Leading the way was Charlie Wi, 1995 Pac-10 Champion and First-Team All-American.


In February 2008, Desimone had the honor of watching three of his former golfers - Wi, Tomasulo and Michael Wilson - compete as professionals at the Pebble Beach National Pro-Am on the Monterey Peninsula. It was the second time he had three golfers participate in the event.

In November 2008, Tomasulo secured his 2009 PGA Tour card by virtue of finishing No. 11 on the Nationwide Tour money list. He became the second Golden Bear on the PGA TOUR, joining Wi, who completed his third year on the tour in 2008.

In addition to his current duties at Cal, Desimone is the Manager of the University of California Golf Club, a 130-member Associate Club of the Northern California Golf Association, and is a member of the Ping Advisory Committee for college golf. He has served twice on the NCAA Pacific Region Selection Committee for the NCAA Western Regional (1991-93, 2002-04) and served on the campus-wide NCAA Self-Certification Committee in the mid-90s.

Desimone lives in Orinda with his wife, Linda. They have two children: Kim, who graduated in the spring of 2006 from Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, and Robert, a member of the media relations staff on the NHL's Minnesota Wild following his May 2008 graduation from Northern Michigan University.






WALTER CHUN
Assistant Coach • Fifth Season
University of California, 2001

A former California golf standout, Walter Chun enters his fifth year as assistant coach with the Golden Bears. Chun was named the 2008 Jan Strickland Award winner as the nation's top assistant coach following last spring. Prior to his current position, he was the Bears' administrative assistant for the 2003-04 campaign, helping the Bears to the 2004 NCAA title.

Chun was a two-time team captain and competed in three NCAA Western Regionals (2000-02) and the 2000 NCAA Championship as a member of the Cal Golf team from 1997-2002. He has also qualified for two U.S. Amateur Championships, the first in 1999 at Pebble Beach and the second in 2002 at Oakland Hills Country Club.


Chun received his bachelor's degree from the Walter A. Haas School of Business in 2001, and earned his Master's from Cal's Graduate School of Education in 2003. In addition to his success on the course, Chun was a three-time Pac-10 All-Academic selection (2000-2002) and a two-time All-America Scholar (2001, 2002) for the Bears.

Operations Manager • Fifth Season
University of the Pacific, 1989

Curt David is in his fifth year as Cal Golf's operations manager. David has been a golf club professional since 1991, gaining Class A membership with the PGA of America in 1995. Most recently, he was Head Golf Professional and General Manager at Cherry Island Golf Course in Sacramento, California from 1995-2003 and he was also Head Golf Professional at Ancil Hoffman in Sacramento from 1999-2002.



Volunteer Assistant Coach • Fifth Season University of California, Davis, 2000

Gene Bakkum is in his fifth year as a volunteer assistant after a two-year stint as assistant coach for the Bears for the 2002-03 and 2003-04 seasons. Before Cal, Bakkum served two years as the assistant men's golf coach for his alma mater, UC Davis, and helped the Aggies to a No. 1 ranking in Division II golf and back-to-back NCAA West Regional appearances.

Since 1997, Bakkum has instructed at the Nike Jr. Golf camps in Pebble Beach, where he also served as Assistant Director. Recently, Bakkum was the Director of the Nike Coaches All-Star Golf Academy in Phoenix, AZ. He is in his fourth year as Assistant Director of Instruction at Metropolitan Golf Links in Oakland, and has been affiliated with the PGA of America since 2005.

Q&A WITH HEAD COACH STEVE DESIMONE

What does it say about the program that you were named Coach of the Fall by the Daily Californian?

Of course, it's a wonderful honor but in all honesty, this was a team honor. The players were the ones working hard, competing and playing well. When you look at the Department, we have a lot of very successful programs and a lot of successful teams, and we certainly were one of them during our fall season. What I'd really like to do is run the table, do it in both fall and spring, because that would mean we've had one heck of a year. I've never been one to put a lot of importance on the national rankings - we just kind of go about our business – but when you look at where we were a year ago and where we are now, it's been a quantum leap, and I do think we've got bigger and better things coming.

In assessing your team, how much goes into following other programs and what they're doing, versus paying attention to your own program?

Basically we try to take care of our own business. We've been able to take a look at, statistically, where our biggest needs are, where we need to improve. I don't worry too much about rankings or polls or what the other teams are doing; I just figure that if we're doing what we need to do, then we'll be a very good golf team, possibly a great team, and we'll let everybody else worry about us.

What are your biggest challenges for the spring 2009 season?

We need to continue to work on our short games and putting, but coming out of the fall, I think our biggest issue is health. We've had a number of injuries that popped up right at the end of the fall. I think the [winter] break came at the right time and everybody's getting healthy. We should be ready to go by early February. Evan Derian, for example, was dealing with health issues on and off last fall, very similar to his first semester freshman year. Evan's really on the cusp of something good and understands that he has a chance to be something special. Most important though, this all secondary until Evan's health (back) improves.

What about the balance between age and experience on the team?

From a coach's standpoint, what's really critical is that we have a wonderful blend of experience and youth. You can break down our team by years, from seniors

through freshmen, and there is a healthy mix. We're not top-heavy with upperclassmen in the lineup or even on the team, and that should make for a consistent run of really good teams over the next few years. Clearly, losing all of our seniors Michael Jensen, George Gandranata, Kent Yamane and Erick Thorson at the end of this year will be difficult. They have played some great golf for us over the years. However, when you look at how well some of the younger players are playing like Jeff Hamm, Andrey Mindirgasov and Ian Dahl, they should be ready to replace our graduating seniors. As I project the team over the next few years. with our returning letterman, our younger players and what appears to be a very strong incoming recruiting class, we should be on a good roll here for quite a while.



Were you pleased with how Cal started the fall with team and individual championships at the San Francisco Intercollegiate at the Olympic Club?

Looking at the field, there were four or five very good, high quality teams that were the favorites and had a real chance to win. Yes, the club is in San Francisco, but there really was no home-course advantage because none of our players had experienced playing that golf course before. Our players did not know how challenging the Olympic Club course was and how great it is. The rewarding part was the way the players responded. especially after those tremendous first two rounds, when we ran away and hid from the rest of the field. We just played some solid golf the final round, but I was not surprised and I don't think the players were, either. I think the only surprise we had all fall was that we didn't play better at The Prestige, especially in the first round.

Does the contrast of a difficult Prestige compared to an otherwise successful fall season offer anything positive going into the spring?

Coaches always wonder what kind of teams they have psychologically when things don't go well. How do the kids handle it? Are they going to fight and are they going to battle? We had been on a good roll the first three tournaments, and we didn't need to dig in as much in those events. Rather, we needed to just keep playing well. At The Prestige we got off to such an awful start - it was good for us to experience some failure. but then it was important to see how we were going to respond to it. No doubt, we responded well. As far back as we were early in the first round, to have moved back up the leader board was a strong statement of character. I was as proud of the players over the last two-and-a-half rounds as I was at any point during the season, and I made sure they knew that. That was a heck of a field, and for us to have raced back up that scoreboard the way we did, again, is an indication of how solid this team is.

Does it matter whether Cal sneaks up on people or is considered a favorite to win?

Each team has its own character. We don't think we take a backseat to anybody and the best teams don't think they do, either. They think, we bring our A games, we're the best team in the field. I can guarantee you our guys are thinking the same thing. There's no intimidation factor for us. I can guarantee you that.

Do you see the benefits of intra-squad competition for roster spots this spring?


I have a sense that we're going to have the most competitive qualifyings going back at least 10 years. It really puts the onus on the players to practice and work very hard, especially on what they need to improve to crack the lineup. I think competition is a great thing. You want to say you've given it everything you have. It's going to be really fun watching these guys get after it all spring.

What does it say about the Cal program that John Murphy chose to transfer to this university?

The key part of John's decision is that it's recognizable across the country and that a player like John wants to be part of a quality program. John's a very polished player, and to his great credit, also is very interested in his education. We have had lots of success in the classroom and on the golf course, and after his first semester at Cal, John is another good example of that. He stepped right into this program and no one outworks him. That's the type of leadership we like seeing. He fit in immediately, and he is one of the guys that the players look up to.

CAL GOLF COMMITTEE

he University of California's intercollegiate golf tradition dates back to 1912. Over the years, the Cal Golf team has competed in many of collegiate golf's finest tournaments, including the Pac-10 and NCAA Championships, and in 2004, winning the NCAA Championship. In January of 1980, a group of golf supporters formed The Friends of Cal Golf to raise the necessary funds to support the golf program at Cal.

Operating costs have been covered by the annual Cal Golf Tournament, satellite tournaments in Sacramento, Marin, Palm Springs, Santa Rosa, Fresno, Los Angeles and Seattle, from annual donations and from the Cal Golf endowments. The Cal-Stanford rivalry, perhaps the finest rivalry in intercollegiate athletics, has spawned a series of popular and competitive events, especially the Big Game Cup, which will be played for the 18th time this November.

In the early years of the program, the Cal Golf Committee established a goal of \$8 million to fund men's golf in perpetuity. Endowment funds, both active and pledged, now stand at approximately \$3.5 million. The Cal Golf team has an endowed grant-in-aid funded by the Sacramento Valley Group for deserving Sacramento Valley golfers choosing to attend Cal. Nine partially-endowed grant-in-aids are continuing to accept funds: the Edward and Mollie Arnold Golf Grantin-Aid, the Edward M. Burnham Family Memorial Endowment Golf Grant-in-Aid, the Edward and Lynn Little Men's Golf Scholarship, the Marin County Golf Grant-in-Aid, the William V. Power Golf Endowed Scholarship, the Sacramento Valley Golf Grant-in-Aid Fund, the Robert G. Tuck Memorial Golf Grant-in-Aid, and the John Llovd Memorial Scholarship. NCAA rules permit up to 4.5 golf scholarships for the men's programs and the Cal Golf Committee has concluded that the

completion of the endowment campaign is essential to both the program's ongoing success and assuring Men's Golf in perpetuity at Cal.

The Pac-10 Conference is the equal of any conference in the nation and in the sport of golf, as it has produced many of the premier professional players on the PGA Tour. The purpose of the Cal Golf program is to provide a competitive atmosphere for young men who desire a place in the worlds of collegiate and professional golf, as well as to make available to them the considerable educational opportunities of the University of California.
