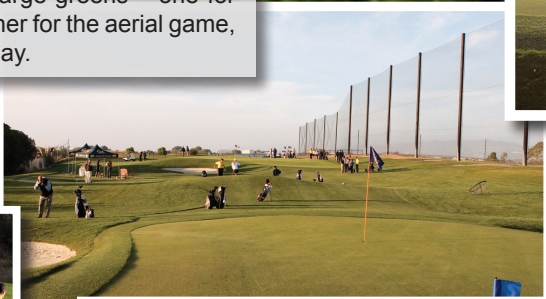
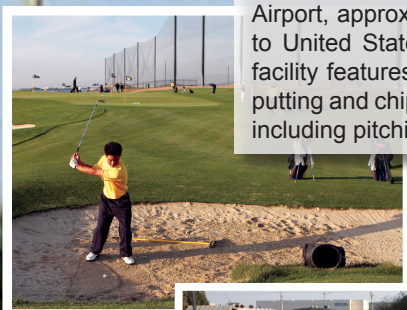
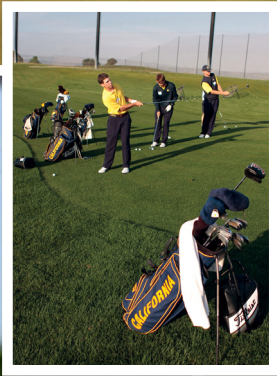
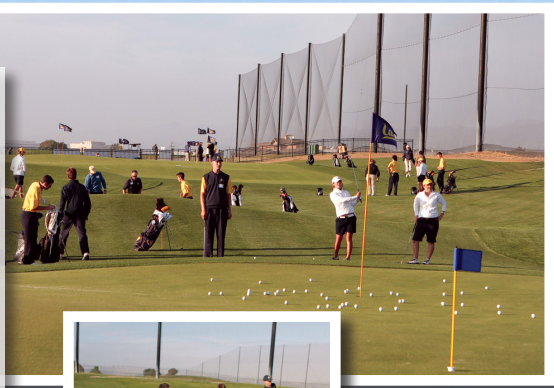


CAL GOLF'S STATE-OF-THE-ART SHORT-GAME FACILITY

In a huge boost for the California men's and women's golf programs, the Golden Bears opened their new short-game facility at the Metropolitan Golf Links in Oakland in the fall of 2007.

The Cal athletic department would like to thank everyone who combined to contribute approximately \$600,000 to bring the project to fruition. The lead donors were Ed and Mollie Arnold, Ellen and Joffa Dale, Jay deBenedetti, Lon and Becci Haskew, Judy Isaac, and Pat and Kent Newmark.

The programs broke ground on the privately-funded project in 2006 after a long planning process. The two-and-a-half acre state-of-the-art short-game facility is conveniently located on the southwest corner of the Metropolitan Golf Links near the Oakland International Airport, approximately 15 minutes from campus. Built to United States Golf Association specifications, the facility features two extremely large greens – one for putting and chipping, and the other for the aerial game, including pitching and bunker play.



*"This was a dream of mine and Cal men's golf for 27 years and for the women's program since its inception in 1994-95. The facility will help improve our players from 120 yards and in. Both teams can always be more efficient in that area. It will also help in terms of recruiting because it will make us more competitive with the best programs in the country. 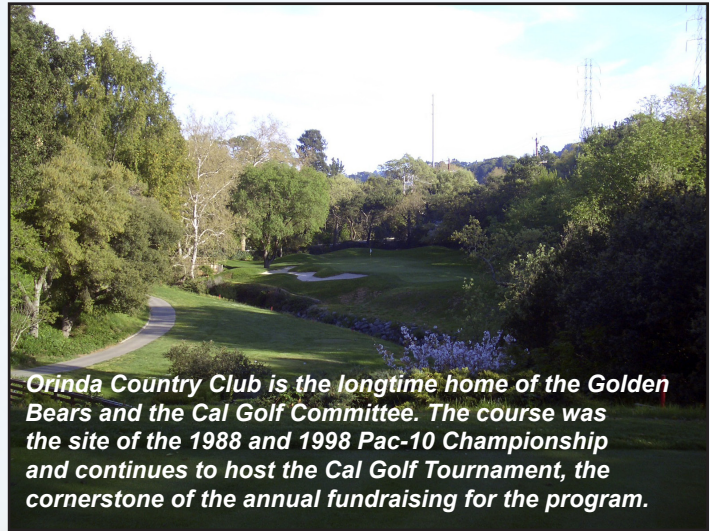

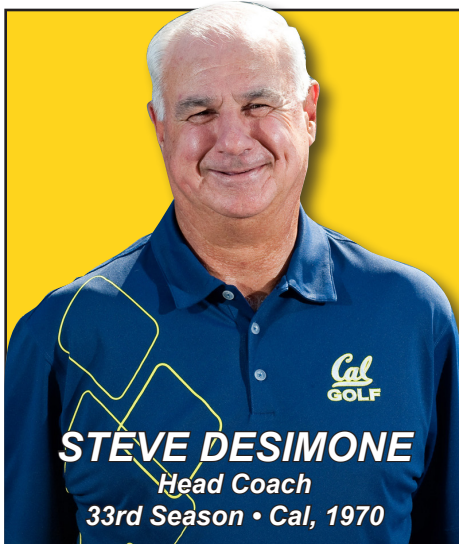

COACHING STAFF



Head coach Steve Desimone is in his 33rd season at the helm of the Cal men's golf team in 2011-12. The recent resurgence of the program has produced outstanding results over the last two-plus seasons. Cal tied for 19th a year ago at the 2011 NCAA Championship after finishing 23rd the previous season in the Golden Bears' first appearance at the event since winning the NCAA title in 2004. Cal has made five consecutive NCAA Regional appearances dating back to 2007.

Cal is well on its way to a third straight appearance at the NCAA Championship in 2012 after a strong series of events in the fall of 2011, winning twice and placing in the top five in each of its four fall tournaments. Cal won at the Wolverine Intercollegiate to open the season and also shared a victory with Oregon at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational hosted by the Bears. Cal ranked as high as No. 7 by Golfweek and No. 10 according to Golfstat at one point in the fall. The top individual performances came from Joël Stalter and Max Homa, who finished second at the Wolverine Intercollegiate and Alister MacKenzie, respectively, to lead the Bears to team victories. Homa led the squad with a 70.9 stroke average.

In 2010-11, Cal qualified for the NCAA Championship by finishing alone in third place at the NCAA Arizona Regional. Cal had a strong campaign, reaching as high as No. 13 in the national polls and equaling a school record with three regular-season tournament wins (The Prestige at PGA WEST, Alister MacKenzie Invitational, John A. Burns Intercollegiate) among its 14 events. All told, Cal had eight top-five finishes in 2010-11, also taking third at the Windon Memorial Classic and the Southern Highlands Collegiate Masters, placing fifth at the Pac-10 Championship and tying for fifth at the ASU Thunderbird Invitational. Michael Weaver was named an honorable mention Division I PING

All-American after posting an eighth-place finish at the NCAA Championship that was the highest ever by a Cal player. Stephen Hale, Homa and Eric Mina all picked up second-team All-Pac-10 selections, while Ben An was an honorable mention choice. Homa was the team's lone individual medalist, sharing the title at the John A. Burns Intercollegiate before falling in a playoff. An had a stretch of top-notch golf to lead the Bears during back-to-back team victories when he placed third at The Prestige at PGA WEST before tying for second at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational.

The amateur play during the summer of 2010 by members of the 2010-11 team was certainly noteworthy as a school-record six Bears – An, Jamie Coré, Homa, John Murphy, Ben Mangum and Mina – qualified for the U.S. Amateur at Chambers Bay in August. No other school in the country had as many qualifiers. An, an incoming freshman who had become the event's youngest winner ever at the age of 17 in 2009, reached the 2010 semifinals while attempting to defend his title. Homa made the quarterfinals before falling to eventual teammate An.

The 2010 calendar year was a banner year for Desimone that was capped off when he was one of seven members of the 2010 class inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America Hall of Fame during the Reception and Awards Banquet at the Tropicana Hotel in Las Vegas on December 6.

Cal tied for third place at the NCAA San Diego Regional in 2009-10 to reach the NCAA Championship. But the postseason successes of the team weren't the only highlights of the campaign. The Bears posted three regular-season victories to tie a school record, winning at the Spartan Golf Classic, the Alister MacKenzie Invitational and the Arizona Intercollegiate. Several individuals also had great accomplishments in 2009-10, highlighted by the Pac-10 individual medalist honors won by Mina as one of only two Cal men's golfers

to capture the event in its 54-year history, with Charlie Wi the other in 1995. Mina also won at the Spartan Golf Classic, while Hale captured the Alister MacKenzie Invitational. Weaver became the first Cal player to finish in the top 10 at both the Pac-10 Championship and NCAA Regionals, tying for sixth and taking eighth, respectively.

Prior to the 2009-10 season, the Bears had not advanced past the NCAA Regional level since winning the NCAA title in 2004.

The 2003-04 season was magical for Desimone as the

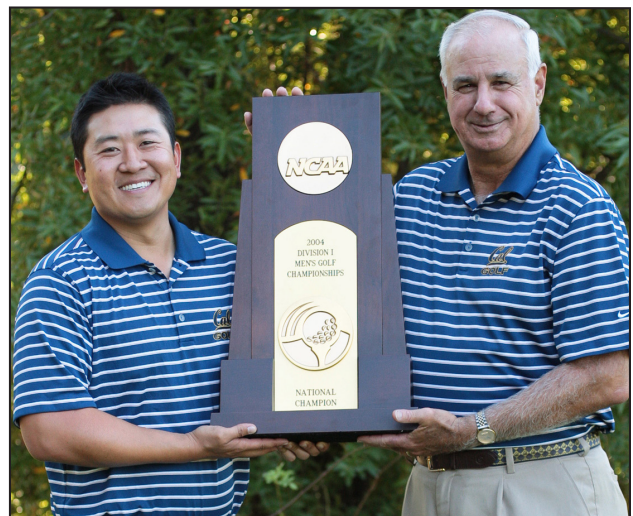
veteran coach was able to orchestrate one of the greatest stories in the history of NCAA golf. Cal came from eight strokes behind UCLA on the final day of competition at the NCAA Championship to win the national title by six strokes over the Bruins. It was the culmination of a season in which the Bears had to overcome several injuries but were able to play their best golf when it counted the most. As a result of his team's impressive accomplishment, Desimone was named Golfweek's Collegiate Coach of the Year, and was honored as 2004 Grand Master of the Year by the Northern California Golf Association.

All told, Desimone has directed Cal to 16 NCAA Regionals (1990, '93, '95, '97, '98, '99, 2000, '01, '02, '03, '04, '07, '08, '09, '10, '11) and seven NCAA Championship events (1995, '98, '99, 2000, '04, '10, '11). Through the fall of 2011, the Bears have won 40 tournaments during his tenure.

When Desimone came aboard as head coach in the fall of 1979 he was taking over a program which had lost its varsity status following the previous season. But Desimone was intent on not only returning the program to varsity status but taking it to a higher level. Among the first steps was the formation of the Cal Golf Committee in 1980, the primary support group for the golf team, which helped return the program to varsity status in 1982.

Soon after, Desimone began crafting Cal into the nationally respected golf program it has become today. In addition to developing a winning program, nine All-Americans (Dan Arroyo, Ben Furth, Jeff Hood, Garrett Larson, Han Lee, Eric Mina, Peter Tomasulo, Weaver, Wi) have earned 10 All-American honors, with Tomasulo contributing twice. The Bears have also had 10 All-America Scholars (Bill Albers, Dan Coyle, Walter Chun, Scott Carlyle, Furth,

George Gandranata, Hale, John Murphy, Tomasulo, Michael Wilson) that have picked up the award 16 times during Desimone's tenure, with the repeat selections accomplished by Chun, Carlyle, Furth, Hale, Tomasulo and Wilson. Carlyle was also selected a first-team Academic All-American in 2004.

By 1986-87, Desimone had Cal ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation for the first time in the history of the program. One outstanding performance that season was a dramatic comeback at San Diego State's Frank Scott Memorial Tournament. Trailing fourth-ranked Fresno State by 17 shots going into the final round, the Bears rallied to win their first major championship in 17 years. Cal's success that season helped Desimone win Pac-10 Conference Co-Coach of the Year.

During an outstanding 1989-90 campaign, Desimone brought the Bears' golf program to an unprecedented level. The team earned its first berth in the NCAA Championship in 26 seasons. Cal competed in the 1964 NCAA Championship, but didn't earn its first actual berth until 1990, two years after the NCAA switched to a selection/qualifying format. Cal played in 13 tournaments that year, placing among the top 10 in all but two, including a regular-season school-record-tying three team titles and a tie for third place at the Pac-10 Championship. In addition, the Bears were ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation throughout the season. Furth, the school's first All-American in men's golf and its only member of the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame, was a major contributor to the Bears' success that year.

The following season came to a disappointing conclusion for Desimone and the Bears. A career-ending back injury to Furth brought to an end the hope that 1990-91 would surpass Cal's great season the preceding year. Off the course, however, another important step in the rebuilding of the Cal men's golf program was undertaken. With the generous support of the Cal Golf Committee, a minimal amount of financial aid was offered to incoming student-athletes for the first time in 15 years. This was a critical step because it finally demonstrated the Bears were committed to competing nationally in all respects and gave Desimone a new and critical tool in recruiting.

The 1994-95 season stands as the second best in the history of Cal golf. The Bears finished second to Arizona State at the Pac-10 Championship, being selected for their third NCAA Regional berth in six years. Cal came up with a sixth-place showing at an NCAA Regional hosted by New Mexico in Albuquerque to qualify for the NCAA Championship and then was sixth again at the NCAA Championship hosted by Ohio State in Columbus. We led the way as Cal's first Pac-10 individual champion and a first-team All-American.

Wi is currently in his seventh year on the PGA Tour in 2012 and has finished second five times, most recently at the 2012 AT&T

Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Tomasulo has also played on the PGA Tour along with An, Robert Hamilton and Jesse Ruda, while several others continue to play professionally on other tours.

Desimone is also the former Manager of the University of California Golf Club, a 130-member Associate Club of the Northern California Golf Association, and a former member of the PING Advisory Committee for college golf. He served two stints on the NCAA Pacific Region Selection Committee for the NCAA Western Regional (1991-93, 2002-04) and was also on the campus-wide NCAA Self-Certification Committee in the mid-1990's.

Desimone graduated from Cal in 1970 after playing for the Bears' men's basketball team as an undergraduate. He then served in the United States military before returning to Cal to complete a double major in history and physical education, while also earning his master's degree in physical education. After graduating from Cal, Desimone left Berkeley to become the Director of Athletics at the College Preparatory School in Oakland where he remained until 1988. Desimone returned to Cal in 1980 as the men's golf head coach, and shared responsibilities with both jobs until 1988, when he joined Cal on a full-time basis.

Desimone lives in Orinda with his wife, Linda. The couple has two children. Kim graduated in 2006 from Cal Poly and Robert is a 2008 graduate of Northern Michigan.



A former Cal golf standout, Walter Chun is in his eighth season on the Golden Bears' coaching staff in 2011-12 and his third as associate head coach. Chun was promoted to his current role in September of 2009 after five seasons as an assistant coach. He was also an administrative assistant when Cal won the NCAA title in 2004.

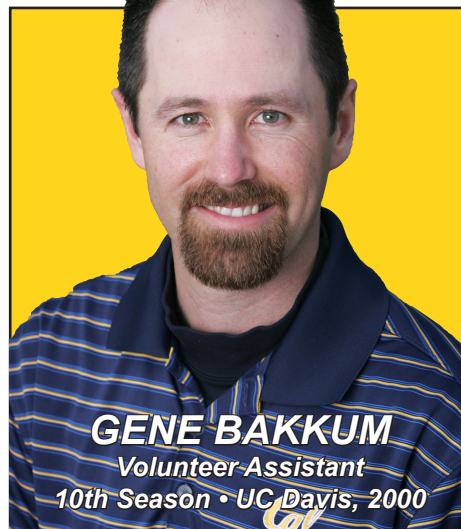
Chun has been recognized nationally for his recent coaching exploits. He was honored with the Jan Strickland Award as the nation's top assistant coach for his work during the

2007-08 season. In June of 2009, he served as a Team USA assistant coach for the Palmer Cup pitting the top eight American collegiate golfers against their European counterparts for an event that is considered the collegiate version of the Ryder Cup.

Chun has been associated with the Cal golf program since 1997 when he began his playing career for the Bears. He was a two-time team captain while competing three times in the NCAA Western Regional (2000-02) and once at the 2000 NCAA Championship. Chun has also qualified for two U.S. Amateur Championships, the first in 1999 at Pebble Beach and the second in 2002 at Oakland Hills Country Club.

Chun received his bachelor's degree from the Walter A. Haas School of Business at Cal in 2001, and his master's from Cal's Graduate School of Education in 2003. In addition to his success on the course, Chun was a three-time Pac-10 All-Academic selection (2000, '01, '02) and a two-time All-America Scholar (2001, '02).

He and his wife, Grace, live in Emeryville.



Gene Bakkum is in his 10th season at Cal in 2011-12 and his eighth as a volunteer assistant after a previous two-year stint as assistant coach (2002-04). Prior to arriving at Cal, he served two years as assistant men's golf coach for his alma mater UC Davis (2000-02), helping the Aggies to a No. 1 ranking in Division II golf and back-to-back NCAA West Regional appearances.

He is also currently in his eighth year as Assistant Director of Instruction at Metropolitan Golf Links in Oakland, and has instructed at the Nike Jr. Golf camps in Pebble Beach, where he also served as Assistant Director. In addition, he was previously the Director of the Nike Coaches All-Star Golf Academy in Phoenix, and has been affiliated with PGA of America since 2005.

He and his wife, Alicia, reside in Bay Point with their daughters Ava and Alaina.

Q&A WITH COACH DESIMONE

What are your goals in 2011-12?

“There is a series of goals and the first is to qualify for an NCAA Regional, and we certainly positioned ourselves well for that with our play in the fall. The next goal is to advance to the NCAA Championship, but the Regional is always a crapshoot because you have 13 or 14 teams in each Regional and only five advance to the NCAA Championship. Once you make the NCAA Championship, the next goal is to reach match play, then once you get to match play anybody can win. It’s a step by step process. There are four steps and the fourth step is to win it all.”

How did you balance your fall and spring schedules?

“We thought it would be better to play four tournaments in the fall since the team was in transition and had lost some great players from last season, take it a little on the slow side and see how things developed. I know most coaches thought we would probably take a steep dive after what was a really good season last year. Walter [Chun] and I both believed after the way our guys played over the summer that, if they brought those games back to campus with them in the fall that we would not drop off but rather have a chance to move up, which is what we have done. The spring season is back-loaded with great tournaments, one right after the other. We also have two match play events and given what the NCAA is doing with the final eight teams advancing to match play it made absolute sense for us to play as much match play as possible. As far as the rest of the spring schedule, we go to Southern Highlands again, which is one of the elite tournaments of the year, like a mini-NCAA Championship.

It gives you a feel for what you’re going to see two and a half months later at the NCAA’s. Of course, we also have the first Pac-12 Championship. The Pac-12 is clearly the dominant conference in college golf.”

After losing many of your top players from last year, how was Cal able to rebound so quickly in 2011-12?

“Our top-10 ranking for most of the fall was one of the best rankings we have ever had. When you look at where we were a year ago, that team included Eric Mina, an All-American and Pac-10 champion; Stephen Hale, a three-time All-Pac-10 Conference player; and Ben An, 2009 U.S. Amateur Champion and 2010 U.S. Amateur semifinalist, all great players and very much the heart of last year’s team. We then lost Michael Weaver to a redshirt year this season, which made it clear we were a team in real transition. But we also knew that there was real potential with some of the players in the program and incoming players who had demonstrated they could win in amateur and high school golf. Brandon Hagy was returning and no doubt he was a solid player. We had Michael Kim, who had a great summer in amateur golf and a great senior year in high school on a state championship team. We didn’t know how quickly Michael would get started in the fall, but we knew he would be competitive. Then, there was never a doubt where Max Homa would be. You knew right off the top that you had

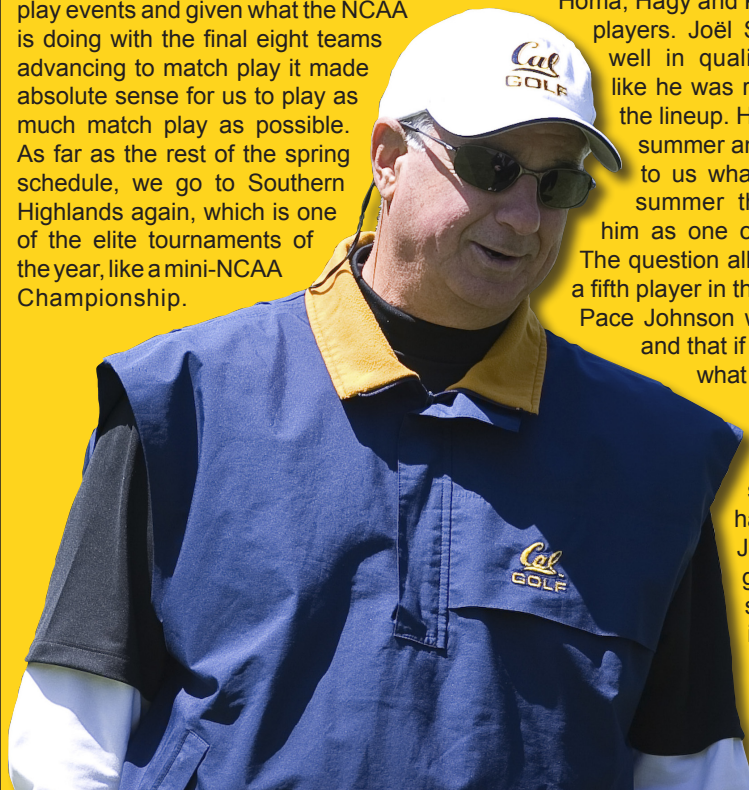
Homa, Hagy and Kim – three proven players. Joël Stalter had played well in qualifying and looked like he was ready to break into the lineup. He had an excellent summer and if he could bring to us what he had done all summer then we projected him as one of our top players. The question all along was finding a fifth player in the lineup. We knew Pace Johnson was transferring in and that if we could resurrect what he did his freshman year at Cal Poly then obviously we would have a good solid team. We also had fifth-year senior Jeff Hamm, a real grinder who had shown continuous improvement every

year. Finally, the real pleasant surprise for us may be the addition in the spring of Keelan Kilpatrick from Christchurch, New Zealand. Keelan has a strong amateur record in New Zealand and certainly will challenge for a spot in the lineup. The components were there, and coaches of opposing teams are much more surprised than we are.”

Can you talk about Cal’s recruiting prowess and the development of players?

“One thing I have learned over the years is that recruiting is never an exact science. When young men transition from high school and their families to college life, there is a significant change in their environment as they grow from teenagers to young men. One of my key responsibilities in the recruiting process is to explain in the best possible way the challenges and the great opportunities at the University of California. We want them to understand that our goal is to support them in every aspect of their life and to challenge them to be the best player, the best student and the best person they can be, and that we will hold them accountable. We recruit players that want to be open, that want to learn, that don’t just have a single way of doing things. It’s a real partnership and collaboration, and you have to have guys that hunger to improve to be the best. One of the key themes in the history of this program has been that it is up to our players to take from this experience, these wonderful years, everything they can from the University of California. We remind them frequently that when they leave, they will have lots of thoughts and memories, but most important, we want them to be honest with themselves and us and say NO REGRETS!”

We’ve recruited good players over the years, but we’ve also had a lot of success developing players. We have a partnership with players and coaches working together, identifying strengths and weaknesses and then really pinpointing what we need to do to work on those weaknesses. I give the players all the credit because they get it. We keep two huge statistical databases on the players and these are smart guys. You get to a point where the numbers don’t lie, and your game is what those numbers are telling us. It becomes so obvious that they accept that this is what their game is instead of resisting and being delusional. At that point, we start identifying what each player needs to work on and begin that process. We’ve done that for many years and we’ve done it with a lot of success.”



How much of golf is physical and how much mental?

"The golf swing is probably 10-20 percent of the game. I'm a firm believer that when you get to the back nine of the U.S. Open you have to be the toughest guy on the block. You've got to know in your heart that you're the best player and you can do it. It's difficult to do at every level, there's a lot going on out there in the mind. When you've got 10-12 minutes to think about every shot that mind is racing. You've got to be able to train it. Part of that is going through the learning process, the competitive process, being in the heat of battle. You have to learn how to pace yourself and how to keep your emotions under control. You can see that just about every great player that has ever played the game of golf has worked their way through each of these steps all the way to the top."

What worries you most about the 2011-12 team?

"To start with we're young. Experience is a factor, but I don't know how much. It didn't show in the fall and it may not be because these guys have all had success at various levels. The other big issue is keeping players healthy."

What does it mean to play golf at Cal?

"It means you've made a commitment to the University of California and to the golf program to be the best student, the best player and the best person you can be. All of those things work together. There's a great deal of pride our players have in the program. They also understand that they're part of a legacy and they want to leave a legacy, something that will be a part of this program forever. When your players are thinking like that, then you know they've had a great experience. As a coaching staff, those are some of the hopes and goals we have for our players."

Can you describe your coaching style?

"I've always thought of myself coaching in terms of the overall student-athlete experience at Cal. I'm certainly a different coach than I was 25-30, even 15-20 years ago. That basically stems from the fact that building this program was not easy, especially with no scholarships and no housing at the beginning. My coaching style now is much more laid-back, collaborative, and more interactive with our players simply because we have better athletes and better

students that are more committed and want to compete at the highest levels of collegiate and amateur golf. In the end, we're trying to provide the best student-athlete experience for our players. We want to do everything we can to help them develop into the best players they can be for this program, and if they decide to move on in the game when they finish, we want them prepared for those



next steps. I think we do a really good job of setting a foundation for our players, setting goals, giving them every opportunity to prove themselves, to develop as players, and within that context we want to work as hard as we possibly can. But we also want to have fun. One of the things that we tell our recruits and families is that we start every day with humor and chocolate. If you can understand both the symbolism and practical side of that perspective, then you can understand why Walter [Chun] and I have been such a great team and what our overriding philosophy is. Life has its interesting twists and turns, great moments and difficult times, but if you can enjoy life that's the chocolate part and if you can do it with a sense of humor that's the fun part. If you look at the players that have come out of our program over the years and what they're doing now, then an objective person might say that, so far, things have gone very well. We're always trying to do it better, we're always trying to improve but we've had a lot of great times, a lot of big laughs, and a lot of wonderful stories. I think when you put all of that together then just maybe we've done a few things right, and we're going to keep doing it that way."

Can you discuss the importance of the Metropolitan Golf Links short game facility in Oakland?

"You can't play golf if you don't have the golf courses and facilities, and without a doubt one of the most important components of both the men's and women's programs here at Cal is the short game facility at Metro. It opened four years ago, and it has paid dividends for both programs. It allows our players to hit virtually every shot they need to hit from 120 yards in. It's been fabulous, and the incredible improvements both teams have made in our short games have been obvious statistically and in competition."

How are you able to practice on so many fantastic golf courses?

"To have a nationally competitive golf program, you have to have great golf courses open their doors to you. We are so fortunate that this has been the case since I became head coach in 1979. We play so many great golf courses and the number has just increased over the years. It allows us to identify the players who are playing the best and are most ready to play in each event, and it also helps tremendously in recruiting. When recruits know we are playing some of the best courses in Northern California, coupled with the short game facility, that's a pretty good combination. It has certainly worked to our advantage over the years."

Can you talk about the importance of the Cal Golf Committee?

"There should be no doubt that without the committee and guys like Ed Arnold, Frank Brunk, Joffa Dale, Ken Lloyd, Bob Scuitto, and so many other Cal people, there would not be a Cal golf program. This was all the Cal Golf Committee. Yes, I've been the coach for 32 ½ years and from a programmatic standpoint I can say with a smile that things have gone well, but without the support of the Cal Golf Committee and its energy, none of this would have ever happened, and what a loss that would have been. No Peter Tomasulo, no Charlie Wi, no Ben Furth, no Walter Chun, no national championship, no All-America Scholars, and on and on. To think that none of this would have existed at Cal is an awful, tragic thought. No one knows with certainty they'll ever win another national championship, but I do know we're going to be competing for more and I do know that our student-athletes are getting a great education. They're playing really good golf and they're growing as people. All of that runs directly back to the Cal Golf Committee. It's one of the truly great success stories in the history of Cal Athletics."

GCAA HALL OF FAME INDUCTS STEVE DESIMONE

DESIMONE JOINS 2010 INDUCTION CLASS OF GOLF COACHES ASSOCIATION HALL OF FAME

Cal head coach Steve Desimone was one of seven members of the 2010 class inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America's Hall of Fame Class on December 6, 2010, at the GCAA Hall of Fame Reception and Awards Banquet at the Tropicana Hotel in Las Vegas.

"There are a lot of great people and great coaches in college golf's Hall of Fame, and many of them are the ones who really built college golf into the great sport that it is today," said Desimone upon his induction. "To be included in that group makes me smile and is something that will stay with me forever."

"It's still soaking in," added Desimone. "It's one of the two highest honors anyone

can receive in this profession along with winning an NCAA championship. There's no doubt that when you're selected to the Hall of Fame by your peers the respect that they show for the work you've done is very gratifying. It's an absolutely wonderful honor."

Others in the 2010 class included coaches Bob Alpers (Saint John's, Minn.), Kyle Blaser (Oklahoma City), Michael Carlisle (South Carolina-Aiken), Bobby Cornett (Texas Wesleyan) and Floyd Horgan (Brevard CC/Centenary). Additionally, writer Ron Balicki of Golfweek was inducted for his contributions to college golf.

Desimone was also quick to thank the Cal Golf Committee upon his Hall of Fame induction.

"This has been an incredible team effort to get Cal golf reinstated to varsity status and build it into a national-level program," said Desimone. "Cal Golf Committee Chairman Frank Brunk and I have had a shared vision about the program back to 1980. When I think of the Cal Golf Committee and all of the wonderful people who've made this vision come true, this has been an amazing team effort. They've all been part of the team that's helped me become a part of this honored Hall of Fame. I want to thank everyone that has helped, including all of the great players that have come through here over the last 31-plus years, because it never would have happened without them."

GOLDEN BEARS LOOKING TO RISE TO THE TOP

With four of the five players from last year's team that finished 19th at the NCAA Championship out of the equation for 2011-12, many thought this season would be a rebuilding year for Cal. That process has seemingly happened much faster than many expected.

Head coach Steve Desimone was not one of those.

"We knew we were young and we had lost a lot from last year, but we also knew we had some talented players," Desimone said. "Other people were a lot more surprised than we were with the way we played this fall."

The way the Golden Bears played was nearly as well as they ever have. Cal was one of the top teams in the nation last fall, achieving the school's highest ranking since capturing the 2004 national title when they were listed as the No. 7 team in the country at one point by Golfweek. Cal won two of the four tournaments it played in with victories at the season-opening Wolverine Intercollegiate and its own Alister MacKenzie Invitational (co-title with Oregon). The Bears also fared well in their other two events, tying for fourth at the prestigious Isleworth Collegiate Invitational that arguably featured the best field in the nation of any fall event, and placing fifth at the Golfweek Conference Challenge.

"We felt pretty good coming out of the fall season," Desimone said. "Anytime you finish the fall ranked among the nation's best teams you know you've had a great start to the season. Now it's time to build on that."

Junior Max Homa (Valencia, Calif./Valencia HS) was the one player returning from the five that played at the 2011 NCAA Championship and picked up right where he left off with a fantastic fall. He played in all four events and led the Bears with a 70.9 stroke average that was 1.3 shots better than his 2010-11 mark. He finished in the top eight three times, taking second at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational, tying for fifth at the Wolverine Intercollegiate and tying for eighth at the Golfweek Conference Challenge.

"Max is clearly one of the best players in the country," Desimone said. "There are no real weaknesses in his game."

Three other players – sophomores Brandon Hagy (Westlake Village, Calif./Westlake HS) and Joël Stalter (Amneville, France/INDP HS), and freshman Michael Kim (Del Mar, Calif./Torrey Pines HS) – also participated in each of the team's four fall events. Junior Pace Johnson (Fresno, Calif./Cal Poly/Clovis West HS), played in three of the four. Johnson transferred to Cal from Cal Poly prior to the beginning of the 2011-12 campaign. Stalter was the only one of the four to have seen any action for the Bears in 2010-11, having played in a pair of events last season.

Kim translated an impressive junior career to the college game with a 71.0 stroke average in the fall that was just shy of Homa as he totaled a mere two additional strokes over the 12 rounds both played. Kim matched Homa's three top-eight finishes. He tied for third at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational that included a second-round 65 that was the lowest by a Cal player at the 2011 event and the second-lowest overall by a team member during the fall season. Kim also tied for fifth in his collegiate debut at the Wolverine Intercollegiate

and tied for eighth at the Isleworth Collegiate Invitational.

"Michael is a wonderful player and a great addition to the team," Desimone said. "He does everything really well. He manages his game magnificently and doesn't try to do too much."

Stalter came out of the gates with his second-place finish at the Wolverine Intercollegiate and his career-low eight-under par 63 in the second round that tied a course record. Stalter finished the fall with a 72.8 stroke average and one other top 20 performance when he tied for 20th at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational.

"Joël is one of our most improved players," Desimone said of the native of France. "Now he's a veteran on campus and comfortable here. There is just a different air about him this year and you can see it translate to his game."

Hagy had a solid fall in his return from redshirting the 2010-11 season to focus on gaining admission to Cal's Haas School of Business. He posted three top-20 finishes – Wolverine Intercollegiate (T14th), Isleworth Collegiate Invitational (T16th), Alister MacKenzie Invitational (T17th) – and a 73.3 stroke average.

"Brandon is an outstanding all-around young man," Desimone said. "He has played some solid golf for us and is one of the key reasons we are ranked in the top 10."

Johnson, who was the Big West Freshman of the Year in 2009-10 during his first of two seasons at Cal Poly, played in the top spot in the lineup for the first two events of the fall be-

fore Homa took over that position for the final two. Johnson posted a 74.0 stroke average over his three events with top-20 showings at both the Golfweek Conference Challenge (T13th) and Wolverine Intercollegiate (T18th).

"Pace had an incredible stretch of qualifying play this fall that was the best in the history of the program," Desimone said. "He earned the top spot in our lineup early in the year."

Senior Jeff Hamm (Danville, Calif./Monte Vista HS) also played in one event for the Bears in the fall, tying for 37th at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational.

The remainder of the 13-player roster includes juniors Michael Weaver (Fresno, Calif./Clovis West HS) and Jamie Coré (Montreal, Canada/Phillips Exeter Academy), redshirt freshman Ben Mangum (Montgomery, Ala./The Montgomery Academy), and four true freshmen in Shotaro Ban (San Jose, Calif./Archbishop Mitty HS), Michael Culin (Plano, Texas/John Paul II HS), Keelan Kilpatrick (Christchurch, New Zealand/St. Bede's College) and Nick Thomas (Westlake Village, Calif./Chaminade College Prep).

Weaver is redshirting in 2011-12 to focus on gaining admission to Cal's Haas School of Business after being a mainstay in the team's lineup for most of the past two seasons. He was an honorable mention All-American in 2010-11 and had the best finish ever by a Cal player at the NCAA Championship when he finished eighth.

Coré saw limited action during the 2009-10 and '10-11 campaigns, while none of the freshmen have yet to play at Cal.

Three Cal players posted top five finishes to lead the Bears to a team victory at the season-opening Wolverine Intercollegiate hosted by Michigan. Cal (281-275-283 – 839, -13) tied a course record as a team at 13-under par and coasted to a 12-stroke win. Stalter (72-63-72 – 207, -6) started the final round at the par-71, 6,687-yard University of Michigan Golf Course on top of the leader board and stayed there before two late bogeys made him settle for second place one shot behind individual medalist Jace Long (67-73-66 – 206, -7) of Missouri. Stalter had moved into the lead heading into the final round after tying a 12-year-old course record when he shot an eight-under par 63 in the second round. Kim (68-69-74 – 211, -2) tied for fifth in his first collegiate tournament, as did Homa (72-69-70 – 211, -2). Hagy (70-74-70 – 214, +1) finished in a tie for 14th, while Johnson (71-74-71 – 216, +3) climbed eight spots during the final round to tie for 18th in his Cal debut.

The Bears' other fall victory came during a shootout at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational as Cal (273-267-271 – 811, -41) and Oregon (270-268-273 – 811, -41) battled all the way to the final putt before eventually sharing the team title at the par-71, 6,718-yard Meadow Club. Individual medalist Eugene Wong (65-63-67 – 195, -18) of Oregon made a six-foot

uphill birdie putt on the 18th hole to secure the Ducks' piece of the title after second-place individual finisher Homa (66-66-68 – 200, -13) had drained a 25-footer for a birdie to guarantee Cal a piece of the crown, giving the Bears at least a share of the MacKenzie title each of the past three seasons, five of the last six campaigns and six times in nine years since the tournament began in 2002. Kim (70-65-66 – 201, -12) finished in a tie for third, while Hagy (70-68-69 – 207, -6) tied for 17th, Stalter (72-68-68 – 208, -6) tied for 20th and Hamm (67-74-72 – 212, E) tied for 37th.

The team begins the spring portion of its 2011-12 schedule January 30-31 at the Arizona Intercollegiate played at Tucson National in Tucson, Ariz.

Cal will then look to defend its title at the John A. Burns Intercollegiate (Feb. 15-17) hosted by Hawai'i on the Arnold Palmer Course at Turtle Bay Resort on the north shore of Oahu, Haw.

The Bears begin an interesting stretch of the schedule Feb. 27-28 with the Del Walker Match Play Championship hosted by Long Beach State at the Virginia Country Club in Long Beach, Calif. The match play event will mark only the second occasion in school history and the first time since 2004 that the Bears will be involved in the format of play that has been used the past three seasons to decide the final eight places at the NCAA Championship.

After returning to stroke play March 9-11 for the prestigious Southern Highlands Collegiate Masters hosted by UNLV at the Southern Highlands Golf Club in Las Vegas, Nev., the Bears will be right back into match play action Mar. 18-20 with the Callaway Collegiate Match Play Championship hosted by South Florida at The Concession Golf Club in Bradenton, Fla.

After a short time off for spring break, Cal will finish its regular season with the ASU Thunderbird Invitational (Apr. 6-7) hosted by Arizona State at the ASU Karsten Golf Course in Tempe, Ariz., and the Western Intercollegiate (April 14-15) hosted by San Jose State at the Pasatiempo Golf Club in Santa Cruz, Calif.

The Pac-12 Championship will be hosted by Oregon State and played April 27-29 at the Trysting Tree Golf Club in Corvallis, Ore. Cal has never won a team title in the 54-year history of the event, with a top finish of second place in 1995. The Bears have also been third on four occasions (1992, '96, 2000, '08). Last year, Cal was fifth with Homa (38th) and Stalter (T48th) the only two members of this year's team to participate. Charlie Wi (1995) and Eric Mina (2010) have been individual champions.

NCAA postseason competition begins with Regional action at a site yet to be determined May 17-19. The six possible sites are Ann Arbor, Mich. (University of Michigan Golf Course); Athens, Ga. (University of Georgia Golf Course); Bowling Green, Ky. (The Club at Olde Stone); Greensboro, N.C. (Forest Oaks Country Club); Norman, Okla. (Jimmie Austin OU Golf Club); and Stanford, Calif. (Stanford University Golf Course). Cal has qualified for NCAA Regional competition each of the last five seasons and 16 times in school history. Last year, the Bears were third at the NCAA Arizona Regional in Tucson, Ariz.

A top-five Regional finish would put Cal back in the NCAA Championship for the third consecutive season. This year's event will be played May 29 – June 3 and hosted by USC at the Riviera Country Club in Pacific Palisades, Calif. Prior to tying for 19th a year ago when the tournament was played in Stillwater, Okla., the Bears were tied for 23rd in 2010 at The Honors Course in Ooltewah, Tenn. Cal won its lone NCAA title in 2004 in Hot Springs, Va., and has made a total of seven appearances in the NCAA Championship.
