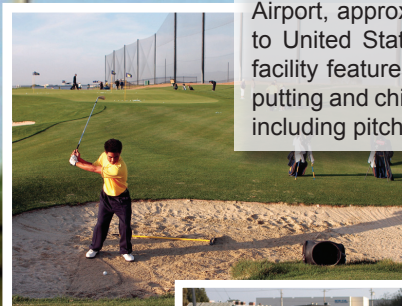
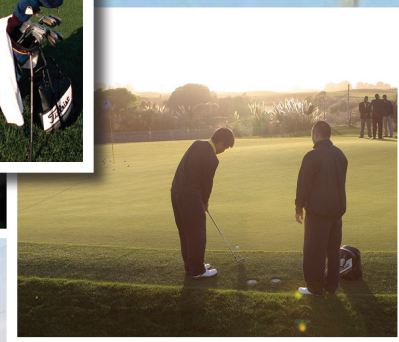
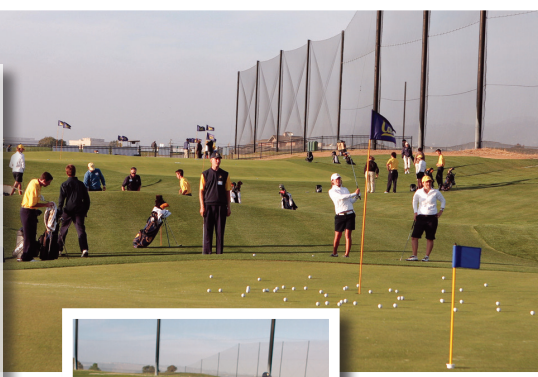

## CAL GOLF'S STATE-OF-THE-ART SHORT-GAME FACILITY

In a huge boost for the California men's and women's golf programs, the Golden Bears opened their new short-game facility at the Metropolitan Golf Links in Oakland in the fall of 2007.

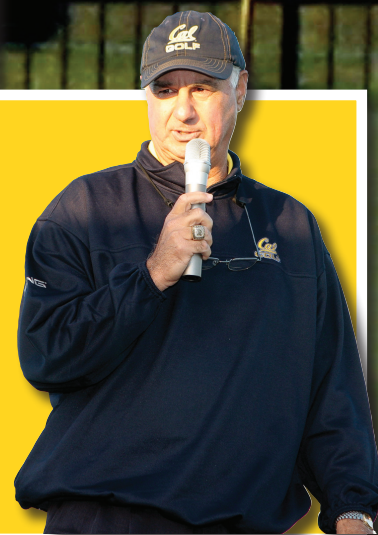
The Cal athletic department would like to thank everyone who combined to contribute approximately \$600,000 to bring the project to fruition. The lead donors were Ed and Mollie Arnold, Ellen and Joffa Dale, Jay deBenedetti, Lon and Becci Haskew, Judy Isaac, and Pat and Kent Newmark.

The programs broke ground on the privately-funded project in 2006 after a long planning process. The two-and-a-half acre state-of-the-art short-game facility is conveniently located on the southwest corner of the Metropolitan Golf Links near the Oakland International Airport, approximately 15 minutes from campus. Built to United States Golf Association specifications, the facility features two extremely large greens – one for putting and chipping, and the other for the aerial game, including pitching and bunker play.



*"This was a dream of mine and Cal men's golf for 27 years and for the women's program since its inception in 1994-95. The facility will help improve our players from 120 yards and in. Both teams can always be more efficient in that area. It will also help in terms of recruiting because it will make us more competitive with the best programs in the country. 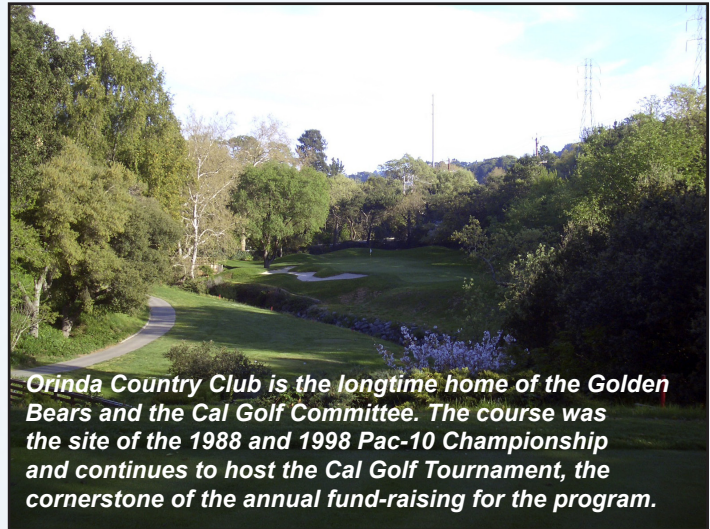

## COACHING STAFF



Head coach Steve Desimone is in his 34th season at the helm of the Cal men's golf team in 2012-13 and has his club ranked No. 1 in all national polls and off to the best start in school history heading into the spring portion of the schedule. Desimone has led his program to sustained success over nearly three and a half decades and the school's lone men's golf national title in 2004. The run his team has put together from the beginning of the 2011-12 campaign through the fall of 2012 is unprecedented not only at Cal but perhaps on a national level with the Golden Bears winning 11 of their 19 events during the stretch and finishing in the top five in all 19.

Cal won each of its five events (Gopher Invitational, PING/Golfweek Preview, Pac-12 Preview, Alister MacKenzie Invitational and Isleworth Collegiate Invitational) during the 2012-13 fall season for the first time in school history. Michael Kim (Isleworth Collegiate Invitational) and Brandon Hagy (Alister MacKenzie Invitational) also won individual medalist honors during the run. In addition, the Bears swept the Pac-12's Player of the Month honors in the fall, with Kim taking the October award after Max Homa had won in September. Kim paced the team with a 70.1 stroke average and finished in the top 10 in each of the five tournaments. Hagy (70.9), Homa (71.1) and Michael Weaver (71.4) posted three top-10 finishes each, while Joël Stalter (71.2) had two. Kim ended the fall as the nation's second-ranked player according to Golfweek, while Homa (17), Hagy (22), Weaver (25) and Stalter (38) were also in the top 40. Hagy, Homa, Kim and Weaver were also among the 16 players nationally to participate in Walker Cup practices after the fall season.

The team's 2012-13 start comes on the heels of arguably the best season in school

history in 2011-12 when Desimone was named the Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the second time in his career and added GCAA/Eaton West Regional Coach of the Year honors for the first time. His 2011-12 squad reached the national semifinals before falling just shy of the school's second national championship. The Bears posted a series of firsts along the way that included a trip to NCAA Championship match play as well as a match play victory in the national quarterfinals at The Riviera Country Club. Cal also won NCAA Regional and Pac-12 titles at Stanford and Oregon State for the first time, posted a school-record six tournament wins that doubled the previous total, and had top-five finishes in each of the squad's 14 events. Cal finished the season ranked No. 3 by both Golfstat and in the Golf World/Nike Golf Division I Coaches Poll, while Golfweek put the Bears at No. 6. The squad featured three PING Division I All-Americans in Hagy, Homa and Kim.

The first of the team's 11 victories over the past season and a half came at the Wolverine Intercollegiate to open the 2011-12 season. Cal also shared a victory with Oregon at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational hosted by the Bears in the fall. The team's Pac-12 and NCAA Regional wins in the two events leading up to the NCAA Championship were preceded by victories at the John A. Burns Intercollegiate and ASU Invitational earlier in the spring. Cal also finished second twice by a single stroke during the spring season to host schools Arizona at the Arizona Intercollegiate and UNLV at the Southern Highlands Collegiate Masters. Hagy, Homa and Kim were each named second-team All-Pac-12 and shared team MVP honors, with Kim adding the squad's Newcomer of the Year award.

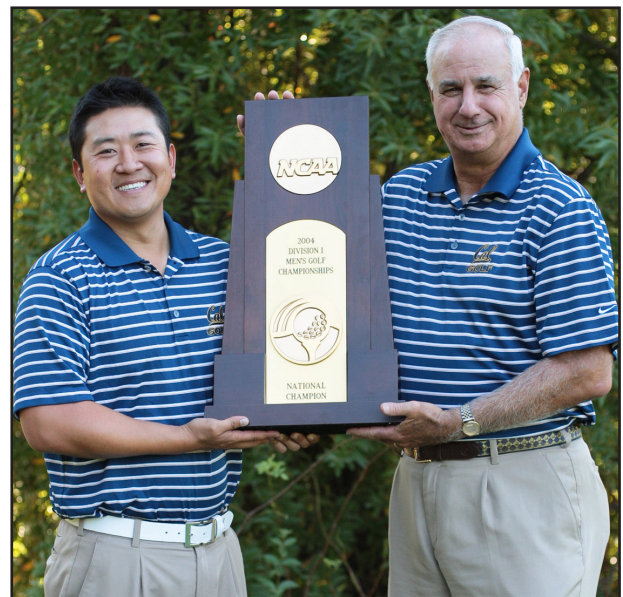
Stalter was honorable mention all-conference and the team's Most Improved Player. Homa (71.2) narrowly edged Hagy (71.4) and Kim (71.4) for the team's lowest stroke average. Homa tied for ninth individually at the NCAA Championship, which was the second-highest finish ever by a Cal player. All three finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Stanford Regional, giving Cal three top-10 players at an NCAA Regional for

the first time in school history and making Homa the first player ever at Cal to finish in the top 10 at both the NCAA Championship and NCAA Regional, where he tied for 10th. Hagy (T5th) and Stalter (T9th) had top-10 showings at the Pac-12 Championship.

In between the last two seasons, Cal players made arguably the strongest showing ever by a school at the U.S. Amateur at Cherry Hills Country Club in Denver, Colo., during August of 2012 when four of the school's national-best five qualifiers reached the Round of 64. Michael Weaver would go on to reach the finals, with Hagy making the semis, Homa the Round of 32 and Kim the Round of 64. Walker Huddy was a participant in the stroke-play portion of the event.

Cal moved up 16 spots at the 2012 NCAA Championship from the 19th-place tie slot the Bears had finished in at the 2011 NCAA's at Karsten Creek in Stillwater, Okla. Cal had a strong campaign in 2010-11, reaching as high as No. 13 in the national polls and equaling a then-school record with three regular-season tournament wins (The Prestige at PGA WEST, Alister MacKenzie Invitational, John A. Burns Intercollegiate) among its 14 events. All told, Cal had eight top-five finishes in 2010-11, also taking third at the NCAA Arizona Regional, Windon Memorial Classic and Southern Highlands Collegiate Masters, placing fifth at the Pac-10 Championship and tying for fifth at the ASU Thunderbird Invitational. Weaver was named a PING Division I All-American after posting an eighth-place finish at the NCAA Championship that was the highest ever by a Cal player. Stephen Hale, Homa and Eric Mina all picked up second-team All-Pac-10 selections, while Byeong Hun (Ben) An was an honorable mention choice. Homa was



the team's lone individual medalist, sharing the title at the John A. Burns Intercollegiate before falling in a playoff. An had a stretch of top-notch golf to lead the Bears during back-to-back team victories when he placed third at The Prestige at PGA WEST before tying for second at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational.

The amateur play during the summer of 2010 by members of the 2010-11 team was noteworthy as a school-record six Bears – An, Jamie Coré, Homa, John Murphy, Ben Mangum and Mina – qualified for the U.S. Amateur at Chambers Bay in August. No other school in the country had as many qualifiers. An, an incoming freshman who had become the event's youngest winner ever at the age of 17 in 2009 at Southern Hills in Tulsa, Okla., reached the 2010 semifinals at Chambers Bay, Wash., while attempting to defend his title. Homa made the quarterfinals before falling to eventual collegiate teammate An.

The 2010 calendar year was a banner 12 months for Desimone that was capped off when he was one of seven members of the 2010 class inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America Hall of Fame during the Reception and Awards Banquet at the Tropicana Hotel in Las Vegas on December 6.

After winning its lone national title in 2004, Cal missed the NCAA Championship for five consecutive seasons (2005-09) before returning to its spot among the nation's elite teams by finishing 23rd at the 2010 NCAA Championship at The Honors Course in Chattanooga, Tenn. Cal qualified by tying for third place at the NCAA San Diego Regional. The Bears also posted three regular-season victories to tie a then-school record, winning at the Spartan Golf Classic, the Alister MacKenzie Invitational and the Arizona Intercollegiate. Several individuals also had great accomplishments during the season, highlighted by the Pac-10 individual medalist honors won by Mina at Arizona State as one of only two Cal men's golfers to ever capture the event, with current PGA Tour pro Charlie Wi the other in 1995 at Washington State. Mina, who earned PING Division I All-American honors, also won at the Spartan Golf Classic while Hale captured the Alister MacKenzie Invitational. Weaver became the first Cal player to finish in the top 10 at both the Pac-10 Championship and NCAA Regionals, tying for sixth and taking eighth, respectively.

Prior to its current three-year run, the team's previous appearance at the NCAA Championship came at the end of the magical 2003-04 campaign when Desimone orchestrated one of the greatest stories in the history of college golf as Cal came from eight strokes behind UCLA on the final day

of competition in the NCAA Championship at The Homestead in Virginia to win the national title by six strokes over the Bruins. It was the culmination of a season in which the Bears had to overcome several injuries but were able to play their best golf when it counted the most. As a result of his team's impressive accomplishment, Desimone was named Golfweek's Collegiate Coach of the Year, and was honored as 2004 Grand Master of the Year by the Northern California Golf Association.

The California Golf Writers & Broadcasters Association has announced it will heap another prestigious honor on Desimone when he becomes the first coach to be presented with the Jack Lemmon Ambassador of Golf Award at the organization's 54th annual gala event at The Inn at Spanish Bay during the week of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am on February 5, 2013.

When Desimone came aboard as head coach in the fall of 1979 he was taking over a program which had lost its varsity status following the previous season. But Desimone was intent on not only returning the program to varsity status but taking it to a higher level. Among the first steps was the formation of the Cal Golf Committee in 1980, the primary support group for the men's golf team, which helped return the program to varsity status in 1982. Soon after, Desimone began crafting Cal into the nationally elite program it has become today.

By 1986-87, Cal was ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation for the first time in the history of the program. One outstanding performance that season was a dramatic comeback at San Diego State's Frank Scott Memorial Tournament. Trailing fourth-ranked Fresno State by 17 shots going into the final round, the Bears rallied to win their first major championship in 17 years. Cal's success that season helped Desimone win Pac-10 Conference Co-Coach of the Year honors for the first time.

During an outstanding 1989-90 campaign, Desimone brought the Bears' golf program to a then-unprecedented level. The team earned its first NCAA postseason berth in 26 seasons by qualifying for an NCAA Regional. Cal competed in the 1964 NCAA Championship, but didn't actually earn its first berth until 1990 at New Mexico State, two years after the NCAA switched to a selection/qualifying format. Cal played in 13 tournaments that year, placing among the top 10 in all but two, including a then-regular-season school-record-tying three team titles and a tie for third place at the Pac-10 Championship. In addition, the Bears were ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation throughout the season. Ben Furth, the school's first All-American in men's golf and still its only member of the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame, was

a major contributor to the Bears' success.

The following season came to a disappointing conclusion for Desimone and the Bears. A career-ending back injury to Furth brought to an end the hope that 1990-91 would surpass Cal's great season the preceding year. Off the course, however, another important step in the rebuilding of the program was undertaken. With the generous support of the Cal Golf Committee, a minimal amount of financial aid was offered to incoming student-athletes for the first time in 15 years. This was a critical step because it finally demonstrated the Bears were committed to competing nationally in all respects and gave Desimone a new and critical tool in recruiting.

The 1994-95 season was historic as the Bears qualified for their first ever NCAA Championship and posted the best finish in school history at the time and still the third best ever by taking sixth in the event hosted by Ohio State in Columbus. Cal was appearing at the NCAA Championship for the first time since 1964 when there was no selection/qualifying format. The Bears were previously selected to play in their third NCAA Regional berth in the past six years and came up a sixth-place showing at an NCAA Regional hosted by New Mexico in Albuquerque after a second-place finish to Arizona State at the Pac-10 Championship. Wi led the way by earning first-team All-American honors and was Cal's first Pac-10 individual champion, while Garrett Larson picked up honorable mention All-American recognition.

Cal returned to the NCAA Championship for three consecutive years from 1998-2000, finishing 15th at New Mexico, 16th at Minnesota and 17th at Auburn, respectively. The Bears were tied for fourth at the NCAA Tempe Regional, fourth at the NCAA Tucson Regional and tied for 10th at the Madera Regional during those three seasons, respectively, after finishing fourth, fifth and third at the Pac-10 Championship.

The 1997-98 team led by All-American Dan Arroyo used the best final round of the day at the NCAA Tempe Regional to advance to the NCAA Championship and then was the final team to make the cut at the national event before eventually settling for its 15th place finish.

Arroyo was back again in 1998-99 and led a now-veteran group that also included 2001 U.S. Amateur runner-up Robert Hamilton to its 16th place national finish. The Bears missed a playoff at the NCAA's to have an opportunity to make the cut by a single shot.

The 1999-2000 squad featured All-American Han Lee and current associate head coach Walter Chun. The Bears needed a dramatic finish at the 2000 NCAA Regional at Riverbend Golf Club in Madera when Chun birdied his last hole of the tournament

to force a three-team playoff for the final spot to advance to the NCAA Championship. The Bears would eventually win the playoff on the third hole, beating Stanford and Idaho. At the NCAA's, Cal would miss making the cut by a single shot while Hamilton would move on in the championship as an individual.

All told, Desimone has directed Cal to the NCAA Championship eight times (1995, '98, '99, 2000, '04, '10, '11, '12), including a current school-record-tying stretch of three in a row, while the Bears have played in 17 NCAA Regionals (1990, '93, '95, '97, '98, '99, 2000, '01, '02, '03, '04, '07, '08, '09, '10, '11, '12) with a current run of six straight that is two shy of the school-record eight in a row the Bears put together from 1997-2004. Cal has won 49 tournaments overall during Desimone's tenure.

Desimone has coached 12 All-Americans (Arroyo, Furth, Hagy, Homa, Jeff Hood, Kim, Larson, Lee, Mina, Peter Tomasulo, Weaver, Wi) who have earned 13 All-American honors, with Tomasulo contributing twice. Tomasulo also played in the Palmer Cup in 2003.

Wi is in his eighth season on the PGA Tour in 2013 and has finished second five times, most recently at the 2012 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Wi and James Hahn, who played at Cal in 2000-01, both played in the 2012 U.S. Open. Hahn finished fifth on the final Web.com Tour money list in 2012 to earn his PGA Tour card for the first time in 2013 and promptly tied for fourth in the second tournament of the season at the Humana Challenge. Tomasulo has also played on the PGA Tour, while An, Robert Hamilton, Jesse Ruda and Michael Wilson have competed in PGA Tour events. Several others have played professionally on other tours, with George Gandranata, Hale, Jeff Hamm, Lee, Mina and Murphy currently active in the professional ranks. Weaver will play at the 2013 Masters and U.S. Open thanks to his runner-up finish at the 2012 U.S. Amateur.

The Bears have also had success in the classroom during Desimone's tenure with 10 All-America Scholars (Bill Albers, Dan Coyle, Chun, Scott Carlyle, Furth, Gandranata, Hale, Murphy, Tomasulo, Michael Wilson) that have combined to earn the award 16 times, with repeat selections accomplished by Chun, Carlyle, Furth, Hale, Tomasulo and Wilson. Carlyle was also selected a first-team Academic All-American in 2004.

In addition to his duties as Cal's head coach, Desimone was the former Manager of the University of California Golf Club (1979-2010), a 130-member Associate Club of the Northern California Golf Association, as well as a former member of the PING Advisory Committee for college golf. He also served two stints on the NCAA Pacific Region Selection Committee for the NCAA Western

Regional (1991-93, 2002-04) and was on the campus-wide NCAA Self-Certification Committee in the mid-1990's.

Desimone played for the Bears' men's basketball team as an undergraduate and then served in the United States military before returning to Cal to complete a double major in history and physical education, while also earning his master's degree in physical education. After graduating from Cal, Desimone left Berkeley to become the Director of Athletics at the College Preparatory School in Oakland where he remained until 1988. Desimone returned to Cal in the fall of 1979 as the men's golf head coach, and shared responsibilities with both jobs until 1988, when he joined Cal on a full-time basis.

Desimone lives in Orinda with his wife, Linda. The couple has two children. Kim graduated in 2006 from Cal Poly and Robert is a 2008 graduate of Northern Michigan.



A former Cal golf standout, Walter Chun is in his ninth season on the Golden Bears' coaching staff in 2012-13 and his fourth as associate head coach, with the Bears making the NCAA Championship in each of his first three campaigns in his current role after a previous five-year absence. Chun was promoted to his current role in September of 2009 after five seasons as an assistant coach. He was also as an administrative assistant when Cal won the NCAA title in 2003-04.

Cal started the 2012-13 campaign by winning all five events in the fall for the first time in school history. The Bears also had several firsts in 2011-12, including an NCAA match play victory in the quarterfinals, a trip to match play at the NCAA Championship, NCAA Regional and Pac-12 titles, a school-record six victories to double the previous record and top-five finishes in all 14 events.

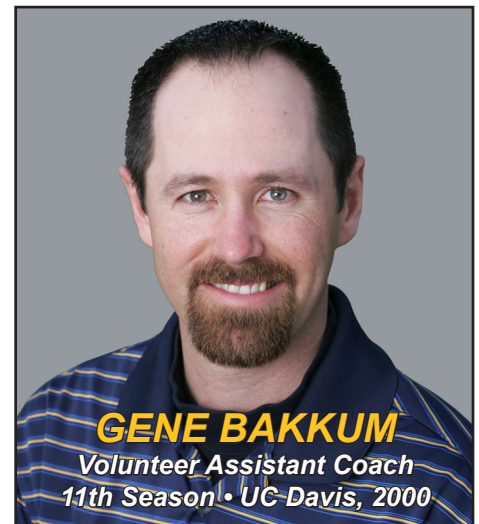
Chun has been recognized nationally for his coaching exploits. He was honored with the Jan Strickland Award as the nation's top assistant coach for his work during the 2007-

08 season. In June of 2009, he served as a Team USA assistant coach for the Palmer Cup pitting the top eight American collegiate golfers against their European counterparts for an event that is considered the collegiate version of the Ryder Cup.

Chun has been associated with the Cal men's golf program since 1997 when he began his playing career for the Bears. He was a two-time team captain while competing on three occasions in the NCAA West Regional (2000-02) and once at the NCAA Championship (2000). Chun has also qualified for two U.S. Amateur Championships, the first in 1999 at Pebble Beach and the second in 2002 at Oakland Hills Country Club.

Chun received his bachelor's degree from the Haas School of Business at Cal in 2001, and his master's from Cal's Graduate School of Education in 2003. He was a three-time Pac-10 All-Academic selection (2000, '01, '02) and a two-time All-America Scholar (2001, '02).

He and his wife, Grace, live in Hayward along with their newborn son, William.



Gene Bakkum is in his 11th season at Cal in 2012-13 and his ninth as a volunteer assistant after a previous two-year stint as assistant coach (2002-04). Prior to arriving at Cal, he served for two seasons as assistant men's golf coach for his alma mater UC Davis (2000-02), helping the Aggies to a No. 1 ranking in Division II golf and back-to-back NCAA West Regional appearances.

He is also currently in his ninth year as assistant director of instruction at Metropolitan Golf Links in Oakland, and has instructed at the Nike Jr. Golf camps in Pebble Beach, where he also served as assistant director. Bakkum was previously the director of the Nike Coaches All-Star Golf Academy in Phoenix, and has been affiliated with PGA of America since 2005.

He and his wife, Alicia, reside in Pleasant Hill with their daughters Ava and Alaina.

## Q&A WITH COACH DESIMONE

### *What are your goals for the 2012-13 season?*

“We want to get back to the NCAA Championship and give ourselves a shot at the national title. There are very high expectations here. We kind of sneaked up on everybody last year, but we’re not going to sneak up on anybody this year. Anything short of playing for the national title would not necessarily be underachieving, but it would be a disappointment. But golf is an interesting and difficult game. You just don’t know. Do you get the right bounce or the wrong bounce? Do you make a close putt or miss it? Still, I am confident that if we stay healthy we will have a great shot at returning to the NCAA Championship and that’s really the first goal. Once we get there, we have to play well to put ourselves in a position to win. I think the chances are good that we will do that, but a lot of good things have to happen between now and the end of the season.”

### *Can you talk about the courses that the Pac-12 Championship and NCAA Championship will be played on this year?*

“Let’s start with the North Course at The Los Angeles Country Club that the Pac-12 Championship will be played on because I am very familiar with it. I’ve played it many times and it is one of the best golf courses not only in the country but in the world, especially after it was remodeled in the mid-2000’s. It will be one of the best tests ever for the Pac-12 Championship and a great experience for all of the teams. It’s a wonderful statement about the conference that a course like this is willing to host our championship. As for the Crabapple Course at the Capital City Club in Atlanta where the NCAA Championship will be played, the only experience I have with the course is playing the PING/Golfweek Preview there last fall. The course sets up well for us. We played some good golf there at the PING/Golfweek Preview and will have a good game plan for the NCAA Championship. Of course, we have to get Atlanta first.”

### *What do you think the carryover from last season will be for this year’s team?*

“If you go back to the 2004 NCAA Championship, the seeds of winning that title were really set at the 2002 NCAA Regional when we missed making the NCAA’s by a single shot. There was a feeling that we were not going to let that happen again and we were going to commit ourselves to winning the

championship. We knew we were going to redshirt a couple of players in 2002-03 and would have a tough time getting there, but during the 2003-04 season the feeling from the 2002 and 2003 NCAA Regionals was something that still carried over to our team. That really was our rallying cry for those two years. Fast forward to now and I can tell you that as soon as we lost to Alabama in the NCAA semifinals last year, I told the guys on our team that I wanted them to remember how they felt that day because this cannot and will not happen again. I told them I wanted them to remember the feeling when we got to Atlanta the next year, and that we are not going to go through this a second time, and they got it. We’ve been talking about it ever since. Being as close as we were to a second national championship trophy and how difficult it was to lose last year has been tremendous motivation for the guys.”

### *Can you discuss the academic prowess players in the Cal men’s golf program have shown?*

“We’ve had a tremendous amount of academic success because most of our players have truly accepted the challenge of both school and golf. We’ve sold the program based on those two challenges, and having a great experience at Cal, too. We’ve had so many of our guys do extremely well. In 2009 and 2010, we were the top academic team among all 29 programs at Cal, and we’re still right near the top. Most importantly we have three student-athletes in the Haas School of Business when no other program in the history of Cal Athletics has ever had more than two at the same time. There has been a tremendous amount of academic achievement for the young men in our program and I certainly see that continuing. We are recruiting for that.”

### *What is your biggest concern about the 2012-13 season?*

“It’s the same thing I said a year ago, and that’s staying healthy. When Ben An got sick at the NCAA’s in 2011 any chance we had of winning disappeared. We also had a little bit of a lull last March when Michael Kim was hurt and sick and missed the Del Walker Match Play Championship, Joël Stalter was sick at the Callaway Collegiate Match Play Championship, and I was even sick and missed the Southern Highlands Collegiate Masters. We still competed at a very high level during those tournaments, but we could have won all three of them had we been healthy. You’re going to run into these types of issues. Fortunately this team has tremendous depth and that should help as

the season evolves. We have at least seven or maybe eight players that can legitimately compete for a spot in our top five. I’ve had guys joke with me that qualifying is going to be impossible. [Associate head coach] Walter [Chun] and I hear that and we smile and say ‘that sounds great to us.’ In order to stay in the lineup, our guys are going to have to be really sharp and play really well.”

### *Can you talk about the program’s philosophy in terms of recruiting and player development?*

“We’ve had a lot of success both in recruiting and developing players. In all honesty, we haven’t had a lot of guys ranked highly as junior golfers, but what it takes to succeed at Cal isn’t just hitting the golf ball and making a putt. Still, when you have success you have more and more good players interested in what you’re doing and how you’re doing it, and that’s what’s going on. We’re in a position where we are solid enough financially to compete for the best players, and mid-level junior players who wouldn’t have looked at us in the past are doing so very seriously now. We feel like once we get a player here who has some ability and the willingness to learn we can help to develop them into a top-notch player.”

### *Can you describe your coaching style and has it changed over the years?*

“I don’t know that anything has changed much. Certainly I think all coaches, especially veteran coaches, go through a period at the end of each season and again before the upcoming season where we self-evaluate. We sit back and ask ... What went right? What went wrong? What can we do better? Once you kind of solidify that then you do the same thing a couple of weeks before the next season starts and ask yourself if you are you still comfortable with the conclusions and the things you want to do in the upcoming season. When you have a program that works as well as this program has over the years, the old saying ‘if it ain’t broke, don’t fix it’ is usually a pretty good one. For the most part we will continue to do what we’re doing, maybe tweak a little bit but other than that we’re going to stay the course.”

### *How ready are you and the team for the 2013 spring season?*

“These guys are up for this. They are so ready for the next four months. You just sense that they know what’s there and they want to get after it.”

**Can you talk about the annual Cal Golf Tournament and its role in your fund-raising efforts?**

“Our annual Cal Golf Tournament is set for Sept. 16, 2013, again at Orinda Country Club. It is the most important non-competitive day of the year for our program. We raise roughly a third of the funds necessary to operate the team during the year from that one event. It is a critical day for us, and we can’t function without it. It’s a fun day. We call it a tournament, but it is really a party and a celebration from start to finish. When you have as many returnees to the tournament as we do, you know people are having a lot of fun and believe in what we’re doing. They believe in the product we have, which in the end is the young men in this program and how they’re playing, how they’re achieving academically and how they’re functioning as people in society. It’s gratifying for us that we get that kind of support because we wouldn’t if the program were in a different mode or headed in a different direction.”

**How important is the Cal Golf Committee?**

“There should be no doubt that without the committee and guys like Ed Arnold, Russ Bigelow, Frank Brunk, Joffa Dale, Ken Lloyd, Bob Scuitto, and so many other friends of Cal golf, there would not be a Cal men’s golf program. This was all the Cal Golf Committee. Yes, I’ve been the coach for 33 ½ years and from a programmatic standpoint I can say with a smile that things have gone well. But without the support of the Cal Golf Committee and its energy, none of this would have happened, and what a loss that would have been. No Charlie Wi, no Peter Tomasulo, no Ben Furth, no Walter Chun, no Max Homa, no national championship, no All-Americans, no All-America Scholars, the 2012-13 team would not exist, and on and on. To think that none of this would have existed at Cal is an awful, tragic thought. No one knows with certainty if we’ll ever win another national championship, but I do know we’re going to be competing for more and I do know that our student-athletes are getting a great education. They’re playing really good golf and they’re growing as people. All of that runs directly back to the Cal Golf Committee. It’s one of the truly great success stories in the history of Cal Athletics.”

**Can you talk about the importance of the team’s facilities?**

“It’s very important and gratifying that the local clubs both public and private have opened their doors to us for so many years. You simply can’t run a competitive national golf program without great support from the local clubs. We must have great golf courses on which to play and qualify on. Without the ability to identify our best players on a regular basis on championship golf courses, we just wouldn’t have the program we have now. Lastly, we also have a tremendous short-game practice facility now that has made a huge difference in our program. Our facilities are the lifeblood of our program.”

**Do you have any concerns about peaking too early?**

“I don’t worry about peaking at all. If you look at our progression over the last year and a half, we have been very steady. We really have not seen any highs and lows out of this group. Part of that reason is we have five great players in the lineup at each tournament, so the odds that two or three of those players are going to go sideways at any time are really low. Most teams have one or two guys that could be their top player each week, but you can make the case that we have five guys who could be No. 1. That’s why we’ve seen the steady, great play over the last year and a half.”

**What does it mean to play golf at Cal?**

“It means you’ve made a commitment to the University of California and our golf program to be the best student-athlete and the best person you can be. All of those things work together. There’s a great deal of pride our players have in the program. They also understand that they’re part of a legacy, something that will be a part of this program forever. When your players are thinking like that, then you know they’ve had a great experience. As a coaching staff, those are some of the hopes and goals we have for our players.”

**How much of golf is physical and how much mental?**

“The golf swing is probably 10-20 percent of the game. I’m a firm believer that when you get to the back nine of the U.S. Open you have to be the toughest guy on the block. You’ve got to know in your heart

that you’re the best player and you can do it. It’s difficult to do at every level, there’s a lot going on out there in the mind. When you’ve got 10-12 minutes to think about every shot that mind is racing. You must be able to train it. Part of that is going through the learning process, the competitive process, being in the heat of battle. You have to learn how to pace yourself and how to keep your emotions under control. You can see that just about every great player that has ever played the game has worked their way through each of these steps all the way to the top.”

**Can you talk about the individual honors you’ve won recently?**

“The coaches voted me as the Pac-12 Coach of the Year for 2011-12 and that was very special because my peers thought I did the best job and should be rewarded. As far as being named the NCAA Regional Coach of the Year also last season that’s just another one of those wonderful honors that I’ll be able to look back on and say that was one heck of a team and I was recognized for the year we had. I also received the prestigious Jack Lemmon Ambassador of Golf Award for 2012. I’m not speechless very often, but I am very humbled to have been selected for this wonderful award. All you have to do is look at the recipients that have preceded me to know how special this is. But, I never really think about these things much because it’s about the players earning their all-conference and all-academic recognition. Those things are much more important to me because they’re the ones that do it. We kind of drive the bus, but they’re the guys that get it done and they’ve sure done a lot of it lately.”



## GCAA HALL OF FAME INDUCTS STEVE DESIMONE

### DESIMONE JOINS 2010 INDUCTION CLASS OF GOLF COACHES ASSOCIATION HALL OF FAME

Cal head coach Steve Desimone was one of seven members of the 2010 class inducted into the Golf Coaches Association of America's Hall of Fame Class on December 6, 2010, at the GCAA Hall of Fame Reception and Awards Banquet at the Tropicana Hotel in Las Vegas.

"There are a lot of great people and great coaches in college golf's Hall of Fame, and many of them are the ones who really built college golf into the great sport that it is today," said Desimone upon his induction. "To be included in that group makes me smile and is something that will stay with me forever."

"It's still soaking in," added Desimone. "It's one of the two highest honors anyone

can receive in this profession along with winning an NCAA championship. There's no doubt that when you're selected to the Hall of Fame by your peers the respect that they show for the work you've done is very gratifying. It's an absolutely wonderful honor."

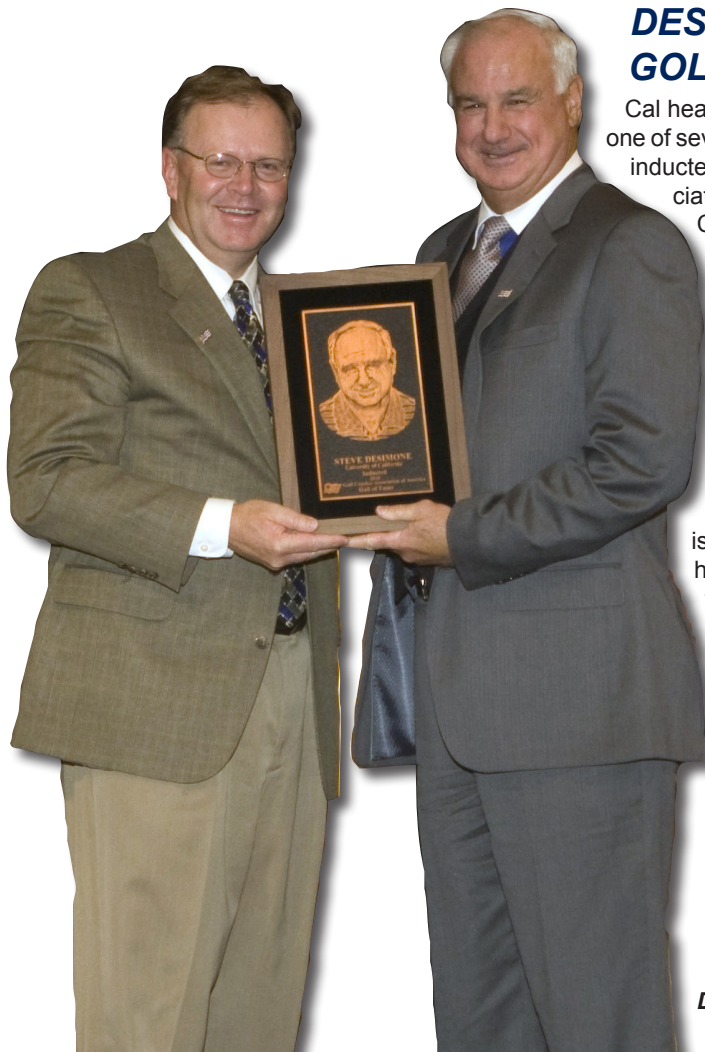

Desimone was also quick to thank the Cal Golf Committee upon his Hall of Fame induction.

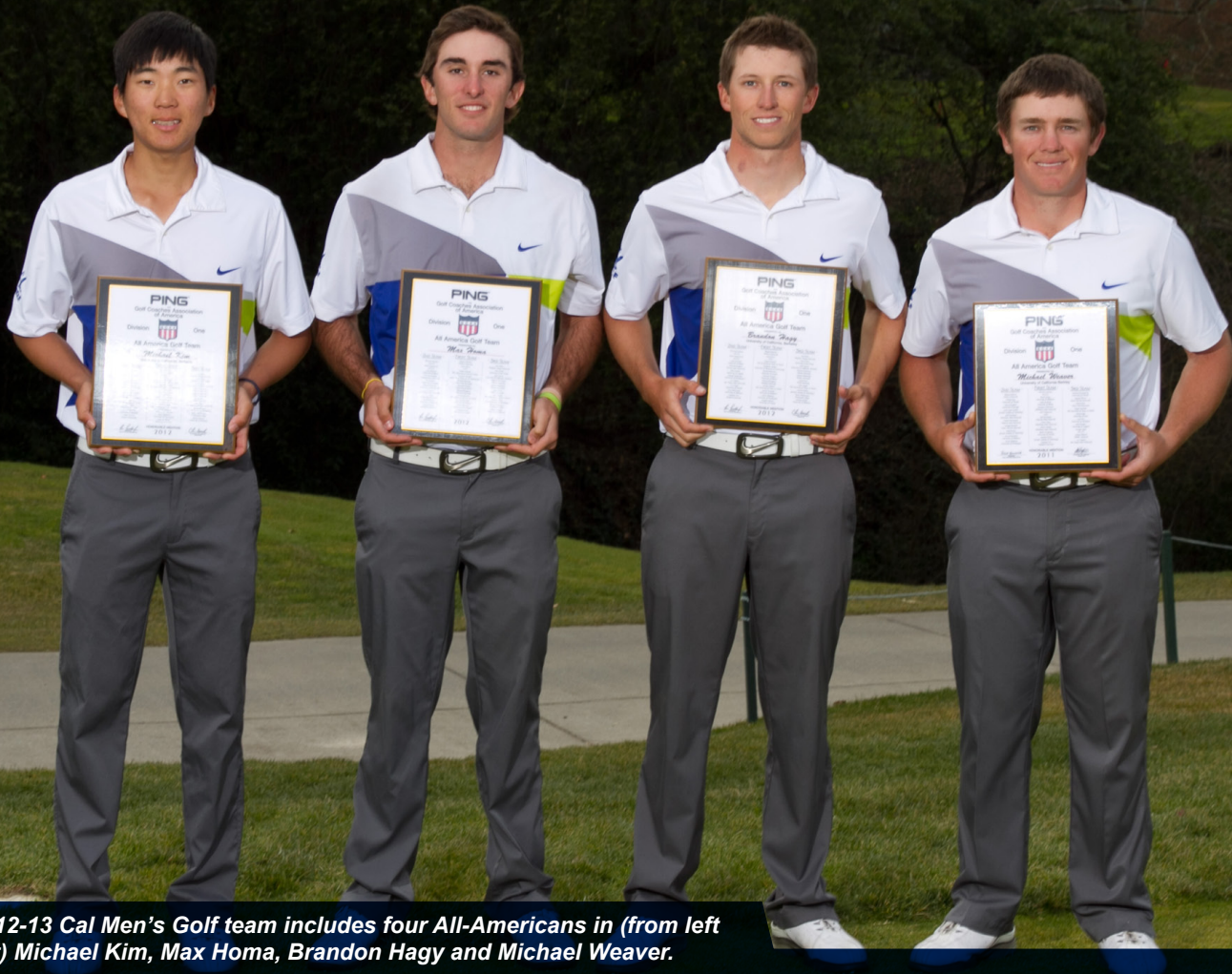

## CHAMPIONSHIP QUEST CONTINUES

**H**ead coach Steve Desimone remembers the moment vividly when the team's historical 2011-12 season finally came to an end with a loss to top-ranked Alabama in the semifinals at the NCAA Championship.

"It was a very difficult finish for us and I told the guys that it was never going to happen again, that a year from that day there was going to be a different ending," Desimone emphasized.

The Golden Bears had accomplished so much in a season of firsts that included a trip to NCAA match play, an NCAA match-play quarterfinal victory, an NCAA match-play semifinal appearance, NCAA Regional and Pac-12 Championship titles – all for the first time. Cal also posted a school-record six tournament wins to double its previous mark and had top-five finishes in all 14 events for the first time in school history.

Still, it didn't feel like nearly enough.

"We rallied around that very well, and we haven't slowed down since," Desimone said about the team's NCAA semifinal loss. "There's no question we're on a mission."

After coming just two match-play wins away from their second NCAA title in school history last June, the Bears responded by winning all five of their fall events last fall to unanimously jump to the top of the national rankings and become the team to beat heading into the 2013 spring season.

The 2012-13 edition of the team features each of its five NCAA participants plus some exciting new players. The team started the season with an impressive 14-stroke victory at the Gopher Invitational (274-290-298 – 862, -2) and has yet to look back. The Bears next posted statement victories against strong national and conference fields at the PING/Golfweek Preview (289-280-276 – 845, +5) and Pac-12 Preview (285-273-277 – 835, -29) in late September and early-October, respectively. In a busy October,

Cal concluded its fall schedule by cruising to a 20-stroke victory in its own Alister MacKenzie Invitational (265-268-273 – 806, -46) and scratching out a two-stroke win at the prestigious Isleworth Collegiate Invitational (284-295-289 – 868, +4).

Cal shared its win with host Georgia Tech in the PING/Golfweek Preview held at the same Crabapple Course at the Capital City Club where the 2013 NCAA Championship will be contested in June. The Bears came back from an eight-stroke deficit that left them tied for eighth after the first 18 holes.

At the Pac-12 Preview, Cal once again fell behind early and trailed by 15 shots on the front nine of the first's day action before coming back to eventually post a seven-shot victory by playing the final 45 holes in an astonishing 36-under par.

The Bears led from start to finish and had the best team score each day at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational. Cal also had its first individual winner since Eric Mina's victory

at the 2010 Pac-12 Championship when junior Brandon Hagy took home individual medalist honors for the first time in his collegiate career.

Just when it didn't seem like things could get any better they did when sophomore Michael Kim won his first collegiate title and led the Bears to a team victory at Isleworth, hanging on for a one-shot individual victory and a two-shot team win with a clutch shot on his final hole of the tournament to help save par.

The five consecutive victories in the fall gave Cal an incredible 11 wins in its last 19 events dating back to the beginning of the 2011-12 campaign.

"The stretch of golf we have played has been absolutely phenomenal," Desimone said. "I'm not sure if there's ever been a stretch like this in the history of college golf."

Kim and Hagy are two of the four returning PING Division I All-Americans that had impressive 2012 fall seasons and will lead the Bears into the stretch run of the campaign in the spring of 2013, with the others senior Max Homa and 2012 U.S. Amateur runner-up junior Michael Weaver.

Kim begins the 2013 calendar year as the top-ranked player in the Palmer Cup standings and was second on a watch list that Golfweek released in December of 2012 for the Haskins Award given annually to the top player in collegiate golf. He was ranked second nationally by Golfweek at the end of the fall, while his 70.1 stroke average was third according to Golfstat. Kim finished in the top 10 in each of the five events he played. In addition to winning at Isleworth, he tied for second at the Gopher Invitational, tied for fifth at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational, tied for sixth at the Pac-12 Preview and tied for 10th at the PING/Golfweek Preview. He was named the Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Month for October for the first time in his career thanks to his Isleworth, Alister MacKenzie and Pac-12 Preview performances.

"Michael had the best fall season of any player we've ever had," Desimone said. "I don't see any reason for that to change. He's just going to get better and better. We have not seen the best of Michael Kim."

Hagy was on Kim's heels especially during the beginning and latter portions of the fall when in addition to his Alister MacKenzie victory he added top-10 finishes by placing fourth at the Gopher Invitational and tied for ninth at Isleworth. He would finish second on the team behind Kim with a 70.9 stroke average and No. 22 in Golfweek's final fall national rankings.

"Brandon played great both last season and last summer, and we had a lot of expectations for him this year," Desimone said. "He's done exactly what we thought he would do. He has not slowed down and played great."

One of the team's two seniors and the only one to play in the fall, Homa started his final collegiate campaign by tying for second at the Gopher Invitational and PING/Golfweek Preview to earn Pac-12 Player of the Month honors for the second time in his career in September. His play made him the nation's top-ranked golfer after his two events. He would eventually finish the fall with a 71.1 stroke average that was a close third behind Kim and Hagy, while posting a final fall Golfweek ranking of No. 17 just ahead of Hagy. He added a third top-10 finish by tying for seventh at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational.

"Max has been as steady in terms of pro-

gression as any player we've had," Desimone said. "He's one of the best players in the history of our program. He really understands the game, he understands his own strengths and weaknesses."

Weaver gave the Bears lineup a major boost when he returned after redshirting in 2011-12 to successfully gain admission into the Haas School of Business. Like Hagy and Homa, he would post three top-10 finishes in the fall of 2012 by tying for second along with Homa at the PING/Golfweek Preview, taking fourth at the Isleworth Collegiate Invitational and tying for ninth at the Gopher Invitational. His 71.4 stroke average was fifth on the team and his final fall Golfweek national ranking was No. 25, giving the Bears four players in the top 25.

"Michael continues to improve every year," Desimone said. "He's done a great job on improving his short game and his course management has improved tremendously. He's really become a student of the game."

Each member of the foursome played in all five events and 15 rounds in the fall, with junior Joël Stalter and freshman Walker Huddy the only two other players to see the course in the fall despite a deep team with many possibilities. Huddy started the season in the lineup and played in the first two events at the Gopher Invitational and PING/Golfweek Preview before Stalter moved back into a lineup spot he held last year and participated at the Pac-12 Preview, Alister MacKenzie Invitational and Isleworth Collegiate Invitational.

Stalter had a stroke average of 71.4 to rank fourth on the team just behind Homa and ahead of Weaver. He also had a pair

of top-10 finishes by tying for third at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational and tying for eighth at the Pac-12 Preview. He was No. 38 nationally in the final fall Golfweek national rankings.

"Joël has come along beautifully over time," Desimone said. "He doesn't have any weaknesses in his game. He does everything well and everything intelligently. He manages himself and his game really well."

Huddy posted a 75.0 stroke average over his two events.

Each of the six players currently have the lowest stroke average of their career through the team's five fall events.

"That's no surprise," Desimone said. "In terms of player development, you want to see an improvement year-by-year. You can target strengths and weaknesses over time and then work on those weaknesses. Assuming that those weaknesses improve then you should see stroke averages start to go lower, and that's exactly

what we've seen out of every one of our players."

Senior Pace Johnson and sophomore Keelan Kilpatrick did not play in the fall of 2012 despite making significant contributions in 2011-12. Johnson was a member of the team's lineup at the 2012 NCAA Championship and NCAA Stanford Regional. Kilpatrick, who is redshirting in 2012-13 to pursue admission into the Haas School of Business, played at the 2012 Pac-12 Championship.

The remainder of the team consists of five players looking for their first action at Cal in redshirt freshman Shotaro Ban and true freshmen Andrew Morgan, Cameron Shaw, Thayer White and James Yoon.

The squad begins the spring portion of its 2012-13 schedule Jan. 28-29 at the Arizona Intercollegiate. The Bears will be looking for their sixth consecutive victory in the first major college golf event of the spring season. Cal led at the event most of the way last year before finishing second to the host Wildcats by a single stroke. The tournament has moved to a new venue in 2013 at the Vistoso Golf Club.

Three weeks later the Bears will travel to Hawaii for the John A. Burns Intercollegiate (Feb. 20-22), looking to win the event played on the Arnold Palmer Course at the Turtle Bay Resort in Kahuku on Oahu's North Shore for a third consecutive year.

Cal will visit the heart of the Central Valley next for the Fresno Lexus Classic hosted by Fresno State in the hometown of Weaver and Johnson. The Bears return to the event to be played at the Belmont Country Club for the first time since finishing ninth in 2010.

The first section of the spring schedule wraps up Mar. 8-10 with the Southern Highlands Collegiate Masters at the Southern Highlands Golf Club in Las Vegas. Cal started the final round of last year's event with a six-stroke lead but in a scene reminiscent of the 2012 Arizona Intercollegiate ended up falling to the host school UNLV by one stroke. The Running Rebels played the 18th hole in one-under par, while the Bears were one-over.

"Southern Highlands annually has one of the top fields in collegiate golf and to finish second there last year by a single shot validated the great year we were having," Desimone said. "It eliminated any doubt that we could beat the best teams in the country."

The Bears return from three and a half weeks out of action over spring break for their final two regular-season events at the Arizona State Thunderbird Invitational (Apr. 5-7) on the ASU Karsten Golf Course in Tempe and the Western Intercollegiate (Apr. 13-14) at Pasatiempo Golf Club in Santa Cruz. Cal will be looking to defend its title at ASU and improve upon a fifth-place finish at the San Jose State-hosted Western Intercollegiate last season that tied for their worst finish of the campaign.

The postseason begins Apr. 29 – May 1 with the Pac-12 Championship to be hosted by UCLA and played on the prestigious North Course at The Los Angeles Country Club. The Bears are the event's defending champion for the first time ever after winning their first conference title in 2012 when Hagy forced a playoff by sinking a 40-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole and then clinched the victory with a 25-foot birdie putt on the second playoff hole. Heading into the 2013

spring season the conference features four teams – Cal (No. 1 Golfweek/Golfstat/Golf World), UCLA (No. 4 Golfstat/No. 5 Golf World/No. 7 Golfweek), Washington (No. 6 Golfweek/No. 7 Golfstat/Golf World) and USC (No. 8 Golfweek/Golf World/No. 9 Golfstat) – ranked in the top 10 of all three major national polls. Stanford (No. 13 Golfstat/No. 15 Golfweek/No. 16 Golf World) makes it five conference squads in the top 20.

NCAA postseason competition starts May 16-18 with Regional action at a site yet to be determined. The six possible sites are Baton Rouge, La. (University Club); Tallahassee, Fla. (Golden Eagle Country Club); Columbus, Ohio (Scarlet Course); Fayetteville, Ark.

(The Blessings Golf Club); Pullman, Wash. (Palouse Ridge Golf Club); and Tempe, Ariz. (ASU Karsten Golf Course).

Cal won its first-ever NCAA Regional title at Stanford last year and has qualified for regional action each of the last six seasons and 17 times in school history.

A top-five NCAA Regional finish would give Cal a ticket to the NCAA Championship for a school-record fourth consecutive season and ninth time in school history. This year's event will be played May 28 – June 2 and hosted by Georgia Tech at the Crabapple Course at the Capital City Club in Atlanta, Ga. The top eight teams from three days of stroke play will advance to match play beginning May 31. The Bears reached match play for the first time in school history last season and defeated San Diego State, 3-2, in the quarterfinals for their first NCAA match-play win before falling to top-ranked Alabama by the same score in the semifinals.

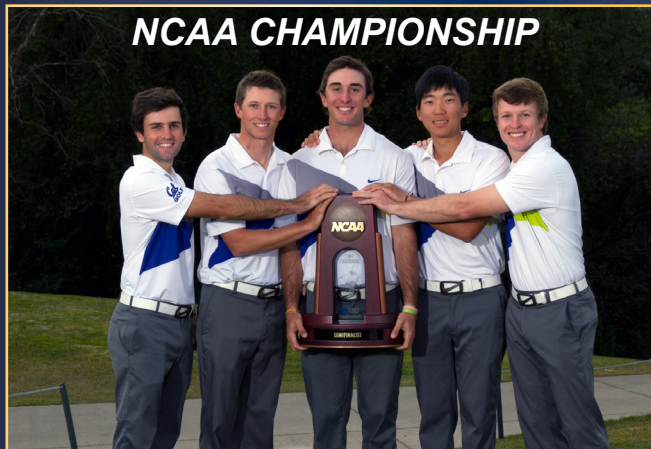
