

2006 SEASON OUTLOOK

The 2006 Golden Bears gymnastics team brings experience and talent to the lineup this season, and considers itself one of the few teams in the country that has a legitimate chance to win the national championship.

"I am very optimistic about this year," said Head Coach **Barry Weiner**. "We have good depth and everybody is confident about this season and beyond. Practices have been spirited and the guys are really going for it."

Cal finished the 2005 season with a 14-10 overall record, while placing second at the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation championships and fifth at the NCAA Championships. Since 1948, the Bears have had 170 individual top 10 finishers at the NCAA Championships, 25 national individual champions and have collected four national team titles.

Weiner has guided the Bears over the past 14 seasons. He boasts a 207-52-1 (.798) career record at Cal, and has helped turn the program into a national powerhouse. In 2004, he was selected the MPSF Conference Coach of the Year for the fourth time. Weiner has also collected two national championships and two National Coach of the Year honors (1997, 1998).

Weiner will be assisted by first-year coach **Aaron Floyd**. Floyd was a member of the Cal men's gymnastics team from 1999-03 and was team captain his junior and senior years. For the past two years, he has been coaching the Golden Bear club gymnastics team, which featured two U.S. Junior National team members. Floyd was named Northern California Coach of the Year in 2005.

The 2006 team will have to work hard to fill the void of seniors **Graham Ackerman**, a three-time NCAA champion, and **Jay Yee**, a two-time NCAA All-American on the still rings. The Bears will be led by experienced senior captains **Shawn Mowry** and **Chris Rodriguez**. Mowry, who finished third on the floor exercise at the 2005 MPSF individual championships with a score of 9.300, will be a major contributor on the floor exercise, parallel bars, vault and pommel horse. Rodriguez will provide depth for the Bears on the floor exercise, high bar and vault.

"The senior leadership is excellent," said Weiner. "That is what the captains provide, and they have been a big help to me this year."

Weiner expects big numbers and solid competition from what he considers the five-person nucleus on the team: sophomores **Colin Christ**, **Tim McNeill**, **Mark Freeman**, **Tyler Block** and freshman **Kyson Bunthuwong**. Christ, a freshman All-American on the high bar, made a tremendous debut with the Bears posting season-high scores of 9.650 on the floor exercise and 9.600 on pommel horse, but will start the season

overcoming mononucleosis. McNeill, considered one of the most talented gymnasts to come to Berkeley, was an NCAA All-American on pommel horse and vault as a freshman. He is recovering from knee surgery, but is expected to contribute in the all-around lineup.

Mark Freeman, who was injured most of last year but is finally healthy, will be a key to the team reaching its full potential.

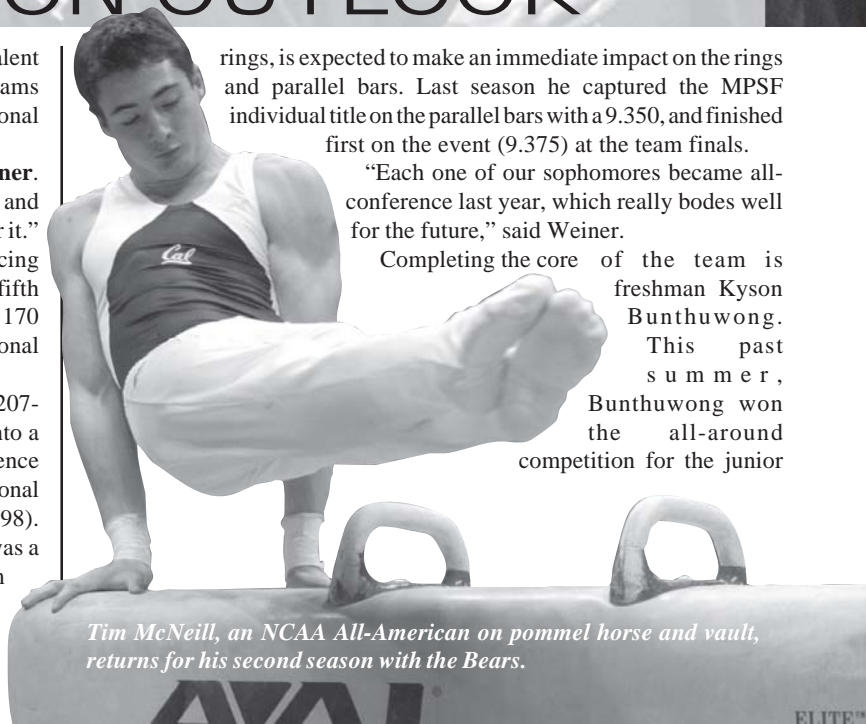
"Mark will be one of the biggest surprises of the coming year," said Weiner. "His first year he wasn't anywhere near where he could have been because he was injured."

Tyler Block, an NCAA All-American on the still

rings, is expected to make an immediate impact on the rings and parallel bars. Last season he captured the MPSF individual title on the parallel bars with a 9.350, and finished first on the event (9.375) at the team finals.

"Each one of our sophomores became all-conference last year, which really bodes well for the future," said Weiner.

Completing the core of the team is freshman **Kyson Bunthuwong**. This past summer, Bunthuwong won the all-around competition for the junior

division at the 2005 VISA Championships in Indianapolis, Ind., with a score of 92.225. Weiner says that he is the whole package and has the potential to be an All-American as a freshman. Bunthuwong will be competing all-around for Cal.

Also competing for the Bears will be juniors **Caleb Kirk**, **Bromley Palamountain**, **Jason Pierce**, **Hiroki Yokoyama** and transfer **Sean Bryan**. A strong performer on the still rings the past two seasons, the coaching staff will look to Kirk to step up on the pommel horse and set the tone early in the rotation. Palamountain will be vying for a spot in the 12-man lineup, but "comes through in the end and surprises you," according to Weiner. Yokoyama and Pierce, who also will be contending for a lineup spot, will be essential to the Bears reaching their full potential on pommel horse, parallel bars, still rings and high bar. Bryan, a transfer from Temple, is a powerful gymnast that can help the Bears on the still rings.

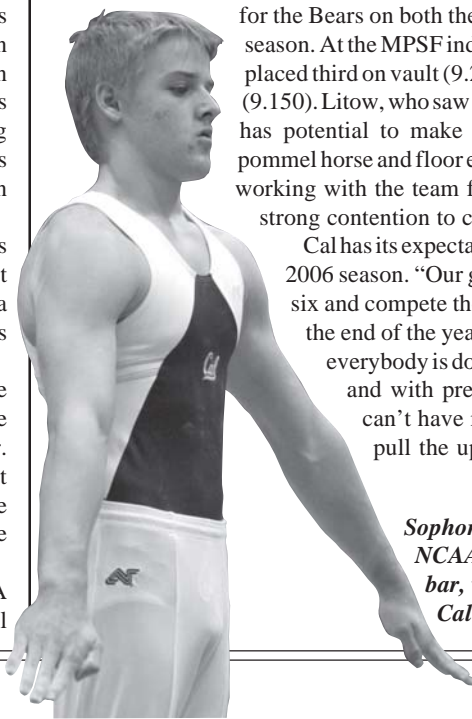
Weiner also expects to see contributions from senior **Alex Smith** and sophomores **Aaron Moy** and **Kyle Litow**. Moy provided solid support for the Bears on both the floor exercise and vault last season. At the MPSF individual championships, Moy placed third on vault (9.250) and tied for fifth on floor (9.150). Litow, who saw action in one meet last season, has potential to make the lineup and compete on pommel horse and floor exercise. Smith, who has been working with the team for the past three years, is in strong contention to compete on pommel horse.

Cal has its expectations set high heading into the 2006 season. "Our goal will be to get into the top six and compete the last day," said Weiner. "By the end of the year, the refinement is there and everybody is doing all of their skills correctly and with precision. In order to win, you can't have many misses. It's up to us to pull the upset."

Sophomore Colin Christ, an NCAA All-American on the high bar, will be a key contributor for Cal in the all-around lineup.

Students reflect all age groups, and economic, cultural and geographic backgrounds. This dynamic mix produces the wide range of opinion and perspective essential to a great university.

THE BAY AREA

Overlooking San Francisco Bay, the campus is a lush and tranquil 1,232-acre oasis in an urban setting. The grounds have retained much of the beauty of their rural beginnings. Spacious lawns, hiking and running trails, as well as groves of oak, redwood and eucalyptus blend with the Neo-classical architecture of John Galen Howard. The University is bordered by the wooded rolling hills of Tilden Regional Park and Berkeley, one of America's most lively, culturally diverse and politically adventurous cities.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

By any standard, Cal offers its students one of the best educations available. Since its birth it has earned a reputation unmatched by any public university in America. According to a recent study by the National Research Council, Cal ranks first nationally in both the number of graduate programs in the Top 10 in their fields (97 percent) and the number of "distinguished" programs for the scholarship of the faculty (32 programs).

Although Cal is well known for its stellar graduate programs, undergraduate teaching is a campus priority. Nearly half of all courses offered at the undergraduate level have 25 students or fewer, and many lecture courses include smaller laboratory or study group sections which allow close interaction with professors and other instructors.

Cal offers a wide arena for academic endeavor and personal growth with more than 7,000 courses in nearly 300 degree programs. Exceptional support services such as the Student Learning Center, Career and Graduate School Services, the Disabled Students' Program, and campus and alumni mentor programs reflect Cal's strong commitment to undergraduate education. Study abroad is available to undergraduate students through the Education Abroad Program, which maintains more than 90 study centers in countries such as Australia, Costa Rica, Egypt, Hong Kong, New Zealand and Thailand.

Each year, more than 8,500 students receive degrees from the University - about 5,500 bachelor's degrees, 2,000 master's degrees, 900 doctorates and 200 law degrees.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The excellence of the University's intercollegiate athletic program rivals the school's academic reputation as Cal boasts one of the finest all-around programs in the nation. Twenty-seven sports - men's and women's basketball, crew, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track & field and water polo; men's baseball, football and rugby; along with women's softball, volleyball, field hockey and lacrosse - are sponsored by the University. Over the years, Cal has captured more than 60 national team championships - most recently rugby and women's crew in 2005 - while claiming over 130 NCAA individual championships in a variety of sports. This past season, Dave O'Neill was named the national women's rowing Coach of the Year, while Dujie Draganja was chosen the Pac-10 men's Swimmer of the Year.

OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

A myriad of activities also goes on outside the classroom. There are more than 350 registered student organizations, such as the Marching Band, Hang Gliding Club, radio station KALX, ethnic associations, humor and literary magazines, debate team, Cal Corps (volunteer programs), Cal in the Capitol/Sacramento, and political organizations.

In addition, Cal has a host of other features, including public lectures and concerts, campus-sponsored forums and seminars, clubs and workshops, dramatic presentations, international festivals, art, photographic, design, architectural, anthropological and archaeological exhibits and displays, and dozens of bookstores within one-square mile - all of this making Berkeley one of the most intellectually stimulating communities in the country.

2006 CAL COACHING STAFF

BARRY WEINER

Head Coach, 15th Year at Cal



Largely credited with developing the University of California men's gymnastics program into one of the nation's finest, Barry Weiner led the Golden Bears to national championships in 1997 and 1998. He has had a total of seven Top 5 national finishes and eight NCAA individual champions in his fourteen seasons at Cal. The results of Weiner's hard work and dedication first paid dividends in '97 when he was named National Coach of the

Year after leading the Bears to a perfect 17-0 regular season and the team's first NCAA team title since 1975. Weiner then outdid himself the next year, as Cal swept through the entire '98 season without a loss en route to its second-consecutive team championship. Following that season, Weiner was named Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Coach of the Year for the third time (he won the award for the fourth time in 2004) and National Coach of the Year for the second straight campaign. Including the 16-1 overall record of 2004, Weiner's career record stands at an impressive 207-52-1 (.798) spanning over the last fourteen years.

Weiner took the reins of the men's gymnastics program in 1992 after Cal's worst-ever 1-18 season in '91. Under his guidance, Cal rebounded to post a 15-13 dual meet record, placing third in the conference and reaching the NCAA Regionals, where the team managed a seventh-place finish. Six individuals from that squad qualified for the NCAA Championships that year, including All-American Jason Bertram.

Before arriving at Cal in September 1991, Weiner maintained a lengthy association with the United States Junior National Gymnastics Program. Over an 11-year period, he has coached 15 Junior National Team members, including two Junior National all-around champions. He most recently coached the U.S. Junior National Team against Hungary in 1988 at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. He also coached the Junior Pan American Team in Ponce, Puerto Rico in 1987 and was a U.S. coach at international competitions in England and Hungary. Weiner was also selected as a coach for the 2000 Olympic Team.

The personal coach of numerous state and regional champions, Weiner has coached several athletes who are currently attending schools across the nation. His former charges include Cal gymnastics alumni Evan Richman and Scott Green.

On the competitive level, Weiner was a two-time MVP at Temple University from 1968-70. A 1968 NCAA event finalist in the parallel bars and floor exercise, he helped Temple finish fourth in the country in '68 and led the Owls to a third-place national finish in 1970. Weiner also earned gold medals at the 1968 Maccabiah Games in the floor exercise and horizontal bar.

A native of Philadelphia, he earned a bachelor of science degree from Temple in 1970. He is single and resides in El Sobrante.

AARON FLOYD

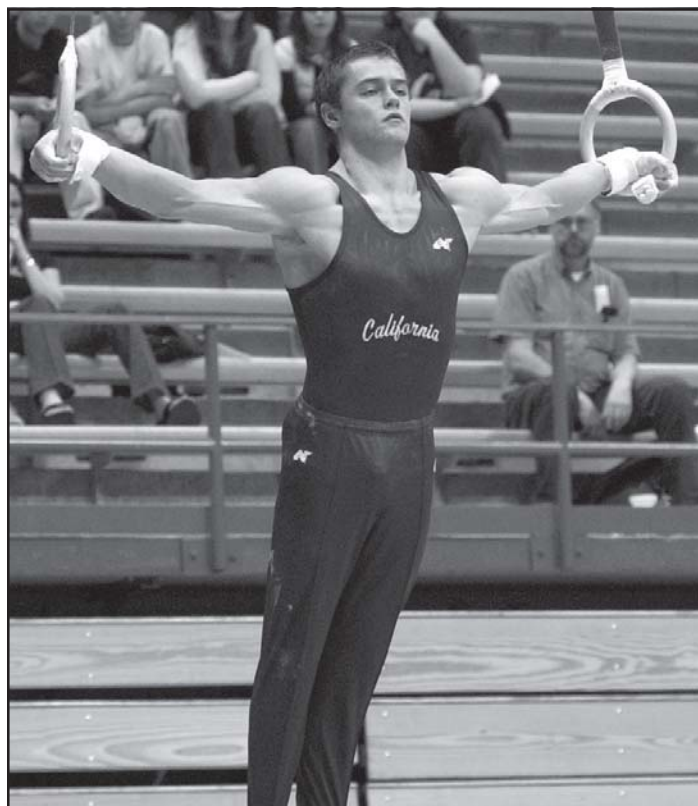
Assistant Coach, 1st Year at Cal

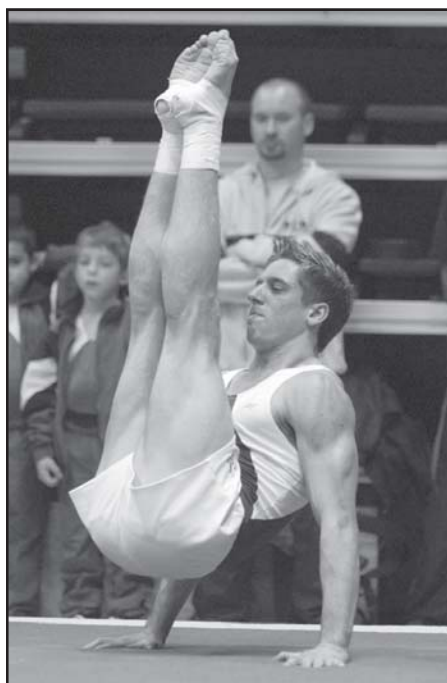

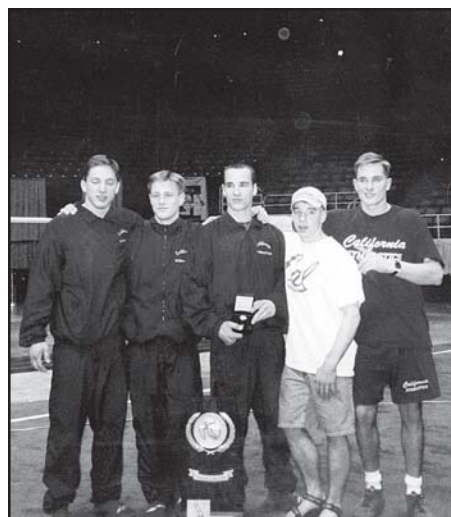
