

2007 SEASON OUTLOOK

It's not too often you come across a collegiate team that depends on veteran leadership from non-seniors. This is the case, however, with the 2007 California men's gymnastics team. The leaders of this season's squad are a core group of juniors, led by the 2006 national champion on pommel horse, **Tim McNeill**.

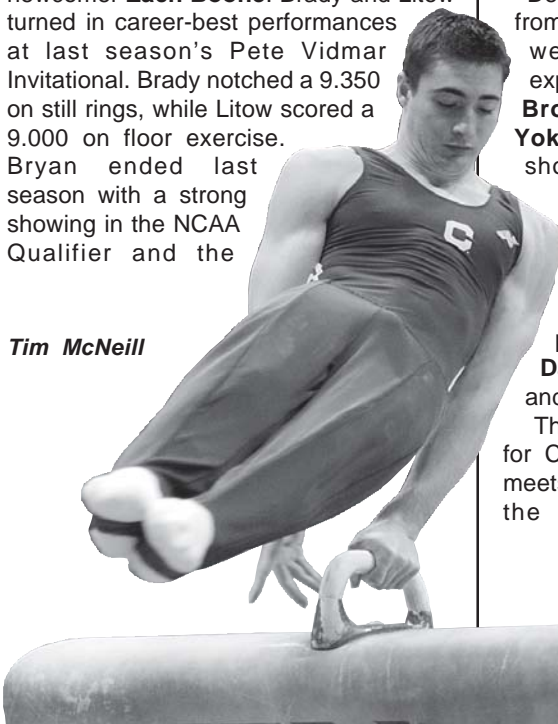
The group of juniors includes, McNeill, **Aaron Moy**, **Tyler Block**, **Colin Christ** and **Mark Freeman**. Besides McNeill, Christ and Freeman make up the top three gymnasts whom Cal head coach Barry Weiner will depend on to perform well in 2007. Christ battled through injuries during the 2006 campaign, but had a strong finish as he came in fifth in high bar in the NCAA Championships.

McNeill will miss the first half of the season after having knee surgery. While McNeill's teammates await his return, which should be at the end of February, his absence means the Golden Bears will depend on Christ, Freeman and the rest of the juniors to make up for his absence and lead the way for Cal.

"We're a talented team, driven by our junior class," Weiner said. "Our nucleus is the junior class. Colin's going to have a really good year. He had minor surgery and I think he has a real thirst and hunger to get back in there. He's been working really hard and he has some new skills that he brings to the table this year. For us to really go, Mark Freeman has to have a good year."

Also among Cal's junior class are **Kyle Brady**, **Sean Bryan**, **Kyle Litow** and newcomer **Zach Boone**. Brady and Litow turned in career-best performances at last season's Pete Vidmar Invitational. Brady notched a 9.350 on still rings, while Litow scored a 9.000 on floor exercise. Bryan ended last season with a strong showing in the NCAA Qualifier and the

NCAA Championships. He set a career-high 8.950 on parallel bars in the qualifier and then one-upped his score in the championships, marking an even 9.000. Boone will specialize in high bar.

Cal is confident in another top-five national finish. Weiner thinks the Bears should make the top three and have a chance to win the NCAA title with a healthy McNeill, but Cal should still finish in the top six if McNeill can't compete. The Bears look to improve upon their fifth-place finish in the NCAA Championships last season, following a third-place performance in the MPSF Championships.

Weiner will be assisted by second-year coach Aaron Floyd. Floyd was a member of the Cal men's gymnastics team from 1999-03 and was team captain his junior and senior years. For two years prior to joining the coaching staff, he coached the Golden Bear club gymnastics team, which featured two U.S. junior national team members. Floyd was named Northern California Coach of the Year in 2005.

In addition to having an NCAA champion on the team, Weiner recruited the U.S. junior national champion for the second straight year. Last year he brought in sophomore **Kyson Bunthuwong** and this year he added freshman **Bryan Del Castillo**. Weiner calls the two gymnasts his "pocket aces."

"These two junior national champions I think are ultimately the future of the program," Weiner said. "Those were huge recruits for us. We signed the No. 1 kid two years in a row."

Despite the core of the team coming from its junior class, Weiner has more weapons in his arsenal. His experienced seniors include **Caleb Kirk**, **Bromley Palamountain** and **Hiroki Yokoyama**. Kirk had an impressive showing in the qualifier, posting a season-best 9.000 on still rings.

One of the things Weiner wanted to fix over the off-season was the team's performance as a whole on pommel horse. He solved the problem by getting a couple of recruits, **Daniel Geri** and **Evan Roth**, to come in and strengthen Cal in the event.

Three home meets are on the schedule for Cal this season, including two dual meets against Stanford and Ohio State. In the third home meet, the MPSF Championships, the Bears will have a

chance to improve on their third-place finish last season in the friendly confines of H a a s Pavilion.

Still, Weiner knows the conference meet does not compare to the NCAA Championships. He said, although he always wants the team to do its best, the main focus for the Bears is to do well in the N C A A s . W e i n e r added that sometimes the results from the MPSF meet can be a little bit misleading.

"In 1997, we were third in the conference meet and then we won the NCAA title," Weiner said. "Some conferences look at the conference championships to be almost as important as the NCAAs, but I don't look at it that way. Everything is geared towards the NCAAs and in the next two years, we have a real opportunity (to win). We don't lose any really key performers next year either."

The future looks bright for Cal, as the Bears aspire to take home another national championship in 2007, which would be the first NCAA title since 1998 and would also be the third national title for the Bears under Weiner.

"Everybody has another year of experience, but we're trying to get ready earlier this year," he said. "We're trying to do more work early in the year. Ultimately to do well at NCAAs, we have to go and have a great meet. You'll perform 36 routines; we have to perform 34 of them really well. We can't afford to make too many mistakes."

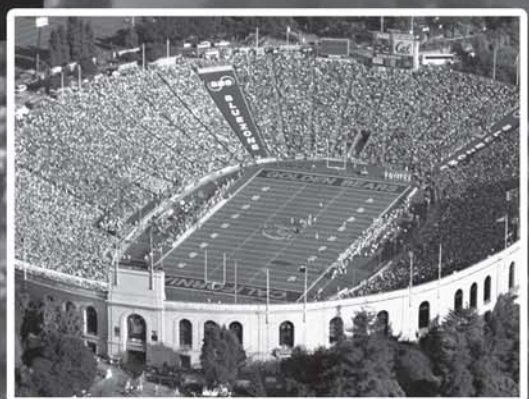
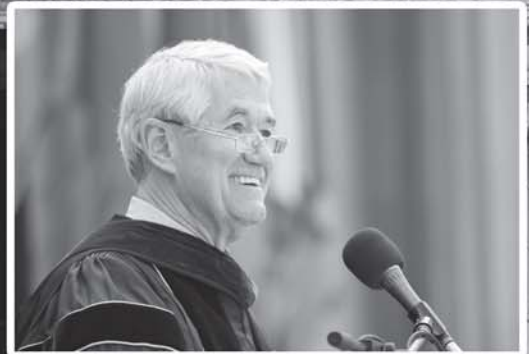

2007 CALIFORNIA COACHING STAFF

BARRY WEINER*Head Coach, 16th Year at Cal*

Largely credited with developing the University of California men's gymnastics program into one of the nation's finest, Barry Weiner led the Golden Bears to national championships in 1997 and 1998. He has had a total of eight Top 5 national finishes, including a fifth place finish in 2006, and nine NCAA individual champions in his fifteen seasons at Cal. The ninth individual champion during Weiner's regime was Tim McNeill, who earned an NCAA title last season on pommel horse. The results of Weiner's hard work and dedication first paid dividends in '97 when he was named National Coach of the Year after leading the Bears to a perfect 17-0 regular season and the team's first NCAA team title since 1975. Weiner then outdid himself the next year, as Cal swept through the entire '98 season without a loss en route to its second-consecutive team championship. Following that season, Weiner was named Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Coach of the Year for the third time (he won the award for the fourth time in 2004) and National Coach of the Year for the second straight campaign. Including the 16-1 overall record of 2004, Weiner's career record stands at an impressive 223-67-1 (.769) spanning over the last fifteen years.

Weiner took the reins of the men's gymnastics program in 1992 after Cal's worst-ever 1-18 season in '91. Under his

guidance, Cal rebounded to post a 15-13 dual meet record, placing third in the conference and reaching the NCAA Regionals, where the team managed a seventh-place finish. Six individuals from that squad qualified for the NCAA Championships that year, including All-American Jason Bertram.

Before arriving at Cal in September 1991, Weiner maintained a lengthy association with the United States Junior National Gymnastics Program. Over an 11-year period, he has coached 15 Junior National Team members, including two Junior National all-around champions. He most recently coached the U.S. Junior National Team against Hungary in 1988 at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. He also coached the Junior Pan American Team in Ponce, Puerto Rico in 1987 and was a U.S. coach at international competitions in England and Hungary. Weiner was also selected as a coach for the 2000 Olympic Team.

The personal coach of numerous state and regional champions, Weiner has coached several athletes who are currently attending schools across the nation. His former charges include Cal gymnastics alumni Evan Richman and Scott Green.

On the competitive level, Weiner was a two-time MVP at Temple University from 1968-70. A 1968 NCAA event finalist in the parallel bars and floor exercise, he helped Temple finish fourth in the country in '68 and led the Owls to a third-place national finish in 1970. Weiner also earned gold medals at the 1968 Maccabiah Games in the floor exercise and horizontal bar.

A native of Philadelphia, he earned a bachelor of science degree from Temple in 1970. He is single and resides in El Sobrante.

AARON FLOYD*Assistant Coach, 2nd Year at Cal*

Aaron Floyd joined the Golden Bear coaching staff last year after spending four seasons, 1999-2003, as a member of the Cal gymnastics team. Floyd was the team captain his junior and senior seasons, and during his stint at Cal he earned three Academic All-American honors.

Upon graduating from Cal with a degree in applied mathematics, Floyd began coaching with the Golden Bear Gymnastics Club. In his two years there, he coached two Junior National Team members and was named Northern California Coach of the Year in 2005.

Before coming to Cal, Floyd, a native of Maryland, lived and trained at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo., for a two and a half year period. Floyd resides in El Cerrito.

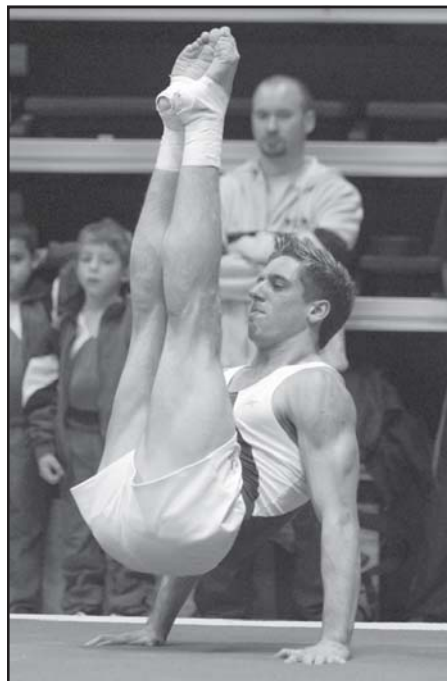
