2002 WOMEN'S SEASON IN REVIEW

The Bears faced stiff competition throughout 2002, but the team completed the year with a No. 13 national team ranking and a 20th consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament. In the Round of 16, though, the squad lost a hard-fought match to Georgia, 4-1.

Sophomore **Raquel Kops-Jones** and junior **Christina Fusano** led the charge for the Bears throughout the year. Teaming together for the first time all season, Kops-Jones and Fusano battled through some of the nation's top tandems and won the Pac-10 double championship April 28 in Ojai. The Cal duo took the crown with an 8-6 win over UCLA's Megan Bradley and Lauren Fisher, and finished 2002 with a No. 14 national ranking, despite only playing seven matches together.

Kops-Jones emerged as the No. 1 player for the Bears on both the singles and doubles courts, finishing ranked 23rd in singles and twice ranked in doubles, No. 14 with Fusano and No. 30 with **Jody Scheldt**. In addition to her Pac-10 doubles title with Fusano, Kops-Jones also competed with Scheldt for the NCAA doubles championship. The Fresno native Kops-Jones was also selected to the NCAA Singles Championship for the second consecutive season, where she lost in the first round.

Fusano, the team captain, once again turned in a top-notch performance for the Bears, splicing together a 17-4 record in dual matches to lead the team in dual match victories. Ranked No. 48, she competed in the first round of the NCAA Championships and earned honorable mention All-Pac-10 honors in the process.

Another pleasant surprise was sophomore **Catherine Lynch**. Known for her tremendous work ethic, she spent some time at the top spot when the Arizona schools visited Berkeley in early April. Lynch split her two matches at the No. 1 court and ranked second on the team in dual wins, boasting a 13-5 record. The 47th-ranked Lynch had to withdraw from the NCAA Championships due to a stress fracture in her leg.

WOMEN'S TENNIS TRADITIONS

1998, '99 and '00 Amy Jensen became the only player in NCAA history to capture three consecutive NCAA doubles titles, giving Cal its first national championships. Jensen's teammate in 1998 and '99, Amanda Augustus, who had twice previously earned doubles All-America honors, also captured back-to-back singles All-America honors in 1998 and '99, including a run to the quarterfinals in the 1998 singles bracket.

The Bears most successful modern women's tennis player, however, may have been Lisa Albano, who was named Cal's Tennis Athlete of the Decade for 1986-96. The only Cal woman ever to reach the NCAA singles final in 1991, Albano capped off an outstanding collegiate career as a finalist for the prestigious national Honda Award with her fourth consecutive singles All-American selection. Albano was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in October 2000.

CAL TRADITION SPANS A CENTURY OF COMPETITION

Although not formally established as a Division I inter-collegiate program until the late 1970s, the University of California women's tennis program traces its roots back to the early days of tennis competition in the United States. The Golden Bear tradition of excellence spans nearly the entire 20th century, as tennis greats from eight-time Wimbledon champion Helen Wills Moody Roark (1923-25) to 1998, '99 and '00 NCAA doubles champion Amy Jensen have graced the California courts.

With 21 NCAA Tournament appearances since the inception of the women's championships in 1982, Cal has built a solid national tennis reputation, reaching at least the quarterfinal round in 15 team championships and earning NCAA semifinal berths in 1985, '94, '99 and '00.

Cal women's tennis has garnered 51 All-American selections in 28 varsity seasons, the bulk of which have come under current head coach Jan Brogan, the winningest female coach in NCAA tennis history. In addition to earning National Coach of the Year honors in 1990, Brogan has guided the Bears to six undefeated conference seasons (1981-86), 18 national Top 10 finishes and a national team final appearance at the 1982 AIAW Championships.

California's players have also earned individual recognition as some of the best the nation has to offer after qualifying for the last 17 consecutive NCAA singles and doubles tournaments. In

WOMEN'S ENDOWMENTS

Few of California's many outstanding women athletes have attained the international success of California Hall of Fame members Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman ('11), Anna McCune Harper ('24), Helen Wills Moody Roark ('25) and Helen Hull Jacobs ('30), who helped establish the continuing standard of excellence that extends through the Golden Bears of today.

A two-time Olympic gold medalist, Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman was the first (and only) woman ever to win the U.S. National singles, doubles and mixed doubles titles in the same year (1909), repeating the achievement again in 1910 and 1911. In 1923, she left a lasting contribution in women's tennis by creating the Wightman Cup Championship between British and American women, competing herself in 1923-24, '27, '29 and '31. In her honor, the Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman Tennis Scholarship is awarded each season to the top women's tennis recruit.

Harper, Roark and Jacobs all left their mark on the California campus during the 1920s, with each eventually moving on to international acclaim. A lifetime Bay Area resident, Harper began her competitive career on the Cal courts and quickly established herself nationally, eventually becoming the nation's top-ranked singles player in 1930. A Top 10 singles player from 1928-32, Harper won the 1931 Wimbledon mixed doubles title. In her honor, a scholarship is awarded annually in Harper's name to the Cal tennis player with the highest grade point average.

Jacobs, too, achieved international success, winning a Wimbledon singles championship in addition to singles and doubles titles at the Italian Open. Jacobs spent a total of 13 years in the USTA's First 10 and capped off her career as the top ranked U.S. woman from 1932-35.

Roark (better known in tennis circles as Helen Wills Moody) was one of the most successful women ever to play the game and was the top-ranked player in the United States seven times during her career. She won a total of 13 U.S. and six French National championships, collecting eight Wimbledon singles, three doubles and one mixed doubles championship and a gold medal in both singles and doubles at the 1924 Olympics.

In December 1994, Roark established an endowment for a grant-in-aid in women's tennis with a \$100,000 gift to the program. Roark has also been a significant benefactor to research at the university, establishing a major endowment for support of research in the biological sciences.

The achievements of women like Wightman, Harper, Roark and Jacobs set the standard to which the California women's tennis program aspires. The tradition that began with these early greats has spawned countless All-Americans and tennis professionals, culminating in the top-flight players who grace Hellman Tennis Courts today.

MEN'S SEASON OUTLOOK

BEARS EYE THE BIG PRIZE

Since 1999, the California men's tennis team has been an object in motion. Steadily moving up the national ranking chart and win columns in each successive year, the Bears finished the 2002 campaign with a No. 13 national ranking and a 5-2 second-place conference record – its best Pac-10 finish ever. With all six singles starters returning, and the addition of two immediate impact players in **Steve Berke** and **Or Dekel**, head coach **Peter Wright** sees no reason why this object will not continue to stay in motion until it reaches the national championship in May.

"The ultimate goal for my teams has always been to win a national championship," said Wright who is 119-87 in his nine years with the Bears. "This year, though, I can say with confidence that we've put together one of the strongest teams in the country,"

Wright has good reason for this optimism. Every player in his lineup has had either a world ranking or significant international experience. Senior All-American and team captain **John Paul Fruttero** returns this spring after taking the fall season off to play in professional events as an amateur. As one of five seniors on this veteran squad, Fruttero enters the year nationally ranked No. 4 after finishing his 2002 campaign with a 16-6 dual match record.

Joining the experienced senior class is Yale transfer and college standout Steve Berke. The No. 45-ranked Berke, an All-American in 2001, advanced to the quarterfinals at the 2001 NCAA Championships, while earning the 2001 Ivy League Player of the Year distinction. The addition of Berke makes the Bears one of only two teams in the country to have four singles players (Fruttero, Veress, Niland and Berke) ranked in the Top 50.

"Steve is a talented and experienced player who will be valuable to the team in both his on-court performance and his off-court leadership," remarked Wright.

But Berke is only half of the tremendous duo that Wright has added to his spring roster. The other half comes in the form of Or Dekel. Hailing from Israel, the 21-year-old Dekel, who like current Cal basketball star Amit Tamir served duty in the Israeli Army, brings an extremely high level of tennis and maturity to the Cal squad. Recently ranked as high as No. 330 in the world, Dekel enters the year as one of the highest world ranked college players in the nation.

Also returning is senior doubles All-American **Robert Kowalczyk**, opening the fall ranked No. 9 in doubles with partner Fruttero. Kowalczyk has taken the fall to refine his singles game, participating in the ITA All-American Championships and the Omni Hotels Northwest Regional Challenge. Perhaps the biggest win of the Bears' fall belonged to Kowalczyk, as he upended the No. 2 player in the country, Amer Delic of Illinois, at the Napa Valley Challenge.

SINGLES

With a great team returning and with the addition of two world class players in January, look for singles competition to be the mainstay of this 2003 squad. Holding down the top spot for the third year in a row will likely be Fruttero. The numbers speak for themselves. Ranked the preseason No. 4 player in the country, Fruttero has compiled a 38-20 record on the No. 1 court, while posting a 63-36 singles record overall.

"Each year John Paul gets a little bit better," Wright said. "He had an outstanding season last year, but look for him to be even better this season. He really brings the team dynamic into play and is focused on taking the team to the NCAA Championships."

Balazs Veress, who forged a 10-7 record on court No. 2 as a sophomore, looks primed for another successful campaign in 2003. This fall the native Hungarian advanced to the semifinals of the Northwest Regionals, defeating Stanford's Scott Lipsky along the way.

"Balazs is looking to be one of the top guys on the team again this year," said Wright. "He's not easy to beat, he's smart, experienced and very determined."

Conor Niland also performed well over the fall season. The Irishman looks to create a healthy dose of competition at the top of the lineup as well. The sophomore spent most of his time on the No. 3 court last year (7-3), but he also jumped between courts 2-5, finishing with a 14-7 dual record. Niland's athletic and gritty style will provide even more depth to an already veteran unit.

"With a solid freshman year under his belt, Conor has made great strides in his game and I expect 2003 to be even better," remarked Wright.

Kowalczyk, who posted an 18-4 dual record on courts No. 3-5 last year has worked diligently at making this senior season his best ever. In addition to defeating the No. 2 player in the nation in September, Kowalczyk advanced to the Round of 16 at the regional championships in October, finishing the fall with a 5-3 tournament record.

"Robert's competitiveness will keep our team on its toes and bring other teams to their knees," said Wright.

Wayne Wong returns for his junior year after having a rock-solid performance last season, competing in all but two matches for the Bears. He split time at courts No. 2-5 in dual match play, finishing the year leading the team in overall wins (24). His accolades continued to mount this fall, as the Hong Kong native put together a 10-match winning streak over three tournaments. In the midst of his streak, Wong won the University of San Diego Invitational and finished the fall with a stellar 10-2 record.

Mik Ledvonova, a native of Denmark, held down the No. 5 and No. 6 courts for the Bears in 2002, finishing the season with a 16-3 overall dual record. He has been hampered by tendinitis in his right hand over the summer and early fall, but should be primed and ready for the spring campaign.

Competing for playing time in the lineup will be sophomore **Patrick Briaud**, redshirt freshman **Dean Wallace**, and junior college transfer **Kuni Minato**. Briaud, who worked his way into the doubles lineup last year, performed solidly this fall finishing with a 6-6 record. Wallace competed at the Regional Championships, earning himself a spot in the Round of 32. Minato, a junior college transfer, comes to Cal after finishing 2002 as the No. 2 ranked junior college player in the state of California.

Jeff King and **Kevin Patrick** round out an experienced group of seniors, both finishing the fall with their best college results since joining the team as walk-ons last year.

All of these returnees, plus the additions of Berke and Dekel, who both join the team as possible 1-4 singles competitors, gives coach Wright plenty of options in creating his singles lineup.



MEN'S SEASON OUTLOOK

DOUBLES

While experimenting with six different doubles combinations this fall, very little has fallen into place quite yet. With Fruttero taking the fall off, and Berke and Dekel arriving in January, the Bears look to form some new combinations for the 2003 season. Perhaps we could see the return of the No. 9-ranked duo of Fruttero and Kowalczyk who earned All America status for 2002.

Wright's squad used 10 different doubles combinations last year en route to a 41-26 overall dual match doubles record. So look for 2003 to be much of the same, as many different doubles possibilities could come to fruition.

"I plan on giving some serious attention to our doubles teams in the early part of the season, to see what's working and what's not," said Wright. "We have many possibilities, so I will be trying to find the combinations that seem to have some natural chemistry."
