THOMAS STOW PLAZA


Stow, the 1926 NCAA doubles champion and former California coach. Formally dedicated upon its completion in January 1995, Stow Plaza brought a face-lift to Hellman Tennis Complex, creating a new main entrance and landscaped patio for Cal's tennis facility.

Thomas Stow was a legend in Cal tennis history, partnering with the great Bud Chandler to win the 1926 NCAA doubles championship before graduating from Cal in 1927. He returned as head coach from 1932-46. During his time at the helm for the Bears, Stow compiled a 73-45-1 (.618) coaching record, leading Cal to three Pacific Coast Conference championships. He was inducted into Cal's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1987.









California Cal

alifornia tennis makes its home at the Hellman Tennis Complex, located on the southwest side of the Berkeley campus. Used for practice, tournaments and home dual matches, Hellman has served as the host facility for the 1996 Men's Rolex NorCal Regional Tournament and was the site of the 1994 NCTA/ Michael Chang Reach for the Stars tennis clinic that benefited underprivileged Northern California youths, as well as numerous NCAA regional competitions.

Built in 1983 with a grant from the S.H. Cowell Foundation, the Hellman Tennis Complex was formally dedicated by the University in October of that year. From 1983-91, Hellman housed the offices of both men's track and field and men's tennis. merging of the men's and women's athletic departments relocated the women's tennis staff to Hellman in 1991. The facility's of-fice has been exclusively used for tennis

The tennis complex honors the late Isias Warren Hellman III, a Cal alumnus (A.B., 1920), former chair of the Cowell Foundation and the former president and chair of Wells Fargo Bank. Hellman was one of Cal's most prominent and active donors and was responsible for university contributions ranging from the Friends of

the Bancroft Library to the Alumni House

and Barrows Hall.
In 1993, stadium lights were added to Hellman Tennis Complex, a direct result of the work of former Oakland Athletics owner Walter Haas. Haas, a Cal tennis letterwinner in 1927, spearheaded the Cal Sports' 80's fund-raising campaign, which brought campus-wide improvements to all of Cal's athletic facilities.


In 2004, new logo-style chairback seats were installed in the eastern viewing section of the stadium, giving Hellman the look and feel it has today. Future renovations to the complex include plans designed by ELS Architecture and Urban Design with the help of top senior player Larry Dodge. The ing lounges, balconies, a modern clubhouse offices, locker rooms and meeting rooms

In the summer of 2008, as a tribute to legendary women's head coach Jan Brogan, the generous donation of former California women's tennis player Stacy Savides Sul-Hellman Tennis Complex.






BERKELEY AND

THE BAY AREA

he San Francisco Bay Area is a major metropolitan area of approximately six million people and one of the most scenic regions in the United States. The Bay Area includes the major cities of San Francisco and Oakland, as well as Berkeley, home of the worldrenowned University of California. Just south is the city of San Jose and the Silicon Valley, home to many of the world's high-tech companies. The Bay Area also lies within easy driving distance of the high Sierra resorts of Lake Tahoe and Yosemite, the Monterey/Carmel peninsula, the world -famous Napa wine country, and the spectacular Mendocino Coast.

Everyone knows "The City" - San Francisco - from countless photographs, movies and television shows that capture its magic. It is a city built on a series of more than 40 hills, offering panoramic views of every kind. The hub of a nine-county complex and the financial and insurance capital of the world, San Francisco has a resident population of about 740,000. ocated across the Bay Bridge from San Francisco, Oakland is a city of 400,000, jam-packed with exciting attractions, stimulating arts, and an ideal climate. 





ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

ne of the real success stories for the University of California is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes: the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and athletic department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program tailored to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor on the field of play and as a student in the classroom.

STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAM

FIAT LUX

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed within the Division of Undergraduate Education, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials, and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.

Geared around the understanding of the amount of time student-athletes must devote to practice, training, physical therapy and team travel, the program creates an environment where students can cultivate strong study habits, receive individual or group tutoring and obtain counseling from academic advisors.



THE NEWMARK ENDOWMENT

Kent and Pat Newmark endow awards for the highest and most improved team grade point averages for Cal's men's and women's sports programs. In 2007-08, both Cal tennis teams received the Newmark award for exceptional academic performance. The men's team had the highest GPA (3.224) among all men's teams at Cal and the women's team had the highest GPA (3.359) of all women's teams. Each team received a \$7,500 gift and has the privilege of deciding how the funds are spent. Past winners have chosen to make improvements to facilities or upgrades to equipment. A three-time tennis letterwinner, Kent received two degrees from the University of California, first graduating in 1960 and earning his MBA in 1964. The Newmarks have also been longtime supporters of Cal women's golf through the Patricia and Kent Newmark Endowment Fund.



The Academic Support Staff

TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The tutorial program promotes and enhances student academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The Athletic Study Center has between 50-60 tutors on staff per semester to guarantee that students receive the best possible support. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night, enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when are able to devote more time to studying.

ADVISING PROGRAM

The advising program offers a broad range of services to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with university, college and NCAA requirements, developing time management skills and resolving personal academic issues unique to student-athletes.

During a student-athlete's freshman year, advisors provide assistance to ensure a successful academic transition from high school. In the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. Over the course of the final two years, advisors take more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made towards graduation while referring juniors and seniors to areas on or near campus that can help with career planning and development.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

The Athletic Study Center offers a special service called *Summer Bridge*; an adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components of the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is peer advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus guidance for new intercollegiate student-athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes who assist in the development of programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING











he strength and conditioning program at Cal is an integral and critical component of the California tennis program and its success. Led by assistant strength and conditioning coach Jenna Smith, who supervises the comprehensive operation for both of the Golden Bear tennis teams, the program's philosophy is centered around providing each student-athlete with the fundamental support necessary to achieve the highest level of athletic development.

By learning how each of the areas of strength and conditioning fit together, student-athletes understand and adapt the essential principles towards maximum force production. The array of critical exercises include enhancement of speed, strength and flexibility, which result in improved control and power. Motivating, educating and assisting in the process of maximum athletic development are the core fundamentals of the Cal strength and conditioning program.

The Cal weight room includes Olympic platforms and a wide range of aerobic and anaerobic equipment. The picturesque facility offers panoramic views of the entire region, including San Francisco and the Bay.

The training regimen at Cal is a year-round process that allows for gradual maturation in all areas of speed, strength and flexibility. Closely monitored workouts that involve individual instruction and attention ensure that student-athletes are taught the correct techniques in order to increase performance levels in both practice and competition. Stressing flexibility for improved weight-lifting technique, the program also seeks to provide comprehensive guidance in maintaining the proper health and safety of all student-athletes through a collaborative effort of the

entire sports medicine team including doctors, athletic trainers, physical therapists and nutritionists.

Combining the efforts of a core staff from many fields of athletic and medical discipline, Cal's strength and conditioning program has become a vital component to the tennis teams, linking the full circle of a student-athlete's physical development from conditioning through rehabilitation and reconditioning for the ultimate in peak performance on the court.





Sandy BARBOUR Director of Athletics



As Director of Athletics at the University of California, Sandy Barbour oversees an Athletic Department that ranks as one of the most successful in the country with a mission that seeks to

match its level of excellence with that attained by the University as a whole.

Built upon four pillars – to teach, to serve, to compete and to excel – Cal Athletics strives to combine high athletic achievement with the academic rigors of the No. 1 public university in the country, and to do so with integrity, passion, respect, teamwork, innovation, diversity and professionalism. The department is charged to not only be a campus and community leader, but also to be a place where individuals can grow to their utmost potential.

Under Barbour's leadership, the Golden Bears have developed into a model program that has become a mainstay among the Top 10 in the annual NACDA Directors' Cup standings. Cal matched the school's best-ever finish in 2007-08 with a seventh-place standing, a ranking buoyed by seven sports that ranked among the Top 5 nationally. The Bears were also seventh in 2005-06 and ninth in 2003, '04 and '07.

"Sandy Barbour was my first appointment at Berkeley, and I consider it a privilege to have her as our athletic director," Chancellor Robert J. Birgeneau said. "Under her leadership, our student-athletes are excelling on and off the field, supported by a department committed to excellence, equity and comprehensive compliance with the rules."

Since Barbour began her tenure in Berkeley on Sept. 15, 2004, Cal programs have captured nine national team championships

and 25 individual titles.

Overall, Cal supports a 27-sport program with more than 800 student-athletes and a budget in excess of \$60 million.

On the academic front, nearly half of Cal's student-athletes maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher, and 14 of Cal's 27 programs earned cumulative GPAs higher than their historical average. All Bear teams also surpassed the required minimum score in the most recent Academic Progress Report, and more than 175 student-athletes have earned academic all-conference recognition in each of the last four years.

In May of 2007, the NCAA certified a comprehensive self-study of Intercollegiate Athletics at Cal, confirming that the athletic department is operating in full compliance of the organization's operating principles. This recognition demonstrates that the University is committed to sustaining a broad-based, nationally competitive athletics program that supports student-athlete academic needs and interests.

Named one of the "100 Most Influential Women in Business" in the Bay Area by the San Francisco Business Times, Barbour has also been chosen a 2006 Woman of Distinction by the East Bay Business Times and the 2006 National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators (NACWAA) Division I-A National Administrator of the Year.

Barbour is an active member of several committees on both the national and conference levels. Currently chair of the Pac-10 Finance Committee, she is also a member of the Pac-10 Executive Committee and the Pac-10 Television Committee and served as vice president of the conference for 2007-08. In addition, Barbour is on the NACDA Executive Committee, the NCAA Diversity Leadership Strategic Planning Committee, the NCAA Women's Basketball Discussion Group and the WBCA Defensive Player of the Year Selection Committee.

Prior to moving to Berkeley, Barbour was the deputy director of athletics at Notre Dame, serving as the university's senior athletic administrator from July 2003 to September 2005.

Barbour's career in intercollegiate athletic administration spans 26 years, beginning as a field hockey assistant coach and lacrosse administrative assistant at the University of Massachusetts in 1981. She has since served as assistant athletic director at Northwestern and in 1991 was recruited to Tulane as an associate athletic director.

In 1996, Barbour was appointed Tulane's director of athletics at age 36, and during her three years overseeing the program, Green Wave teams won 12 conference championships. In her first year in the position, the school captured four conference titles, a feat never before accomplished in Tulane history.

In her position at Notre Dame, Barbour oversaw facilities and event operations for the school's 26-sport program.

Born Dec. 2, 1959, in Annapolis, Md., Barbour grew up in a military family. Her father was a career aviator in the U.S. Navy, and her family lived in various U.S. locations, as well as in Western Europe during her childhood.

Barbour graduated cum laude in 1981 with a B.S. degree in physical education from Wake Forest, where she was a four-year letterwinner and served as captain of the field hockey team. She also played two varsity seasons of women's basketball.

Barbour earned advanced degrees at both Massachusetts (an M.S. in sports management in 1983) and Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management (an MBA in 1991).

Prior to joining Tulane, Barbour worked in programming and production for FOX Sports Net in Chicago during the summer of 1990.
