WOMEN'S 2004 SEASON OUTLOOK

EXPERIENCED BEARS READY FOR IT ALL

fter reaching the NCAA semifinal, boasting a 23-6 dual meet record a year ago, the NCAA team title would seem to be within the Cal Women's Tennis team's grasp. Six months removed from ending the 2003 season as the fourth rated team in the

country, head coach **Jan Brogan** leads her 2004 squad into the spring ranked No. 3 nationally.

The Bears return a very experienced group that is one of the frontrunners for the NCAA crown. With six seniors and one of the most sought-after recruits at her disposal, Brogan can sit back in her office at the Hellman Tennis Complex and smile.

Brogan will enter the season with five athletes nationally ranked by the ITA, included NCAA Doubles Champion **Raquel Kops-Jones** and 2003 team MVP **Jody Scheldt**.

Kops-Jones enters the spring as the No. 1 player in the Northwest region and the No. 2 player in the country. She narrowly missed the nation's top spot in the ITA's preseason poll by six points to Georgia's Agata Cioroch, but Brogan is confident that Kops-Jones has a great shot of matching her doubles title with a singles title come May.

The senior from Fresno, Calif., established herself as a national force in 2003, compiling a career high 44 victories, earning first team All - Pac-10 recognition and being honored with the team's Most Improved Player Award. Kops-Jones ended the season ranked No. 6 nationally in singles competition, and entered the fall No. 4. After a short stint competing on the pro circuit, including the U.S. Open, Kops-Jones began her senior campaign in grand fashion, winning five matches in a row to capture the coveted ITA All-American Championship in early October.

Not to be outdone, Scheldt was probably the hottest Bear this fall, accumulating a team-high 10 victories, including the Bulldog Classic title in late September. Scheldt made the final of the ASU Invitational as well, but had to retire from the match due to injury. She was named the team MVP at the conclusion of the 2003 season, in which she led the team in dual meet wins (21) en route to a 32-8 overall record. Last season's breakout year seems to only be the beginning for Scheldt, who comes into the spring No. 10 regionally and No. 60 nationally.

The Bears boast three other seniors that have all been nationally recognized throughout their careers. **Catherine Lynch**, **Nicole Havlicek** and **Jieun Jacobs** all enter their final seasons eager to hoist the NCAA Championship trophy above their heads.

Lynch starts out rated No. 17 regionally and No. 83 nationally. An All Pac-10 selection in 2002, Lynch has proved her worth at Cal. She has accumulated 88 singles victories in three seasons, including 28 in 2003. Havlicek, who went 6-3 in the fall and 34-9 last spring, enters the season ranked No. 22 in the region. She won the bulk of her matches last season on courts No. 4-6, on her way to an outstanding 19-4 dual meet record. Jacobs hobbled into the fall tournament schedule hampered by injury, but returns healthy enough this spring to make another run at an NCAA individual singles berth. Jacobs was one of three Bears that were extended an invitation a year ago, after posting a 31-10 overall record.

This group of seniors will be joined by freshman-phenom **Sasha Podkolzina**, this spring. Podkolzina has won three age-group national titles over the past few years and ended the past two seasons rated No. 1 nationally. Named the marquee recruit in the country by

many highly respected tennis publications, Podkolzina finds herself ranked No. 3 regionally and No. 18 overall, without even competing in a single dual match. In her first collegiate tournament this fall, she showed signs of brilliance, winning her first five matches at the ITA Regional Championships against highly ranked opponents. She reached the final of the Northwest Regional and earned a spot at the prestigious ITA Indoor Championship in early November.

Senior **Kristen Case**, junior **Rio Del Rosario** and sophomore **Jessica Shu** round out the Bears' line-up in 2004. The three will be asked to provide the adequate depth necessary to be a national championship contender.

Case was having a solid fall campaign, before falling victim to the injury bug. Before going down with an ankle problem, Case was 4-2 with two victories at the Bulldog Classic and the St. Mary's Tournament. Shu has yet to compete in a dual match for the Bears, but has 15 career tournament wins to her credit in just her second season with the Bears. Definitely a talent, Shu will have to wait her turn behind possibly the best crop of seniors in the country. Del Rosario is 2-6 in her career in tour-

nament action, but is constantly improving and looks to be an impact player for Brogan in the future.

The Bears also add to their arsenal of weapons spring admit **Monica Wiesener** from Laurel Springs Academy in Ojai, CA.

As good as the Bears are in singles competition, they may actually be better in doubles action.

Brogan led yet another doubles team to the NCAA title in 2003, and looks to do the same in 2004. Christina Fusano and Kops-Jones surged to the nation's forefront late in the spring, winning 24 of their last 27 matches to capture the Bears' fourth NCAA Doubles title in six years. With the departure of Fusano to graduation, Kops-Jones will have to break in a new partner in Podkolzina. Despite limited practice together, due to injury, the two were able to put together an impressive run at the ITA Regional tournament. They reached the final and earned a spot at the ITA Indoor Nationals. For their efforts, they'll be ranked the No. 2 duo in the region and the No. 7 team nationally entering the spring.

The Bears also have two other tandems looking to burst onto the national scene starting with Scheldt and Havlicek. Scheldt, a constant at court No. 2 last season with Jacobs as her partner, was given a new mate by Brogan this fall. After going 24-12 with Jacobs last spring, Scheldt, under the guidance of doubles-guru Brogan, meshed talents with Havlicek. The pair won six out of seven matches in the fall and brought home the ASU Invitational title in early November. They currently sit No. 10 in the region and No. 49 in the nation.

The team of Jacobs and Lynch also enters the spring as a Top 15 team in the region, having gone a combined 46-22 (.676) in doubles competition a year ago.

With commitment, respect, support, trust and 100% effort as their battle-cry, the 2004 Cal Women's Tennis team is poised for a run at the national championship.

In her 25 years at Cal, Brogan has molded the Golden Bear program into one of the best in the country, guiding the Bears to 22 NCAA appearances, three AIAW showings, including a trip to the finals in 1982, and 18 Top 10 finishes since 1982. Brogan has also produced four national champion doubles teams, 53 All-Americans, 15 first team All-Pac-10 selections and three conference player of

the year honorees during her career. She currently boasts a 470-187 (.715) dual match record, with her eyes set on the 500 win plateau.

Known for developing players mentally, strategically and technically, Brogan implements an applied sports psychology philosophy to her athletes, stressing class peak performance and life skills training. Her holistic educational coaching philosophy has guided the program to the highest graduation rate amongst sports teams at Cal, and one of the highest team GPA's on campus. A clinician for both the USTA and the ITA on team building and sport psychology, Brogan has written on the topic for the ITA newsletter and *Prince Sports Science Magazine*.

Although thorough in all aspects of player development, Brogan is known to have expertise as a doubles specialist. She has coached four

NCAA doubles champions during her years with the Golden Bears, including back-to-back championships (1998-99) with the doubles tandem of Amanda Augustus and current assistant coach Amy Jensen and last season pair of Raquel Kops-Jones and Christina Fusano.

Brogan herself has received an impressive list of accolades. Her continued dedication to excellence earned her the Wilson/ITA National Coach of the Year award in 1990, in addition to three ITA Northwest Region Coach of the Year honors in 1988, 1991 and 1993. She has also been named conference coach of the year eight times during her career, six consecutive years from 1982-1987 ('82-86 NorPac, '87 Pac-10) and twice more in 1992 and '94 (Pac-10).

A successful teaching professional in Los Gatos before taking Cal's head coaching job in 1978, Brogan has been a member of the ITA Board of Directors, ITA Operating Committee, NCAA Championship Tennis Committee and is the co-chair of the ITA Sport Science Committee. A former USTA junior national coach, Brogan received her first U.S. National team assignment in 1985 and in1995 as the U.S. women's head coach at the World University Games.

Brogan is a Bay Area native. A graduate of San Jose State University in Physical Education, she completed her teaching credential in 1978. In 1998 she completed a master's degree in sports psychology at John F. Kennedy University. She teaches an applied sports psychology and life skills class for student-athletes at Cal.

A former Cal All-American who won an unprecedented three consecutive NCAA doubles titles, Amy Jensen enters her second year as an assistant coach with the Golden Bears. Previously, she spent two years in the capacity of volunteer assistant coach with the women's tennis program.

The 25-year old Australian native was a three-year letter-winner for the Golden Bears (1996-2000), posting a career

record of 105-52 in singles and 94-29 in doubles. She won her doubles titles in 1998, 1999 and 2000, as well as being named a 1997 NCAA Singles All-American.

Before coming to Cal, Jensen was one of Australia's top juniors, earning a No. 15 world doubles ranking in 1996. She competed in both the 1996 Junior Wimbledon and Junior French Open, as well as claiming two European doubles titles with former Cal teammate Anita Kurimay in 1996.

Jensen graduated from Cal in May 2002 with a degree in Integrative Biology. She has also attained her strength and conditioning certification, and works as a strength and conditioning specialist with the tennis program.

WOMEN'S 2003 SEASON IN REVIEW

NCAA DOUBLES TITLE HIGHLIGHTED YEAR OF TOP PERFORMANCES

permanent fixture in the nation's elite Top 10. The Bears jumpstarted their 2003 campaign with a preseason No. 10 national ranking, reached their pinnacle in a tie for No. 2 on March 26 and entered their 22nd consecutive postseason appearance in May ranked No. 4. As one of only three teams to reach the NCAA Championships in every year of its existence, Cal cruised through the field reaching its fifth ever NCAA Semifinal match, only to lose a hard-fought contest to Bay Area rival Stanford, 4-1.

The Bears began the spring with a bang, upsetting then-ranked No. 1 Stanford in the quarterfinals of the Team Indoor Championships to advance to only its third-ever semifinal appearance in Madison. More importantly, the victory over the Cardinal was only the sixth win in 56 previous meetings with the cross-bay rival, while Stanford suffered only its second defeat in its previous 62 matches. Cal used that momentum to go on an 11-match win streak that lasted over one month, defeating No. 7 Arizona State, No. 10 Washington, No. 12 North Carolina and No. 13 Texas in that span.

The storybook regular season served as a primer for things to come, as the Bears were selected to participate in their 22nd consecutive NCAA Team Championship – representing one of only three schools to take part in all 22 NCAA Championships (UCLA and Stanford are the others). In NCAA Regional action, Cal swept through its first two opponents, Army and Texas A&M, in advancing to its seventh consecutive Sweet 16 appearance. A 4-1 hard-fought victory over USC earned Cal its fifth-ever semifinal appearance, but Stanford ended the run with a 4-1 defeat in the semifinals.

Individually, senior captain #25 **Christina Fusano** and juniors #6 **Raquel Kops-Jones** and #53 **Jieun Jacobs** were invited to participate in the NCAA Singles Championship, while #4 Fusano and Kops-Jones represented the Bears in the doubles championship. Jacobs pulled out of the singles competition due to personal reasons and Fusano lost in the Round of 32, but Kops-Jones made some waves in advancing to the quarterfinals. The Cal duo of Fusano and Kops-Jones did what they could not do in NCAA singles play, tearing through some of the best doubles tandems in the nation en route to the 2003 NCAA Doubles Crown.

In her third season with the Bears, Kops-Jones established herself as the No. 1 player on both the singles and doubles courts. She completed 2003 with a #6 national singles ranking and a career-best 44 wins to lead the team. Her doubles play was just as solid, as she and Fusano compiled a 38-10 overall record and a #4 national ranking, while claiming their second consecutive Pac-10 Doubles Championship in April. Kops-Jones made waves on the national scene by claiming the Northwest Regional singles crown in October, earning her a spot at the prestigious National Indoor Championships. For her efforts, she was named the team's Most Improved Player, garnered first team All-Pac-10 honors and earned the Northwest Region ITA Player to Watch award.

Fusano, the lone senior on the squad, was a rock-solid performer all season long, splicing together a 19-7 dual match singles record and 26-13 overall. Her career numbers speak for themselves, as she has claimed at least 25 wins in each of her four seasons while compiling an

overall singles record of 104-46 (.697) and doubles slate of 100-43 (.699). Fusano culminated her career a winner on and off the court, as she was awarded the 2003 Northwest Region Arthur Ashe, Jr. Sportsmanship & Leadership award, the Cissie Leary Award for Sportsmanship and the ITA Senior Player of the Years award.

Jacobs, a permanent fixture on singles courts three and four, finished with a 20-6 dual match singles mark and a 31-10 overall. Teamed with **Jody Scheldt**, the duo claimed the Thunderbird Invitational crown in early November and compiled an overall record of 24-12. Playing mostly at doubles No. 2, the pair owned an 18-10 dual match mark.

Scheldt, the winner of the team's most valuable player award, earned her stripes in her second season with the Bears, boasting a team-leading 21-4 dual match singles record and 32-8 overall. She cruised through the months of March and April with a 19-1 overall record, culminating the regular season by claiming the Pac-10 Invitational Singles Championship.

Junior **Nicole Havlicek**, playing mostly at singles No. 5, was also a force to be reckoned with in 2003. She finished the dual season with a 19-4 singles slate while placing second on the squad in overall victories with a 34-9 record. She started things off by claiming the Pac-10 Indoor Flight #3 title in January and finished with an appearance in the title match of the Pac-10 Championships in April. Paired with **Catherine Lynch**, the two own a 17-6 slate mostly playing at court three

Lynch saw time at courts two through four with a 13-12 record and 28-19 overall, including the clinching match in win over Army in the NCAA Round of 64. Redshirt freshman **Brooke Borisoff** saw her first dual meet action of the season, compiling a 4-3 record on court six.

1998 and '99, including a run to the quarterfinals in the 1998 singles bracket. The tradition continued last season, where Raquel Kops-Jones and Christina Fusano won the NCAA doubles title, giving the Bears four NCAA doubles championships six years.

The Bears most successful modern women's tennis player, however, may have been Lisa Albano, who was named Cal's Tennis Athlete of the Decade for 1986-96. The only Cal woman ever to reach the NCAA singles final in 1991, Albano capped off an outstanding collegiate career as a finalist for the prestigious national Honda Award with her fourth consecutive singles All-American selection. Albano was inducted into the Cal Athletic Hall of Fame in October 2000.


CAL TRADITION SPANS A CENTURY OF COMPETITION

Ithough not formally established as a Division I intercollegiate program until the late 1970s, the University of California women's tennis program traces its roots back to the early days of tennis competition in the United States. The Golden Bear tradition of excellence spans nearly the entire 20th century, as tennis greats from eight-time Wimbledon champion Helen Wills Moody Roark (1923-25) to 1998, '99 and '00 NCAA doubles champion Amy Jensen have graced the California courts.

With 22 NCAA Tournament appearances since the inception of the women's championships in 1982, Cal has built a solid national tennis reputation, reaching at least the quarterfinal round in 16 team championships and earning NCAA semifinal berths in 1985, '94, '99, '00 and '03.

Cal women's tennis has garnered 53 All-American selections in 28 varsity seasons, the bulk of which have come under current head coach Jan Brogan, the winningest female coach in NCAA tennis history. In addition to earning National Coach of the Year honors in 1990, Brogan has guided the Bears to six undefeated conference seasons (1981-86), 19 national Top 10 finishes and a national team final appearance at the 1982 AIAW Championships.

California's players have also earned individual recognition as some of the best the nation has to offer after qualifying for the last 18 consecutive NCAA singles and doubles tournaments. In 1998, '99 and '00 Amy Jensen became the only player in NCAA history to capture three consecutive NCAA doubles titles, giving Cal its first national championships. Jensen's teammate in 1998 and '99, Amanda Augustus, who had twice previously earned doubles All-America honors, also captured back-to-back singles All-America honors in

WOMEN'S ENDOWMENTS

Harper ('24), Helen Wills Moody Roark ('25) and Helen Hull Jacobs ('30), who helped establish the continuing standard of excellence that extends through the Golden Bears of today.

A two-time Olympic gold medalist, Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman was the first (and only) woman ever to win the U.S. National singles, doubles and mixed doubles titles in the same year (1909), repeating the achievement again in 1910 and 1911. In 1923, she left a lasting contribution in women's tennis by creating the Wightman Cup Championship between British and American women, competing herself in 1923-24, '27, '29 and '31. In her honor, the Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman Tennis Scholarship is awarded each season to the top women's tennis recruit.

Harper, Roark and Jacobs all left their mark on the California campus during the 1920s, with each eventually moving on to international acclaim. A lifetime Bay Area resident, Harper began her competitive career on the Cal courts and quickly established herself nationally, eventually becoming the nation's top-ranked singles player in 1930. A Top 10 singles player from 1928-32, Harper won the 1931 Wimbledon mixed doubles title. In her honor, a scholarship is awarded annually in Harper's name to the Cal tennis player with the highest grade point average.

Jacobs, too, achieved international success, winning a Wimbledon singles championship in addition to singles and doubles titles at the Italian Open. Jacobs spent a total of 13 years in the USTA's First 10 and capped off her career as the top ranked U.S. woman from 1932-35

Roark (better known in tennis circles as Helen Wills Moody) was one of the most successful women ever to play the game and was the top-ranked player in the United States seven times during her career. She won a total of 13 U.S. and six French National championships, collecting eight Wimbledon singles, three doubles and one mixed doubles championship and a gold medal in both singles and doubles at the 1924 Olympics.

In December 1994, Roark established an endowment for a grant-inaid in women's tennis with a \$100,000 gift to the program. Roark has also been a significant benefactor to research at the university, establishing a major endowment for support of research in the biological sciences.

The achievements of women like Wightman, Harper, Roark and Jacobs set the standard to which the California women's tennis program aspires. The tradition that began with these early greats has spawned countless All-Americans and tennis professionals, culminating in the top-flight players who grace Hellman Tennis Courts today.


