A LOOK AT THE BEARS

The No. 4 seed California Golden Bears (27-6, 15-3 Pac-10) are making the first trip to the Sweet 16 in the history of the program, advancing to the Trenton Regional after a pair of decisive first and second round victories over No. 10 seed Fresno State (70-47) and No. 5 Virginia (99-73).

The Bears will take on the UConn Huskies (35-0, 16-0 Big East), the No. 1 seed in the Trenton Region and the overall No. 1 seed in the tournament. The two teams will be playing on Sunday, March 29 for the right to advance to the elite eight to face either Texas A&M (27-7, 11-5 Big-12) or Arizona State (25-8, 15-3 Pac-10) on Tuesday, March 31 to get a ticket to the Final Four in St. Louis the following weekend.

Cal has never beaten the top-ranked team in the nation. Their biggest victory was the upset of then-ranked No. 2 Rutgers, 82-73, earlier this season at Haas Pavilion in Berkeley.

The Bears come into the game with a 27-6 overall record, tying for the most wins in a season in program history. In their 7 NCAA tournament appearances, they have a record of 4-6.

Since their final game of the Pac-10 regular season, the Bears offense has been heating up, averaging 74.2 points per game, well above their regular-season average of 66.7. The scored a season-high 99 points against No. 24 Virginia, their third victory of the season over a top-25 opponent.

The Bears are led by first team All-Pac-10 senior forward **Ashley Walker**. Walker, who led the Pac-10 in scoring this season with a 19.1 point per game average, is averaging 24.0 ppg in the Bears four post-season games. She tied her career high with a 32-point performance against Virginia, the fourth time this season Walker has eclipsed the 30-point mark.

Walker has scored 20 or more points in five of the six NCAA tournament games in her career. She has scored 134 points in NCAA Tournament games (22.3 ppg). She

has led the Bears in scoring in all six of the Tournament games she has played in.

Walker is a finalist for the Wooden Award and the State Farm Wade Trophy and is on the final ballot for the Naismith Award, the three national player of the year honors.

Senior forward **Devanei Hampton** got off to a slow start to the season. Coming back from offseason knee surgery, Hampton missed the first three games of the season completely and did not return to the starting line up until Dec. 29. Coming off the bench, Hampton averaged 5.6 points and 3.3 rebounds per game. Since Dec. 29, Hampton has averaged 10.2 points and 7.0 rebounds, earning her Third-Team All-Pac-10 honors. Hampton played her best game of the season against Virginia. She scored a season-high 22 points with 11 rebounds for her third double-double in the last five games, but her first career NCAA tournament double-double. Hampton has four double-digit scoring performances in six career NCAA tournament games. She averages 13.5 ppg in her NCAA career games.

Junior guard **Alexis Gray-Lawson** earned her first All-Pac-10 First Team honors this season. Gray-Lawson was second on the team in scoring, averaging 11.9 points per game, but it was the 37 she scored on Jan. 18 against then-ranked No. 6 Stanford that left the biggest impression. Gray-Lawson is second on Cal's all-time three-point shooters list and ranked third in three-point efficiency in the Pac-10 during most of the season. Gray-Lawson hit four three-pointers en route to scoring 22 points against Virginia.

Gray-Lawson has four double-digit scoring tournament games in the five in her career. She averages 14.4 ppg in the Tournament.

Junior point guard **Natasha Vital** comes into the tournament ranked sixth on the Cal career assist list, with 108 dishes so far this season. Vital had five assists with zero turnovers in the Fresno State game. Vital is another accurate three-point threat, who was second in the Pac-10 with a three-point accuracy above 40.0 through the end of the regular season. Vital was an honorable mention All-Pac-10 and all-defensive team.

Rounding out the starting lineup is junior guard **Lauren Grief**. Grief was third on the team in rebounding, averaging 5.6 boards per game. She's also an outside shooting threat, averaging over a made-three per game this season. Grief has found her shooting stroke, putting up back-to-back double-digit point performances in the two NCAA games. Grief was one assist shy of a double double against Virginia, with 9 assists to go with her 10 points.

The Bears' top performers off the bench are freshman guard **Casey Morris** (4.6 ppg, 1.58 apg) and sophomore forward/guard **Kelsey Adrian** (3.3 ppg, 2.1 rpg). Adrian is a 6-1 guard who can play multiple positions on

the floor, giving the coaching staff options in their substitutions. Morris, the lone freshman to get quality minutes on this veteran squad, has played in every game this season for the Bears. Junior forward **Rama N'diaye** (2.3 ppg, 2.3 rpg) will also see quality minutes in the game. At 6-5, N'diaye gives the Bears extra height in their post rotation.

SNEAKER TIME

The Cal Bears are wearing unique Nike shoes the players designed themselves while on their Oregon road trip this season. They are one of only four teams in the tournament that Nike worked with to create a NCAA postseason team sneaker.

BLUE AND GOLD

Official colors of the University of California were established at Berkeley in 1868. The colors were chosen by the University's founders, who were mostly Yale men who had come west. They selected gold as a color representing the "Golden State" of California. The blue was selected from Yale blue. Cal teams have donned the blue and gold since the beginning of intercollegiate competition in 1882.

GOLDEN BEARS

In 1895, the University of California track & field team was the dominant power on the West Coast and decided to challenge several of the top teams in the Midwest and East on an eight-meet tour that is now credited by many historians as putting Cal athletics onto the national scene. As a symbol of the University, Regent Arthur Rodgers, class of 1872, commissioned a blue silk banner emblazoned with a gold grizzly bear, the symbol of the state of California. The banner was carried by the team on its successful tour, which saw it win five of eight competitions. Cal athletics fans were so ecstatic over the team's performance that Prof. Charles Mills Gayley was inspired to write the song, "The Golden Bear." Cal's athletic teams have been known as the Golden Bears ever since.

DANCING AND BOWLING

The California Golden Bears are the only Pac-10 school this season to have their football team earn a bowl bid and both their men's and women's basketball teams secure invitations to the NCAA tournament. The Cal football team took on the University of Miami in the Emerald Bowl Dec. 27 in San Francisco. The Cal men secured a No. 7 seed in the West Region, taking on the No. 10 Maryland Terrapins in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in Kansas City, Mo.

There are 11 schools overall in 2008-09 who have had football teams play in a bowl game and their men's and women's hoops teams make it to the NCAA tournament.

HAAS PAVILION

Cal completed its ninth season in the 11,877-seat Walter A. Haas Jr. Pavilion this year. The \$57.5 million facility is a renovated and expanded version of old Harmon Gym. In addition to the basketball court, the building features coaching and administrative office space, locker rooms, a spacious weight room, athletic training facilities and a student-athlete computer lab, as well as media work and interview rooms. In 2007-08, Cal set a Pac-10 and Cal single-game attendance record of 10,525 fans against No. 7 Stanford Feb. 23. That number is the record for Haas Pavilion and Harmon Gym, the program's previous home. In 2008-09, the Bears had their second-ever crowd of over 10,000, with 10,126 fans attending the "Battle of the Bay" between Cal and Stanford on Jan. 18. Cal averaged 2,285 fans per game in 15 home contests this season.

OPPONENT SCOUTING REPORT**A LOOK AT UCONN**

UConn advanced to the NCAA Regional Semifinals for the 16th consecutive season and the 17th time overall in the program's history. The Huskies defeated Vermont, 104-65, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and Florida, 87-59, in the second round.

UConn earned an automatic bid in 2009 after capturing Big East Tournament and Regular Season Titles. The Huskies captured the tournament title with wins over South Florida, Villanova and Louisville following a 16-0 BIG EAST mark during the regular season. Connecticut currently stands at 35-0 overall and has been ranked No. 1 nationally in both the Associated Press and ESPN Coaches polls every week this season.

The automatic berth marks the Huskies' second consecutive and the 15th in the program's history. Connecticut has advanced to the Final Four nine times in the program's history, including six of the last nine seasons overall.

UConn's 35-0 start marks its best start to a season since finishing a perfect 39-0 in 2002. This season marks the 12th time overall and the third straight season that UConn has entered the NCAA Tournament as a No. 1 seed. The Huskies boast an overall mark of 47-7 in NCAA Tournament games when playing as a No. 1 seed and have captured four National Championships in those seasons. The Huskies were also a No. 1 seed last season when they advanced to the 2008 NCAA Final Four before falling, 82-73, to Stanford, a team with whom the Bears split the 2007-08 series, 1-1.

Sophomore guard Maya Moore, who is a national player of the year candidate, leads the Huskies, averaging 19.0 points per game and 9.1 boards per game. Also averaging in double digits are Tina Charles (16.7 ppg) and Renee Montgomery (16.1 ppg). The undefeated Huskies are winning each game by an average scoring margin of 31.6 points.

The two teams share three common opponents in 2008-09 in Rutgers, Oklahoma and Washington. Each squad has defeated Rutgers – Cal once and UConn twice – while the Huskies hold the advantage against Oklahoma. The Bears beat Washington three times this season while the Connecticut Huskies beat the UW Huskies once.

CAL-UCONN SERIES HISTORY

The Bears are 1-1 in the all-time series with the Huskies. The last game was Dec. 28, 1994, when UConn beat Cal, 99-52. In their first meeting, the Bears dropped the Huskies, 76-60, on Nov. 24, 1991. This will be the first postseason meeting between the two teams.

UCONN POSTSEASON HISTORY

The Huskies, who have claimed three of the last seven NCAA titles (a total of five in the program's history), their last coming in 2004, are making their 21st consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. The Huskies have advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in each of the past 15 seasons (1994-present). They are currently 67-15 all-time in NCAA Tournament play and they have won 32 of its last 35 NCAA Tournament games overall.

HEAD COACH FILE

Geno Auriemma is in his 24th season at the helm of the Husky program, which he has to five national championships, nine Final Fours and 32 Big East titles. He was named Big East Coach of the Year for the eighth time in 2008-09, was recognized as the 2008 WBCA, Associated Press, USBWA and Naismith National Coach of the Year in 2008.

A LOOK AT ARIZONA STATE

Arizona State will be playing to advance to the regional final for the second time in three years under coach Charli Turner Thorne, after reaching its first Elite Eight in 2007. The Sun Devils (25-8, 15-3 Pac-10) improved to 6-1 in NCAA Tournament first round games under head coach Arizona State is making its 10th all-time NCAA Tournament appearance and its seventh in the last nine seasons. ASU's overall record in the NCAA Tournament is now 11-9, including an 9-6 record under Turner Thorne.

The Sun Devils were ousted in the quarterfinals of the Pac-10 Tournament by tournament runner-up USC. ASU received an at-large bid an a six seed into the NCAA Tournament. The Sun Devils defeated No. 11 seed Georgia, 58-47, in first round action. They went on to upset third-seeded Florida State, 63-58 in the second round thanks to Danielle Orsillo's 3-pointer with 32 seconds remaining gave the Sun Devils a 57-54 lead.

Head coach Turner Thorne is in her 13th year at the helm in Tempe, Ariz. She became the all-time most winningest coach at ASU.

CAL-ARIZONA STATE SERIES HISTORY

The Bears and the Sun Devils are tied in the all-time meetings, 27-27. This season, the teams split the two meetings with ASU getting a 63-41 upset on March 5, 2009 in the last game. The Bears beat the Sun Devils, 54-53, on Jan. 4 in Tempe, Ariz. This would be the first meeting between the two teams in the NCAA Tournament.

A LOOK AT TEXAS A&M

The No. 2-seeded Aggies are making their second-straight appearance in the Sweet 16 and their sixth all-time trip to the NCAA Tournament. Texas A&M earned a 73-42 win over No. 10-seed Minnesota in the second round and an 80-45 victory against No. 15-seeded Evansville in the opening round. With the win over Minnesota, the Aggies claimed their 27th overall victory of the season, which now stands alone as the second-most wins in school history behind its 29-8 run to the NCAA Elite Eight a year ago. They are now 8-5 in the NCAA Tournament.

For the second consecutive year, the ninth-ranked Texas A&M women's basketball team tied a program-best by earning a No. 2 seed. The Aggies boasted the fifth-toughest schedule in the nation this season. A&M earned an at-large bid after falling to Baylor in the Big 12 Tournament championship game.

Head coach Gary Blair has now led seven all-time squads to the Sweet 16 in his 24-year coaching career at Stephen F. Austin, Arkansas and A&M combined. He also picked up his 20th all-time NCAA Tournament game victory versus Minnesota.

CAL-TEXAS A&M SERIES HISTORY

Cal holds the all-time advantage, 1-0, against the Aggies. The teams have not met since Jan. 4, 1982, when the Bears defeated Texas A&M, 85-55

In a game with two players named Ashley Walker, only one stood out. California's Ashley Walker always saves her best for the NCAA tournament, and the senior did so again.

Walker scored 21 points and Cal's perimeter defense overwhelmed Fresno State in a 70-47 first-round victory Saturday night in the Trenton Regional. The Bears (26-6) advanced to a second-round game.

Playing in her final NCAA tournament, Cal's Walker was 9-of-12 from the floor and grabbed eight rebounds. She has scored 20 or more points in four of the five NCAA tourney games she's played.

Alexis Gray-Lawson added 14 points and Lauren Greif 11 in the 13th-ranked Bears' sixth consecutive win over the Bulldogs.

The fourth-seeded Bears, who improved to 3-6 in the tourney, have never gotten past the second round in their six previous appearances.

They were right at home at Galen Center, though, having played two games on the same court during last week's Pac-10 tournament, where the Bears were upset by USC in the semifinals.

The Bears opened the game on a 14-5 run, with Walker scoring 11 points, including nine in a row.

From there, the Bulldogs outscored Cal 15-10 to close to 24-20, the closest

they got the rest of the game. But the Bulldogs also committed four of their 11 first-half turnovers in that stretch and twice trailed by 10 points, their largest deficit of the half.

Walker, Rama N'diaye and Natasha Vital each hit jumpers as Cal closed out the half on a 6-1 spurt to extend its lead to 30-21 while the Bulldogs committed three consecutive traveling turnovers.

Walker scored the Bears' first basket of the second half, and they quickly built a 46-23 lead. Greif, Vital and Gray-Lawson each hit 3-pointers, and Walker had another basket in Cal's 16-2 run.

On Gray-Lawson's 3-pointer, Walker stole the ball, tripped and fell getting upcourt but still managed to find her teammate beyond the arc. The Bears shot 42 percent from the floor.

Fresno State, the WAC tournament champions, led the nation in 3-pointers made per game all season, averaging 9.5. But the Bulldogs were just 4-of-18 against the Bears and committed 21 turnovers - five above their average.

The Bulldogs were limited to 32 percent shooting from the floor, with Jaleesa Ross, Hayley Munro and Bailey Amundsen - the Bulldogs' three top scorers - all held under their double-digit averages.

FRESNO STATE 47, NO. 14 CALIFORNIA 70

Walker scored 21 points and Cal's perimeter defense overwhelmed Fresno State in a 70-47 first-round victory. Walker was 9-of-12 from the floor and grabbed eight rebounds. From there, the Bulldogs outscored Cal 15-10 to close to 24-20, the closest they got the rest of the game. Fresno State, the WAC tournament champions, led the nation in 3-pointers made per game all season, averaging 9.5. GAME NOTES

The 23 points was, at the time, the largest margin of victory for the Bears in an NCAA tournament game, topping last season's 17-point victory, 77-60, over San Diego. It was the largest margin of victory for the Bears since their 84-42 victory over Oregon on Feb. 19.

Cal never trailed against Fresno State. Cal never trailed in last year's victory over San Diego and never trailed until the last shot by George Washington in their second round loss.

It was the 14th game this season where they have held their opponent to under 50 points. Bears opponents in three of their last four games have failed to score 50 points. The Bears have 22 games where they have held their opponent to 55 or fewer points, all of which were Bears' victories.

Cal converted their final 10 free throw attempts of the game. Prior to that stretch, Cal was 7-for-14 from the line.

Cal scored 24 points off turnovers. Fresno State scored just seven.

After logging 10 first-half turnovers, the Bears only had three in the second half.

Fresno State has just four treys in the game. They average over 9 makes per contest. The Bears defense allowed only 18 attempts for a team that averages 27 long-range shots per game.

Walker had a season-high three blocks against Fresno State. Walker is second on the Cal career blocked shot list with 173.

Walker scored 13 of Cal's first 16 points of the game, all within the first eight minutes of the game.

Junior guard **Natasha Vital** had five assists and zero turnovers. It was her second straight game that she did not turn the ball over.

Junior guard **Alexis Gray-Lawson** had her third double-digit scoring effort in four NCAA Tournament games.

Vital logged her 100th assist of the season.

Junior forward **Rama N'diaye** scored six points, tying her highest single-game total of the season.

A powerful inside duo and a sharp-shooting guard helped California put up NBA-like numbers in taking the school where it's never been before.

Senior forward Ashley Walker scored 20 of her career-high-tying 32 points in the first half, and Cal used its strong inside game to rout Virginia 99-73, sending the Golden Bears to the NCAA tournament's final 16 for the first time in school history.

Senior center Devanei Hampton had 22 points and 11 rebounds and junior Alexis Gray-Lawson added 22 points for the fourth-seeded Bears (27-6), who advanced to the Trenton Regional semifinals Sunday in New Jersey. They'll play the winner of Tuesday's game between Connecticut and Florida.

Walker and Hampton and Gray-Lawson scored 76 of their team's 99 points, by far Cal's highest-scoring game this season.

Monica Wright scored 26 points before fouling out with 2:23 remaining for fifth-seeded Virginia (24-10), seeking its first trip to the regional semifinals since 2000.

The Bears' 27th victory equaled the most in program history, a mark set last year when they were 27-7. They improved to 4-7 in NCAA tournament games, and advanced out of the second round a year after losing to George Washington in their second game.

Walker snapped a 12-all tie with a layup that launched the Bears on a 41-23 run and gave them a 53-35 halftime lead. Walker had 16 points in the spurt, Hampton added eight, junior guard Lauren Greif seven and Gray-Lawson six on back-to-back 3-pointers.

Greif finished with 10 points and a career-high nine assists.

Walker's jumper in the paint gave Cal its first double-digit lead, 28-18, and the Bears went on to their largest lead of 19 points near the end of the half.

Cal outscored the Cavaliers 10-6, including 3-pointers by Gray-Lawson and Natasha Vital, to open the second half and take a 63-41 lead.

Virginia answered with a 16-5 run to close to 68-57 with 11:43 remaining. Wright scored 10 points as the Cavaliers got more aggressive and took advantage of misses and turnovers by the Bears.

But 11 points was as close as Virginia got the rest of the game.

Walker, Hampton and Gray-Lawson combined for a 13-4 spurt that pushed the Bears' lead to 81-61 with 6:26 remaining.

Walker scored more than 20 points for the fifth time in six career NCAA tournament games. She had 21 points in Cal's 23-point first-round win over Fresno State.

GAME NOTES

The Bears tied the program record for most victories in a season with 27, which was set last year when the Bears posted a 27-7 mark. They are 27-6 in 2008-09.

Fifth-seeded Virginia marked the highest seeded team that the Bears have defeated in the NCAA tournament program history.

VIRGINIA 73, NO. 14 CALIFORNIA 99

Ashley Walker tied a career high, scoring 32 points as the Bears advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time in program history. Walker snapped a 12-all tie with a layup that launched the Bears on a 41-23 run and gave them a 53-35 halftime lead. Walker had 16 points in the spurt, Hampton added eight, junior guard Lauren Greif seven and Gray-Lawson six on back-to-back 3-pointers. The Cavaliers pulled within 11 in the second half, but could get no closer as the Bears scored a season-high 99 points to secure the victory.

Ashley Walker had 10 points in the first 12 minutes of play.

With 53 first-half points, it was 2nd time in the 2008-09 season that Cal had scored 50 or more points in a half and the sixth time this season that the Bears had scored 40 plus points in a half.

Cal only had one turnover in the first half, a season-low. Their previous best was two games with two turnovers.

Cal's six turnovers were a season low. The previous low was seven against Nevada on Nov. 16, 2008.

With four straight free throws in the first half, the Bears had made 14 straight free throws, with 10 coming in the Fresno State game.

Lauren Greif's nine assists were a career high. Greif's nine were Cal best in the NCAA Tournament, edging the previous record of eight, set twice before.

Ashley Walker's 32 points against the Cavaliers were a personal best in an NCAA Tournament game. Her previous best was 21 against Fresno State this year and also against St. John's in 2006. It was one shy of the 33 points scored by Trisha Stafford against Santa Clara in 1992.

It was the fourth time this season Walker scored more than 30 points in a game.

Alexis Gray-Lawson's 22 points against Virginia set a new career high in an NCAA Tournament game.

Cal's final total of 99 points is a new program high in the NCAA Tournament.

The Bears' final total of 99 points was also a season best.

The last time the Bears scored 99 points was their Dec. 30, 2007 99-55 rout of Washington State at Haas Pavilion.

Cal made 37 field-goals against Virginia, which is a new program best in the NCAA Tournament. Ashley Walker's 14 made field goals were also a new high.

Alexis Gray-Lawson now holds the Bears' record for three-pointers made in an NCAA Tournament game with four, breaking her own record of three (set against San Diego last year).



CAL EARNS SEVENTH NCAA TOURNAMENT BERTH

In 2008-09, Cal earned its seventh invitation to the NCAA Tournament and fourth under fourth-year head coach **Joanne Boyle**. This year marks the first time Cal has received four straight NCAA Tournament selections. The Bears own a 2-6 all-time NCAA Tournament record, including a program-best second-round showing in 1993 and 2007. Cal also has advanced to the WNIT four times – 1979, 1981, 1984 and 1987, when the Bears finished second for their best result.

2008 NCAA FLASHBACK

Ashley Walker posted 21 points and 12 rebounds to lead third-seeded Cal to a 77-60 victory over the 14-seeded San Diego. **Devanei Hampton** tallied 22 points in the second-ever NCAA tournament victory for a Bears team and their first since 1993. Cal jumped out to a 14-2 lead in less than five minutes and never trailed. The Bears led 42-27 at the half and cruised to the 17-point victory. In the second round, however, the Bears were stunned by a George Washington comeback to lose 55-53. The Bears led the entire game, holding a 51-44 advantage with 4:08 left in the game. George Washington kept pushing, with Sarah-Jo Lawrence getting a basket with two seconds remaining in the game to give George Washington its only lead of the game. Walker scored 19 points with nine rebounds. **Alexis Gray-Lawson** had 14 points with nine rebounds.

2007 NCAA FLASHBACK

Eighth-seeded Cal fought back from a nine-point halftime deficit to grab several leads before falling to ninth-seeded Notre Dame, 62-59, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in Pittsburgh. **Ashley Walker** led Cal with 20 points and 13 rebounds for her conference-leading 12th double-double. Walker made 10-of-12 foul shots, including 10-of-10 in the first half, to keep the Bears in the game. **Devanei Hampton** posted 13 points and nine rebounds, highlighted by 11 points and five boards after halftime, but battled through foul trouble, playing only eight minutes in the first half. Cal continued its trademark fight in close contests during the final minute. **Krista Foster**, who played most of the second half, grabbed a

defensive rebound and found **Natasha Vital** racing down court for a fast-break layup to cut Notre Dame's edge to 58-56 with 37.7 on the clock. The Bears sent Notre Dame freshman Melissa Lechlitner to the foul line with 31.8 to go, and she missed the front end of a one-and-one situation to give Cal a chance. Vital fed the ball to Hampton in the low post, but as Hampton made her move to the basket she lost the ball out of bounds with 19 seconds to play. With seven seconds remaining, Cal's **Lauren Greif** made three free throws after being fouled in the act of shooting a three-pointer to make it a one-point game. Charel Allen led Notre Dame with 13 points, and Lechlitner added 12.

2006 NCAA FLASHBACK

Tenth-seeded Cal returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 13 years and held a 16-7 edge with 11:35 to play in the first half over No. 7-seed St. John's but lost, 78-68, in the first round in University Park, Pa. The Red Storm went ahead, 21-20, with 3:35 left before halftime and 32-27 at the break and never relinquished its leads. St. John's led 65-49 with 7:41 to play before **Alexis Gray-Lawson** tallied seven straight points to pull Cal within six, 72-66 with 1:20 left in the game. **Ashley Walker** led Cal with then-career highs of 21 points and six assists, and Gray-Lawson registered 17 points. **Devanei Hampton** fouled out after posting 16 points in only 13 minutes. **Keanna Levy**, who had seen limited action all season, came off the bench to spark the Bears with eight points, one rebound and one assist in a then-career-high 29 minutes. Kia Wright and Greeba Barlow led the Red Storm with 26 and 21 points, respectively.

CAL SUFFERS STUNNING DEFEAT IN 2009 PAC-10 SEMIFINALS

After beating Washington, 61-41, in the Pac-10 Tournament quarterfinals, Cal advanced to the semifinals of the 2009 Pac-10 conference tournament for the third straight season. The USC Trojans jumped out to a hot start, putting Cal in its largest halftime deficit of the season. After trailing by 13 points in the second half, Cal started a late rally, going on a 15-5 run to pull within two points, 69-67. The Bears had possession of the ball with seven seconds remaining when the Trojans fouled junior guard **Alexis Gray-Lawson**, putting her at the line with a chance to tie the game. Gray-Lawson missed both free throws, with USC pulling down the rebound. Gray-Lawson fouled the Trojan player, who then missed both of her free throws. Cal got the rebound, but lost control of the ball while bringing it up the court. The ball went out of bounds off of a Trojan, giving the Bears a chance to inbound the ball deep in their own zone with 0.3 seconds left on the clock. Junior guard **Lauren Greif** threw a perfect pass to Ashley Walker beneath the hoop, who tipped the ball into the basket and seemingly tied the game for the Bears. After the officials reviewed the play, the basket was waived off

and USC earned the 69-67 victory and the trip to the Pac-10 Championship game.

Walker was named to the All-Tournament team, marking the third straight year the Bears have had a player earn the honor. Devanei Hampton earned the accolade in 2006-07 and 2007-08. Walker scored 43 points with 25 rebounds in her two tournament games.

WALKER, GRAY-LAWSON HEADLINE PAC-10 HONOREES

Senior forward **Ashley Walker** and redshirt junior guard **Alexis Gray-Lawson** were among the five first-team All-Pac-10 selections. This marked only the fourth time in school history and the second straight year that the Bears have had two first-team All-Pac-10 honorees in one season. Walker is one of only two three-time first team All-Pac-10 selections in school history. Senior forward **Devanei Hampton** is the only other player to earn that honor three times. This season, Hampton was named to the third team. Walker was also named to the five-member Pac-10 All-Defensive team, the second year she has earned that award. Junior guard **Natasha Vital** was named as an honorable mention for both All-Pac-10 honors and the Defensive Team.

PAC-10 PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

ALEXIS GRAY-LAWSON

Scoring over half the team's points in the first part of "Battle of the Bay" at home against Stanford on Jan. 11, junior guard Alexis Gray-Lawson was named the U.S. Bank Pac-10 Player of the Week for Jan. 12-18. Gray-Lawson scored 37 points to help lead the Golden Bears to a thrilling 57-54 victory over Bay Area-rival and top-10 ranked Stanford, converting on two decisive free throws with 1:09 left to play to put California up for good. The junior took over for the Bears, who were battling for the top spot in the league standings, scoring a career-high 37 points. Gray-Lawson was the first Bear to score more than 35 points in a game since Jennifer Bennet scored 39 points March 20, 1987. Gray-Lawson converted 60 percent of her shots, going 12-20 from the floor, including 5-7 from beyond the arc. It is also the second-highest single-game total in the Pac-10 this season and tied for the ninth highest in the country.

ASHLEY WALKER

Ashley Walker earned the Pac-10 player of the week honor three times this season. Her eight career player of the week honors are one shy of the league record.

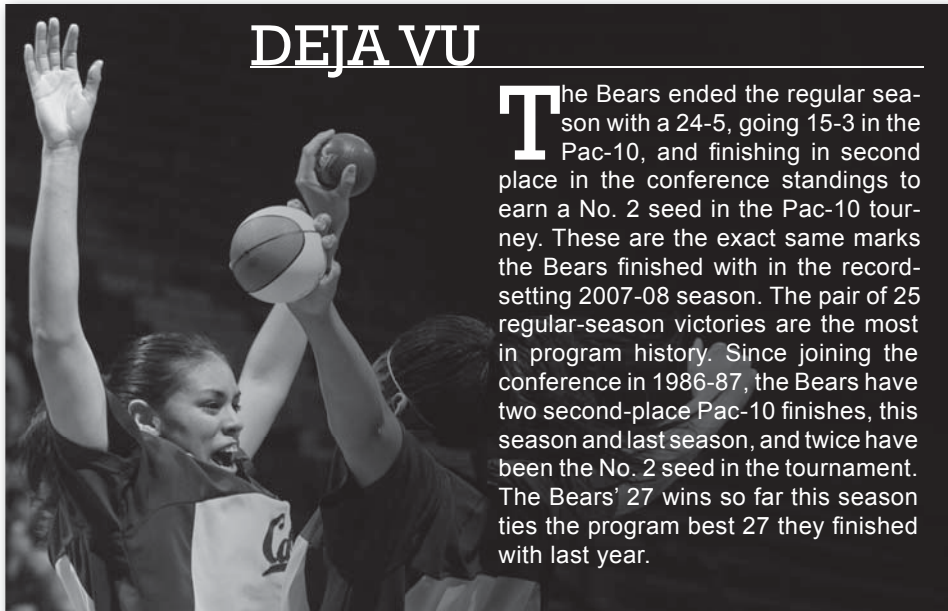
Her first POW honor came after leading the then-No. 3 Bears to a 3-0 week at the Paradise Jam over the Thanksgiving weekend. Walker averaged 22.7 points, 6.0 rebounds and 2.3 assists over three games at the holiday tournament in the Virgin Islands, also earning the event's most valuable player distinction for the Reef Division. After opening the week with six points, four rebounds and three assists in the 85-55 rout of South Florida, Walker went on to post back-to-back 30-point efforts to lead the team to the Paradise Jam championship game. Against Texas Tech, she netted 30 points on 9-for-14 shooting, including a three-pointer

on her only long-range attempt. She was impressive from the free throw line, as well, going 11-for-11. Walker followed with a 32-point, eight-rebound performance in the title tilt versus Iowa, which the Bears won handily, 76-43. She was 14-for-21 and perfect again from the charity stripe, knocking down all four attempts from the line. Walker shot 60.5 percent from the floor during the week and was 15-for-15 from the foul line. She also tacked on six steals and four blocks in the tournament.

Walker earned the honor in back-to-back weeks when she was named Pac-10 Player of the Week for the following week, Dec. 2-7. She averaged 26.0 points and 10.0 rebounds per game as Cal advanced to the championship game of its home tournament, the Colliers International Classic, before falling to then-No. 22 TCU. She shot 64.5 percent (20-31) for the weekend and made 78.6 percent of her free throws (11-14) in a combined 68 minutes of playing time. Walker had 21 points and eight rebounds in the win over Princeton in the opening game of the tournament, going 9-for-12 from the field. Her performance in the title game against the Horned Frogs included her third double-double (31 points, 12 rebounds) and third 30-point performance of the season. One point off her career high against TCU, Walker was named to the all-tournament team.

Her third player of the week honor of the year came the week of Feb. 16-22. Walker averaged 22 points, shooting 55.9 percent from the field, and had 10 rebounds in the home series against the Oregon schools on Feb. 19 and 21. Against Oregon, she recorded 20 of her game-high 24 points in the first half, and also grabbing 11 rebounds and adding two assists as the Bears ran away with the victory, 84-42. On the night she became Cal's career rebounding leader, Feb. 21 against Oregon State, Walker shot 62 percent from the floor, going 8-for-13. The forward/center finished the game with 20 points, her 16th 20-plus-point outing of the season.

DEJA VU



The Bears ended the regular season with a 24-5, going 15-3 in the Pac-10, and finishing in second place in the conference standings to earn a No. 2 seed in the Pac-10 tourney. These are the exact same marks the Bears finished with in the record-setting 2007-08 season. The pair of 25 regular-season victories are the most in program history. Since joining the conference in 1986-87, the Bears have two second-place Pac-10 finishes, this season and last season, and twice have been the No. 2 seed in the tournament. The Bears' 27 wins so far this season ties the program best 27 they finished with last year.

20-20-20 VISION

Head coach **Joanne Boyle** has led her teams to back-to-back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in program history. The Bears had back-to-back 20 win seasons in 1980-81 and 1981-82, but had never won 20 games three seasons in a row. This is just the eighth time in program history the team has finished with 20 or more wins. Including her time in Richmond, Boyle has now led teams to 20 or more victories in six of seven years as a head coach.

RECORD WIN STREAKS

The Bears set multiple consecutive victory marks this season. The Bears won seven games to start the season, the best start to a season in the history of Cal women's basketball. The Bears also had a 33-game nonconference home win streak. They had not lost to a non-Pac-10 opponent while playing at Haas Pavilion since a Nov. 26, 2005 loss to Baylor. The Bears snapped both of those streaks with a home loss on Dec. 7 to TCU. After falling to Oklahoma on Dec. 13, the Bears put together a string of 12 straight victories, 11 of which came against Pac-10 opponents. Both of those streaks were snapped by the Feb. 14 loss at Stanford. The 12-game win streak had been the fifth longest active streak among all DI teams before it ended. The Bears previous record for consecutive victories had been 10. Cal's previous record for consecutive Pac-10 wins was eight.

INJURIES

With only 11 players on the roster, injuries are a key element to the Bear's season story. The Bears began the season without the help of two of their posts – 6-3 senior and three-time first team All-Pac-10 selection **Devane Hampton** and 6-5 junior **Rama N'diaye**. Hampton missed the first three games of the season while recovering from June 30, 2008 arthroscopic surgery to repair cartilage in her right knee. This was the third time in her collegiate career Hampton underwent surgery on her right knee.

N'diaye missed the first 18 games of the season recovering from surgery to repair her ACL from an injury sustained in the Bears first round 2008 NCAA Tournament game against San Diego.

The Bears were very lucky to avoid any new injuries to their squad, though they had a big scare on March 1 when junior guard **Alexis Gray-Lawson** left the UCLA game with a knee injury. An MRI revealed that Gray-Lawson had merely sprained her left knee. She was back on the court for the next game and did not miss a start. Gray-Lawson

missed all but nine games of the 2006-07 season after sustaining a season-ending ACL injury to her right knee.

Sophomore forward/guard **Kelsey Adrian** missed two games this season after sustaining a mild concussion against Oregon State on Feb. 21.

PARADISE JAM TOURNAMENT

The Bears travelled to St. Thomas in the US Virgin Islands to play in the Paradise Jam tournament over Thanksgiving weekend. The Bears won the Reef Division crown with victories over South Florida, Texas Tech, and Iowa. Senior forward **Ashley Walker** scored 68 points with 18 rebounds in the tournament to be named the Reef Division MVP. **Alexis Gray-Lawson** and **Lauren Greif** were also named to the All-Tournament team.

IT'S MAGIC

On Sunday, March 1, NBA legend Magic Johnson stopped by the Cal pre-game meal to meet with the team. Magic, along with former NBA great Mark Aguirre, father of freshman Angelei Aguirre, had breakfast with the team, told stories about their days in the NBA, before Magic delivered some inspirational words to the players. After breakfast, he met each of them and spent time chatting with them on an individual basis.

DEFENSE

The Bears are best known for their defense. They closed out the regular season holding opponents to just 53.7 points per game, making them No. 13 in the nation. They are on pace to set the Pac-10 record for lowest points allowed average, breaking the previous record of 54.3 set last season by Cal.

The Bears have twice held opponents to 10 or fewer points in a half, with Oregon scoring 10 in the first half of the game in Eugene on Jan. 24 and Washington scoring just nine first half points at Haas on Jan. 11. The Bears have five games this season where the opponent was held to 40 or fewer points.

The Bears are 22-0 when holding their opponents to 55 or fewer points.

THREE POINTERS

The Bears have two of the most efficient three-point shooters in the Pac-10. Junior guard **Natasha Vital** and **Alexis Gray-Lawson** were ranked second and third in three-point shooting efficiency in the Pac-10 for most of the season. Gray-Lawson made eight consecutive three-point attempts over a three game span in late February. She was perfect against Oregon and Oregon State and went 4-for-4 from long range in the first half of the USC game before snapping the streak in the second half.

Gray-Lawson moved up to No. 2 on the Cal career three-point list, passing Liz Rizzo (1994-97, 135) and has a good chance to leave Cal after next season as the all-time career leader in that category.

ASSISTS

Alexis Gray-Lawson earned her first career double-double of her career on Dec. 6 when she scored 12 points with 10 assists against Princeton. Gray-Lawson was the only Pac-10 player this season to log 10 assists in a game.

Gray-Lawson is third in the Pac-10 this season in assist-to-turnover ratio. She closed out the regular season with 91 assists to 59 turnovers, ranking her in the top-60 players in the nation this season in that category.

Natasha Vital moved into Cal's career assist top-10 list this season and should finish the year ranked No. 5 in the record book. She ended the regular season with 361 career assists.

2000, 1500, 1000, 500

Cal had the distinction of having one member score her 2,000th career point (**Ashley Walker**, March 1), another her 1,500th career

point (**Devanei Hampton**, March 1), one score her 1,000th career point (**Alexis Gray-Lawson**, Nov. 29) and two score their 500th career points (**Natasha Vital**, Nov. 11 and **Lauren Grief**, Nov. 27) all in the same season. Walker also passed the 1,500 point mark this season (Nov. 16). Walker and Hampton were the only two Pac-10 players this season to reach that 1,500 point milestone. Walker was the only player in the Pac-10 to reach 2,000. Gray-Lawson was one of six Pac-10 players to pass the 1,000 point mark.

TWO MILESTONES, ONE HALF

Two games after **Ashley Walker** became Cal's career rebounding leader in the Oregon State game, Feb. 21, she reached another career milestone. Walker became just the second player in Cal history and the 11th Pac-10 player to score 2,000 career points. She reached the milestone when she made a layup with 18:17 remaining in the second half of the UCLA game. A little over 10 minutes later, senior forward **Devanei Hampton** reached a milestone of her own when she scored on a jumper at 7:40 to post her 1,500th career point. Hampton is the eighth player in Cal history and the 39th Pac-10 player to score 1,500 career points.

GRAY-LAWSON'S 1000TH POINT

Alexis Gray-Lawson became the 20th member of Cal's 1,000 point club in the Virgin Islands when she drove through the lane to score a lay-in with 1:26 remaining in the first half of Cal's 76-43 victory over Iowa on Nov. 29. The St. Thomas crowd gave Gray-Lawson a rousing ovation when the accomplishment was announced.

WALKER'S 1,500TH CAREER POINT

Ashley Walker started her record-breaking and milestone-reaching season by scoring her 1,500th career point in the second game of the season. Against the Nevada Wolf Pack on Nov. 16, Walker hit a jumper at the 12:18 mark of the first half, putting her over 1,500 career points.

CAL PRESEASON UNANIMOUS TOP-10

California was ranked No. 9 or higher in four preseason women's basketball polls. Both the AP poll and the *USA Today*/ESPN Coaches' poll had the Bears ranked ninth. *Lindy's Magazine* has the Bears ranked eighth. *Athlon Sports Magazine* rated the Bears as the No. 2 team in the country.

CAL PICKED SECOND IN PAC-10

The California women's basketball team was predicted to finish second in the Pac-10 Conference, according to the preseason coaches' poll and the media poll. They were picked to finish behind Stanford and ahead of ASU. Stanford won the Pac-10 regular season title with Cal and Arizona State tied for second place. Cal earned the No. 2 seed to the Pac-10 tournament via a tiebreaker with ASU.

CAL LANDS NO. 1 RATED RECRUITING CLASS

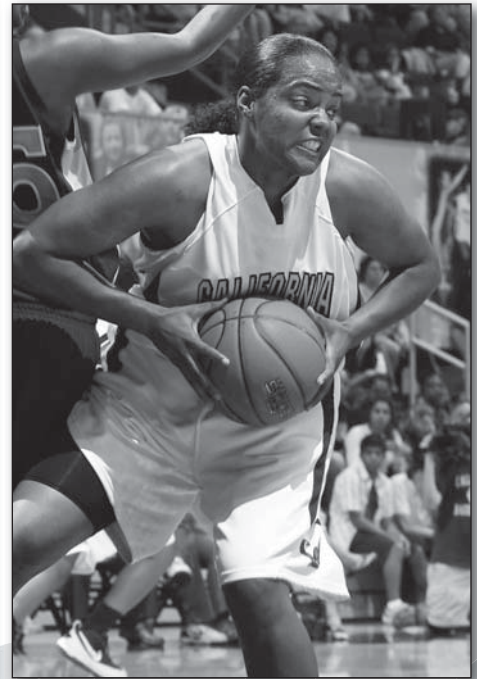
Seven highly-ranked student-athletes, all of whom are ranked in the top 50 by at least one scouting service, have signed NLI's to play basketball at California beginning with the 2009-10 season. The combination of the seven incoming players has given Cal the No. 1 ranked recruiting class in the nation, according to Blue Star Basketball Report.

Cal's recruiting class is ranked No. 2 by All-Star Girls Report and the Collegiate Girls Basketball Report, with ESPN HoopGurlz ranking the class at No. 3. Included in the Bears freshman class of 2009-10 are two Bay Area standouts, Sacred Heart Cathedral High's Tierra Rogers and Pinole Valley High's DeNesha Stallworth, who will be joining four Southern California prep stars, Talia Caldwell of Marlborough High in Los Angeles, Layshia Clarendon of Cajon High in San Bernadino, Eliza Pierre of John Muir High in Pasadena, and Gennifer Brandon of Chatsworth High in Sylmar, and one Oregon product, Brenna Heater of Ashland High in Ashland. Of the seven Bear recruits, five are rated in the top ten at their position (as ranked by ESPN HoopGurlz) and all are in the top 15.

HS ALL-AMERICANS

The incoming Bears of 2009-10 dominated the two high school All-American teams that were announced in the past few weeks with five of their recruits named to at least one of the two high school All-American teams. Forward DeNesha Stallworth (Richmond, Calif.) had the honor of making both teams. Playing in the WBCA All-American game April 4 in St. Louis will be guard Layshia Clarendon (San Bernadino, Calif.) and Stallworth. Players selected for the McDonald's All-American game on April 1 in Miami include forward Gennifer Brandon (Sylmar, Calif.), guard Eliza Pierre (Pasadena, Calif.) and guard Tierra Rogers (San Francisco, Calif.) and Stallworth (Richmond, Calif.). Both All-American games are a national stage for the top female basketball prospects in the nation. Brandon, Pierre, and Rogers all were named honorable mentions for the WBCA All-American team.

NATIONAL POLLS

The Bears had two stints this season as the No. 3 ranked team in both polls. They have spent a combined four weeks this year with that program-best No. 3 ranking. The Bears spent two weeks during the 2007-08 season ranked at No. 8, the previous best ranking in program history.

The Bears were ranked in the top-10 in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches' poll up until week 17 and for 12 of the 18 rankings this season in the AP poll. Last season, the Bears closed out the season ranked in the top-10 in the AP poll for the final 13 weeks of the year and in 12 of the final 13 weeks of the USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll. Since January 2008, the Bears have been ranked in the top-10 in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches' poll 25 of 26 weeks. The only time the Bears have not been in the top-10 was the final poll of the 2007-08 season when they dropped to No. 18 after their second round NCAA tournament loss to George Washington.

The Bears first returned to the polls in the 2006-07 preseason poll when they were ranked at No. 21. They were in the top-25 of both polls each week until dropping out in week 15. They returned in week 16 (Feb. 26, 2007), and have held a top-25 ranking in the ESPN/USA Today poll ever since. The Bears have been in the AP Poll's top-25 every week since the 2007-08 preseason poll.

WALKER, IN THE REGULAR SEASON...

- Led the Pac-10 in scoring from Dec. 1 through the end of 2008-09
- Has 47 career double-doubles, including 13 in 2008-09
- Scored in double-digits in all but four games this season
- Led the team in scoring 25 times this season and has been Cal's rebounding leader 22 times
- Hit 10 or more field goals in a game eight times this season.
- Shot 50.0 percent or better in all but seven games this season.
- She had a career-best 55.5 field-goal percentage this season, fourth-best in the Pac-10 and ranking her No. 23 in the country.
- Amassed 38 career games scoring 20 or more points. This season, she has topped 20 points 19 times and did so nine times in Pac-10 play.
- Was the Pac-10 nominee for WBCA Player of the Month in December, a month in which she averaged 22.6 points per game and shot 61.4 percent from the floor.
- Was the Pac-10 nominee for WBCA Player of the Month in January, in which she averaged 18.1 points per game with 7.4 rebounds per game.
- Started every game since her freshman year and has scored in every game since her freshman year. The closest she ever came to being shut out was in the 2007-08 Pac-10 finals against Stanford when she scored her first, and only, basket with 6:20 remaining in the game.
- Finished the regular season at No. 22 in the NCAA I stats ranking in points per game (19.1) and No. 91 in rebounds per game (8.4)
- Raised her current points per game average to 19.7
- Has scored 134 points in six NCAA Tournament games averaging 22.3 points per game

CAL'S ALL-TIME SCORING LIST: NO. 2 ASHLEY WALKER

Walker moved past Jennifer Bennett (1984-87, 1,766 points) and into second place on the all-time scoring list on Jan. 8 in a home game against Washington State. Walker's spin move on a basket coming with precisely 15 minutes remaining in the game made her the second leading scorer in Cal history. Walker entered the season ranked seventh on the Cal all-time scoring leaders list.

PAC-10 ALL-TIME SCORING: WALKER NO. 11

Walker is currently in 11th place on the Pac-10 all-time scoring list and should end her career with more than the 2,062 points required to be in the top-10. Walker became the 39th player to score 1,500 points as a member of the Pac-10 on Nov. 16 of this season and the 11th player to score 2,000.

CAL'S CAREER REBOUNDING LEADER

Ashley Walker's 1,030th career rebound came on Feb. 21 in the second half of the Bear's 62-40 victory over Oregon State. She got it with 5:37 remaining off a miss by Oregon State's Kirsten Tilleman, moving Walker past Colleen Galloway (1978-81), whose 1,029 career rebounds had stood as the record at Cal for 28 years. When Boyle

called a timeout soon after, an announcement of Walker's achievement was made and the crowd at Haas Pavilion gave the Bears' senior leader a standing ovation. She walked to the bench and waved to the crowd, then sat out the final five minutes.

PAC-10 ALL-TIME REBOUNDERS: NO. 6 ASHLEY WALKER

Walker entered the season ranked No. 21 on the Pac-10 career rebounding list. She moved up to No. 6 on the career list, passing Ebony Hoffman of USC (2001-04, 1,003) and Amber Hall of Washington (1996-99, 1,003). The No. 5 ranked player on the list, Val Whiting of Stanford (1989-93), has 1,134 career rebounds.

CAREER FREE THROWS

Walker became Cal's all-time leader in made free throws in the USC game on March 1. Her 10-for-12 performance from the line gave her 483 in her career, the most ever by a Bear. It was the second time this season Walker made 10 or more free throws in a game. She began the season ranked fourth on the career free-throw list.

PRESEASON ALL-PAC-10

Walker, a two-time first team All-Pac-10 honoree, was the lone unanimous selection to the preseason All-Pac-10 team. Cal had two of the five players on the preseason

All-Pac-10 team with Devanei Hampton, a three-time All-Pac-10 honoree, also earning the recognition.

WALKER EARN PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Walker, a two-time All-American and first-team All-Pac-10 player, was named a first-team preseason All-American by the *Sporting News* and an honorable mention All-American by the *Associated Press*.

WALKER NAMED TO WOODEN AWARD MIDSEASON TOP-20

Walker made the first cut in determining the winner of the John R. Wooden Award, an award that has been presented since 1976 to the nation's best player. Walker was among the 30 preseason candidates for the award. She was named as one of the 20 midseason contenders on a list released on Jan. 29.

WALKER NAMED TO NAISMITH TROPHY EARLY SEASON WATCH

Walker was named to the Naismith Trophy Early Season Watch List as a player to contend for this national player of the year honor. For the sixth consecutive season, presenting sponsor AT&T will once again set the standard in allowing fans to participate in determining this year's winner. Through the power and ease of text messaging, fan voting will account for an unprecedented 25 percent of the final results - more than any other national college basketball award.

WALKER NAMED TO WADE WATCH LIST

Walker was selected to the 2008-09 preseason "Wade Watch" list for the State Farm Wade Trophy Division I Player of the Year award. The 25-member list is made up of top Division I student-athletes who best embody the spirit of Lily Margaret Wade according to the following criteria: game and season statistics, leadership, character, effect on their team and overall playing ability.

WALKER NAMED BEST POWER FORWARD BY ESPN.COM

ESPN.com declared Ashley Walker to be the best power forward in the nation in a list of the top five players at each position. "She plays with the aggressive mentality of thinking she has something to prove. She has been the steady presence as Cal has risen in the national rankings" said ESPN contributor Mechelle Voepel about Walker. Alexis Gray-Lawson was among the top five 2-guards. Devanei Hampton was "others receiving votes".

CHARITY AND COMMUNITY SERVICE



SHOOTING SHIRTS AUCTION

The California basketball team used its final two home games of the season to raise money for the SEEDS - Sports & Education for Economic Development in Senegal -- Foundation, a charity that benefits orphanages in Africa.

The players took their off day on Monday, March 2 to design one-of-a-kind uniforms with each player creating her own very unique shirt. Head coach Joanne Boyle and assistant coaches Jennifer Hoover and Charmin Smith also created personal designs for the auction.

On Thursday, March 5, the Bears donned the individually designed shooting shirts

during their warm ups for the Arizona State game.

The shirts went for bid in a silent auction during the Bears final home game on Saturday, March 7. Fans had the opportunity to pre-bid on the shirts as well as bidding through the end of halftime at Haas.

The intent of the auction was to raise funds for orphanages in Africa like the ones the team visited last summer on its trip to the continent. Starting bids for the shirts were \$100 with \$10 bid increments allowed during the silent auction. The auction netted \$3100 for the charity.

I ASSIST, YOU ASSIST

The Bears ran a season-long fundraising promotion that also benefitted the SEEDS Foundation. Fans could pledge anything from 25 cents to \$5 per assist made by the Bears this season. Flat donations or other monetary amounts were also encouraged. Head coach Joanne Boyle matched all donations. Through the end of the regular season, Cal had tallied 398 assists in the season, with approximately \$8,000 pledged by Cal fans, resulting in an expected donation of \$16,000 for SEEDS.

ABOUT THE SEEDS FOUNDATION

The SEEDS Foundation is an organization run by Amadou Gallo Fall, and is supported by the NBA and Nike. Gallo, who hails from Senegal, and the SEEDS Foundation, provide opportunities for young African men and women to make a better life for themselves.

You can visit the SEEDS Foundation at www.seedproject.org. They have taken on Cal's challenge to assist in distributing the money to the orphanage and schools we visited this past spring. Every single dollar will be used to directly help with the items and projects that include purchasing mosquito nets, medicine, vaccines, food and formula, building supplies, along with generators (they have restricted use of electricity) and a used car to service as an ambulance.

QUARTER MEAL

Much closer to home, the Bears concentrated their energies on helping out members of their community. The Bears were frequent volunteers at the Quarter Meal program at Trinity Church, directly across the street from Haas Pavilion. The Quarter Meal, so-named because it used to cost a quarter but now is a free program, provides a nutritious, sit-down



evening meal to approximately 100 individuals each night of operation. The players manned the cafeteria lines, serving food to the program's benefactors. Some dished up the main entrees onto plates, other players manned the drink stations while some worked the salad line, but all were smiling, friendly faces greeting the financially-challenged members of the Berkeley community.

YOUTH CLINICS

Members of the team have put on various clinics at low-income inner city Oakland elementary schools such as Parker Elementary and Lockwood Elementary.

GIRLS INC.

The players have been pen pals with the children involved in Girl's Inc. for the past two seasons and have been excellent role models for these young ladies.



Last summer, the players and staff spent time in Africa. There, the Bears played several games, toured historical sites and visited local orphanages. It was a life-changing experience for all involved.

Joanne Boyle, the 2007-08 Russell Athletic/WBCA Region 8 Coach of the Year, has guided the California women's basketball program to the distinction of being one of the top-10 teams in the country in her three seasons at the helm. This year's Cal team has earned the highest ranking in school history, grabbing the No. 2 preseason spot in *Athlon Sports* magazine.

Boyle entered 2008-09 with a 68-28 record in three years in Berkeley, giving her the best winning percentage (.708) of any of the eight women's basketball coaches in school history and a six-year career record of 135-57 (.703). A member of the State Farm/Wade Trophy selection committee, Boyle became the third individual in school history to be honored as Pac-10 Coach of the Year in 2006-07. She has registered more wins in her first three seasons at Cal than the Bears tallied in the six seasons (63) prior to her arrival.

Under Boyle's direction, Cal has registered three consecutive NCAA Tournament berths (2006-08) for the first time and consecutive seasons with at least 20 wins for only the second time in school history (the other years were 1980-81 and 1981-82). In 2008, Cal also advanced to the final of the Pac-10 Tournament for the first time.

Boyle's 2007-08 Cal team carved its place in the national spotlight and in the school record books. The Bears set Cal records for wins in a season (27-7), winning percentage (.794), Pac-10 victories (15-3) and Pac-10 finish (2nd), and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1993. No. 3-seeded Cal defeated No. 14-seeded San Diego, 77-60, in the first round of 2008 NAAs before losing to No. 6-seeded George Washington, 55-53, in the second round on a buzzer beater.

Last season, Cal was ranked in the top 10 for 13 straight weeks in the Associated Press poll and 12 consecutive weeks in the *USA Today-ESPN* coaches' poll, including rising to an all-time program-best ranking of No. 8 in both polls. The Bears were tabbed No. 13 (AP) and No. 14 (coaches) in the preseason polls.

Since Boyle's arrival on the West Coast, Cal has emerged as one of the Pac-10's statistical leaders. In 2007-08, Cal ranked among the top-five teams in 13 categories for the second straight season and was No. 1 in four areas. For the third consecutive year, Cal established school records for field goal percentage defense (35.1%, 1st Pac-10) and scoring defense (54.3 ppg, all-time Pac-10

record). Cal's 155 three-pointers made in 2007-08 broke the previous school record of 135, established in 1995-96.

After registering the program's first winning record and postseason berth in 13 seasons in 2005-06, the following year's team surpassed that standard. The Philadelphia native led the Golden Bears to a 23-9 overall record, marking Cal's first 20-win season in 15 years and falling only one win from matching the 1983-84 team (24-8) for the previous most wins in school history. Eighth-seeded Cal fell to ninth-seeded Notre Dame, 62-59, in the opening round of the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

In 2006-07, Cal matched the 1991-92 Cal team for the then-best Pac-10 record (12-6) and placed alone in third place for the then-best Pac-10 showing in school history. The 2006-07 Bears also were nationally ranked 17

of 18 weeks, including a then-school-record No. 15 ranking by the Associated Press for two weeks. On the heels of the 2005-06 squad's success, Cal was ranked No. 21 in the preseason AP and *USA Today-ESPN* coaches' polls.

Boyle's team gained further attention when it upset No. 8 Stanford, 72-57, on the road Feb. 4, 2007. The victory snapped the Cardinal's 17-game winning streak and 50-game home Pac-10 winning streak, and marked the highest ranked win in Boyle's head coaching career. Also that season, Cal defeated Oregon, 65-56, Jan. 20, 2007, in Berkeley to give Boyle her 100th-career victory.

During her first Cal season in 2005-06, Boyle led a freshman-dominated Bears team

to an 18-12 overall record, a sixth-place showing in the Pac-10 (10-8) and the school's first NCAA Tournament bid since 1993.

That year, Cal registered victories over No. 13 Arizona State (66-64) and Pac-10 Tournament champion UCLA (65-58) at home, and No. 23 USC (72-67) on the road. The 10th-seed Bears fell to seventh-seeded St. John's, 78-68, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament after holding a first-half lead.

Under Boyle's tutelage, Cal players have received 19 conference postseason honors, highlighted by center Devanei Hampton's 2006-07 Pac-10 Player of the Year honor and guard Alexis Gray-Lawson's 2005-06 Pac-10 Freshman of the Year award. Hampton became the 10th freshman in conference

history to be named first-team All-Pac-10 and became Cal's first three-time first-team selection in 2007-08. Forward Ashley Walker is a two-time first-team All-Pac-10 choice and was picked to the inaugural 2007-08 Pac-10 All-Defensive team. Hampton and Walker have both earned All-America recognition the last two years. In 2007-08, guard Lauren Greif garnered second-team Pac-10 All-Academic.

After her first season at Cal, Boyle was named an assistant coach for the USA team that competed in the 2006 FIBA Americas U20 Championship for Women and a member of the WBCA Board of Directors. With Boyle on staff and Hampton on the 12-player roster, the USA defeated Brazil, 96-54, to claim the FIBA Americas title with a 5-0 record.

Boyle was hired at Cal on April 15, 2005, after serving three seasons as head coach at Richmond, where she directed the Spiders

WNIT semifinals in 2004 (23-10). Her 2003-04 team paced the conference in six statistical categories, including scoring offense, scoring margin, field goal percentage and assist/TO ratio. At 17.9 assists per game, Richmond ranked 10th in the nation.

Under Boyle's guidance, six Richmond players were selected All-Atlantic 10, with Kate Flavin receiving first-team honors in 2004 and 2005.

Boyle was hired by the Spiders in April of 2002, inheriting a team that posted a 14-16 overall record the previous year and hadn't enjoyed a postseason appearance since 1990-91. As she did at Richmond, Boyle brought a winner to Berkeley in her inaugural year at the helm, snapping a streak of 12 straight losing seasons at Cal.

Boyle also has a proven track record as a recruiter, inking Blue Star Index's 12th-ranked recruiting class in the country for Richmond

Eight and to the 2000 and 2001 NCAA Sweet 16.

Kodak All-Americans Michele VanGorp (1999), Georgia Schweitzer (2001), Alana Beard (2002 and 2003) and Iciss Tillis (2003) were among the players who benefited from Boyle's presence at Duke. Beard was selected the 2003 Kodak Player of the Year.

Fueling Duke's rise on the national scene were four straight top-five recruiting classes from 1999-02.

Duke's success in 2001-02 was particularly rewarding for Boyle, who faced a unique personal challenge off the court. In late November, Boyle suffered an arteriovenous malformation (AVM) in her brain, which resulted in brain surgery and a lengthy hospital stay. The genetic condition is a capillary deficiency that causes an eruption of blood vessels which produces stroke-like symptoms and bleeding within

to three consecutive 20-plus win seasons, including a 23-8 record and the program's first NCAA berth in 14 years in 2004-05. The Spiders finished with a 12-4 record in the Atlantic 10 in Boyle's final year, their best mark in the four years since they joined the conference. In January 2005, the program received its first-ever national ranking – No. 25 in the ESPN-USA Today-WBCA Coaches' Poll.

In 2005, Richmond earned the program's first at-large bid and third overall invitation to the NCAA Tournament. The 11th-seeded Spiders lost to sixth-seeded Florida State, 87-54, in the first round. Also in 2004-05, Boyle coached Richmond to victories over Virginia, Liberty and Dartmouth – all NCAA Tournament qualifiers – and fielded a team that led the Atlantic 10 in three-point field goal percentage (35.1%) and ranked in the upper five in the conference in 13 statistical categories. For Boyle's efforts, the *Richmond Times-Dispatch* named her the Virginia State Coach of the Year.

Boyle recorded a 67-29 mark (.698) in three seasons at Richmond. In addition to the 2005 NCAA Tournament, she led the Spiders to the WNIT quarterfinals in 2003 (21-11) and to the

in 2004-05. She signed Crystal Goring, who was rated the No. 6 best player nationally by Blue Star and earned McDonald's and WBCA All-America honors. Cal's last two recruiting classes have been ranked in the top 25 nationally.

Before accepting her first collegiate head coaching job at Richmond, Boyle was an integral part of Duke's rise to national prominence as an assistant coach for nine seasons. The season before Boyle's arrival in 1993-94, Duke compiled a 12-15 record and finished last in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Two seasons into her stint in Durham, N.C., the team notched 20-plus wins (22-9) for the first time in 10 years and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

With Boyle on staff, Duke garnered eight straight NCAA Tournament berths, highlighted by appearances in the 1999 national championship game and the 2002 semifinals. The Blue Devils reached the 20-win plateau seven times, twice amassed at least 30 victories, were ranked in the top 10 nationally four straight years, grabbed four regular-season ACC championships and advanced to the 1998 NCAA Elite

the cerebellum. An AVM differs from a blood clot in that an AVM cannot reappear.

Surrounded by her team, friends and family, Boyle fought valiantly to overcome her illness. Her recovery process was more rapid than her doctors had predicted. Her steely resolve, coupled with intense physical and speech therapy, enabled Boyle to return to her role on the Blue Devils' bench within a month. Not long after that, she was on her way to San Antonio, Texas, with the team for Duke's second Final Four appearance in four years.

Prior to coaching at Duke, Boyle played professional basketball overseas for three years for division one teams in Luxembourg and Germany. During her European stay, she also won two league championships.

Boyle, a four-year letterwinner at Duke, graduated in 1985 with a degree in economics and obtained a master's of science degree in health policy and administration from North Carolina in 1989. She ended her playing career ranked second at Duke in both scoring and in assists. Her 75 steals during the 1984-85 campaign remained the highest single-season total until Beard broke the mark in 2000-01.

Charmin Smith, a former Stanford assistant coach and standout player, became an assistant coach for the California women's basketball team during May of 2007. Smith, now in her second season with the Golden Bears, serves as the team's recruiting coordinator, oversees the growth of the Bears' guards and assists with all aspects of the program.

In Smith's inaugural season in Berkeley in 2007-08, Smith helped junior guard Alexis Gray-Lawson earn second-team All-Pac-10, and sophomore guard Natasha Vital garner honorable mention all-conference and Pac-10 All-Defensive accolades.

Smith came to Cal after serving as an assistant coach for three seasons with the Cardinal and spending six years playing professionally. During Smith's tenure as an assistant at Stanford, the Cardinal posted an 87-16 (.845) record and made a pair of NCAA Elite Eight appearances. In addition to her duties with recruiting, scouting and player development, Smith was heavily involved in various community service activities, including a program to assist the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

Smith was a star player for Stanford from 1993-97, helping the Cardinal to three NCAA Final Fours, as well as three Pac-10 titles. Following her playing career, she joined the professional ranks in the ABL from 1997-98 as a member of the Portland Power. She also played three years in the WNBA with the Seattle Storm and the Minnesota Lynx, and one year in the Swedish Basketball League. In May of 2008, Smith attended a 10-year reunion of the first Lynx team.

Smith began her coaching career in 2003 as an assistant coach at Boston College, helping the Eagles to one of their most successful seasons in school history. During her lone season, Boston College won its first Big East title and received a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the Midwest Regional semifinals.

In addition to her on-court experiences, Smith worked for two seasons as a production assistant and editor with NBA Entertainment, where she aided in the production of several national NBA broadcasts.

A four-year letterwinner at Stanford, Smith earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in civil and environmental engineering from the school. The St. Louis, Mo., native was a two-time recipient of the Coaches' Award (1994, 1997) and was named the team's Most Improved Player in 1995.

Kevin Morrison, who spent seven years as a successful California Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) coach, joined the California women's basketball program as an assistant coach in June of 2007.

Morrison contributes to all facets of Cal's program, including recruiting and scouting, and teams with Charmin Smith to push the Golden Bears' guards to reach their potential. Last season, Morrison worked closely with Cal's post players.

During his first season at Cal in 2007-08, the Bears set school records for wins in a season (27-7), Pac-10 victories (15-3) and Pac-10 finish (2nd), and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Morrison helped posts Devanei Hampton and Ashley Walker earn first-team All-Pac-10 and garner an assortment of All-America recognition.

Prior to his current role, Morrison served as the president and head coach of the West Coast Elite AAU girls' basketball team. In addition to serving as the program's recruiting coordinator, he provided individual coaching and instruction to the team's members.

For three years prior to joining the Cal staff, he had also been the director and editor of Grass Roots Journal, the top Western Regional scouting service. The service had over 93 Division I schools as subscribers, featured fall and spring showcases, and the Grass Roots Sports Basketball Academy.

During his three years with West Coast Elite, he coached 44 players who went on to play college basketball, including six McDonald's All-Americans and three Gatorade State Players of the Year. The McDonald's All-Americans include Stefanie Gilbreath (Cinco Ranch HS, TX - USC), Brianna Gilbreath (Cinco Ranch HS, TX - USC), Michelle Harrison (Mountain View HS, UT - Stanford), Italee Lucas (Centennial HS, NV - North Carolina), Ashley Gayle (Bishop Gorman HS, NV - Texas) and Abi Olajuwon (Marlborough School, CA - Oklahoma). Harrison, Lucas and Gayle were named Gatorade State Players of the Year in 2006, 2007 and 2008, respectively.

Morrison served as a consultant for Blue Star Basketball, working as a camp director and tournament director for various events. He also was a varsity girls' basketball assistant coach for Upland High School (2002-03) and Charter Oak High School (2000-02).

A 1994 graduate of Cal Poly Pomona with a degree in social work, Morrison spent over nine years as a social worker and high school guidance counselor.

Jennifer Hoover, a 14-year NCAA Division I coaching veteran whose stops have included Virginia and Memphis, was named an assistant coach of the California women's basketball team in June of 2008.

Hoover, who was chosen one of the top-50 all-time greatest women's basketball players in Atlantic Coast Conference history in 2002, works with all aspects of the Cal program, including on-court coaching, recruiting and scouting. With extensive post experience as a player and coach, Hoover will oversee the development of the Bears' post players.

Hoover came to Berkeley after spending the 2007-08 season as the associate head coach at Memphis. After her first stint as an assistant coach at Memphis in 2002-03, Hoover was hired at the University of Virginia as the director of basketball operations and was promoted to assistant coach after less than a year. Hoover became the Cavaliers' recruiting coordinator and helped them finish the 2006-07 season with a 19-15 overall record.

Hoover, who also handled on-court coaching, scouting, player development and summer camps at Virginia, started her coaching career at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, working there from 1994-96 prior to becoming an assistant at Virginia Commonwealth for two seasons (1996-98). She then spent two seasons at East Carolina (1998-00) before moving to James Madison (2000-02), where she helped the Dukes to the WNIT Final Four.

Hoover then made her first stop in 2002-03 at Memphis, where she recruited and coached the Lady Tigers' post players.

In her playing days, Hoover was a three-time All-ACC honoree at Wake Forest. The forward/center still holds the Wake Forest career records for points (1,728) and rebounds (1,006), and is the only women's basketball player at Wake Forest to surpass both the 1,000-career point and rebounding marks.

Following her collegiate playing career (1987-91), Hoover played professionally overseas for the Solna IF Basketball Team in Stockholm, Sweden, from 1991-92. She played the 1993 season with Athletes in Action on the USA Fall Exhibition Tour and the Australian spring tour before starting her coaching career.

Anative of Roanoke, Va., Hoover graduated from Wake Forest in 1991 with a degree in communications. In 2007, she was selected to the Wake Forest Athletic Hall of Fame.

Hoover and her husband, John, reside in Lafayette, Calif., with their daughter, Maggie, and a Mastiff named Butkiss.

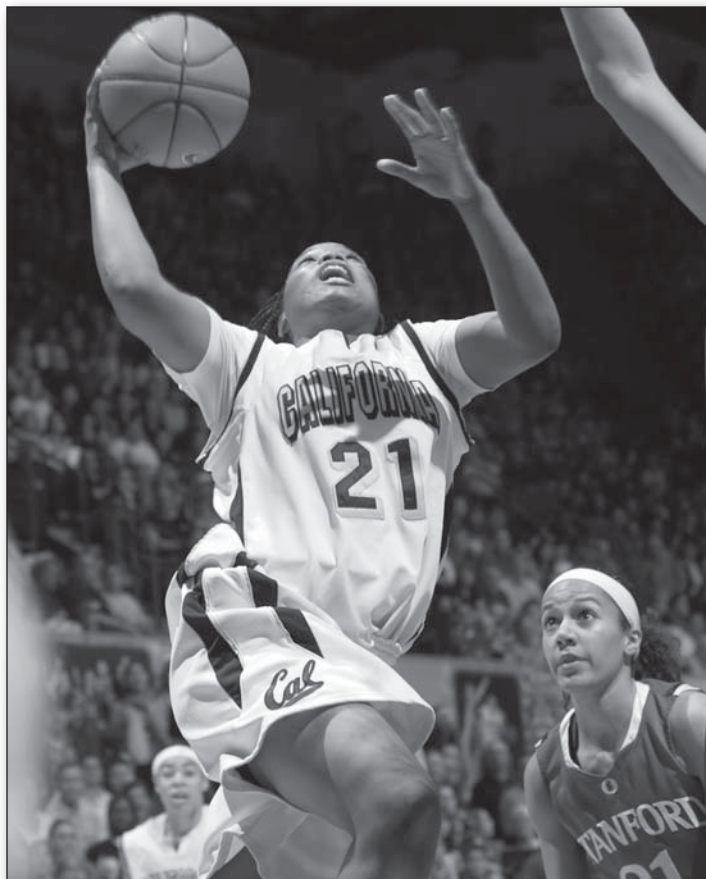
