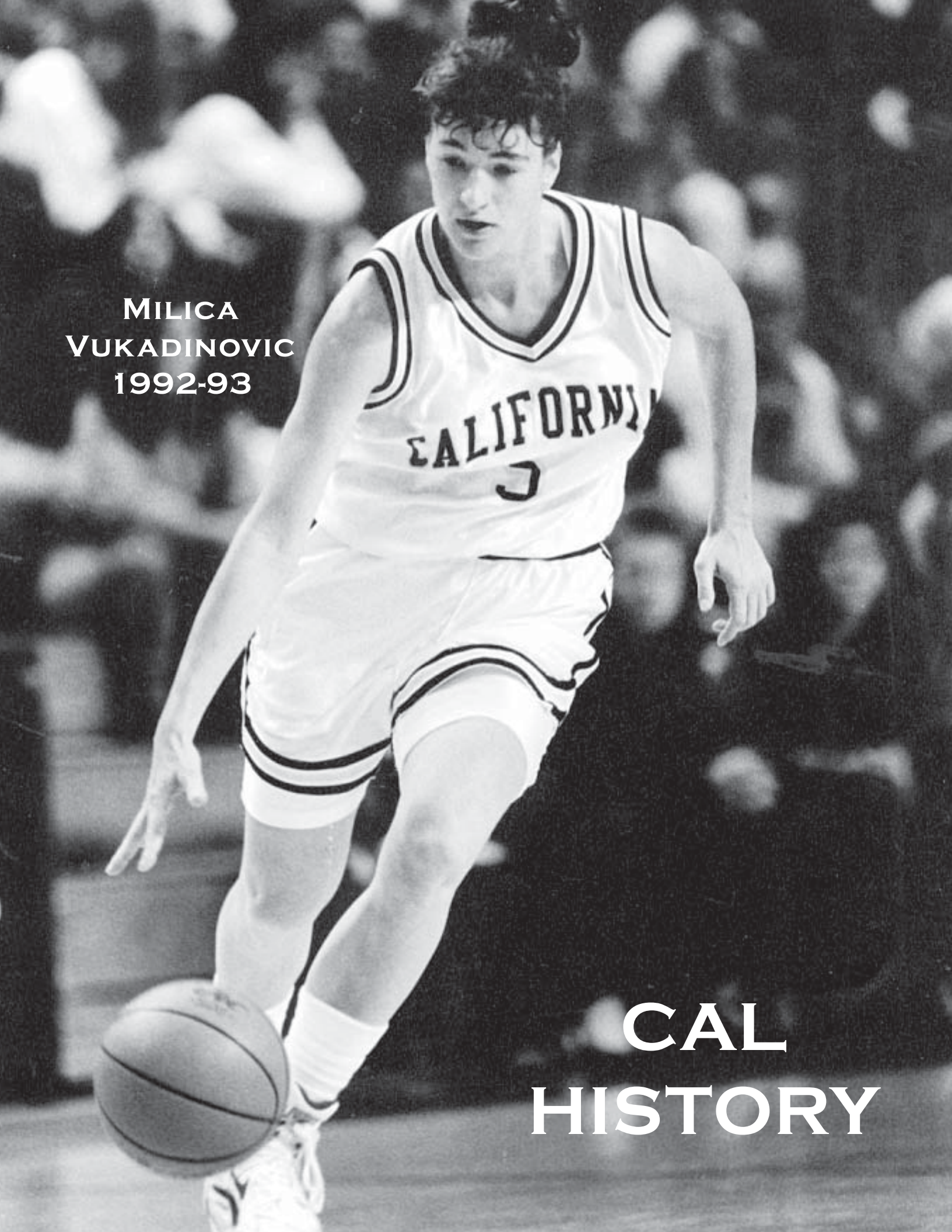

COLLEEN GALLOWAY'S RETIRED JERSEY

Colleen Galloway, the all-time leading scorer and rebounder in Cal history, is the only women's basketball player ever to have her jersey retired. Galloway wore lucky #13 for the Bears from 1978-81, and had her jersey retired on Feb. 17, 1981.

Galloway's career-scoring total of 2,320 points is the most by any Cal player, male or female, and she is the Bears only four-time all-conference selection. The 5-9 forward holds virtually every Cal rebounding record - single game (26), single season (312) and career (1,029). She also is one of only two Cal players to score 40 or more points in a single game. She is a 1981 Cal graduate with degrees in psychology and anthropology and earned her teaching credential at San Jose State.

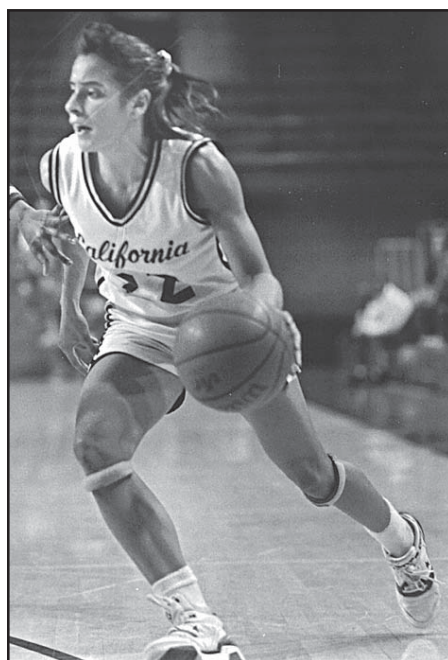

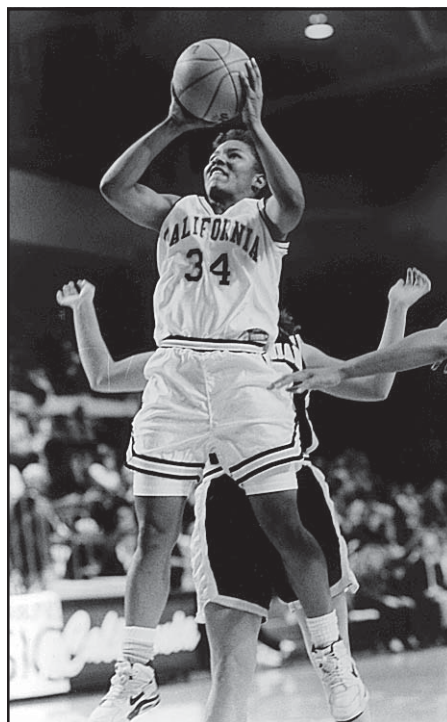

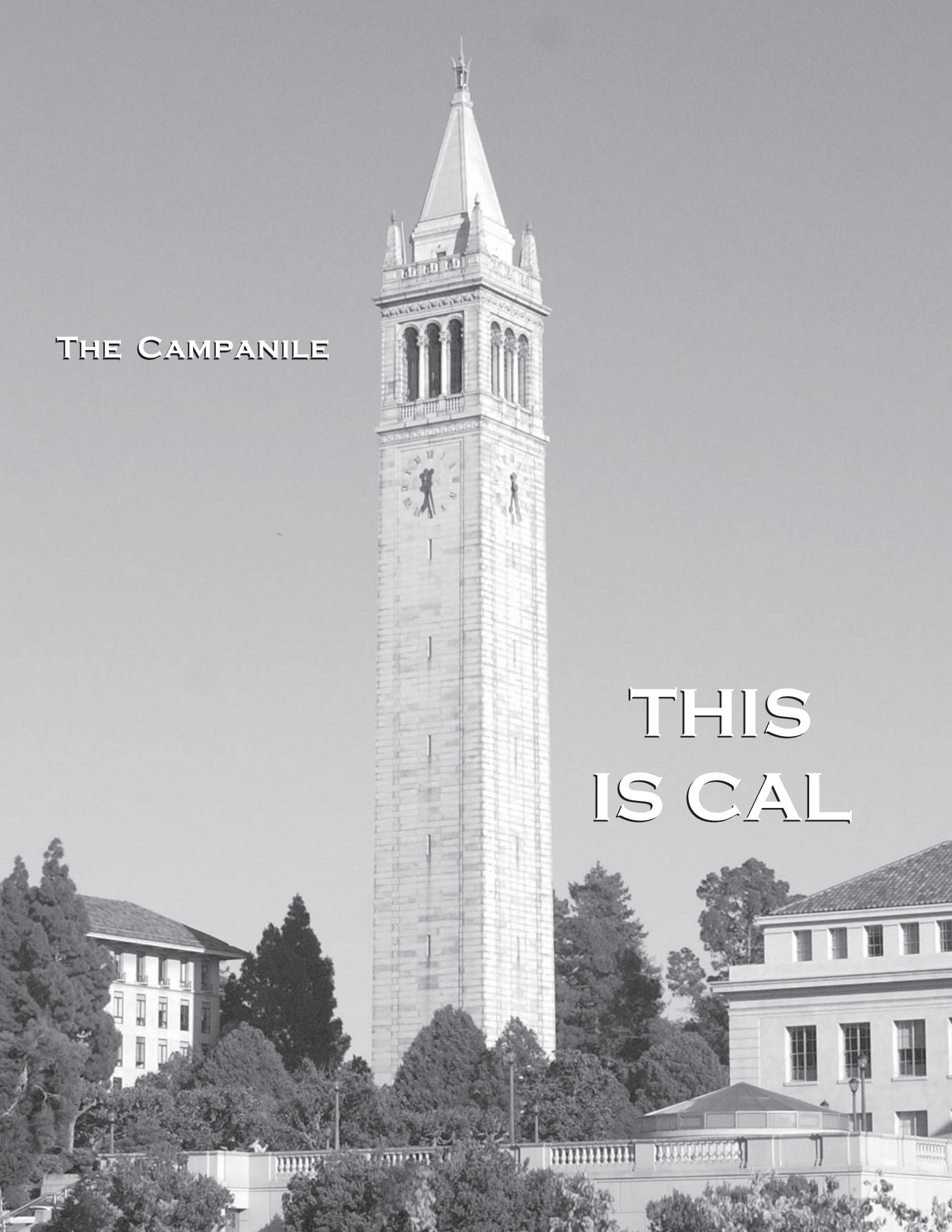

The University of California is one of the world's leading academic institutions. The school, known throughout the world as "Cal," is truly a prototype of a contemporary university. It attracts what many consider the finest applicant pool in the country, generates an ethnically and culturally diverse student population on campus, and provides one of the finest learning experiences in the world today.

WORLD-CLASS FACULTY AND STUDENTS

The Berkeley campus is renowned for the size and quality of its libraries and laboratories, the scope of its research and publications, and the distinction of its faculty and students. National rankings consistently place Cal's undergraduate and graduate programs among the very best. The faculty includes eight Nobel Laureates, 124 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 19 MacArthur Fellows, 87 Fulbright Scholars, three Pulitzer Prize winners and more Guggenheim Fellows (141) than any other university in the country.

The quality of Cal's diverse and independent student body complements the stature of the faculty. More than 33,000 students annually enroll at Cal. Of these, about 23,000 are undergraduates. Students come to Berkeley from all over California, in addition to every state in the union and more than 2,000 students from 75 countries around the world.

as groves of oak, redwood and eucalyptus blend with the Neo-classical architecture of John Galen Howard. The University is bordered by the wooded rolling hills of Tilden Regional Park and the City of Berkeley, one of America's most lively, culturally diverse and politically adventurous municipalities.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

By any standard, Cal offers its students one of the best educations available. Since its birth it has earned a reputation unmatched by any public university in America. According to a recent study by the National Research Council, Cal ranks first nationally in both the number of graduate programs in the Top 10 in their fields (97 percent) and the number of "distinguished" programs for the scholarship of the faculty (32 programs).

Although Cal is well known for its stellar graduate programs, undergraduate teaching is a campus priority. Nearly half of all courses offered at the undergraduate level have 25 students or fewer, and many lecture courses include smaller laboratory or study group sections which allow close interaction with professors and other instructors.

Cal offers a wide arena for academic endeavor and personal growth with more than 7,000 courses in nearly 300 degree programs. Exceptional support services such as the Student Learning Center, Career and Graduate School Services, the Disabled Students' Program, and campus and alumni mentor programs reflect Cal's strong commitment to undergraduate education. Study abroad is available to undergraduate students through the Education Abroad Program, which maintains more than 90 study centers in countries such as Australia, Costa Rica, Egypt, Hong Kong, New Zealand and Thailand.

Each year, more than 8,500 students receive degrees from the University - about 5,500 bachelor's degrees, 2,000 master's degrees, 900 doctorates and 200 law degrees.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The excellence of the University's intercollegiate athletic program rivals the school's academic reputation as Cal boasts one of the finest all-around programs in the nation. Twenty-seven sports - men's and women's basketball, crew, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track & field and water polo; men's baseball, football and rugby; along with women's softball, volleyball, field hockey and lacrosse - are sponsored by the University. Over the years, Cal has captured more than 60 national team championships - most recently men's golf and rugby in 2004 - while claiming over 105 NCAA individual championships in a variety of sports. This past season, six coaches received Conference Coach of the Year honors, including Cal women's basketball coach Caren Horstmeier, and 11 programs finished in the top seven nationally. Swimmer Natalie Coughlin won five medals at the 2004 Athens Games, tying the U.S. women's record for medals garnered in one Olympics.

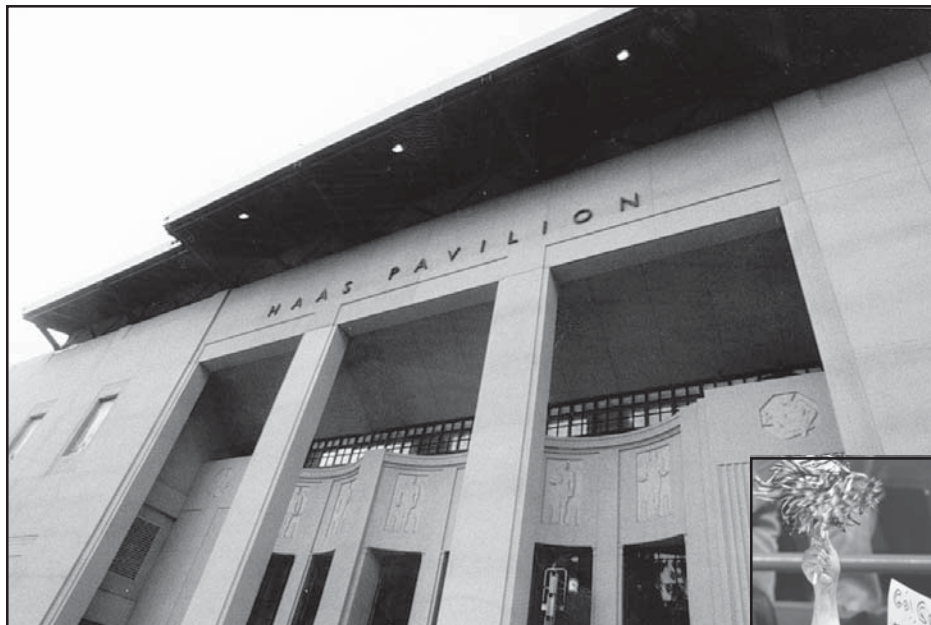
OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

A myriad of activities also goes on outside the classroom. There are more than 350 registered student organizations, such as the Marching Band, Hang Gliding Club, radio station KALX, ethnic associations, humor and literary magazines, debate team, Cal Corps (volunteer programs), Cal in the Capitol/Sacramento, and political organizations.

In addition, Cal has a host of other features, including public lectures and concerts, campus-sponsored forums and seminars, clubs and workshops, dramatic presentations, international festivals, art, photographic, design, architectural, anthropological and archaeological exhibits and displays, and dozens of bookstores within one-square mile - all of this making Berkeley one of the most intellectually stimulating communities in the country.



HAAS PAVILION



On the same site where beloved Harmon Gym stood for more than 60 years, the Walter A. Haas Jr. Pavilion has risen as a state-of-the-art sports facility that retains the old building's famous spirit.

The new basketball arena, the centerpiece of the \$57.5 million project, opened in the fall of 1999 and has 11,877 seats - almost twice the capacity of its predecessor. And although the structure is 37 feet taller and 28 feet wider than Harmon, it continues to keep fans close to the action.

"The transformation of Harmon Gym into the Haas Pavilion is a magnificent addition to our campus," said Chancellor Robert Berdahl. "The moment you walk in you feel the vibrancy of the place, but you instantly feel a very real connection to the past that is just wonderful.

"Student-athletes will love to play here and our great and devoted fans will love watching the action here," he added. "But Haas Pavilion is more than just an impressive new sports facility. It provides our large campus with a venue for extraordinary campus-wide gatherings, conferences and special events."

Haas Pavilion is very much an assertion of Cal's commitment to athletics - from the administration and faculty, down through the alumni who made the entire project possible.

When the construction of Haas was first proposed, alumni and fans wanted to ensure that the intimidating homecourt advantage Harmon provided could be maintained in a building twice its size. Haas was created specifically with this in mind.

Consequently, sound-baffling devices were omitted intentionally, and student seating has doubled from 1,300 seats in Harmon to 2,600 seats in Haas, with about 900 courtside. In an attempt to keep Haas as intimate as Harmon, designers built the arena with the last row of seats just 88 feet from the floor.

Nearly 2,000 club seats with chair backs have been installed in the arena. Fans also enjoy wider corridors and a quadrupling of the number of restrooms and concession areas. The arena features two high-resolution video boards, more than 50 television monitors throughout the building and a team store. The elegant Haas Club Room, which overlooks Evans Baseball Diamond, provides a spacious banquet area.

Cal student-athletes are also able to take advantage of new and expanded

locker rooms, as well as the pavilion's weight room and athletic training facility. In addition, the facility houses Athletic Department administrative and coaches offices.

The idea of a new building to replace the aging Harmon Gym, which was built in 1933, first surfaced in the mid-1970s under then-Athletic Director Dave Maggard. During the next 20 years, a number of studies were done to determine the feasibility of a multitude of options.

Most people pushed for a renovation of Harmon, considering all the tradition already rooted there. Former Athletic Director John Kasser, who served from 1994-2000, strongly agreed that this was the proper course of action and he set about drumming

up support from the administration, faculty and alumni.

When Walter A. Haas Jr. and his wife, Evelyn, generously donated the lead gift of \$11 million, the project suddenly became a reality. Cal alumni supported the renovation in an unprecedented manner. Of the \$57.5 million final price tag, \$41 million came from private gifts, with \$16.5 million coming from a combination of revenues from the



Athletic Department, a campus seismic safety fund and miscellaneous income funds.

Construction on Haas Pavilion began just after the final game at Harmon in March 1997 and finished in time for the start of the 1999-00 basketball season.

The men's and women's basketball teams assumed residency in two of the country's best locker rooms in December 2003. The women's locker room features a locker area with wooden doors, a player lounge with three plasma screen televisions and lounge chairs, a computer/study area and a team meeting room with a movie-theater like projection screen.



WALTER A. HAAS JR.

1916-1995

A self-described "loving, loyal and grateful Cal alumnus," Walter A. Haas Jr. and his wife, Evelyn, committed the lead gift of \$11 million for the pavilion that now bears his name.

A 1937 Cal graduate who lettered in tennis as a senior, Haas joined Levi Strauss & Co. in 1939. He and his brother, Peter E. Haas '40, went on to lead the San Francisco-based company - the fourth generation of their family to do so - from a regional work pants manufacturer into the largest clothing maker in the world. Haas served in various leadership capacities, including president, chief executive officer and chairman of the board.

Haas and his wife created the Evelyn and Walter Haas Jr. Fund in 1953, which he chaired until his death in 1995. Since its founding, the fund has made grants in excess of \$95 million to nonprofit organizations, primarily in the Bay Area.

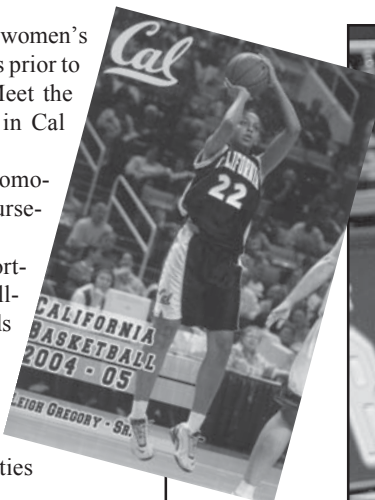

CAMPUS LIFE

Living in the residence halls at the University of California is an exciting opportunity to be a part of a dynamic community where you will enjoy unique academic, social, cultural and personal experiences. You'll discover that studying with classmates, sharing meals with fellow residents, and living with other students will enhance your college experience.

Each residence hall or residential complex is unique and reflects a "character" of its own. A sampling of campus living follows:

Clark Kerr Campus houses 750 residents in Spanish Mediterranean style buildings nestled in a park-like setting approximately six blocks south of the University. Students enjoy studying and lounging in picturesque courtyards or jogging eucalyptus-lined trails.

Faculty members and teaching assistants also live at Clark Kerr and are an integral part of the academic support program. Residents at Clark Kerr can take advantage of faculty lecture series, group tutorials in English, mathematics and science, as well as educational programs that promote academic success.

In addition to regular double and triple rooms, halls contain single and double rooms in a suite arrangement, each with a common living area and bath. Three of the buildings at Clark Kerr are designated as 24-hour quiet-environment halls.

Students like the "High-rise" complexes of **Unit 1**, **Unit 2** and **Unit 3** because they're near the hub of campus, Sproul Plaza and the south campus area. Units 1, 2, and 3 consist of four eight-story halls grouped around a dining commons. The halls are mostly coed.

Each hall in the Units has a main lounge where students can gather in front of the fireplace, watch TV, or play a friendly game of pool or ping pong. Most halls have a piano. Within each Unit, there is study space and coin-operated laundry facilities.

Stern Hall, which houses 246 women, lies in the beautiful northeast area of campus. One of the two oldest residence halls at Cal, Stern has a rich history and proud tradition.

Foothill Student Housing residents enjoy the chalet-like atmosphere of their buildings. This living complex combines state-of-the-art amenities with the rustic ambiance of a hideaway in the woods, taking full advantage of the natural beauty of the prime north campus area.

This coed complex is composed of suites in seven buildings. The complex also has a Commons building that contains the dining hall, assembly room, lounge, a convenience store, offices, and meeting space where residents can gather for social or academic activities.

Theme houses provide a living and learning experience for students who share an interest in a particular cultural theme. Theme houses maintain close relationships with their sponsoring academic departments. Residents explore the histories, languages, and literatures of their respective

cultural groups. The five theme houses are **African American House**, **Asian Pacific American House**, **Casa Italiana**, **Casa Magdalena Mora**, and **Slavic House**.

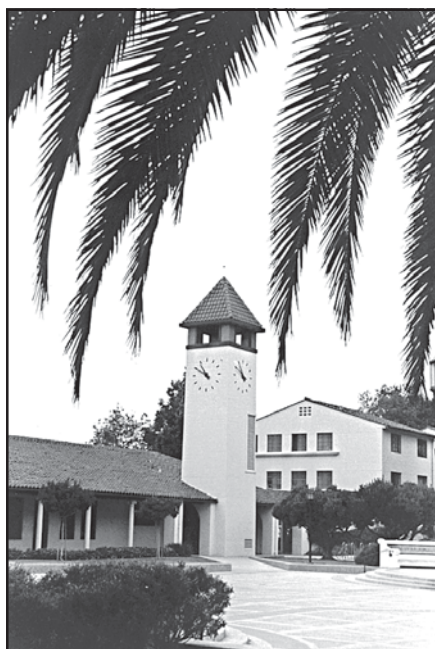
In all residence halls and theme houses, rooms are furnished with twin beds (extra long), dressers, desks, closets, mirrors, and shelving. Rooms in Clark Kerr Campus, Unit 3, and Foothill are carpeted.

A primary goal of residential programs is to facilitate the formation of a community that encourages personal, social, cultural, and academic development of students who choose to live in University residence halls.

A special factor within the environment is the diversity that reflects the cultural pluralism of California and the University. The numerous programs and activities within the halls are intended to assist residents in recognizing, appreciating and celebrating the differences in a community in which the common goal is learning.

Community standards require that members develop and maintain a high degree of respect for one another. To promote a greater appreciation for diversity, programs exploring issues such as cultural, ethnic, gender and religious differences are sponsored throughout the academic year.

Each residence hall complex is coordinated by the residential life coordinator, a professional staff member who oversees the residential program in his or her living community. Each hall within the unit is staffed with up to five paraprofessionals: one hall coordinator and four resident assistants. Hall coordinators supervise the activities of the hall, and resident assistants serve as peer advisers who assist with residents' educational and social activities and help maintain community standards.



CAMPUS ADMINISTRATION



ROBERT J. BIRGENEAU **CHANCELLOR**

Robert J. Birgeneau, an internationally distinguished physicist, was appointed the ninth chancellor of the University of California by the UC Board of Regents in July and took his new post in October.

Birgeneau, 62, served as president of the University of Toronto from 2000-04. He previously was dean of the School of Science at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he spent 25 years on the faculty. He has been elected a foreign associate of the National Academy of Sciences, has received numerous awards for teaching and research, and is one of the most highly cited physicists in the world.

A Toronto native and the first in his family to finish high school, Birgeneau received his B.Sc. in mathematics from the University of Toronto in 1963 and his Ph.D. in physics from Yale University in 1966. He served on the faculty of Yale for one year and then spent one year at Oxford University. He was a member of the technical staff at Bell Laboratories from 1968-75 and then joined MIT as a professor of physics. He was named head of the physics department in 1988, and in 1991 was appointed dean of science. He became the 14th president of the University of Toronto on July 1, 2000.

A leader on gender issues within higher education, Birgeneau is well known for his commitment to diversity and equity in the academic community. He will hold a faculty appointment in UC Berkeley's Department of Physics, in addition to serving as chancellor.

Birgeneau has published extensively and has received many honors for his research. In 1987, he was awarded the O.E. Buckley Prize of the American Physical Society. The only other Canadian to win this award is Dr. Bertram Brockhouse of McMaster University, who later was awarded the Nobel Prize. In 2000, Birgeneau received the J.E. Lilienfeld Prize of the American Physical Society, given to a physicist who has made outstanding contributions to physics and has exceptional talent at explaining physics to diverse audiences. He was elected a fellow of the Royal Society of London in 2001 and the Royal Society of Canada in 2002.

He and his wife, Mary Catherine, have four grown children.



JOHN F. CUMMINS **ASSOC. CHANCELLOR/ CHIEF OF STAFF**

As the associate chancellor and chief of staff for the University of California campus, Dr. John F. Cummins provides coordination and liaison with other senior campus officers on any matter

of interest to the Chancellor, including analysis and advice on policy development and implementation. He additionally provides coordination and liaison between the Chancellor's Office and the Office of the President.

A member of the senior management team, Cummins, whose duties include oversight of Intercollegiate Athletics, represents the Chancellor in coordinating responses to campus emergencies, including protests. He serves as the Berkeley Campus Local Designated Official under the University's Whistleblower policy to receive retaliation complaints and administer local implementing procedures. He also has responsibility for handling records requests under federal FOIA and state PRA regulations and guidelines.

Cummins has had an association with Cal since 1972 when he was

appointed research coordinator at the Center for the Study of Higher Education, conducting research on the role and responsibility of universities to their larger host communities. In 1974, he began a 10-year tenure as the public service coordinator and founding director of the California Policy Seminar of the Institute of Governmental Studies.

In 1984, Cummins was promoted to assistant chancellor—chief of staff, also serving as the university's public affairs officer from 1986-91. In 2002, he was elevated to associate chancellor.

Prior to his arrival in Berkeley, Cummins was an assistant to the dean in the School of Education at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee from 1970-72.

Cummins earned his bachelor's degree in philosophy from Marquette, and pursued studies in the master's program there in theology. He received a Ph.D. in education from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in 1972.



JESSE H. CHOPER **FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE**

Jesse Choper, the Earl Warren Professor of Public Law and a former dean of Boalt Hall, serves as Cal's faculty athletics representative.

Appointed to the FAR position this past summer, Choper provides oversight and advice in the administration of the athletics program. He is empowered by the NCAA to represent Cal in dealings with both the NCAA and the Pacific-10 Conference, and advises the chancellor on campus policies relating to student-athletes.

Choper served as law clerk to Chief Justice Earl Warren of the U.S. Supreme Court following graduation from law school. He taught at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania from 1957-60 and at the University of Minnesota Law School from 1961-65. He joined the Boalt faculty at Cal in 1965. Choper has been a visiting professor at Harvard Law School and Fordham Law School and served as dean of Boalt Hall from 1982-92.

From 1979-98, Choper was one of the three major lecturers at U.S. Law Week's Annual Constitutional Law Conference in Washington. He has delivered 20 titled lectures at major universities throughout the country, including the Cooley Lectures at Michigan, the Stevens Lecture at Cornell, the Baum Lecture at Illinois and the Lockhart Lecture at Minnesota. He has served on the executive committee of the Association of American Law Schools and on the executive council of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences (of which he is vice president). He was a national president of the Order of the Coif and is a member of the American Law Institute. In 1998, he received the UC Berkeley Distinguished Teaching Award.

Choper's major publications include the books, *Judicial Review and the National Political Process: A Functional Reconsideration of the Role of the Supreme Court*, which received the Order of the Coif Triennial Book Award in 1982, and *Securing Religious Liberty: Principles for Judicial Interpretation of the Religion Clauses*. His recent publications include the ninth edition of his *Constitutional Law casebooks*; the sixth edition of his *Corporations casebook*; the second edition of *The Supreme Court and Its Justices*; "The Endorsement Test: Its Status and Desirability," in the *Virginia Journal of Law and Politics* (2002); and "Taming Congress's Power Under the Commerce Clause: What Does the Near Future Portend?" in the *Arkansas Law Review* (2002).

Choper received his bachelor of science degree from Wilkes University in 1957, his law degree from Penn in 1960 and his doctorate from Wilkes in 1967.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION



SANDY BARBOUR **ATHLETIC DIRECTOR**

Anne “Sandy” Barbour, deputy director of athletics at the University of Notre Dame and former athletic director at Tulane University, was named director of athletics at the University of California on Sept. 15. Barbour replaces Steve Gladstone, who announced in June his plans to step down as athletic director after three years and return to coaching the Cal rowing teams full time.

“This is my first appointment in my new role at Berkeley. I simply can’t imagine a better appointment. I consider it a real privilege to appoint Sandy Barbour as Cal’s new athletic director,” said UC Berkeley Chancellor Robert J. Birgeneau.

“Cal represents everything that’s right with higher education and intercollegiate athletics,” said Barbour, 44. “I am thrilled and flattered to be given this opportunity. This is what I have been working toward my entire life. It’s a dream come true, both personally and professionally.”

Barbour will head a Division I intercollegiate athletic program that fields 27 sports with an annual budget of about \$40 million.

At Notre Dame, Barbour is the deputy director of athletics, serving as the university’s senior athletic administrator under Athletic Director Kevin White since July 2003. She previously held associate athletic director positions there starting in 2000.

Her career in intercollegiate athletic administration spans 22 years, beginning as a field hockey assistant coach and lacrosse administrative assistant at the University of Massachusetts in 1981. She has since served as assistant athletic director at Northwestern University and in 1991 was recruited to Tulane University as an associate athletic director.

While at Tulane, Barbour also worked for White — then Tulane’s athletic director. At the age of 36, she was appointed Tulane’s director of athletics when White left in 1996 for a similar position at Arizona State University.

During her three years as athletic director, Tulane teams won 12 conference championships. In her first year in the position, Tulane won four conference titles, a feat never before accomplished in that school’s history. She also hired Tommy Bowden as Tulane’s head football coach during her first year. Bowden proceeded in 1997 to post the Green Wave’s first winning season (7-4) in 16 years, and then directed the school to a 12-0 record, Conference USA championship and No. 7 national ranking the following season as 1998 Liberty Bowl champions. Barbour later hired Chris Scelfo as Bowden’s successor. Scelfo has subsequently gone on to set the school record for career wins in five subsequent seasons.

One of eight female athletic directors at NCAA Division I-A schools at

the time, Barbour was chair of the NCAA Division I Student-Athlete Reinstatement Committee and a member of the Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet and the board of directors of the National Association of Collegiate Women’s Athletic Administrators. She was also elected chair of the inaugural Conference USA committee for Senior Women Administrators and served on the league’s executive committee. In addition, she chaired the executive committee for the 1993 NCAA Division I Outdoor Track and Field Championships hosted by Tulane.

In her most recent position at Notre Dame, Barbour oversaw facilities and event operations for the school’s 26-sport program, including football game management and the department’s two golf courses. She was also responsible for developing, maintaining and implementing Notre Dame’s \$127 million athletics facilities master plan. Among the capital projects is a \$22 million, 100,000-square-foot Guglielmino Center, which will feature a centralized football operation, as well as sports medicine and strength and conditioning facilities. Under Barbour’s supervision, the construction of the new facility is due for completion in June 2005.

In addition, her role at Notre Dame included responsibilities for women’s lacrosse, men’s and women’s cross country, indoor and outdoor track, men’s and women’s swimming and men’s golf. She also assisted White with the administration of women’s basketball.

Born Dec. 2, 1959, in Annapolis, Md., Barbour grew up in a military family. Her father was a career aviator in the U.S. Navy, and her family lived in various U.S. locations as well as in Western Europe during her childhood.

Barbour graduated cum laude in 1981 with a B.S. degree in physical education from Wake Forest University, where she was a four-year letter winner and captain of the field hockey team. She also played two varsity seasons of women’s basketball. She also served as president of Pi Beta Phi sorority during her undergraduate days.

She earned advanced degrees at both the University of Massachusetts (an M.S. in sports management in 1983) and the Northwestern University’s J.L. Kellogg Graduate School (an MBA in 1991).

Between master’s programs, Barbour served as assistant field hockey and lacrosse coach at Northwestern from 1982 to 1984. She also held the position of director of recruiting services during that period, before being promoted to assistant athletic director for intercollegiate programs in 1984.

She served in that capacity until 1989. Prior to joining Tulane, Barbour worked in programming and production for FOX Sports Net in Chicago during the summer of 1990.

At UC Berkeley, Barbour will inherit an intercollegiate athletic program that has earned No. 9 national rankings the past two years in the U.S. Sports Academy Director’s Cup standings, which rates more than 300 NCAA Division I programs for overall excellence. The Golden Bears’ men’s golf and rugby teams both won national championships last season, and the football team has been ranked in the nation’s Top 10 in both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today national polls.

MEDICAL PROGRAM

Golden Bear student-athletes are privileged to be supported by one of the top medical staffs in college athletics along with some of the most modern training and rehabilitation equipment in the country. The comprehensive program features state-of-the-art facilities as well as a staff of acclaimed practitioners of all areas of sports medicine.

Cal student-athletes have access to a pair of athletic training facilities, both at the Haas Pavilion and at Memorial Stadium. In both instances, the spacious training rooms are located adjacent to the weight training rooms and house rehabilitation equipment, hydrotherapy space and an extensive pre-practice preparation area.

In addition, Cal athletes also use University Health Services (UHS), which oversees and supervises sports medicine services to all injured or ailing Golden Bear athletes. UHS, housed in the Tang Center across the street from Haas Pavilion, is recognized as the largest and most comprehensive campus health facility in the country. It provides access to physician clinics, laboratory services, X-ray and other ancillary services such as nutrition and counseling. The athletic medicine area is supervised by Bill Coysh, Ph.D., who is also actively engaged in sports psychology.

The expert staff of team physicians is headed by Dr. Cindy Chang, M.D. The staff features specialists from the fields of orthopedic surgery, family medicine, internal medicine, psychiatry and podiatry. The medical staff, with their diverse backgrounds and areas of expertise, have treated injured athletes on every level of competition, including Olympic and professional athletes.

Cal's athletic training staff boasts 13 certified athletic trainers, including 2 physical therapists, and 20 student athletic trainers. The staff tends to

the day-to-day health care needs of Cal athletes in 27 different sports, including the evaluation and treatment of injuries and illnesses. The rehabilitation of injuries is also the responsibility of the athletic training staff, with additional assistance from our staff physical therapist. The trainers also provide coverage at home and away athletic contests, and practices are staffed on a full-time basis.

Whether it's for taping, physical therapy, or the prompt recovery from an illness or injury, Golden Bear athletes have the full confidence that Cal's medical staff will provide the best care available with one of the most progressive treatment and rehabilitation programs in the country.

SPORTS MEDICINE STAFF

CINDY CHANG HEAD TEAM PHYSICIAN



Cindy Chang has served as head team physician for Cal's 27 athletic teams since 1995. Prior to coming to Cal, she was a team physician for the Ohio State Buckeyes.

She was an elected member of the Board of Directors for the American Medical Society of Sports Medicine (AMSSM), and has also served on the Medical Education Committee for the American College of Sports Medicine. She is on the Board of Directors for the AMSSM Foundation. Chang also served as a physician at the U.S. Olympic Training Center and was a member of the U.S. medical staff for the Winter Paralympic Games in Nagano, Japan, in 1998 and in Salt Lake City in 2002.

After earning both her bachelor's ('84) and medical ('89) degrees from Ohio State, Chang completed her family practice residency at UCLA before returning to Ohio State for a fellowship in sports medicine. She and her husband, Chris Hudson (Cal '88), live in Berkeley with their daughter, Carlin, and son, Joseph.

CAROL ROGERS ATHLETIC TRAINER



Carol Rogers arrived at California in 1990 as head women's athletic trainer and held that post for two years until the merger of the men and women's athletic departments in 1992. Rogers currently is the trainer for the Golden Bears' women's basketball, women's crew and women's tennis teams.

She previously served as the head athletic trainer at Santa Clara from 1979-90. Rogers received her bachelor's degree in physical education from Massachusetts in 1977 and her master's degree in athletic training from North Carolina in 1978. In addition to being a certified athletic trainer, she is a certified strength and conditioning specialist.

Rogers grew up in Highland Park, Ill., and now resides in Lafayette with her nine-year-old daughter, Emily.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

An integral part of Cal basketball is the strength and conditioning program. The program's philosophy is geared towards helping each student-athlete achieve the highest level of athletic development.

By teaching how all the components of strength and conditioning fit together, student-athletes understand how to maximize force production. This includes enhancement of speed, strength and flexibility that results in improved power. Motivating, educating and helping to reach maximum athletic development is the primary focus of the Cal program.

The Cal weight room at Haas Pavilion includes six Olympic platforms, more than 5,000 pounds of Olympic bars and bumper plates, and an array

of aerobic and anaerobic equipment. The facility is brightly designed and overlooks Evans Baseball Diamond to the west. Cal also has a 2,000-square foot weight room in Memorial Stadium with similar Olympic equipment that offers panoramic views of the entire region, including San Francisco and the Bay.

The training regimen at Cal is a year-round process that emphasizes the speed, strength and flexibility. With closely monitored workouts that involve a great deal of individual instruction and attention, student-athletes are taught the correct techniques to increase their ability to perform at their peak during competition.

Cal's program stresses comprehensive training in order to improve both strength and speed. Flexibility is a key component because it is essential for proper lifting. It also improves the running mechanics needed for acceleration and deceleration, both essential for playing basketball.

Athlete workouts are closely monitored by the conditioning staff, who work in collaboration with the entire sports medicine team (doctors, athletic trainers, physical therapists, nutritionists, etc.) to ensure the health and safety of all of student-athletes.

In this way, Cal's strength and conditioning program is a vital component linking the "full circle" of a student-athlete's physical development from conditioning through rehabilitation and re-conditioning.

In addition, Blasquez, who joined the Cal staff in January 2003, serves as supervisor of the Haas Pavilion weight room and manages training programs for all athletic teams that use the facility.

A Bay Area native, Blasquez arrived at Cal after working as the head strength & conditioning coach at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., from 1992-2003. Assisting head football coach Bob Ladouceur, he contributed to four national championships and nine NorCal titles at De La Salle. During Blasquez's tenure, the Spartans also won the 2000 state in boys' basketball.

From 2001-03, Blasquez had the added responsibility of serving as director of outreach at the Muir Hospital Orthopedic Center in Walnut Creek.

Blasquez received his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Cal State Hayward in 1991, and he holds certifications in athletic training (ATC) and strength & conditioning (CSCS). He and his wife, Mary, have two children, Makena and Bianca.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

There is more to life than wins and losses, and University of California student-athletes have the opportunity to learn that lesson through participation in CHAMPS/Life Skills, an NCAA sponsored program designed to help prepare athletes for the challenges beyond the intercollegiate athletic competitive arena.

The program is based on the premise that student-athletes, by virtue of their involvement in athletics, have a difficult time accessing campus-wide student activities, programming and experiences. The CHAMPS/Life Skills program is designed to provide student-athletes with education and experiences to assist them in bridging the gap from college life to professional life and to make meaningful contributions to their communities.

This comprehensive program provides educational experience and service to: develop well-balanced lifestyles for student-athletes, encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals and enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting. By focusing on "real life" skills and personal development, the CHAMPS/Life Skills program not only assists student-athletes with meeting daily challenges, but enhances student-athletes' growth in their college years and beyond.

The focus of CHAMPS/Life Skills is on the following five commitments viewed as critical to personal growth: academic excellence, personal development, career development, athletic excellence and community service.

Personal development and career-related programs are conducted throughout the school year through the Student Services Office. All student-athletes are strongly encouraged to attend these programs. They are designed to provide fundamental life-long knowledge in such areas as health (alcohol and substance abuse, nutrition, stress management, etc.), career planning (resume writing and interview skills, career development events, internships) and personal life skills (time management, money management, organizational skill development, etc.).

The Department of Athletics in conjunction with the Big C Society conducts an annual Career Night for all student-athletes on a week night in February. This program gives student-athletes exposure to over 30 different career fields through interactive panels, including Cal alumni and former student-athletes. This program has had many past successes in creating networking for both summer and after graduation jobs and internships.

between the university and the community and as role models to children.

Directed by Mohamed Muqtar, the Cal Athletic Speakers' Bureau receives requests from local schools and community organizations for student-athletes to speak to kids ranging from kindergarten to high school age at various times during the school year and summer. The student-athletes are trained to address a wide variety of health-related topics in addition to emphasizing the importance of education and maintaining self-esteem. The goal is to encourage and support young students in finding a path to productive and healthy futures, free from reliance on harmful substances.

With so many areas covered through the Life Skills Program, Cal student-athletes are certain to be much better prepared for a career when they graduate from school than when they entered.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

One of the real success stories for the University of California is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes – the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and Athletic Department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program geared to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor on the field of play and in the classroom.

PROGRAM FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed within the Division of Undergraduate Education, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally-located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials, and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.

Geared around the understanding of the amount of time student-athletes must devote to practice, training, physical therapy and team travel, the program creates an environment where students can cultivate good study habits, receive individual or group tutoring and obtain counseling from academic advisors.

DEREK VAN RHEENEN, PH.D. DIRECTOR



Derek Van Rhee, a former Cal soccer player and coach, begins his fourth year as Director of the Athletic Study Center this fall.

Van Rhee joined the ASC in 2001 and has served on the Cal faculty since 1997, where he teaches courses in American Studies and in the School of Education.

As an undergraduate at Cal, Van Rhee was a four-year starter for the Bears and a three-time all-conference player in the mid-1980s. As a senior, he was selected Cal's MVP and an Academic All-American.

Following graduation, Van Rhee competed with the U.S. National "B" team and with the San Francisco Bay Blackhawks professional team. He also served as an assistant coach for the Bears for several years.

Van Rhee received his bachelor's degree from Cal in Political Economy of Industrial Societies (PEIS) and German in 1986. He added a Master's degree in Education in 1993 and a Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Studies in 1997, both from Cal.

TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The Tutorial Program promotes and enhances students' academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The Athletic Study Center has between 50-60 tutors on staff per semester to guarantee that students receive the best possible support. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when they have more time to devote to studying.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

ADVISING PROGRAM

The Advising Program offers a broad range of services to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with University, college and NCAA requirements, developing time management skills and resolving personal issues unique to student-athletes. During the freshman year, advisors typically try to help student-athletes make a successful academic transition from high school, while during the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. For the final two years, advisors take more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made towards graduation while referring juniors and seniors to areas on campus that can help with internships, graduate school applications and career planning.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

In addition, the Athletic Study Center offers a Summer Bridge adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components for the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is Peer Advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus life guidance for new intercollegiate student-athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes who assist in developing programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.

KEIKO PRICE ACADEMIC ADVISOR



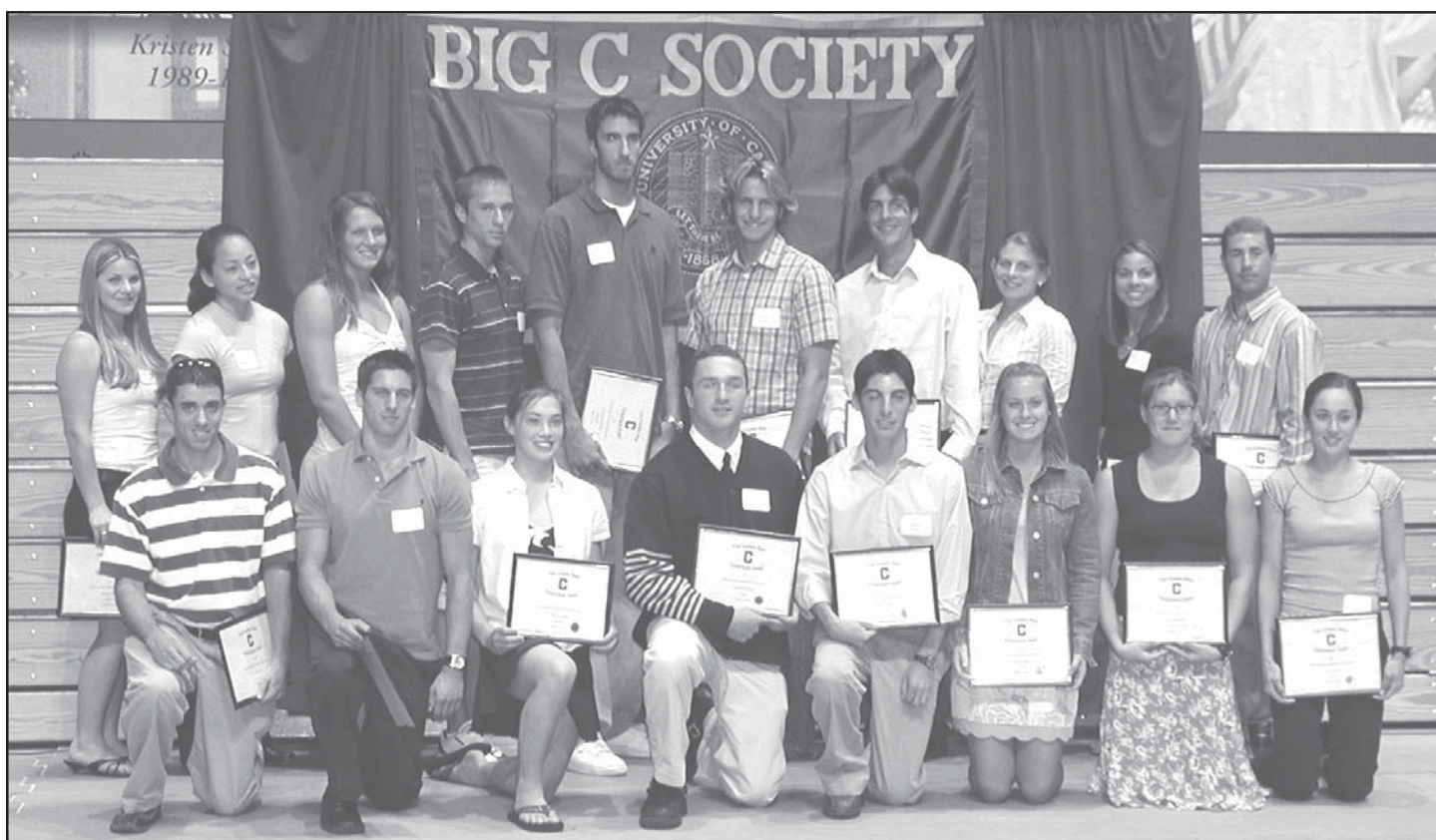

She assists team members in choosing courses and majors, developing time management and study skills, and making a successful transition from high school.

Price joined the Athletic Study Center as an academic advisor prior to the start of the 2004-05 academic year. Prior to her current role, she served as a graduate academic advisor in the same office from September 2002-June 2004.

As a graduate advisor, Price was responsible for the academic advising and monitoring of student-athletes in football, women's volleyball, softball, men's and women's tennis, women's crew, women's lacrosse and women's field hockey. Price completed her master's of arts in education, with a focus on athletes and academic achievement, from Cal in May 2004.

Other roles Price has held at Cal include as a graduate student instructor/tutor in the Athletic Study Center and as a workshop leader for the Student Learning Center.

Prior to her arrival in Berkeley, Price worked at UCLA as a student-athlete academic coordinator from September 2000 to June 2002. A 22-time All-American swimmer, Price graduated Cum Laude from UCLA with a bachelor's of arts in African-American studies in June 2001.

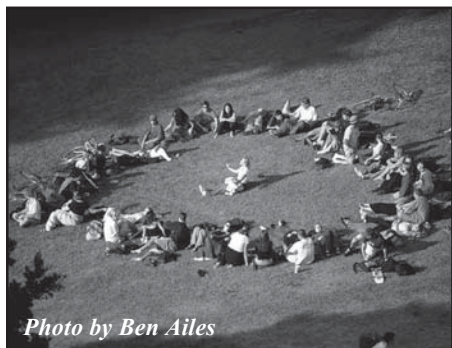

2. WORLD-CLASS STUDENTS

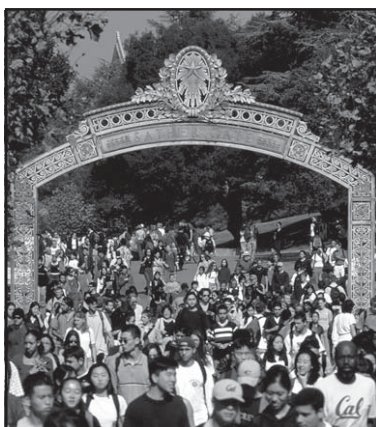
Cal draws its undergraduates from the best high school and community

Cal consistently ranks in the Top 20 among more than 300 Division I schools in the Sears Directors' Cup standings, which measure a school's level of success. Eleven Cal teams claimed national Top 10 finishes last year, and six coaches earned conference coach of the year honors.

2003-04 ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS

With a national championship in men's golf highlighting the year, the University of California placed ninth in the 2003-04 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup standings – matching last season for the best finish in school history.

In addition to men's golf, 10 other Golden Bear teams placed in the Top 10 during the year, including a second straight runner-up finish by softball and fourth-place standings by women's golf, women's crew and men's water polo.

The Directors' Cup measures the best overall sports programs in the country and awards points based on final national standings in a maximum of 10 NCAA-sponsored sports for both men and women. Under those guidelines, Cal's national title in rugby and bronze medal in men's rowing – which do not compete under the NCAA umbrella – did not figure into the rankings.

Individually, Sarah Huarte (women's golf) and Raquel Kops-Jones (women's tennis) were voted national Athlete of the Year in their respective sports, while six coaches were selected conference Coach of the Year.

GOLDEN BEAR TRADITIONS

The opening of the \$57.5 million Haas Pavilion in 1999 signaled the beginning of new basketball traditions at the University of California. Some long-standing Golden Bear traditions, however, will likely never change.

BLUE AND GOLD

Official colors of the University of California were established in Berkeley in 1868. The colors were chosen by the University's founders, who were mostly Yale men who had come West. They selected gold as a color representing the "Golden State" of California. The blue was selected from Yale blue. Cal teams have donned the blue and gold since the beginning of intercollegiate athletic competition in 1882.

GOLDEN BEARS

In 1895, the University of California track and field team was the dominant power on the West Coast and decided to challenge several of the top teams in the Midwest and East on an eight-meet tour that is now credited by many historians as putting Cal athletics onto the national scene. As a symbol of the University, Regent Arthur Rodgers, class of 1872, commissioned a blue silk banner emblazoned with a golden grizzly bear, the symbol of the state of California. The banner was carried by the team on its successful tour, which saw them win five of the eight competitions. Cal athletic teams have been known as the Golden Bears ever since.

CAL BAND

The University of California Marching Band has been a tradition at Berkeley for more than 100 years, exemplifying many of the best aspects of student life at one of the nation's most prestigious public universities. It boasts 180 members, a student-run management and a unique high-step marching style, all of which combine to make it one of the most singular bands of its kind.

Formed as the R.O.T.C. Cadet Band in 1889, the Cal Band adopted its present name in 1923. It has performed across the country and around the world at such events as the Brussels World Fair in 1958, Expo '70 in Japan and a Bicentennial Tour of the United States in 1976. In 1980, the Band took to the stage with the San Francisco Ballet, and it was the official state band for the city's welcome to Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Phillip of Great Britain in 1983.

The smaller version of the Cal Marching Band is the Straw Hat Marching Band, which is present at all California men's and women's home basketball games. The Straw Hat Band marches into the arena in grandiose-style playing the California fight song and then takes its seat in the stands. During the game, the band entertains fans and inspires the Bears with school songs and other popular favorites.



SONGS OF CAL

While through the years California has collected numerous songs that are popular with its alumni and fans alike, two songs will regularly be heard at basketball games each winter at Haas Pavilion. Those songs are the familiar fight song entitled "Big C," a brisk marching tune composed by N.S. McLaren and H.P. Williams of the class of 1914. The other is the Cal alma mater, "Hail to California," written and composed by Clinton R. "Brick" Morse, class of 1896.

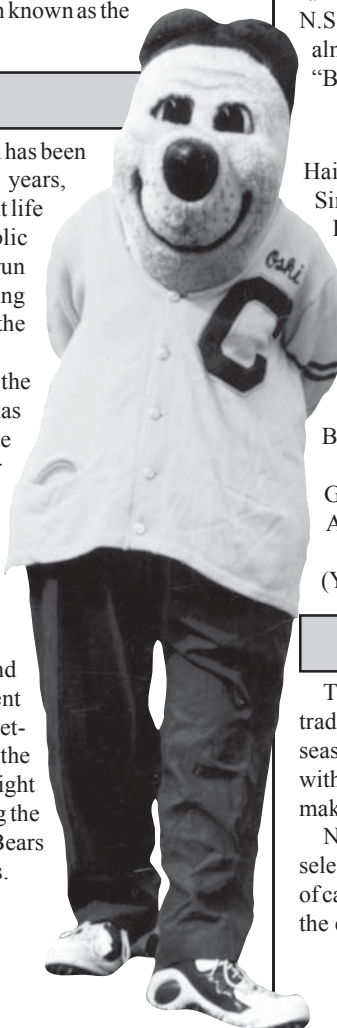

OSKI

The official mascot of the University of California, Oski, has been a tradition at the school since making his debut during the 1941 football season. Prior to his arrival, live mascots were used at Memorial Stadium with varying success. It was decided in 1940 that a costumed mascot would make a more suitable alternative to a live bear.

Named after the popular "Oski Wow-Wow" yell, the Cal mascot is selected by the Oski Committee, a governing body that oversees all aspects of caring for the lovable Bear. Oski's identity is unknown to everyone, with the exception of the committee.





PAC-10 CONFERENCE

Entering the 2004-05 season, the Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions."® Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 84 NCAA team titles over the past nine seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.

Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 84 team titles over the past nine seasons have come in 21 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has now led the nation in NCAA Championships 39 of the last 44 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievement, the Pac-10 has captured 336 NCAA titles (246 men's, 90 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 197 titles.

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. Stanford continued its remarkable run in the 2003-04 season, winning its 10th consecutive United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup. In the 2003-04 competition, four of the top-10 and seven of the top-20 Division I programs were Pac-10 members: No. 1 Stanford, No. 3 UCLA, No. 8 Washington, No. 9 California, No. 15 Arizona, No. 16 Arizona State and No. 20 USC.

The Pac-10 captured 11 NCAA titles in 2003-04, more than double of any other conference. The Pac-10 total of 11 NCAA titles was followed by the Southeastern Conference, which was runner-up with five NCAA crowns, and the Big Ten, which had four. And it should be noted that the Pac-10 total does not include USC's national championship in football or California's in rugby, as they are not counted as NCAA titles. The 11 titles for the Pac-10 is the most for the Conference since it had 11 in 1997-98. The Pac-10 had the most NCAA titles of any conference in women's sports with eight, and tied with the SEC and Big Ten for most in men's sports with three. NCAA team champions from the Pac-10 in 2003-04 came from: UCLA (women's gymnastics, women's golf, softball, women's track and field), Stanford (men's and women's cross country and women's tennis), USC (women's volleyball and men's and women's water polo) and California (men's golf). The Pac-10 also had runners-up in six NCAA Championship events: men's golf (UCLA), men's and women's tennis (UCLA), men's swimming and diving (Stanford), men's water polo (Stanford) and softball (California). Overall, the Conference had 21 teams finish in the top three at NCAA Championship events.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-10 in 2003-04. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Pac-10, 18 witnessed at least half its teams participating in the postseason. The men sent 57 of a possible 87 teams into the postseason (65.5 percent), while the women sent 66 of a possible 99 teams into NCAA Tournament action (66.7 percent).

The Pac-10 showed its worth on the basketball court, as it sent three teams into the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship. On the women's side, three teams competed in the NCAA Championship, while the league had a team reach the Sweet Sixteen for the 21st time in the last 23 seasons. Pac-10 Co-Champions Arizona and Stanford battled in the State Farm Pac-10 Tournament final, and the Cardinal emerged victorious. Stanford carried that momentum into the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship, advancing to the Elite Eight for the second time since its 1997 Final Four run.

The Conference continued its dominance in softball as seven of eight teams earned trips to NCAA regional play, marking the sixth consecutive season the Pac-10 has sent at least seven softball teams to the postseason. California, Stanford, UCLA and Washington made it to the Women's College World Series, where the defending champion Bruins and Golden Bears battled



for the national title.

The Conference also swept NCAA team golf honors, as UCLA captured the women's national title and California claimed the men's trophy. Cal's Sarah Huarte won the NCAA individual women's golf title. Women's volleyball proved to be another showcase of Pac-10 talent, as a record five teams advanced to NCAA regional action.

On the men's side, Pac-10 members have won 246 NCAA team championships, far ahead of the 187 claimed by the runner-up

Big Ten. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-10 - 15 basketball titles by five schools (more than any other conference), 48 tennis titles, 45 outdoor track and field crowns, and 24 baseball titles. Pac-10 members have won 23 of the last 35 NCAA titles in volleyball, 30 of the last 45 in water polo, and 20 total swimming and diving national championships.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 23 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 15 occasions. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 90 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the Southeastern Conference, which is second with 60. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 17 softball titles, 15 tennis crowns, nine of the last 14 volleyball titles, 11 of the last 15 trophies in golf and eight of the last 16 in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, having captured an unmatched 428 NCAA individual titles, an average of nearly 19 champions per season.

Currently, the Pac-10 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two other women's sports.

The Pacific-10 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.

PAC-10 WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Even in its infancy, the Pac-10 Conference played a significant role in the development of women's basketball. On April 4, 1896, California and Stanford squared off at the Page Street Armory in San Francisco in the first women's intercollegiate game in the United States.

The Pacific-10 has consistently been among the nation's finest women's basketball conferences since its inception during the 1986-87 season. The "Conference of Champions" has shared in the surge in popularity of women's college basketball with average attendance figures surpassing 2,000 fans per game for 11 consecutive seasons.

The Pacific-10 quickly established a reputation as one of the strongest women's basketball leagues in the nation, with solid teams across the board. The Pac-10 sent at least four teams to the NCAA Tournament nine times in the decade of the '90s, and every Conference member made a trip to the Big Dance in the '90s. In the new millennium, the story has proved much the same. Six different Pac-10 teams have advanced to the NCAA Championships in the last four seasons.

Overall, Pac-10 schools have won four NCAA women's basketball titles, with USC winning back-to-back titles in 1983 and 1984, and Stanford claiming the national crown in 1990 and 1992. The Pac-10 has made a combined nine Final Four appearances and has advanced to the Sweet 16 in 21 of 23 NCAA Tournaments.

In addition, the Pac-10 has produced five Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT) champions, including Oregon which captured the 1989 and 2002 crowns. Arizona claimed the 1996 WNIT title, while Oregon State won the WNIT in 1980 and 1982.

THE BAY AREA

The San Francisco Bay Area is a major metropolitan area of approximately six million people and one of the most scenic regions in the United States. The Bay Area includes the major cities of San Francisco and Oakland, as well as Berkeley, home of the world-renowned University of California. Just south is the city of San Jose and the Silicon Valley, home to many of the world's high tech companies. The Bay Area also lies within easy driving distance of the high Sierra resorts of Lake Tahoe and Yosemite, the Monterey/Carmel peninsula, the world famous Napa wine country, and the spectacular Mendocino Coast.

Everyone knows "The City" – San Francisco – from countless photographs, movies and television shows that capture its magic. It is a city built on a series of more than 40 hills, offering panoramic views of every kind. The hub of a nine-county complex and the financial and insurance capital of the world, San Francisco has a resident population of about 740,000. San Francisco is situated on a 46.6 square-mile peninsula bounded on the west by the Pacific Ocean, on the north by the Golden Gate strait, and from north to east by the San Francisco Bay. The City has been named the world's top city twice by readers of *Condé Nast Traveler* and the top U.S. city seven times since 1988.

The San Francisco Bay is spanned by two landmarks, the Golden Gate and San Francisco-Oakland Bay bridges, and graced by four islands: Alcatraz, Angel, Yerba Buena and Treasure. The area is easily navigated by car, BART (Bay Area Rapid Transit), bus or ferry, making it easily accessible to all.

Located across the Bay Bridge from San Francisco, Oakland is a city of more than 380,000, jam-packed with exciting attractions, stimulating arts, and a climate that is ranked number one in the country by *Prentice Hall's Places Rated Almanac*. Oakland's charm exceeds its man-made wonders, as its tumbling hills, vast forests, hiking and riding trails, beautiful lakes and numerous parks provide a natural escape for those who prefer nature over an urban environment.

Berkeley, just a 12-mile drive from San Francisco, is situated on 18.8 square miles with a population of 105,000 people. A study in contrasts, Berkeley is a small town with a big-city character. With its world-renowned university, global population and rich diversity of cultural arts, Berkeley reflects and affects the rest of the country.

In the Berkeley hills, Tilden Regional Park offers more than 30 miles of hiking trails, a public golf course, swimming at Lake Anza and plenty of places to picnic. As part of its wealth of cultural life, Berkeley boasts the award-winning Berkeley Repertory Theatre, an opera company, a nationally celebrated symphony and a ballet company.

Just north of San Francisco, across the shining jewel of the Bay Area – the Golden Gate Bridge – lies Marin County and the North Bay. Stunning views of hills and mountains cascading into the bay and the ocean at every turn, Marin County boasts some of the most beautiful scenery in the world.

The Golden Gate National Recreation Area, the only U.S. national park in a major metropolitan area, is the largest urban park in the world. Muir Woods National Monument offers peaceful walks and hikes through majestic groves of towering redwoods, while Point Reyes National Seashore offers spectacular bird and whale watching.

Sports fans can see it all in the Bay Area - professional football (San Francisco 49ers, Oakland Raiders), professional basketball (Golden State Warriors), professional baseball (San Francisco Giants, Oakland Athletics), professional hockey (San Jose Sharks), professional soccer (San Jose Earthquakes), and outstanding collegiate competition.
