## 2008 CALIFORNIA LACROSSE OUTLOOK

#### YOUNG STAFF BUOYS BEARS AS SHERRY ERA BFGINS

new coaching staff brings a renewed sense of optimism to the California lacrosse program in 2008. First-year head coach **Theresa Sherry**, an assistant coach last year under Jill Malko, the only other head coach in Cal lacrosse history, has a fresh outlook on the Golden Bears buoyed by a playing career that included two NCAA championships at Princeton, an Under-19 World Championship and U.S. national team success.

At 25, Sherry is the youngest head coach of any sports team at Cal and one of the youngest lacrosse head coaches in the nation. The young coaching staff includes first-year assistant coaches Cassie Abel (Colorado College '05) and Julia Southard (Brown '05).

The Bears' new brain trust hopes to build on the foundation that Malko created and to improve on a 7-10 overall record in 2007. Cal also posted a 2-3 record in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation, which earned the Bears a No. 4 seed in last spring's MPSF Championship. Highlights for the 2007 squad included a 14-5 victory over eventual NCAA Tournament participant Le Moyne and a five-goal performance by

18-9 win over Saint Mary's in her last game at Memorial Stadium.

The 2008 Bears have big shoes to fill with the graduation of some significant contributors, including Cavallo, who left as Cal's all-time leading scorer, and No. 2 all-time scorer Liz Reifsnyder. The Bears also lost 2007 seniors Hilary Lynch, a rock in goal the past four years; Kathryn Lindler, Cal's top one-on-one defender; attacker-turned-defender Jocelyn Paul; and Meghan Bushnell, a solid defender.

Sherry believes the Bears will rebound.

"The coaching staff this year is really working to increase the lacrosse IQ of every player on the team," Sherry said. "We are implementing a much more flexible and free-flowing style of play on both ends of the field which will allow the players to begin trusting their instincts more as they develop their decision-making processes this year. As coaches, we want to give our players the tools they need to be successful and to prepare them for the split-second choices that they will need to make in game situations."

One key for the season will be the play of the sophomores and freshmen. There are 14 underclassmen out of the 26 players on the roster.

"We need the underclassmen to help us with our depth this year, regardless of whether they are starting games or not," Sherry said. "We are hoping to go 15 to 17 people deep without the level dropping off when we make personnel changes or encounter injuries throughout the season. It is my belief that upperclassmen leadership determines the direction of a team, but the precociousness of underclassmen determines how far a team can go in the postseason."

Among the upperclassmen, look for senior **Danni Zuralow** and junior **Madeleine Dale** to lead the attack. Zuralow was Cal's third-leading scorer with 40 points (27 goals, 13 assists) after Cavallo and Reifsnyder and tied Reifsnyder for No. 3 goalscoring honors. Dale was fourth in the scoring column (31 points) and ranked second in goals (28) behind Cavallo. Dale was also second in draw controls (33) and third in ground balls (28) last season.

Another strong option on the attack for Cal is senior **Brittany Aungier**, who played limited minutes last year due to injury. In 2005, Aungier was Cal's top-scoring freshman with 25 points (15 goals, 10 assists).

"A lot of players who do not have a ton of game experience will have to be ready to step into leadership roles on the attack this year," Sherry said. "Players who have seen time will also have to step out of their comfort zones."

"Elizabeth 'T' Jahp and Sam Price played great throughout fall ball, and we are hoping that they can do some damage for us this spring," Sherry said. "We also expect **Tighe** 

Hutchins to be a good playmaker, along with fellow sophomores Alyse Kennedy and Katie Felber. Catie O'Mahoney, who saw limited playing time last year due to injury and sickness, is another sophomore who will see time on the attacking end. A former line defender,

O'Mahoney has been tearing it up on the attack this fall and will be making the position switch for good."
While the Bears lost

key players at both ends of the field, the midfield unit is essentially intact. Cristen Andrews and Mary Downs, returning starters from 2007, will anchor the midfield in their senior season, while junior Ghillie Little, who started in nine of 17 games played, should have a broader role in midfield this year.

"We're looking for **DennaFaye Herald** and **Alex Tickner** to step up as well," Sherry said. Herald, a 5-11 sophomore, started 14 of 16 games her freshman year, while Tickner scored 13 points (4 goals, 9 assists) as a freshman.

Many of Cal's midfielders will have dual roles on the defense. Downs and Andrews will need to continue to be anchors back there, but Sherry is hoping for Herald and Little and juniors **Kiki Kalkstein** and **Stephanie Smith** to handle more of the defensive chores, allowing Andrews and Downs to concentrate on midfield.

In goal, junior **Morgan Dyson** and freshman **Allie Shropshire** will battle for the starting spot. Dyson played in 14 games the previous two seasons. Shropshire has played for the U.S. under-19 national team and was an alternate on the U.S. squad that won the U-19 World Championship last summer.

"Morgan has the quickness and athleticism, and Allie gives us a good presence in the goal as well as a special ability to move outside the cage and be a significant part of our defense with her interceptions," Sherry said.

Cal boasts another challenging schedule in 2008 that includes three-time defending NCAA champion Northwestern, which will travel to Berkeley for Cal's season opener on Feb. 17. In the Brine East-West Challenge, a March 6-8 tournament in Southern California, Cal will take on Notre Dame, which was nationally ranked for much of last season, and Temple, which has appeared in 16 NCAA Tournaments and won two national crowns. The Bears also host 2007 NCAA Tournament team Pennsylvania - a team that ended last season ranked second in the nation - on March 11.

"Our goal is to make the NCAA Tournament and eventually win an NCAA championship," Sherry said. "At this point we do not have an automatic bid, so it's necessary to play a strong national schedule and earn a ranking. Opening up against Northwestern is the challenge we are looking for to give us the ability to break into the national scene."

The Bears will play most of their home games early, with six of their first eight games scheduled for Memorial Stadium. Conversely, Cal will play seven straight road games before ending the regular season with an April 26 match against MPSF foe Denver in Berkeley.

After battling the Pioneers, Cal will host the 2008 MPSF Championship May 3-5 in Berkeley. While no postseason bid is attached to the conference title this year, the Bears hope to protect "our house," according to Sherry.

"That's a huge motivator," she added. "It's a great opportunity and we need to take advantage of it. We have strong motivation to win the tournament every year, but we have renewed energy this year with the new staff and the new group of players that we have out there. This team will take a lot of pride in having the conference tournament on campus."

## CALIFORNIA COACHING STAFF

#### Theresa SHERRY

Head Coach Princeton '04 1st Year at California



Theresa Sherry, a former Princeton All-American who served as an assistant coach at California during the 2007 season, was named the head lacrosse coach at California in the summer of

2007.

Prior to joining Cal last season, Sherry served as an assistant coach at Amherst College for the 2006 season while also working as a television commentator for ESPNU for multiple women's lacrosse matches. She earned her bachelor's degree in anthropology from Princeton in 2004.

In addition to earning first-time All-American honors as a player in 2002, 2003 and 2004, Sherry was a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy as the nation's top women's lacrosse player as a senior in 2004. She helped the Princeton Tigers to NCAA championships in both 2002 and 2003. Her Princeton teams also reached the NCAA semifinals in 2001 and the final in 2004. The Tigers captured Ivy League Championships in each of her four seasons at the school. A four-time All-Ivy League selection, she was the conference's Player of the Year in 2004.

Sherry was also a four-year letterwinner for the Princeton women's soccer team, serving as a team captain and helping the program to three Ivy League Championships. The multi-sport athlete later played soccer for the Western Massachusetts Lady Pioneers of the amateur W-League and was named the 15th-greatest athlete at Princeton in a *Daily Princetonian* article in 2006.

The Baltimore, Md., product has extensive international lacrosse experience as she competed with the United States Developmental Team in 2004 and 2005 and helped the U.S. Under-19 Team to the World Championship in 1999, earning player of the game honors in the championship game.

The Golden Bears completed the 2007 season with a 7-10 record. As a Cal assistant coach, Sherry was in charge of the midfielders in particular and in charge of improving the fundamental skills of the team as a whole. Former Bears coach Jill



Head coach Theresa Sherry was an All-American at Princeton.

Malko credits Sherry with helping to improve the games of former stars Laura Cavallo, who left as Cal's all-time leading scorer, and Liz Reifsnyder, who left ranked No. 2 on Cal's all-time assist list.

Sherry resides in the East Bay.

#### Julia SOUTHARD

Assistant Coach Brown '05 1st Year at California



Julia Southard joined Cal in the summer of 2007. Formerly an assistant coach at La Salle, Southard was an All-lvy League goalkeeper at Brown who competed against Cal head coach

Theresa Sherry when the latter played at Princeton.

At La Salle, Southard was the second assistant in 2006 and the first assistant in 2007. She worked closely with the defense and goalkeepers and with recruiting with the Explorers.

A 2005 graduate of Brown University with a B.A. in history, Southard joined the collegiate coaching ranks following a successful lacrosse career at Brown. A vocal and intense leader, she was selected as a captain to her young squad during her senior campaign. She posted her best numbers, finishing with a save percentage of .502, making 137 saves, including one shutout. Southard finished third on the team in groundballs. For her work, she earned second-team All-lvy League honors.

Before Brown, Southard attended Manhasset High School in Long Island. There she was a three-sport athlete. She earned All-American honors in her junior and senior years. She was selected to play on the eventual gold medal winning team at the Empire State Games and was selected to the all-tournament team.

A native of Manhasset, N.Y., Southard served as the Director of Goalie Operations at the Brown University Camp in 2005. In addition, she has served as a camp counselor at several camps across the country.

## Cassie ABEL Assistant Coach

Colorado College '05
1st Year at California



Cassie Abel, a former All-American player who was an assistant coach for the University of Colorado's club team last season, joined Theresa Sherry's staff in the summer of 2007.

Abel worked with the offense and midfield in Boulder and helped Colorado take seventh place in the Women's Division Intercollegiate Associates (WDIA) National Championship last season. The product of Seattle, Wash., also recently served as a vice president for the Colorado Women's Lacrosse Association Board.

A decorated attacker at Colorado College, Abel was named the Division III Attacker of the Year in 2005 and became her school's first three-time All-American when she earned honors in 2003, 2004 and 2005. Abel left Colorado College as the school's all-time leader in single-season goals (58) and career goals (tied at 180).

An economics graduate with a 3.5 gradepoint average at Colorado College, Abel previously worked as an event coordinator/operations assistant for NDP Lacrosse, a subsidiary of Kroenke Sports Enterprises, after working as an analyst with Green Manning & Bunch.

## ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

ne of the real success stories for the University of California in recent years is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes - the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and Athletic Department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program geared to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor on the field of play and in the classroom.



#### ATHLETIC STUDY CENTER

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed within the Division of Undergraduate Education, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials, and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.

Geared around the understanding of the amount of time student-athletes must devote to practice, training, physical therapy and team travel, the program creates an environment where students can cultivate good study habits, receive individual or group tutoring and obtain counseling from academic advisors.

#### TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The Tutorial Program promotes and enhances students' academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The Athletic Study Center has between 50-60 tutors on staff per semester to guarantee that students receive the best possible support. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when they have more time to devote to studying.

#### ADVISING PROGRAM

The Advising Program offers a broad range of services to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with University, college and

NCAA requirements, developing time-management skills and resolving personal issues unique to student-athletes. During the freshman year, advisors typically try to help student-athletes make a successful academic transition from high school, while during the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. For the final two years, advisors take more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made towards graduation while referring juniors and seniors to areas on campus that can help with internships, graduate school applications and career planning.


#### SPECIAL PROGRAMS

In addition, the Athletic Study Center offers a six-week Summer Bridge adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components for the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is Peer Advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus life guidance for new intercollegiate athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes who assist in developing programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.




### STRENGTH & CONDITIONING



n integral part of Cal Lacrosse is the strength and conditioning program. The program's philosophy is geared towards helping each student-athlete achieve the highest level of athletic development.

By teaching how all the components of strength and conditioning fit together, student-athletes understand how to maximize force production. This includes enhancement of speed, strength and flexibility, which results in improved power. Motivating, educating and helping to reach maximum athletic development is the primary focus of the Cal program.

The Cal weight room in Memorial Stadium includes eight Olympic platforms, more than 15,000 pounds of Olympic bars and bumper plates, and an array of aerobic and anaerobic equipment. The picturesque facility offers panoramic views of the entire region, including San Francisco and

the Bay. Originally opened in Memorial Stadium in 1983 as part of the Cal Sports 80s facility project, the facility now has expanded to more than 5,000-square feet of space for Cal's football team and other athletic squads.

The training regi-

men at Cal is a year-round process that emphasizes speed, strength and flexibility. With closely monitored workouts that involve a great deal of individual instruction and attention, student-athletes are taught the correct techniques to increase their ability to perform at their peak during competition.

Cal's program stresses comprehensive training in order to improve both strength





and speed. Flexibility is a key component because it is essential for proper lifting. It also improves the running mechanics needed for acceleration and deceleration, both essential for playing lacrosse.

Athlete workouts are closely monitored by the conditioning staff, which works in collaboration with the entire sports medicine team (doctors, athletic trainers, physical therapists, nutritionists, etc.) to ensure the health and safety of all of the student-athletes.

In this way, Cal's strength and conditioning program is a vital component linking the "full circle" of a student-athlete's physical development from conditioning through rehabilitation and re-conditioning.






