**WHAT'S ON TAP:** No. 3 California's final roadtrip before postseason may be its most arduous to date in 2005. Cal plays at No. 13 UCLA April 29 before traveling up the Pacific Coast for two weekend games with No. 22 Washington (April 30-May 1). Friday's game against UCLA will be televised live on ESPNU and all in-game updates will be available via Gametracker at CalBears.com. The Bears defeated Washington at home, 4-3, on April 8 before splitting with UCLA (2-1, 1-2) at Levine Fricke Field, April 9-10.

**THORSON COMES THROUGH:** As the season progresses, what was a luxury for Cal of having two, quality starters, has become something of a necessity. Earlier in the season, it was junior **Kristina Thorson** (17-4, 1.11) who was saddled with a majority of Cal's losses while senior **Kelly Anderson** (21-4, 1.25) leaped out to a 20-1 record. With Anderson taking defeats in three of her last four appearances, however, Thorson has picked up the in-circle slack and never was that been more evident than the past weekend. Thorson no-hit No. 7 Stanford for four innings on April 22, but was removed in favor Anderson to begin the fifth inning. The Cardinal touched Anderson for six runs and Thorson, who reentered the game after a third of an inning, allowed two hits the remainder of the evening, keeping the Bears in a game they would eventually lose, 6-4. In a 1-0 victory against the Cardinal April 24, Thorson struck out seven, tossed five innings of no-hit ball from the first through sixth innings and scattered three hits. Along with sophomore **Sarah Adams**, the Bears' pitching staff leads the Pac-10 in opposing batting average (.156), wins (40) and innings pitched (322.1).

**SPENCER STEPS UP:** Moving from a familiar spot in the lineup to fill the void left by a top player might not always be the easiest transition – especially when the player being replaced was hitting .478. Shortstop **Chelsea Spencer**, however, has been more valuable to the Bears' offense since moving to the second spot in the batting order and replacing left fielder **Lindsay James**, out for the remainder of the season with a broken hand. Spencer, hitting .277, is batting .307 since April 9, when she moved from the No. 6 spot in the lineup. More recently, Spencer is hitting .333 in Cal's last seven games. The senior, who has started 258 consecutive games at shortstop dating back to her freshman season, has also been one of Cal's top hitters in the clutch. Of her 21 RBIs, eight have come with a runner on third and less than two outs. Spencer has also successfully advanced runners in 40 of 81 opportunities.

**TRANSFER PRODUCTIVITY:** She's appeared at third base, in right and left field and, most recently, as Cal's designated player. Despite all of the position changes, junior **Emily Friedman** has emerged as Cal's top newcomer and one of the Bears' timeliest and most productive hitters. Though Friedman, a junior transfer from Wisconsin, is hitting .290 for the season, she co-leads Cal in batting average with runners on base (.350) and her .300 mark with runners in scoring position is fourth among Cal regulars. She is also third behind center fielder **Kaleo Eldredge** and third baseman **Vicky Galindo** in advancing runners, having successfully moved players along the basepaths on 26 of 48 occasions (.542). Friedman's top moment as a Bear came April 9, when her

two-out, bottom-of-the-seventh single to left field scored shortstop Spencer for a 2-1 victory against then-No. 12 UCLA.

**JAMES UPDATE:** A broken left hand is still expected to keep James out of the Cal lineup until at least the remainder of the regular season. James, hitting .478 when Washington pitcher **Ashley Boek** struck her with a first-inning pitch April 8, had been especially valuable in the clutch for Cal, batting .514 with runners on base versus .417 when the bases were empty. The left fielder should have enough at-bats to qualify for any season honors and is poised to become not only the program's top single-season hitter, but the Cal's first .400-plus batter since catcher **Gillian Boxx** hit .466 in 1995.

**BEARS GET IT DONE WHEN IT COUNTS:** Cal is 12-7 against teams ranked in the Top 25 of either national poll (ESPN.com/USA Softball, *USA Today/NFCA*) and has defeated some of the nation's top clubs in 2005. Aside from Cal's recent victory against No. 7 Stanford, the Bears have defeated No. 2 Arizona, No. 3 Texas, No. 5 Tennessee, No. 7 Alabama twice in two days, No. 10 Oregon State, No. 12 UCLA, No. 18 Arizona State, No. 20 Washington, No. 24 Iowa and No. 25 Oregon. (all rankings representative of date game was played).

**A SILVER LINING:** If there's such a thing as a quality loss, Cal can take solace in the fact that its eight defeats this season have all come to teams that have been ranked, at one point, in the Top 25 of either national poll. Losses to No. 2 Arizona (April 2) and No. 23 Northwestern (March 18) came on two-out, walk-off home runs. Defeats to No. 16 Texas A&M (Feb. 16), Arizona State (March 13), No. 12 UCLA (April 10) and No. 7 Stanford (April 23) were the only four games this season where Cal had failed to lead at some point in the contest. In the Bears' April 16 defeat at No. 10 Oregon State, Cal committed three errors that led to a five-run Beavers fifth inning and a 6-5 loss. On April 22, Cal allowed six runs in a third of an inning in falling to No. 7 Stanford, 6-4.

**TRIO OF BEARS VIE FOR TOP HONOR:** On April 6, Galindo, Anderson and James were named to a list of 25 finalists for USA Softball's 2005 Collegiate Player of the Year award. Galindo, a first team All-American, All-Pacific Region and All-Pac-10 selection in 2004, is hitting .372 this season with a team-leading 10 doubles and 17 steals. She's also been a catalyst at the top of the order for Cal with a .433 on-base percentage and has successfully reached base 49 percent of the time when leading off an inning or game. Anderson holds the best record among Cal's pitchers at 21-4 and has 1.25 ERA. James was hitting a team-leading .478 at the time of an injury that is expected to keep her out through the remainder of regular-season play. Cal, along with No. 3 Arizona and No. 5 Oklahoma, are the only programs to have three players named as finalists.

**STEALING SUCCESS:** The 2005 season is shaping up to be a record-breaking year for Cal on the base paths. With 87 team thefts this year, the Bears have a chance to break the program record of 104 stolen bases, set in 1979. As a team, Cal leads the Pac-10 with 87 swipes, 23 more than second-place Washington (64). Galindo leads Cal with 17 stolen bases while freshman speedster **Erika Racklin** has nabbed 15. Three other Bears have stolen at least nine bases apiece.

**BEST OF THE BEST:** With eight seniors and four, four-year starters, it's no surprise that a few Bears are chasing or have already set some Cal program records. A

complete list of which current Bears rank among the program's historical elite is on page four of this release.

**SCOUTING THE NO. 13 BRUINS (24-11 overall, 5-5 Pac-10):** After stumbling out of the Pac-10 gate at 0-3, UCLA has been the hot conference team of late, winning five of their last six contests, including 9-1 and 5-4 victories against then-No. 2 Arizona April 16-17 ... freshman pitcher **Anjelica Selden**, who no-hit Cal for six and two-thirds innings April 10, leads UCLA in the circle with a 16-6 record and the Pac-10 with a 0.62 ERA ... third baseman **Andrea Duran** paces the Bruins with a .377 average, 10 doubles, four triples, 67 total bases, a .632 slugging percentage and a .451 on-base percentage ... the Bruins split with Washington, defeating the Huskies, 4-3, on April 22 before falling 2-1 on April 23 ... UCLA and Washington wrap up their season series April 27 in Seattle (1 p.m.) ... UCLA holds a 67-16 all-time advantage over Cal ... the Bruins are coached by **Sue Enquist** (17th season, 821-157-1) ... for more information on UCLA softball, visit [www.UCLABruins.com](http://www.UCLABruins.com).

**SCOUTING THE NO. 22 HUSKIES (24-15, 4-6):** Equally impressive of late has been Washington, which has won five of its last six games, including two non-conference victories against Nevada ... catcher **Kristen Rivera**, the 2004 Pac-10 Player of the Year, leads the conference in slugging percentage (.988), on-base percentage (.644), walks (51) and the Washington lineup in homers (14), RBIs (39) and total bases (80) ... shortstop **Ashley Charters** is hitting .385 with a .766 slugging percentage and has stolen 29 bases ... outfielder **Lauren Greer** was named Pac-10 Player of the Week Tuesday after hitting .667 (8-for-12) with five runs, four RBIs and two home runs as Washington went 3-1 last week ... Cal is 26-22 all-time against Washington and has won 10 consecutive meetings ... Washington is coached by Heather Tarr (1st season, 24-15) ... for more information on Washington softball, visit [www.GoHuskies.com](http://www.GoHuskies.com).

**TIME CHANGE:** Cal's May 6 home date against No. 8 Oregon State was changed from a 3 p.m. first pitch to 1 p.m.

**ETC:** Cal leads the Pac-10 in hits (378), runs (262), at-bats (1,254), plate appearances (1,482) and putouts (966) ... the top four spots among Pac-10 plate appearance leaders all belong to Bear hitters: Eldredge (170), Woods (168), second baseman **Jessica Pamanian** (167) and Spencer (163) ... the Bears are 36-3 when leading after four innings and their only two losses when leading after five innings have come on walk-off homers by the opposition ... Cal is 24-0 when scoring five-plus runs.

**CALIFORNIA HEAD COACH DIANE NINEMIRE (795-377, 18TH SEASON):** In her nearly two decades in Berkeley, **Diane Ninemire** has established California softball as one of the nation's elite programs. The winningest coach in school history has guided the Bears to three consecutive Women's College World Series championship game appearances, winning the title in 2002. Cal has made six consecutive trips to the WCWS, reached the postseason every year and never suffered a losing season under Ninemire, the 2002 Speedline/NFCA National Coach of the Year and 2003 Pacific Region Coach of the Year. The 2004 Bears were one of Ninemire's most successful and decorated squads. Four All-Americans and eight All-Pac-10 selections helped drive Cal to its third consecutive WCWS championship game appearance. Ninemire surpassed former Bears baseball coach **Bob Milano** for wins by a Cal coach on the way to the Bears' 2003 title game appearance. Cal's 2002 National Championship was the first for a women's athletic team and the program set a school-record for victories (56). In 2001, Cal began the season 32-0 before finishing fifth at the WCWS. Under Ninemire, Cal has also finished third (1999), fifth (1992, 1996) and seventh (2000) at the WCWS. Since Ninemire has been at the helm, Cal players have earned All-American honors 23 times. Two of Ninemire's former players – **Michele Granger** and **Gillian Boxx** – were four-time All-Americans and helped the United States win a gold medal as members of the 1996 U.S. Olympic softball team. In addition, Bears have received all-region awards on 44 occasions and All-Pac-10 honors 67 times. Cal players have also collected a total of 10 Academic All-American and 29 Academic All-Pac-10 certificates under Ninemire. Prior to becoming head coach, Ninemire served as an assistant for five years at Cal under **Donna Terry**. Together, the tandem led the Bears to three appearances in the NCAA playoffs, a third-place finish at the 1986 WCWS and the inaugural Pac-10 championship in 1987.

**SARAH ADAMS, So., P (Half Moon Bay, Calif.):** Lone victory of the season came against Iowa State (2/19) as she struck out seven and allowed three hits ... pitched two innings of relief against Mount St. Mary's (3/5), striking out two ... in 14 innings of work, has allowed 10 hits, four earned runs, tallied a 2.00 ERA and struck out 12.

**KELLY ANDERSON, Sr., P (Woodland, Calif.):** Leads Cal in wins (21), shutouts (8), innings pitched (162.2) and opposing batting average (.149) ... captured a win in 10 straight starts (3/18-4/13) ... tossed fourth career no-hitter (and first in more than two seasons) at North Carolina (3/26), striking out 11 ... no-hit Saint Mary's (4/6), striking out six and walking two without allowing a runner past second base ... finalist for the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year award ... named Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week (3/21-27) after striking out 23 without allowing an earned run in three victories at the Carolina Classic (3/25-27) ... has won 20-plus games for the third consecutive season (23 in 2003, 25 in 2004) but has done it the quickest this year ... in four consecutive appearances (3/3-6) allowed just one hit in picking up victories ... has recorded a two-hit victory six times ... recorded 11 strikeouts in a win against Delaware State (3/4) ... tossed a six-inning, one-hit victory against Southern Illinois (2/18) ... averages 3.7 hits, 1.6 runs (1.2 earned) and 6.4 strikeouts per seven innings pitched.

**KALEO ELDREDGE, Sr., CF (Kahului, Hawaii):** Perhaps Cal's most versatile batter as her .321 average, six homers, 35 RBIs, 70 total bases, and .534 slugging percentage suggests ... batted .432 (16-for-37) during a 12-game hit streak (3/4-3/23) ... .451 on-base percentage leads Cal and two triples co-lead the Bears ... 29 walks are second in the Pac-10 and tops among Bear hitters ... 170 plate appearances lead the conference ... has 10 multi-hit and nine multi-RBI games ... toughest Cal hitter to strikeout (1K/14.55AB) ... only regular Cal starter with a 1.000 fielding percentage (33 putouts) ... established a new program runs scored mark of 127 in a 6-5 victory at Oregon (4/15) ... has 13 RBIs in 16 opportunities with a runner on third base and less than two outs ... 17 career hit by pitches tie her for first in Cal history with Lindsay James.

**EMILY FRIEDMAN, Jr., OF/IF/DP (Berkeley, Calif.):** Cal's most productive newcomer who has made 37 total appearances at third base, in right and left field and as the designated player ... slapped game-winning base hit with two outs in the bottom of the seventh to

help Cal defeat then-No. 12 UCLA (4/9) ... first Cal homer, a solo shot, came against Santa Clara (3/11) ... went 4-for-4 with two RBIs versus Pacific (3/23) ... went two-for-three with two RBIs in an 8-0 victory against Portland State (3/3) ... has six multi-hit games and four multi-RBI games ... .350 batting average with runners on base co-leads the Bears with Vicky Galindo ... played two seasons at Wisconsin (2003-04) before transferring to Cal.

**VICKY GALINDO, Sr., 3B (Union City, Calif.):** Finalist for the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year award ... leadoff hitter is batting a team-high .372 (42-for-113) with 10 doubles, a .543 slugging percentage and a .433 on-base percentage ... scored lone run in Cal's 1-0 defeat of No. 7 Stanford (4/24) ... two-run homer at Oregon State (4/17) proved to be the difference in a 2-1 win ... has hit safely in 12 of her last 15 games ... has 11 multi-hit games and three outings of three-plus hits ... went 4-for-5 with two runs in Cal's 6-3 victory at No. 2 Arizona (4/3) ... went 2-for-3 with three runs at North Carolina (3/27) ... had a 3-for-4 performance with two doubles, a run and an RBI in a loss to No. 16 Texas A&M (2/26) ... scored three runs and went 2-for-4 in Cal's season-opening victory against San Jose State (2/5) ... collected two doubles in 4-3 victory against No. 20 Washington (4/8) ... first on Cal and third in the Pac-10 with 17 steals ... has 10 multi-run games ... averages 1.17 hits per game and scores 1.06 runs per game ... holds Cal's top averages against righthanders (.396), with runners in scoring position (.429) and with less than two out (.409) ... .350 average with runners on base co-leads the Bears with Emily Friedman ... struck out just once in last 44 at-bats.

**JEANA GEVAS, Jr., DP/IF (Benicia, Calif.):** Transfer from Cal Poly has been used primarily in the designated player role ... hit first Cal homer, a two-run shot, and had a season-high three RBIs vs. Iowa State (2/19) ... has accumulated five multi-RBI games and three multi-hit games.

**LINDSAY JAMES, Jr., LF (San Carlos, Calif.):** Finalist for the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year award ... was hitting a team-leading .478 (54-for-113) when a broken left hand forced her from the lineup for what is expected to be the remainder of the regular season ... poised to become the first Cal .400 hitter since catcher Gillian Boxx (.466) in 1995 ... despite not playing in Cal's last 10 games, her 54 hits through April 18 are still second in the Pac-10 ... posted a team-high 13-game hit streak (2/26-3/12) where she hit .489 (23-for-47) ... went 11-for-16 (.688) in five games at the Carolina Classic (3/25-27) ... went 4-for-5 in a win against No. 7 Alabama (3/5) ... has 17 multi-hit games and eight games of three hits or more ... tallied four perfect days at the plate ... 1.43 hits per game leads Cal ... season batting average is 156 points over her .322 career mark entering 2005 ... second on Cal with 14 stolen bases ... 17 career hit by pitches tie her for first all-time with Kaleo Eldredge.

**JULIE MEYER, Fr., 1B (Yardville, N.J.):** Hitting .538 (7-for-13) in last five games ... leads Cal newcomers in starts (48), hits (32) and total bases (45) ... batted .379 (11-for-29) over a nine-game hit streak (2/27-3/11) ... first Cal home run (3/23) was part of a 3-for-3, three-RBI performance against Pacific ... 347 putouts lead Cal.

**JESSICA PAMANIAN, Sr., 2B (Milpitas, Calif.):** During a 10-game hitting streak (3/11-25), batted .531 (17-for-32) with eight runs and eight RBIs ... in five games at the Carolina Classic (3/25-27), hit .438 (7-for-16) with two homers and seven RBIs ... went 3-for-4 with three RBIs and two runs against Loyola Marymount (2/27) ... collected three RBIs in a 2-for-3 performance at No. 10 Oregon State (4/16) has nine multi-hit games and four of three-plus hits ... accumulated six multi-RBI games.
