he home of the University of California women's swimming and diving team is the Spieker Aquatics Complex, one of the finest outdoor facilities in the United States.

Completed in the fall of 1982, the one million dollar facility was made possible through the Cal Sports '80s project and was dedicated to the former California water polo letterman Warren "Ned" Spieker Jr., who provided the major portion of the funding for the project.

The facility replaced the old Harmon pool, which had stood on the same site since the early '30s. Included in the extensive remodeling project was the joining of the two existing tanks into one 50-meter by 25-yard pool of deep water, suitable for national and international swimming and water polo competition. Also included in the reconstruction was the installation of new piping and filtration systems, lighting modifications and increased spectator seating.

The Spieker Aquatics Complex is located adjacent to Haas Pavilion at the corner of Bancroft and Dana streets on the Berkeley campus.

2006-07 SEASON OUTLOOK



n arguably more talented team and the presence of one of the best coaches in the nation in **Teri McKeever** give the California women's swimming and diving team a great shot at another top five finish at this season's NCAA Championships.

The Golden Bears are coming off a fourth-place finish at the 2006 NCAA Championships and an unbeaten dualmeet record, at 11-0. Perhaps even more impressive as Cal's achievements last season were the accomplishments by Bears old and new this past summer at the international level. McKeever was the U.S. head coach at the Pan Pacific Championships in Victoria, B.C., where her protégés picked up six gold medals. Returning Bear Jessica Hardy and Florida transfer Dana Vollmer each won a title in Canada, while former Cal star and Olympic gold medalist Natalie Coughlin took home four gold medals from the Pan Pac Championships. Hardy also earned a bronze medal in the 50-meter breaststroke at the FINA Short Course World Championships last spring in Shanghai, China, and won the 100-meter breaststroke at the Janet Evans Invitational last July in Los Angeles.

Led by Hardy, the defending 100-yard breaststroke NCCA champion, and bolstered by Vollmer, a 2004 Olympic gold medalist, McKeever's roster is littered with talent, which will make up for the loss of 200-yard backstroke NCAA champion Helen Silver and Ashley Chandler, Cal's school record-holder in the 1000-yard freestyle. Hardy, a former world record holder in the 100-meter breaststroke, and

Vollmer, who swam with Coughlin on the 800-meter freestyle relay that won gold in Athens, are sophomores this season. That means the Bears, who also bring in new diving coach **Tom Davidson** and new assistant coach **Johan Steiner**, have a tremendous outlook for the next three years.

McKeever returns nine 2005-06 All-Americans, including Hardy, senior Erin Reilly, junior Emily Silver, senior Sherry Tsai, senior Annie Babicz, senior Lauren Andrews, sophomore Lauren Rogers, junior Rachel Ridgeway and junior Leann Toomey. Vollmer is an additional collegiate All-American, who picked up that distinction in the 800-yard free relay last season with the Gators.

"We have five seniors, with Sherry Tsai and Erin Reilly being the captains," McKeever said. "They're doing a great job of filling those leadership roles that Ashley and Helen filled and that had such a huge impact on us last year.

"We have an experienced group that knows what it takes to be a top-five program, one that could really educate, encourage and inspire the young people. For us to stay at that level, the returners are going to have to find a way to score more points and the freshman class needs to contribute on relays and individually at the national level. And we need Dana to swim like she's capable of swimming during the collegiate year."

Blake Hayter leads a quality group of freshmen. A middle-distance and distance freestyler, the product of San Diego also competed at the 2006 Janet Evans Invitational, at which she was fourth in the 400-meter free and fifth in the 800 free, and at last summer's USA National Championships, at which she was sixth in the 400-meter free.

Vollmer, Hayter and the other newcomers join a squad that had one of its best seasons in program history in 2005-06. The fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships was Cal's best finish in six years, since the Bears were also fourth at the 2000 NCAA Championships. Between 2000 and 2006, Cal was seventh in 2001, eighth in 2002, eighth in 2003, sixth in 2004 and eighth in 2005. Helen Silver and Jessica Hardy's NCAA titles were Cal's first since 2004, when the Bears had four. The 2006 Bears also set a school record of 7:07.38 in the 800-yard free relay (Chandler, Emily Silver, Rogers and Reilly), which set that mark in a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

At the Pac-10 Championships, McKeever's team won two individual titles, from Reilly (1:45.70, 200-yard freestyle) and Helen Silver (1:55.12, 200 backstroke), and a relay title (7:08.31, 800-free relay of Chandler, Andrews, Rogers and Reilly). Before Pac-10s, Cal completed only its second undefeated dual-meet season and its second in three years. A 169-131 victory over Stanford on Feb. 11 at Stanford capped the regular season. A win over Stanford in 2004 likewise gave the Bears an unbeaten (9-0) dual-meet record.

With the combination of new and returning Bears and the addition of new support staff, McKeever believes that her program is on track for another great season.

"The NCAA gives out trophies to the top four, and we definitely want to get a trophy," McKeever said. "That's a possibility. There are a lot of great teams out there, with Auburn, Georgia, Arizona is going to be real tough, and USC's good, so we're going to have to do well."

FREESTYLE

Emily Silver, Erin Reilly and Jessica Cotton head a strong contingent of swimmers in what may be Cal's strongest stroke.

Silver, followed by Reilly, is the Bears' top returning sprinter. In the 50 and 100, Annie Babicz, Sherry Tsai, Jessica Hardy, Lauren Andrews and Dana Vollmer are additional threats to score at the Pac-10 and NCAA Championships. The top returning Bears in the middle-distance events (200 and 500) are Reilly, Silver, Lauren Andrews, Rachel Ridgeway, Sherry Tsai and senior Natalie Staubitz. Reilly, who has Cal's top returning time in the 1000 (10:05.45) from last year, and Cotton, the only Bear to swim the 1650yard free last season, Silver, Rachel Ridgeway and sophomore Natalie La Rochelle are Cal's top returning distance swimmers.

In the sprints, Silver took third in the 100yard free (48.47 seconds) and sixth in the 50 free (22.39) at the NCAA Championships. She was also second in both events (22.65 in the 50 and 48.79 in the 100) at the 2006 Pac-10 Championships held last February in Long Beach, Calif. The younger sister of 2006 NCAA champion Helen Silver, Emily Silver has also etched her name in her school's record books. Entering the 2006-07 season, Emily Silver ranks second behind Coughlin in the 100-yard free (48.47) and is third, behind Coughlin and former Olympic star Haley Cope, in the 50 free (22.39).

Reilly swam Cal's fastest 200 (1:44.63) and 500 (4:41.51) frees in addition to the

second-fastest 50 (23.06), 100 (49.21) and 1000 (10:05.45) frees in 2005-06. The Sacramento product swam that 200 free time in taking second place at the NCAA Championships and set her top 500 time in the semifinal round at the NCAA Championships; she eventually took third. A versatile swimmer who also excels in

the butterfly and in relays, Reilly looks to continue her assault on the Cal record books. Entering the season, she ranks third in the 100-yard free (49.21), second in the 200 free (1:44.63), fourth in the 500 free (4:41.51), sixth in the 1000 free (9:53.75) and seventh in the 1650 free (16:25.95).

As a freshman at Florida, Vollmer swam a 22.80 in the 50 free and a 49.63 in the 100 free, which would have ranked her second

behind Silver at Cal last season. The addition of Vollmer and **Blake Hayter** could also make up for the loss of Ashley Chandler, who had Cal's second-best times in the 200 and 500 last year, in the middle-distance free events. Vollmer's best 200 time (1:46.82 leading off a relay) would have placed her third in the Cal ranks for last season. Hayter's best 200 (1:46.62) and 500 (4:43.75) times would have put her third at Cal last year.

BREASTSTROKE

Jessica Hardy is one of the world's best swimmers in the 100-yard and 100-meter breaststroke and is the Bears' best chance at another NCAA title. Before she came to Berkeley, Hardy had already set the world record of 1:06.20 in the 100-meter breaststroke in the semifinals of the 2005 FINA World Championships. Though her mark has since been broken, Hardy's time still holds as the American record and as the World Championships meet record. She also set the Pan Pacific Championships meet record of 1:06.43 last summer, when she won the consolation final of the race in Victoria, B.C., Canada.

Hardy set the Cal record of 59.51 in the 100-yard breaststroke at the 2005 Georgia Invitational and swam Cal's third-fastest all-time mark in the 200 breaststroke (2:12.22) last season. She also placed second in the 100 (1:00.15) and ninth in the 200 (2:15.23) at the 2006 Pac-10 Championships.

Annie Babicz was second to Hardy on both the 100 and 200 last year. The senior also ranks third (1:01.02) and fifth (2:13.51),

respectively, in Cal's All-Time Top 10 lists in those races. She earned All-America honors in the 100 breaststroke with an 11th-place finish (1:01.72) at 2006 NCAAs. Babicz also took third in the 100 (1:01.17) and fifth in the 200 (2:14.50) at the Pac-10 Championships.

"Jessica obviously has world-class speed, and Annie's been so consistent there and provides us with a pretty good 1-2 punch," McKeever said.

Alexandra Ellis and junior Jessica Cotton provide depth in the breaststroke. Ellis placed eighth at 2006 long course nationals in the 200.

BACKSTROKE

While Helen Silver's loss will be felt, Lauren Rogers, Sherry Tsai and Lauren Andrews have plenty of experience in this stroke. Sophomore Emily Verdin, returning from a redshirt year, is another athlete who brings NCAA and Pac-10 Championship experience in the backstroke. Heather White is an outstanding racer and will challenge Cal's top corps of returning swimmers here.

McKeever will likely lean on Rogers, Tsai and Andrews the most in the backstroke. Last year, Rogers had the fastest times in both the 100 (54.27) and 200 (1:56.74) of the returning Bears, setting her 200 time when she took ninth place at the NCAA Championships. Rogers, like upperclassman Tsai, has elite experience, having competed in the 2005 World University Games and in the 2004 Olympic Trials.

Tsai had the fourth-fastest times in both the 100 (54.78) and 200 (1:59.05) last year, while Andrews was fifth (56.73) and third (1:58.00), respectively, in the events.

Cal should be strong again in the butterfly events, as its top swimmer in the 100-yard butterfly (Leann Toomey, 53.71) and in the 200 fly (Rachel Ridgeway, 1:56.94) return and are bolstered by the addition of Dana Vollmer. Erin Reilly, Annie Babicz, Sherry Tsai, Nadia Staubitz and Courtney Eronemo, whose top time of 1:02.38 in the 100-meter fly qualifies her for the 2008 U.S. Olympic Trials, add depth.

Toomey earned All-America honors when she swam the fly leg of Cal's fourth-place 200-medley relay at the 2006 NCAA Championships. She swam her 53.71 at the 2006 Pac-10 Championships, at which she took fourth place.

In the 200 at Pac-10s, Ridgeway was fifth and Toomey was 10th. Ridgeway swam her fastest 200 time at the NCAA Championships, at which she took eighth place.

Reilly can be called upon to swim both the 100 and 200, as well as the fly legs in the medley relays. The senior garnered All-America honors when she swam the fly leg of the Bears' third-place 400-medley relay at the NCAA Championships.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Cal should be improved in the IMs, with

the return of most of the Bears' top IMers and the addition of some new athletes. Rachel Ridgeway is the only returning Bear who swam the IMs at the 2006 NCAA Championships, taking 12th in the 200 (2:00.37) and 14th in the 400 (4:18.26). Her times in the semifinals of both events – 2:00.08 in the 200 and 4:15.80 in the 400 – were Cal's top times in 2006. They put Ridgeway seventh on Cal's all-time top 10 lists for both those events. The junior also had success at the conference level, taking second in the 400 IM (4:16.34) and ninth in the 200 IM (2:01.42).

Freshmen Courtney Eronemo, Alexandra Ellis and Heather White will add more than depth in the IMs. White's lifetime-bests in the 200 (2:01.92) and 400 (4:19.00) would have ranked her fourth and second, respectively, on Cal's 2005-06 team. Eronemo should have success in the 400, as her lifetime-best time (4:17.77) in that race would have ranked her second at Cal last season.

Several returning Bears will likely swim the IMs, including Emily Silver, Sherry Tsai, Jessica Hardy, Jessica Cotton, Annie Babicz and Natalie La Rochelle. Hardy, who is looking to have success in a variety of events this season, was seventh in the 200 at the 2006 Pac-10s with her top time of 2:02.04.

RELAYS

The Bears placed four of their relays in the top 10 at the 2006 NCAA Championships and will again challenge to win national titles in 2006-07. Cal took third place in the 400-medley relay, fourth place in both the 200-medley and 800-free relays, and sixth place in the 400-free relay at NCAAs last spring.

With Helen Silver gone from the NCAA final foursome in the 400-medley relay (3:34.10), which included Jessica Hardy, Erin Reilly and Emily Silver, Lauren Rogers may be the Bears' top backstroke option in the 400- as well as the 200-medley relays. Another strong option for the backstrokelegis Sherry Tsai, who along with Hardy, Leann Toomey and Emily Silver, swam on the 200-medley relay (1:39.09) in the 2006 NCAA final.

The freestyle relays will get a boost with the addition of **Dana Vollmer**, who could replace Helen Silver and Ashley Chandler in those events. Given her success in the 50, 100 and

200 frees and her Olympic relay gold medal, Vollmer could put Cal over the edge in its hunt for its first relay title since 2004. Fellow newcomers **Blake Hayter** and **Amanda Larson** will add depth in the free relays.

Tsai, Reilly, **Lauren Andrews** and Emily Silver formed the 400-free relay that swam a 3:17.49 at NCAAs, while Hardy, **Annie Babicz**, Helen Silver and Emily Silver swam Cal's top 200-free relay time (1:31.59) last season. Chandler led off Cal's 800-free relay, which included Emily Silver, Rogers and Reilly, at NCAAs (7:07.38).

The definitive word on Cal women's diving this year is young. **Tom Davidson**, who was the 1997 Big Ten Freshman of the Year when he dove at Indiana, graduated from the Bloomington campus in 2001 and is just one of the new faces. All four of his athletes – **Samantha Young**, **Stephanie Whalen**, **Tessa Berman** and **Kristen Duffel** – are freshmen.

The 5-5 Young is the most experienced of the quartet and should help Cal challenge at the conference level. A product of Shoreline, Wash., she took 15th and 16th on the one- and three-meter springboards, respectively, at the 2006 USA Diving Senior Zone D Championships. A two-time state champion in Washington, Young won the one-meter springboard (girls 16-18) in 2005 and 2006 at the Spring Region 10 Championships, where Whalen was fourth at one meter and second at three meters.

Young has also made her mark on the platform, taking 11th place (16-18 girls) at the 2005 Wendy Wyland Invitational.

"We're going to surprise a lot of people in the Pac-10 and nationally with the talent this year, based on the hard work they've done so far," Davidson said. "The youth factor will play a part here and there in some meets, when they go against some teams with seniors and a lot of experience, but the fact they are young and might not know that they shouldn't be able to compete will work in their favor."

CALIFORNIA HEAD COACH

TERI MCKEEVER

15th Year at California



One of the best swimming coach in the United States, Teri McKeever enters her 15th season as head coach of the University of California women's swimming program after another season

of accolades for her and her program.

In 2005-06, the Golden Bears amassed another undefeated dual-meet season, at 11-0, before taking fourth place at the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. McKeever produced two individual national champions: freshman sensation Jessica Hardy won the 100-yard breaststroke title and outgoing senior Helen Silver won the 100-yard backstroke title in Athens.

McKeever then made history as the first woman ever to be named head coach of a U.S. national team at a major international meet, after being tabbed to lead the American team that competed at the 2006 Pan Pacific Championships last August in Victoria, B.C. In Canada, McKeever protégés Hardy (1 gold medal), Natalie Coughlin (4 golds) and Dana Vollmer (1 gold) collected six titles.

The Cal coach had also made history in the summer of 2004 as the first woman ever to be named a coach of a U.S. Olympic swimming team. As an assistant coach of the U.S. swim team in Athens, Greece, McKeever helped guide Cal alumna Coughlin to five medals, including two gold, alum Haley Cope to a silver medal,

and the entire U.S. swimming team to 28 medals, including 12 gold. In the summer of 2005, McKeever served as an assistant coach to the U.S. team during World Championship competition.

Under McKeever's direction, Cal's women's swimming program has become one of the most elite in the nation. McKeever's teams have finished in the Top 10 nationally for the last 10 straight years. She has amassed an impressive 122-42 dual meet record (.743) in her time at Cal, and 12 out of the 14 years she has coached in Berkeley, the Bears have notched winning records.

Under McKeever's tutelage, 13 different national champions have emerged, while


47 different swimmers have earned All-America honors, and 54 different swimmers have inked their names on Cal's all-time Top 10 list. Among the most prominent swimmers to blossom under McKeever's guidance are five Pac-10 Swimmers of the Year - Coughlin (2001-03) and former Bear standouts Cope (2000) and Marylyn Chiang (1999). McKeever also coached Staciana Stitts, who became the first Cal woman swimmer to earn an Olympic gold medal since Mary T. Meagher in 1984, when Stitts was a member of the U.S.' gold medal-winning 400-meter medley relay at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

While swimming for McKeever at Cal, Chiang won a national title in the 100 back, becoming the first Cal swimmer to win an NCAA title since 1988. In 2000, Cope led off Cal's 200m medley relay and 200m free relay that won national titles. Cope set a short course world record for her 50m back leg of the medley relay. In August of 2002. McKeever coached Cope and Coughlin to victories at the U.S. National Championships, where Coughlin became the first swimmer to win five national titles since 1978. McKeever also saw the team win the 400 medley relay, breaking the national club record. Coughlin-the 2001, 2002 and 2003 NCAA Swimmer of the Year- finished her career at Cal under McKeever's tutelage, with 11 individual NCAA titles before going on to win five Olympic medals during the 2004 Olympics.

Prior to the Olympics, McKeever gained international experience serving as an

assistant women's coach of the U.S. National Team at the FINA World Championships in July of 2003 and at the U.S. vs. Australia "Duel in the Pool" in April of that year. Her ability to motivate her teams into reaching high goals was shown at both those meets as the U.S. soundly defeated Australia 196-74, and the U.S. women took home 12 gold medals at the world championships. Coughlin, McKeever's pupil, led the U.S. 400-meter free and medley relays to gold and silver medals at the championship meet.

McKeever's great coaching capability has been well noted by her peers as the ASCA (American Swimming Coaches Association) awarded her the 2002 Coach of the Year honor. She also won her second Pac-10 Coach of the Year award (2002 and 1999), and earned the George Haines Coach of the Meet Award at the U.S. National Championships in the summer of 2002. She served as an assistant U.S. coach at the 2002 Pan Pacific Games in Yokohama, Japan and at the 2001 Goodwill Games in Brisbane, Australia.

In May 2002, McKeever was awarded the National Collegiate and Scholastic Swimming Trophy for her outstanding contributions to swimming as a competitive sport and healthful recreational activity. Along with Cal's accomplishments in the pool, the Bears consistently have one of the highest team GPA's in the nation. She has coached 12 different Academic All-Americans and numerous Pac-10 All-Academic selections.

"For someone that comes to swim here, their Cal experience is to be part of a team and an extended family that is going to support and encourage them," McKeever said. "We are looking for athletes who are striving for a balance between excellence in

the classroom and excellence in the pool."

McKeever, 44, came to Cal after spending five years at Fresno State where she also developed an outstanding program. She spent two seasons in charge of the women's program (1988-89) before assuming the dual role of men's and women's head coach from 1990-92.

In 1992, she was named the Big West Conference Women's Coach of the Year after leading the women's team to a 12-3 dual meet record and finishing fourth in the conference championships.

McKeever has strong ties to the Pac-10 Conference, both as an athlete and as a coach. She worked as an assistant coach at USC from 1984-87, helping develop several All-Americans. McKeever is a former USC All-American herself, competing in the NCAA Championship meet all four years while at USC and helping the Trojans to four consecutive NCAA Top-10 finishes. She earned All-America honors in both 1980 and '81. As a senior in 1983, McKeever was named USC's Outstanding Student-Athlete.

The former Trojan graduated from USC in 1983 with a B.S. in education with two teaching credentials (multiple subject, secondary life science) and also earned a Masters degree in athletic administration in 1987. McKeever's father, Mike, was an All-American lineman for the Trojans' football team in 1959. McKeever comes from a family of 10 children, all with varied athletic backgrounds. Sisters Kristi and Kelli Gannon are both members of the U.S. National Field Hockey Team.

McKeever resides in El Cerrito.
