UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS CONTINUES FOR GOLDEN BEARS

Perhaps the greatest measure of the level of success to which head coach Jeff Tedford has brought the California football program is the fact that a year which included a share of the Pac-10 Championship, 10 victories, a fourth straight bowl appearance, a third bowl victory, a top 15 final ranking and a fifth consecutive defeat of Stanford in the Big Game has been labeled by some as a disappointment. The reality is that Tedford has lifted the Golden Bears into a golden era not seen in these parts since the early 1950s. California football has become a recognized national power and a source of pride for alumni, fans and students throughout the nation.

Rather than up-and-down, California's 2006 season is better described as down-and-up. A tough season-opening loss to Tennessee was a definite downer, but that was followed by a dominating eight-game winning streak. After back-to-back November losses foiled Bear hopes for a National Championship and a Rose Bowl, the resilient team rose back up and up-ended archrival Stanford to not only cap a nine-victory regular season, but also to earn a share of the Pac-10 Championship for the first time since 1975.

The season culminated with a dominant performance in the 29th annual Holiday Bowl as Cal rolled to a 45-10 triumph over Texas A&M, man-handling a team which many thought would be too physical for the Pac-10 co-champs. Instead, the Golden Bears were led by running backs Marshawn Lynch and Justin Forsett, who each tallied 100 rushing yards, and linebacker Desmond Bishop, who registered 12 tackles and was the key to the Bears shutting down the Aggies' vaunted option attack.

In addition to advancing to a bowl game for a fourth straight time for the first time in program history, many other firsts were accomplished

by the Golden Bears in 2006. The Bears also posted their fifth straight winning season for the first time in over 50 years, their first five-game stretch of scoring 40 or more points, their first eight-game winning streak since 1950 and their first share of a conference title since 1975. In addition, the Bears broke school records for season tickets sold (40,262) and average home attendance (64,318).

Individual highlights also abounded as Lynch and cornerback Daymeion Hughes were named the Pac-10's Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year, respectively. Hughes and wide receiver/return specialist DeSean Jackson earned invitations to Orlando, Fla., for the ESPN College Football Awards Shows and five different Golden Bears were recognized as All-Americans – Jackson, Hughes, Lynch, Bishop and defensive tackle Brandon Mebane.

The Bears had 18 players recognized as all-conference performers. Bishop, Mebane and center Alex Mack joined Hughes and Lynch on the all-league first team, while Jackson became Cal's first all-conference first-team selection at two positions (wide receiver and punt returner) since 1999. In addition, eight Bears were named to the Pac-10 All-Academic teams, led by senior first-team selections Byron Storer and Randy Bundy.

In the record books, Jackson set Pac-10 and California records in punt return touchdowns in a career (5) and a season (4), while Hughes climbed to second in season (8) and career (15) interceptions and Lynch reached third in career rushing yardage while becoming just the second Golden Bear player to record multiple 1,000-yard rushing seasons.

Other individual performance of note include Bishop leading the Pac-10 with 114 tackles, punter Andrew Larson stepped right into the lineup and leading the league in net punting and placekicker Tom Schneider connecting on all 46 of his PATs as well as 12-of-13 field goals inside 50 yards, not to mention his matching the school record with a 55-yarder in the Big Game. In his first year of action, quarterback Nate Longshore has thrown for 23 touchdowns and has a chance to become just the second Bear

signal-caller to surpass 3,000 passing yards in a season. He was also named Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week three times this year.

While the season-opening loss to Tennessee was disappointing, it was not shocking – Cal entered the game with a re-tooled offense under new coordinator Mike Dunbar, essentially a rookie quarterback in Longshore, a new punter and punt returner, and a very inexperienced secondary. Mixing in 106,000 rabid orange-clad fans added up to an opening day loss, but also an easy-to-remember lesson to take everything one play at a time.

The lesson kicked in immediately as the Golden Bears returned to Berkeley and focused in on another major conference opponent. In their home opener, the Bears crushed the Big 10's Minnesota, then cruised over Portland State before mashing nationally-ranked Arizona State. After beating Oregon State on the road, the Bears shocked 11th-ranked Oregon, 45-24, with a Homecoming performance to remember before an electrifying partisan sellout crowd of 72,516. That Oregon game was the first of three Memorial Stadium sellouts on the year, another first in over 50 years. In fact, Cal had only sold out three other non-Big Games since the early 1950s.

Three more victories lifted Cal into the national top 10, the third straight year that Cal has been ranked in the top 10.

However, a tough road game at Arizona resulted in a heart-breaking 24-20 loss which featured multiple near-misses. In that game, Jackson tallied 285 all-purpose yards, including a 95-yard punt return touchdown. The loss effectively knocked the Golden Bears out of the national championship picture, but the biggest game of the year still loomed.

Nov. 18, 2006 was the date of Cal's showdown with four-time defending Pac-10 champion USC in Los Angeles and it will be remembered as the day Cal came closest to its first Rose Bowl bid since the 1958 season. The two league frontrunners went toe-to-toe for the entire game, with Cal holding a 9-6 lead with 20 minutes to go in the game, but those 20 minutes saw the Trojans knock home a field goal followed by a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to escape with the victory and an eventual Rose Bowl appearance.

After a bye week, the Golden Bears regrouped and then sent their seniors off in class with a fifth straight victory over archrival Stanford in the Big Game. It is Cal's longest win streak in the ancient rivalry since the early 1920s and it improved Tedford's record to a perfect 5-0 against the Cardinal.

While there has been some disappointment in Berkeley this year, the level of expectations for the Cal Bears is higher than it has been in over a half-century. And while there have been some tough losses, one simple fact must be remembered: Cal has lost 20 games in five years under Tedford; the Bears lost 43 games in the five years prior to his arrival. Once again in 2006, the ups have clearly overwhelmed the downs in yet another successful season for the Golden Bears.

GAME 1



KNOXVILLE - California was victimized by big plays and a bigger crowd as the Golden Bears dropped their 2006 season-opener, 35-18, to Tennessee in front of 106,009 fans in Neyland Stadium. It was the largest crowd to ever watch a California football game.

Tennessee struck first with a 12-yard passing TD, then the Volunteers broke free for four straight big plays - a 42-yard pass and a 80-yard pass play followed by a 50-yard strike down the middle and a tough 43-yard rush through traffic. Before the Golden Bears could settle into any offensive rhythm, the Volunteers held a 35-0 advantage and the hostile crowd was in a frenzy.

Cal cracked the scoring column with a 32-yard Tom Schneider field goal in the third quarter and then closed the contest with two touchdowns. Joe Ayoob found DeSean Jackson deep and the sophomore receiver made a nifty move to dodge a flying Volunteer defender and find the end zone for a 40-yard score. Late in the game, Ayoob connected twice with Jackson and once with Marcus O'Keith to set himself up for a one-yard scamper into the end zone.

The Volunteer defense, which ranked second in the nation against the rush in 2005, held Cal to just 64 rushing yards as Marshawn Lynch carried just 12 times for 74 yards (an average of 6.2 yards per carry). Safety Thomas DeCoud led the Bears with a career-high 13 tackles and Brandon Hampton snared his second career interception.

BERKELEY - The California Golden Bears rebounded from their opening-week loss with an impressive 42-17 victory over Minnesota at Memorial Stadium. Nate Longshore established himself as the Golden Bears' starting quarterback by completing 22-of-31 passes for 300 yards and four touchdowns with no interceptions.

Minnesota cracked the scoring column first with an easy-looking drive on its first possession. However, Cal responded with a nine-play drive capped by Longshore finding Robert Jordan for a 24-yard TD. The Bears then opened the second quarter with a quick drive highlighted by a Lavelle Hawkins 42-yard reception and a two-yard TD grab by DeSean Jackson.

The Gophers knotted the game on a 99-yard kickoff return, but the Bear defense tightened and held Minnesota to just a field goal the rest of the way.

Meanwhile, Longshore continued to pick apart the secondary, finding Jackson for two more touchdowns, a 48-yarder down the sideline and an 11-yarder across the middle.

California closed things out behind the gritty running of Marshawn Lynch (27 carries for 139 yards) and Justin Forsett (12-77) and hard-nosed defense. The vaunted Gopher running attack was held to just 109 rushing yards and Daymeion Hughes had a pair of key interceptions.

Jackson finished with 114 receiving yards, in addition to his three touchdowns while Hawkins had career-bests of nine catches for 125 yards.

GAME 3

BERKELEY - All fears of a letdown for California were put to rest early in its game against Portland State at Memorial Stadium. After falling behind 3-0, the Golden Bears scored 35 unanswered points to take control of its final non-conference game of the season. The entire scoreless second half belonged to reserves as Cal walked away with a 42-16 triumph.

Cal used a wide array of weapons to pile up its points, scoring 21 points in each of the first two quarters. The first score was a three-yard delivery from Nate Longshore to tight end Cameron Morrah for his first career TD. After Justin Forsett jumped over the pile for a one-yard scoring plunge, Daymeion Hughes helped the defense get on the board with a 30-yard interception return for a touchdown. A spectacular career-long 71-yard TD burst from Marshawn Lynch made it 28-3 early in the second quarter and a short five-yard run around tackle for Marcus O'Keith made the score 35-3.

Lynch's score was on the first drive of the second quarter and his day was done after that. Despite just six carries, the Heisman candidate managed 112 rushing yards, his second straight 100-yard day.

Longshore closed the scoring and his afternoon on the final play of the first half, a 27-yard TD toss to DeSean Jackson - Jackson's fifth TD of the year. The sophomore receiver finished with 103 yards through the air for his second 100-yard day of the season.

Defensively, the Bears held the Vikings to just 273 total yards of total offense as 29 different players registered tackles in the game.

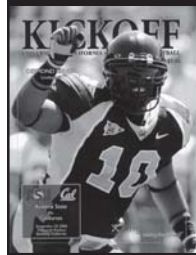

DeSean Jackson caught one of Nate Longshore's four touchdown passes and returned a punt 80 yards for a score against the 22nd-ranked Sun Devils, who couldn't keep up with Cal's dizzying speed on both sides of the ball.

Marshawn Lynch, Lavelle Hawkins and Justin Forsett also caught TD passes for the Bears, who scored four touchdowns in a 7 1/2-minute span of the first half. Longshore passed for 270 yards and Lynch ran for 124 in Cal's third straight impressive victory after season-opening loss at Tennessee, when the Bears were ranked No. 9.

Hughes and Mickey Pimentel returned two of Cal's four interceptions for scores, punctuating a terrible day for Carpenter. Ryan Torain's career-high 191 yards rushing and two scores weren't enough for the Sun Devils.

Hughes' fourth career TD return with 26 seconds left capped the Golden Bears' highest-scoring half in their Pac-10 history - one week after they scored the same number of first-half points against Portland State. Cal has racked up 1,442 total yards and 133 points in its last three games.

Sophomore Nate Longshore again showed his skills, completing 22-of-31 passes for a career-high 341 yards and four touchdowns, while Marshawn Lynch recorded three touchdowns to go with his fourth straight 100-yard rushing day.

The Golden Bears took the opening kickoff and scored on a 39-yard Longshore-to-Lavelle Hawkins hook-up. BERKELEY - In what was billed as a tale of two offenses, the California defense set the tone early as the Golden Bears rolled to a 45-24 victory over Oregon before a raucous sellout crowd at Memorial Stadium.

Cal quarterback Nate Longshore passed for three scores and ran for another while DeSean Jackson caught a 36-yard touchdown pass and added a 65-yard punt return for a TD which put the game away in the first half.

In the second half, the Bears controlled possession for 75 percent of the time as Justin Forsett ground out the yards, finishing with 163 rushing yards on 27 carries.

The game opened with Cal's Brandon Hampton snaring an interception on the first play of the game. Longshore found tight end Craig Stevens for a short touchdown strike and the rout was on.

After an Oregon field goal, Cal responded with the Longshore-to-Jackson hookup before plunging into the end zone from one yard out. Then with 4:40 to go in the half, Jackson dazzled the crowd with another spectacular punt return for a touchdown, the third of his career, and the score was 28-3.

The Bear defense held Oregon to just 70 rushing yards after the Ducks had entered the game leading the Pac-10 with 227.5 rushing yards per game. Cal also had interceptions by Desmond Bishop and Bernard Hicks as it forced four total turnovers.

Forsett added a rushing TD while Robert Jordan also scored on a short Longshore delivery. Tom Schneider booted a season-long 44-yard field goal.

The game marked the first time in history that California scored over 40 points in five straight games.

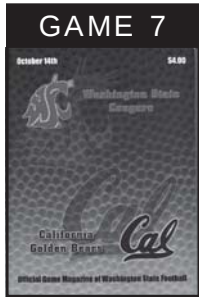

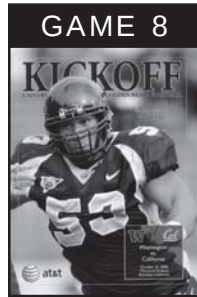

BERKELEY - Marshawn Lynch ran for 150 yards and a 22-yard touchdown in overtime to lift California to a 31-24 victory over the Huskies.

Linebacker Desmond Bishop made 16 tackles and capped his day with a game-ending interception for the Golden Bears, who celebrated wildly after surviving for their seventh straight victory.

Lynch notched a 17-yard TD run with 1:52 to play, and Cal appeared to be safe after trailing much of the day against the Huskies and new quarterback Carl Bonnell, who threw five interceptions in his first start in two years.

But Bonnell drove the Huskies 48 yards to the Cal 40, where he uncorked a long throw to the end zone with 6 seconds left. The ball was deflected into a Husky's hands and he lunged over the goal line to knot the game.

BERKELEY - Marshawn Lynch caught one of Nate Longshore's three touchdown passes and ran for another score as No. 10 Cal won its eighth straight, 38-24 over the Bruins on Saturday night.

Robert Jordan had two touchdown catches and DeSean Jackson romped 72 yards on his school-record fourth TD punt return for the first-place Golden Bears, who moved one big step closer to their first conference title since 1975.

Although UCLA outgained Cal and controlled play for long stretches, Cal has several players capable of rendering those long stretches pointless. Longshore was 20-of-24 for 266 yards, and Lynch had 126 total yards.

Jackson finished off the Bruins with his third punt return for a score this season, tying the Pac-10 record in the third quarter.

Patrick Cowan passed for 329 yards and ran for a score in his fourth start as UCLA outgained Cal 516-433, but repeatedly failed to capitalize on strong drives in the Bruins' fourth consecutive loss.

Jackson, who already has scored 19 touchdowns for Cal as a sophomore, provided another electric moment. He caught Aaron Perez's punt and took two steps to his left, then reversed his field and picked up a crushing block from Thomas DeCoud before juking Perez and outrunning the rest of the Bruins to the end zone.

Memorial Stadium was filled with 72,516 fans for its second sellout of the season - and just the fifth for any opponent except Stanford since the 1950s.

TUCSON - California could not catch a break as it dropped a hard-fought Pac-10 battle with Arizona on the road. The Golden Bears had one touchdown called back by penalty, one called back by replay and another near-touchdown when their receiver could not keep his balance into the end zone. In addition, two interceptions were called back by flags on a late game-tying drive by Arizona. It all added up to a 24-20 Cal loss in the desert.

Cal had a pair of touchdowns from the spectacular DeSean Jackson to open a 17-3 halftime advantage. The sophomore opened the scoring on a 95-yard punt return - the fifth punt return touchdown of his career, then, after a 46-yard field goal from the ever-reliable

Tom Schneider, Jackson took a short Nate Longshore delivery and burst past the defense for a 62-yard score.

However, the second half was a different story as Arizona kept itself in the game and chipped away at the Bears' advantage. After a third-quarter score made it 17-10, the Wildcats methodically moved the ball downfield once again, scoring on another short run early in the fourth on a drive that featured flagged interceptions by Bernard Hicks and Daymeion Hughes.

With the score knotted at 17, Arizona took the lead for good on a 39-yard interception return. Cal nearly answered quickly as Longshore found Lavelle Hawkins, but Hawkins could not keep his feet into the end zone, falling at the one. After three unsuccessful tries at the TD, Cal had to settle for another Schneider field goal.

Cal had one final opportunity, but a tipped Longshore pass was intercepted to clinch the upset victory for Arizona.

Jackson finished with 285 all-purpose yards, while Marshawn Lynch ran for 102 yards - his school-record 16th 100-yard game, which also pushed him over 1,000 yards for the season.

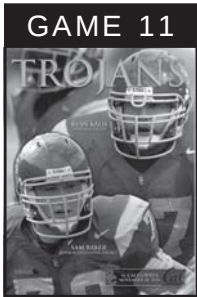

LOS ANGELES - Twenty minutes from the Rose Bowl. The California Golden Bears went toe-to-toe with the USC Trojans for over three quarters, but USC used a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to foil Cal's hopes for its first Rose Bowl since 1959. Instead, USC won 23-9 and captured the Pac-10 championship for the fifth straight season.

Nate Longshore, who completed 17-of-38 passes for 176 yards in the loss, directed the go-ahead drive in the second quarter for the Golden Bears. After pinpoint passes to DeSean Jackson (36 yards) and Robert Jordan (29 yards), Longshore found Lavelle Hawkins, who managed to hold on despite a brutal sandwich from two

Trojan defenders, for a six-yard score and a 9-6 advantage.

The two defenses held strong until late in the third quarter with just over 19 minutes to play, when USC connected on a 49-yard field goal to knot the game at nine.

In the fourth quarter, Cal could not get clicking and USC's offense, bolstered by a vocal sellout crowd of 91,672, began to make big plays. Trojan quarterback John David Booty completed 18-of-31 passes for 238 yards, including touchdown strikes of 25 yards to Dwayne Jarrett and 37 yards to Steve Smith on a back-breaking fourth-down conversion with 8:23 to go.

Cal had a pair of touchdowns called back during the game. In the first quarter, linebacker Mickey Pimentel returned an apparent fumble over 80 yards to the end zone, but the play was ruled an incomplete pass. Late in the fourth quarter, Marshawn Lynch appeared to have a 70-yard touchdown run, but replay showed his knee had been down after nine yards.

After falling behind by a field goal in the first quarter, Cal had a huge defensive play from Brandon Mebane, who burst through the Trojan line to stuff the running back in the end zone for the Bears' first safety since 2002.

BERKELEY - Tom Schneider booted four field goals and the California defense held Stanford to just 269 yards as the Golden Bears upended the Cardinal, 26-17, in the 109th edition of the Big Game before a sold-out Memorial Stadium. It was the fifth straight win in the rivalry for Cal, which closed the season undefeated at home, and it was also the Bears' third sellout of the year, a first in over 50 years.

The Bear offense struggled to click on the cold, blustery day, but Schneider continued his outstanding season and a hard-hitting defense led by Zack Follett and Desmond Bishop kept Stanford from the lead.

Schneider opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 55-yard field goal to match the Cal school record. After Stanford knotted the game at three, another Schneider three-pointer put the Bears on top for good. Then with 2:32 to go in the half, a big hit by Follett forced a fumble which was scooped up by Syd'Quan Thompson and escorted into the end zone, despite the fact the freshman lost his shoe to a would-be tackler.

Stanford did not go away however, using a big kickoff return to set up a TD of its own, making it 13-10 at the break.

The two teams traded touchdowns in the third quarter with Cal quarterback Nate Longshore delivering a perfect pass to Lavelle Hawkins for a 32-yard score before Stanford quickly answered with a deep ball of its own.

However, down the stretch, it was the Cal defense and Schneider wrapping things up. The junior placekicker booted two more field goals while the Golden Bears held the Cardinal to just nine yards of offense in the fourth quarter.

DeSean Jackson was the offensive star, racking up 127 yards on seven catches, despite the swirling winds.

SAN DIEGO - The California Golden Bears cruised to a 45-10 victory over Big XII opponent, Texas A&M, in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl. In fact the 35-point win was the biggest margin of victory for Cal in bowl game history. The win also gave the Bears their third in their last four bowl games played.

In what would be his final game in a Bear uniform, junior Marshawn Lynch rushed for 111 yards and two touchdowns, and was selected as the game's co-offensive MVP. Teammate Justin Forsett, who was the game's leading rusher with 124 yards, also found the endzone in the fourth quarter on an eight-yard dash. The 100-yard performances by Lynch and Forsett marked the first time Cal had two 100-yard rushers since Oct. 22, 2005, when Lynch and Forsett each ran for over 100 yards against Washington State.

Quarterback Nate Longshore had a sound statistical game completing 19-of-24 passes for 235 yards and a touchdown, en route to co-offensive MVP honors. Longshore also scored a touchdown on the ground when he plunged into the endzone from one yard out in the first quarter to even the score at 7-7.

Not to be overshadowed by the offense, linebacker Desmond Bishop recorded a game-high 12 tackles (8 solo/4 asst) to earn Defensive MVP honors.

The Cal defensive unit was spectacular, allowing just 10 points, including a shutout in the second half. San Diego native, Mickey Pimentel recorded seven tackles, while Eddie Young intercepted a Ty Branyon pass (his first career INT) in the fourth quarter highlighting the other top defensive notables.
