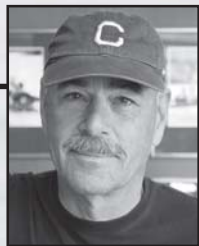

CAL CREW COACHING STAFF



Stephen GLADSTONE

Director of Cal Crew

Regarded as one of the premier rowing coaches in the United States, Stephen Gladstone enters the 12th season of his second stint - 20th overall - as head coach of California men's crew. During the 2006 campaign Gladstone led his team to a national championship at the IRA (Intercollegiate Rowing Association) Regatta and a Pac-10 team championship sparked by victories in the varsity eight. In 2006 the Cal varsity eight came out on top, defeating Princeton by two seconds. With this win, Gladstone is tied with Charles "Pop" Courtney for the most Varsity Challenge Cup Titles (IRA Varsity Eight National Championships); Courtney won 11 titles while at Cornell between 1901 and 1915.

Wanting to give full measure to coaching, Gladstone resigned as Cal's athletic director in June of 2004, having assumed the position in 2001. During his time as AD, Gladstone helped turn around Cal's football program by naming Jeff Tedford to lead the Golden Bears on the gridiron. Despite the pressures of being both athletic director and head coach for men's crew, Gladstone led his team to a bronze-medal finish at the IRAs and second place at the Pac-10s, a near carbon copy of the 2003 spring racing season, the exception being a gold-medal finish for the junior varsity eight at the IRA and Pac-10 Championships.

Dominance was the norm during the 1999 through 2002 seasons. The varsity eights claimed the IRA national championship each year and set an IRA record time in 1999. Additionally the JV eight won a Pac-10 title in 2002 and IRA gold in 1999, 2001 and 2002. Gladstone was recognized as Pac-10 Men's Rowing Coach of the Year for five consecutive seasons from 1998 through 2002.

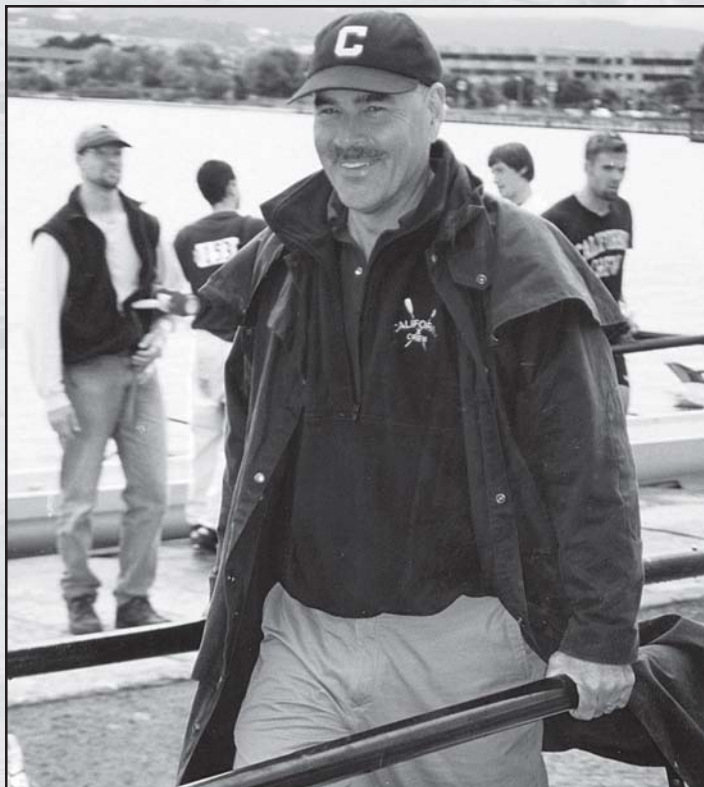
In 1997 and 1998, with Gladstone's return to Cal, the Bears once again stepped onto the IRA medal stand.

From 1981 to 1994 Gladstone served as the Director of Rowing Operations at Brown University in Providence, R.I. While at Brown, Gladstone established a program that was at the time unparalleled in collegiate rowing. His crews triumphed four times at the Eastern Sprints Championships, five times at the IRA Regatta and twice at the National Collegiate Rowing Championships. In both 1993 and 1994, the Brown varsity crew completed the triple crown with victories in each of the aforementioned championship regattas - a feat that had never before and has never since been accomplished. In Gladstone's final season at Brown, the men's crew went undefeated at all levels of competition.

During his previous tenure at Cal from 1973 to 1980, Gladstone guided the Bears to three undefeated dual-race seasons, an IRA title and a Pac-10 championship.

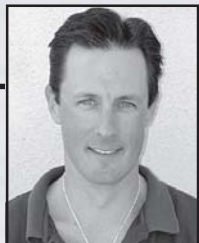
Stephen Gladstone's name has been synonymous with success ever since he began coaching in 1966. After directing the Princeton freshmen to a pair of IRA silver medals, Gladstone took over as varsity lightweight coach at Harvard. He led the Crimson to four straight undefeated seasons, four Eastern Sprints championships and, in 1972, Thames Challenge Cup and Wyfold Challenge Cup victories at the Henley Royal Regatta in England. During his tenure at Harvard, he served as the U.S. National Team Coach (1969) and was a selector for the U.S. Olympic Team (1972).

A 1964 graduate of Syracuse University, Gladstone has served on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen and has also been a member of the Men's Olympic Rowing Committee. In 1984, he served as ABC's expert commentator for rowing events at the Los Angeles Olympics, and he worked in the same capacity for NBC at the Seoul Olympic Games in 1988. Immediately prior to his return to Cal, Gladstone was the president and director of marketing for Resolute Racing Shells.

Geoff BOND
Assistant Coach/Novice Coach

Geoff Bond is a 1988 graduate of Brown University where he earned a B.A. in Classical Greek and Roman History. Bond rowed in Steve Gladstone's powerhouse Brown program, competing in the freshman, junior varsity, and varsity 8s, between 1984 and 1988. During that period Brown won two titles at the Eastern Sprints Championships and two IRA varsity national championships.

After graduating from Brown, Bond and his wife, Hilary, spent two years teaching and coaching at the Salisbury School in Salisbury, Conn. They then traveled to Japan where they taught English for two years. Bond headed the Berkeley High School Boys Crew Program in 1993-94 and 1995-96. When Gladstone returned to Cal in the fall of '96, he asked Bond to join him as his varsity assistant. During Bond's three years of apprenticeship under Gladstone, he helped develop the less experienced athletes and ultimately coached the varsity 4+ at the IRA Regatta each year. In 1999 he led the Bears' Henley Campaign which ended in a second-place finish in the Ladies' Plate at the Henley Royal Regatta.

Bond is currently in his eighth year at the helm of the California freshman crew. In addition to five consecutive Pac-10 wins in 2003-07, his crews have collected medals at the IRA national championships in five of the last seven years. In 2004 and 2005, the Cal freshmen were undefeated national champions, something never done before at Cal in consecutive years. Cal also won the 2007 IRA freshman eight title. Another first under Bond's leadership is the current five-year winning streak over the Washington Huskies in the annual freshman dual that dates back to 1939.

In the rare moments when he is not training his athletes or recruiting the next generation of Cal oarsmen, Bond can be found preparing his house for the next big quake, napping or doing laps around the Oakland Airport on his bicycle. Currently, he and his wife live in the Oakland Hills with their three children, Evelyn, Phineas and Beatrix.



Luke AGNINI
Assistant Varsity Coach

Luke Agnini joined Steve Gladstone's coaching staff in 2008. Prior to coming to Cal, Agnini rowed with the Pennsylvania Athletic Club, winning four national championships for Penn AC. He held a number of positions in the Philadelphia, Pa., area, including the role of Assistant Director for the Masters Rowing Association.

Agnini, who coached at Penn AC from May to September of 2007, has also coached for the United States. He coached a U.S. coxed pair from Penn AC that reached the 2007 World Championships, winning the B final to claim seventh-place overall. In addition, Agnini coached at St. Joseph's Preparatory School in Philadelphia in the springs of 2004 and 2005.

A product of Marietta College in Marietta, Ohio, Agnini graduated in 2002 with degrees in psychology and history. He competed at the IRA Regatta while rowing at Marietta.



Mike FENNELLY
Rigger/Boatman

In his 27th year as Cal's rigger, Mike Fennelly is regarded as one of collegiate rowing's finest boatmen. He not only maintains all of the program's boats and prepares them for racing, but also keeps the entire boathouse in ship shape. Over the previous 16 years, Fennelly maintained the equipment for the Cal women's program as well as for the men's.

Fennelly has a strong rowing background. He rowed in high school at St. Joseph's in Alameda, Calif., and continued at Long Beach State before transferring to Cal and rowing one year in the lightweight varsity 8. In 1979, Fennelly became lightweight head coach while serving as rigger apprentice under the legendary Matt Franich. In 1981, he became Cal's full-time rigger upon Franich's retirement.

Fennelly and his wife, Kathleen, live in Alameda with their two sons, Brian and Patrick.

California alumnus Dean Caparaz is in his first year working with the Golden Bears men's crew program. He also works with the Cal field hockey, lacrosse and women's crew programs. VARSITY 8 HAS PLENTY OF OPTIONS IN RUN TO IRAS

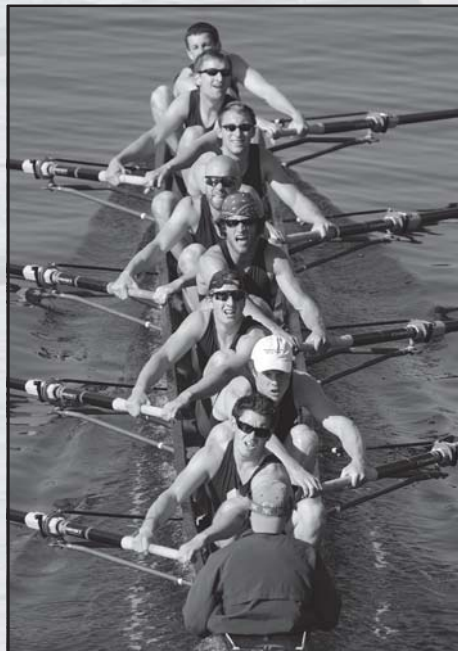
California men's crew looks to return to the elite level of its sport after another top-10 finish at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association's national championships in 2007. The Golden Bears' varsity eight took fifth place against a talented field at the Cooper River in New Jersey. Combined with victories in three other races, Cal placed third in the overall points standings.

Last season marked the first time in 10 years that Cal did not finish in the top three of the varsity eight grand final. Only two seasons ago, in 2006, Cal won the IRA varsity eight race and national championship honors. Now, with talented returning athletes who were members of the winning varsity four, freshman eight and freshman four at the IRA Regatta, plus 28 newcomers to the team, Cal head coach **Steve Gladstone's** program is in good shape for 2008.

"This season there is a lot more depth than there was last year, a lot more parity," said the decorated head coach, who is in his 20th year at Cal. "With the depth comes a very strong competitive matrix, and with a competitive matrix usually comes speed, so we're optimistic that once again we'll

be in contention for the championship. Essentially that's our goal, to be there. When we arrive in Camden, we want to be in position to win that race. That's our goal this year as well."

Cal returns 17 letterwinners and loses 11 from the 2007 squad. The returnees from Cal's varsity eight that competed at

last year's IRA Regatta and placed second at the Pac-10 Championships are junior coxswain **Mike Porter**, senior stroke **Charlie Smith**, junior **Janis Fontein**, senior **David Naughton** and senior **Marko Marjanovic**, a 2008 Olympic hopeful for Serbia. Smith, another international Bear who has competed for Great Britain, was named All-Pac-10 for his performance as a junior. He is the only returning Bear selected to the 2007 All-Pac-10 team.

Another Marko, senior **Marko Knezevic**, returns in 2008 after redshirting 2007 due to injury. Knezevic, who like Marjanovic rows for Serbia, was one of Cal's stars in 2006, when he rowed on the Bears' IRA and Pac-10 championship varsity eight.

Other contenders for his year's varsity eight include senior **Gordon Getsinger** and sophomores **William Dean**, **Sean Engel**, **Nareg Guregian**, **Justin Hills**, **Brandon Shald** and **Benedict Tufnell**. Last season, Getsinger rowed in the three seat for the second varsity eight that placed fifth at the IRA Regatta and second at the Pac-10 Championships, while Dean, Engel, Guregian, Shald and Tufnell rowed for the freshman eight that won titles at the IRAs and Pac-10s.

A talented boat, the 2007 Cal freshman eight won the Pac-10 title over Washington by more than seven seconds and won the IRA crown by more than three seconds over Brown. The Bears' freshmen are now

experienced sophomores, with only one rower not returning. Dean and Guregian were members of that boat whom Gladstone praised for their "tremendous physical capacity, their cardiovascular capacity." Shald, another freshman eight alumnus, brings a positive attitude to Cal that could work well in the varsity eight.

"Athletically, Sean Engel, boy is he good," Gladstone said. "He's just a real coordinated, slick athlete. He's very, very good. All those guys are in contention. That's real. That's not coach talk. I could see all those guys in the varsity eight later in the season."

"It's cliché to say, but it's true: It's wide open," he added. "One of my primary tasks is to be able to go through the season, get a sense of the various combinations of a boat and figure out, Okay, this is our best lineup. Hopefully that'll be clear by the time of Pac-10s. But that's my sense with this squad – it's going to take that long."

**NEWCOMERS BOLSTER
ALWAYS STRONG
FRESHMEN BOATS**

Steve Gladstone and Cal frosh/novice coach **Geoff Bond** have brought in plenty of talented new faces, including several who have competed for their countries, to bolster an always strong set of freshman boats that won two IRA titles and the Temple Challenge Cup in England last year. Some of the Cal freshmen include U.S. junior national team member **T.J. Laher**, the

younger brother of Cal sophomore **Zachary Laher**, Canadian **Spencer Crowley**, Great Britain's **Calum Wright** and Serbians **Jovan Popovic** and **Goran Todorovic**

The younger Laher, a local product from Orinda, Calif., who has rowed for the Oakland Strokes club, competed for the United States in the 2007 Junior World Championships in Beijing, China. There, he took fifth place in the eight along with current Cal teammate Nareg Guregian. Crowley is a member of Canada's junior national team and took ninth place with Canada's four without coxswain at the 2007 Junior World Championships.

Wright along with Cal teammate Benedict Tufnell placed ninth in the four at the 2006 Junior World Championships. Wright also won silver in the four at a 2007 Junior World Cup Regatta in Munich, Germany. Popovic and Todorovic, like Cal teammate Marko Marjanovic, are Olympic hopefuls for Serbia for Beijing '08

Popovic has won several international medals, including a silver medal in the four at the 2007 World Championships, a gold in the pair at the 2006 World Championships and a silver in the pair at the 2006 U23 World Championships. Along with Todorovic, Popovic won a gold medal for Serbia at the 2005 U23 World Championships and took fifth place in the 4 at the 2007 European Championships. In the pair at the Junior World Championships, Popovic and Todorovic placed fourth in 2004 and fifth in 2005.



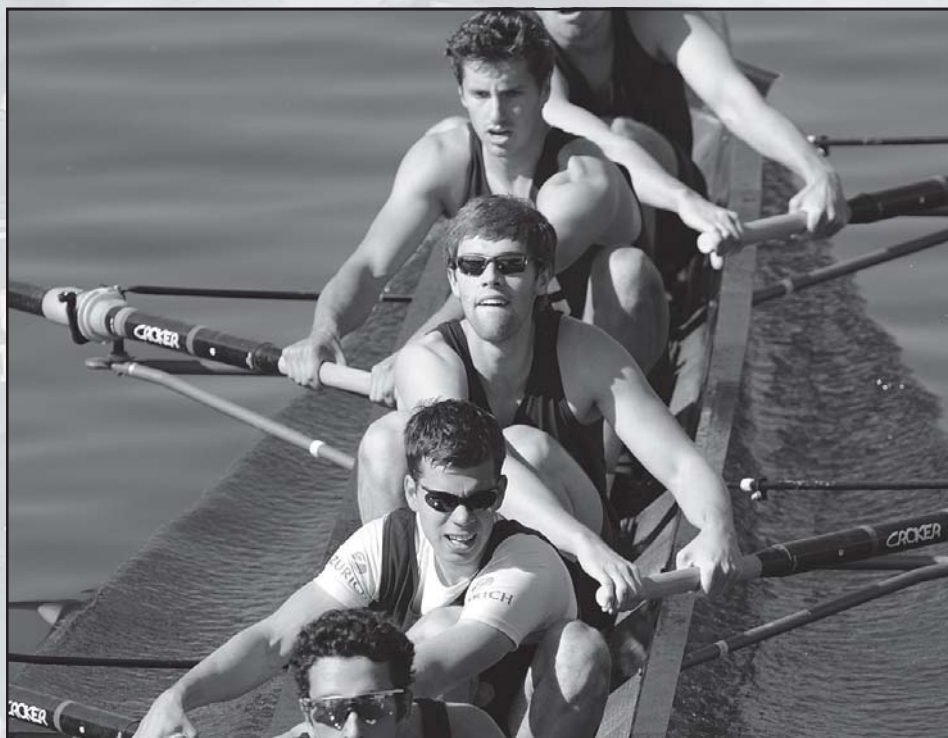
An internationally experienced group of freshmen joins Cal this year.

**CONTENDERS ARE
FAMILIAR FACES**

The other national contenders this season include familiar names in Washington, Stanford and Harvard, perhaps Princeton, as well as Big Ten power Wisconsin. Cal will compete against most of those schools, in competitions such as the San Diego Crew Classic, Stanford Invitational and individual Pac-10 duals, before the IRA Regatta in June in New Jersey.

"We'll have a pretty good idea of where we are at that stage of the regular season," Gladstone said. "We'll have a pretty good idea where we stand relative to the national powers. That's a nice thing, but it's not an essential thing. Hitting the magic lineup, if you will, at that point in the season with this squad particularly, with the way I train crews, is not likely. I tend to bring them along gradually. We don't do a lot of speed work early. I'm not looking for that. I want them peaking at nationals."

"Clearly what we want to do is be in range when we're competing against the top teams in San Diego and elsewhere. It's not a good idea to get blown out. If we're in range of the top crews in that mix, then that's a good thing. And we'll race our butts off down there; we'll race to win for sure. There's a difference – some programs get up to speed very quickly, but that's not the way I bring them along."

2007 SEASON IN REVIEW

SAN DIEGO CREW CLASSIC

For the second straight year No. 7 Stanford defeated No. 2 California in the Copley Cup grand final, but Cal's novice 8, junior varsity 8 and open 8 won their respective grand finals. The novice 8 was never challenged on its way to winning the Derek Guelker Memorial Cup, as the Bears cruised to a 12-second win over Orange Coast. In the Sharp Cabrillo Cup grand final, Cal soundly beat its opponents, holding a five-second lead after only 500 meters and a 21-second lead as the race ended. In the Copley Cup grand final, Stanford finished just over one second ahead of Cal. The Cal open 8 trailed Stanford Rowing Club for the first 1500 meters, but the Bears came back to win by half a second.

WISCONSIN DUAL

The Cal varsity 8 boat defeated Wisconsin for the third consecutive year in a dual race in Redwood Shores, Calif. The freshman 8 also defeated the Badgers, but the second varsity eight lost its race. The Cal varsity 8 began the race with a two-second lead at the 500 meter mark and never let up, eventually finishing seven seconds ahead of the Badgers. The Cal freshman 8 opened up a five-second lead after just 500 meters and cruised to a 22-second win.

STANFORD DUAL

Cal won the Schwabacher Cup, winning all three of the races in the dual competition against Stanford in Redwood Shores. In the varsity 8 race, Cal finished with a 3.3-second margin of victory. In the second varsity 8 race, the Bears defeated Stanford by an open-water margin of 6.7 seconds. Cal finished off the sweep with an 18-second win over the Cardinal in the freshman 8 race.

WASHINGTON DUAL

Cal lost two of three races against No. 1 Washington in dual competition on Montlake Cut in Seattle, Wash. The freshman 8 claimed its fifth consecutive victory over the Huskies, the most ever by a Cal crew, by a full two seconds. This victory marked the varsity 8's fifth consecutive victory over the Huskies. Prior to this run, Cal had never put more than two wins back-to-back in dual racing against Washington. The Huskies started out ahead in the sec-

ond varsity 8 race and eventually finished 1.9 seconds ahead of the Bears. Washington dominated the varsity 8 race, as the Bears finished almost four seconds behind Washington.

PAC-10 CHAMPIONSHIPS

Needing a win over top-ranked Washington in the varsity 8 grand final to secure its ninth Pac-10 title over the previous 10 years, No. 3 Cal came up just 1.5 seconds short on Lake Natoma in Rancho Cordova, Calif. As a result, the Huskies finished with 69 points to the Bears' 66 in the team competition. Cal and Washington placed 1-2 in all four events on the day, with Cal winning the varsity 4 and freshman 8 races, and UW taking the second varsity 8 and varsity 8 titles. Cal surged ahead over the final 500 meters to win the varsity 4 title by more than three seconds over Washington, 6:44.13 to 6:47.48. In the freshman 8 final, Cal took control early and won by nearly eight seconds over Washington, 5:54.87 to 6:02.34, to capture the frosh event for the fifth straight time. Washington took the second varsity 8 race in 6:01.96 to the Bears' 6:07.24 and captured the varsity 8 crown in 5:46.35 to Cal's 5:47.89.

IRA REGATTA

No. 3 Cal, the 2006 IRA national champion in the varsity 8, placed fifth in the varsity 8 grand final of the 2007 IRA Regatta on the Cooper River in Camden, N.J. Washington won its 12th Varsity Challenge Cup in school history, finishing in 5:33.165. Cal finished at 5:40. The Cal freshman 4, varsity 4+ and freshman 8 won their respective national titles, as the Bears took third place with 190 points in the overall team standings and No. 1 Washington (216) topped the field. Harvard (191) was second. The freshman 8's gold-medal finish marked the ninth consecutive year the Bears have finished amongst the top three crews at the IRA Regatta. The Cal varsity pair finished fifth in its grand final; the Bears' open 4 finished fourth. In the second varsity 8 race, Cal was fifth. The Cal freshman 4 dominated its race, finishing six seconds ahead of Yale to claim the title. The Bears' varsity 4+ won the grand final, finishing with an open-water lead over Temple, 6:20.622 to 6:24.370. Cal's freshman eight regained control of the national title and posted an undefeated season for the third time in school history. The Bears won consecutive national titles in 2004 and 2005, but lost to Washington in 2006. Cal finished with a 3.5 second lead over second-place Brown (5:44.736).

TEMPLE CHALLENGE CUP

Cal's freshman crew defeated Cornell by 1 1/4 lengths to win the Temple Challenge Cup at the Henley Royal Regatta in July in Henley-on-Thames, England. In a rematch from the 2006 semifinals, won by Cornell by just under a boat-length, Cal led from the start and crossed the finish line in 6:45. On its way to the title, Cal opened racing by beating First & Third Trinity Boat Club of Cambridge easily. The Bears then defeated Reading University easily, Georgetown by four and a half lengths and Brown by three lengths. The Temple Challenge Cup for eights is open to crews from universities, colleges or schools and consists of five rounds of match races to determine a champion. The Henley Regatta was first held in 1839 and has been held annually ever since, except during the two World Wars. A total of 467 crews, including 114 from outside the British Isles, competed at Henley this year. The Bears reached the quarterfinals in 2005 and the semifinals in 2006 before this year's championship run.

HISTORY OF CAL MEN'S CREW

The University of California and its men's rowing program were both founded in 1868, and crew thereby became the first sport at Cal. The Cal men's crew began its dominance of national and international rowing in earnest in 1924 with the hiring of Carrol ("Ky") Ebright as head coach. Over Ebright's leadership of 36 years, Cal crew became synonymous with Olympic gold medals and national collegiate championships.

Over the years, Cal has won gold medals representing the United States three times in the Olympic Games, more than any college or university in the world. The year 1928 proved to be a landmark time in Cal crew history, as the team compiled arguably the greatest season in the history of collegiate rowing. The crew was undefeated domestically, went on to become the American entry in the 1928 Olympics and

brought home gold from Amsterdam.

The Cal varsity eight repeated its Olympic conquest four years later with a close victory over Italy in the 1932 Olympics at Long Beach, Calif., as it too was unbeaten all year. Sixteen years later Cal brought home a third gold medal, this time from the 1948 Olympics at Henley-on-Thames, England.

Ebright's crews also won a total of six Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) championships. In fact, some argue that Ebright's 1939 IRA champion might have been the fastest of all of his fine crews: it had little trouble with its collegiate opponents, defeating Washington by 12 lengths before going on to set the still-standing four-mile course record at the IRA.

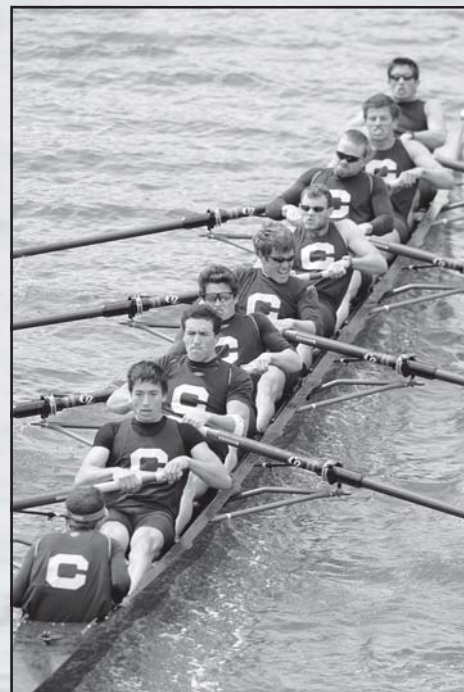
Jim Lemmon moved up from frosh coach to take over the reins from Ebright in 1960. In Lemmon's seven years as head coach,

he strung together an impressive streak that included winning three IRA championships and two Pacific Coast championships. Lemmon's 1964 crew also earned bragging rights as one of Cal's finest, going through the regular season and the IRA Championships without a loss.

Cal won its next IRA title in 1976 during Stephen Gladstone's first turn at the helm (1973-80). Cal also won the 1979 Pacific Coast championship, as the Golden Bears dominated West Coast rowing and earned a spot in the semifinals of the Grand Challenge Cup at the Henley Royal Regatta in England. Craig Amerkhanian, who guided the Bears frosh crews to two IRA gold medals, was a stalwart in that crew.

Mike Livingston became head coach in 1981 and directed the Bears for three years. His 1982 crew was outstanding. It defeated every top crew in the country, after scoring victories in the San Diego Crew Classic and Pacific Coast Championships, while earning Cal a berth in the semifinals of the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley.

In 1984, Tim Hodges,

Cal's stroke in 1974 and '75, stepped up from freshman coach to lead the varsity. He guided the Bears to dual race victories over Washington in his final three seasons, 1985-87. Hodges' 1986 crew was one of the country's best, as it defeated eventual national champion Wisconsin en route to the Bears' victory in the inaugural Redwood Shores Classic and then easily won the Pacific Coast championship. In 1988, Bruce Beall guided Cal to its fourth consecutive dual-race victory over Washington in his first year in charge.

Mark Zembsch, a 1982 graduate of Cal, took his turn at the helm of program in 1992 after two years of coaching Cal freshmen squads. The Bears showed improvement, winning the '92 traditional cup race over Washington in both the varsity and junior varsity events. In 1995, after three years of rebuilding, the Bears had their best season in nine years, ending in a sixth-place finish at the national championships.

Gladstone returned for a second stint coaching the Bears in 1997 after many successful seasons at Brown. Charged with returning Cal men's crew to the upper echelon of collegiate rowing, Gladstone wasted no time as the varsity earned an IRA bronze in 1997 and 1998 and IRA gold in 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002 and 2006. With the 2006 IRA championship, the Bears have won 15 IRA National Championships, the second most behind Cornell (26).

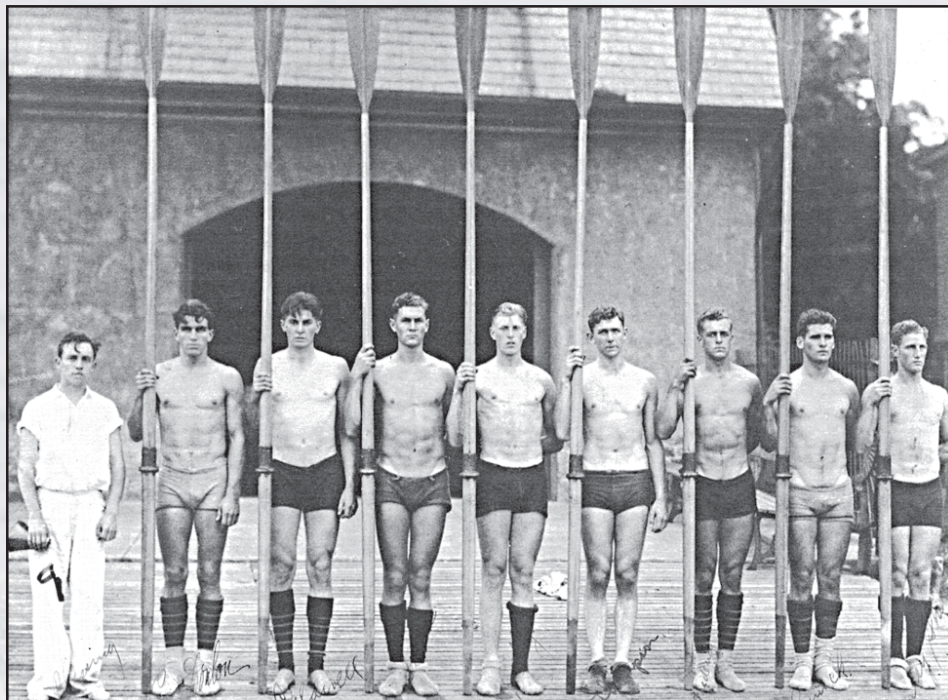

T. GARY ROGERS ROWING CENTER



For more than a century, the home of the California crew has been the Oakland Estuary, located between Alameda Island and the City of Oakland. The Estuary offers 11 miles of protected waters and is one of the few courses in the nation where a straight three-mile race can be held.

With a generous donation from Cal alumni Gary Rogers, and the hard work of Friends of Cal Crew, the Golden Bears

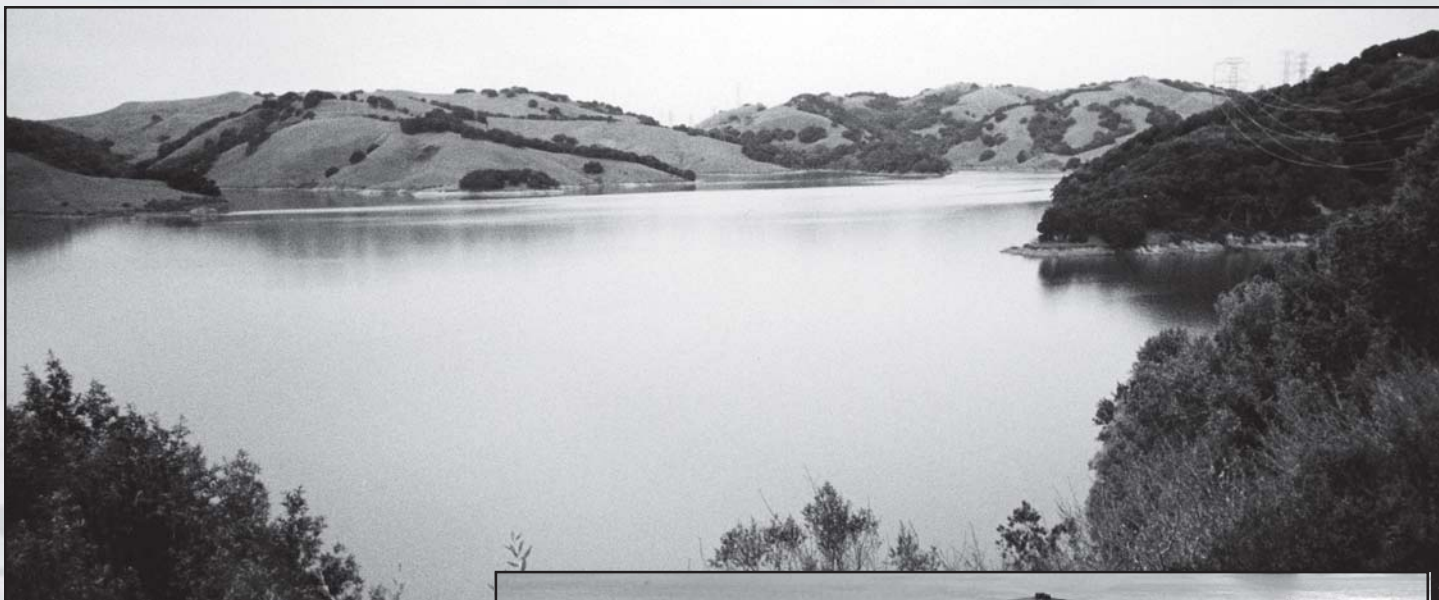
opened their brand new boathouse in 2004. The facility is a three building campus on a property that is three times the size of the former site. The boathouse offers five boat bays and a training space that can accommodate both men's and women's crew.

The T. Gary Rogers boathouse replaces the storied Ky Ebright Boathouse, which was built more than a century ago and be-

came the Bears' home in 2004. The preserved and restored front half of the Ky Ebright Boathouse will serve as the inspirational link to the past and a museum of sorts. Many Olympic gold medalist, world champion and national champion crews have trained at the boathouse at one time. It is believed that the boathouse has been home to more Olympic gold medalists than any other facility in the world.



BRIONES RESERVOIR



Located over the Berkeley Hills in Orinda, the Briones Reservoir serves as the second home of Cal men's crew. With its crystal clear water and limited boat traffic, Briones offers a beautiful escape while providing excellent training conditions year-round.

The topography of the surrounding hills combined with the L-shaped body of water result in flat water conditions regardless of wind direction. In 2002, a new two-bay



facility was completed, which has added to the allure of Briones for the Cal men, whose varsity and freshman crews often practice at Briones.

ERGOMETER FACILITY

Located underneath the west grand stand at the Edwards Track Stadium, the California men's on-campus ergometer facility hums with the spinning of the flywheel and the beat of a boom box seven days a week.

Although the Draconian concrete structure seems a bit foreboding at first, it provides the perfect atmosphere to concentrate on pulling hard.

"The erg room is an integral part of our overall training program," said Cal head coach Steve Gladstone. "Although we have water available to row on all year around, during the winter months we use the machines frequently."

With the music blaring, the coxswains yelling and 40 rowers chasing personal bests, the energy in the ergroom reaches a fever pitch on a regular basis.

Whether it is a scheduled team workout or a solitary training piece, the convenient



location of the facility allows the student-athletes to get on and off the erg quickly and get back to life outside of rowing as soon as possible.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

One of the real success stories for the University of California in recent years is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes - the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and Athletic Department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program geared to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor on the field of play and in the classroom.

ATHLETIC STUDY CENTER

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed within the Division of Undergraduate Education, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials,

and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.

Geared around the understanding of the amount of time student-athletes must devote to practice, training, physical therapy

and team travel, the program creates an environment where students can cultivate good study habits, receive individual or group tutoring and obtain counseling from academic advisors.

TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The Tutorial Program promotes and enhances students' academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The Athletic Study Center has between 50-60 tutors on staff per semester to guarantee that students receive the best possible support. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when they have more time to devote to studying.

ADVISING PROGRAM

The Advising Program offers a broad range of services to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with University, college and NCAA requirements,

developing time-management skills and resolving personal issues unique to student-athletes.

During the freshman year, advisors typically try to help student-athletes make a successful academic transition from high school, while during the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. For the final two years, advisors take

more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made towards graduation while referring juniors and seniors to areas on campus that can help with internships, graduate school applications and career planning.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

In addition, the Athletic Study Center offers a six-week Summer Bridge adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components for the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is Peer Advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus life guidance for new intercollegiate athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes who assist in developing programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.

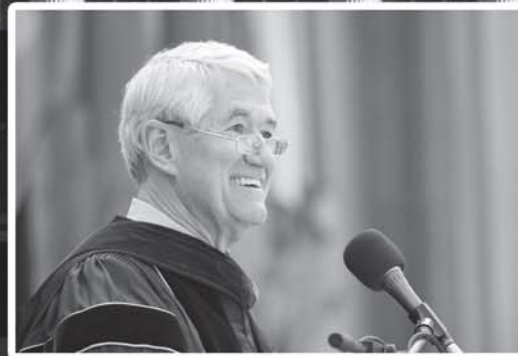
There is no other way to aptly describe America's top public university. There is no other way to describe one of the elite academic settings in the world – especially one that also includes one of America's most successful athletic departments.

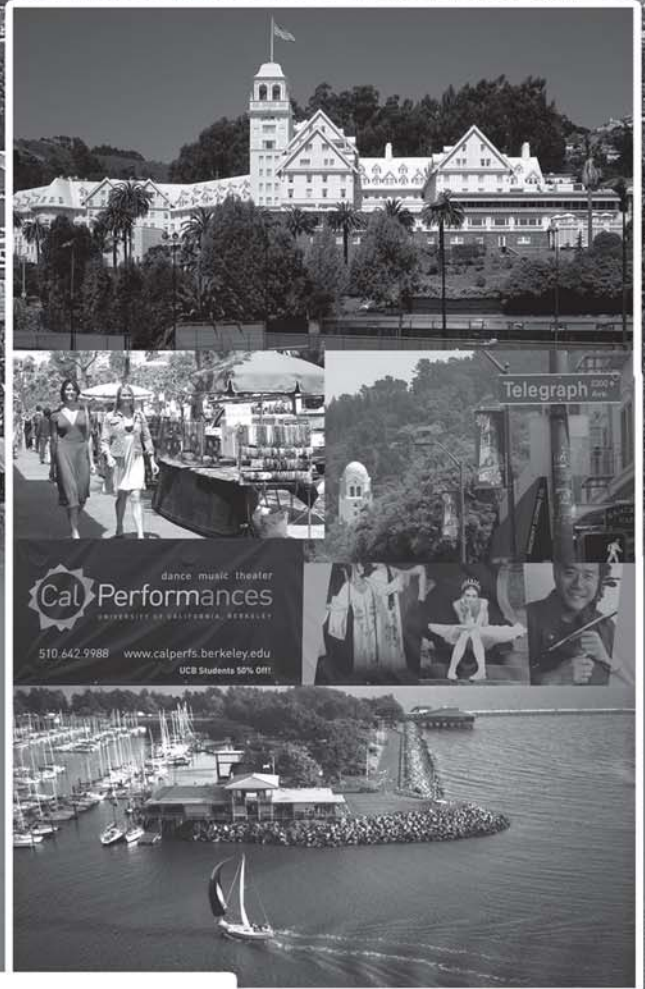
BERKELEY AND THE BAY AREA

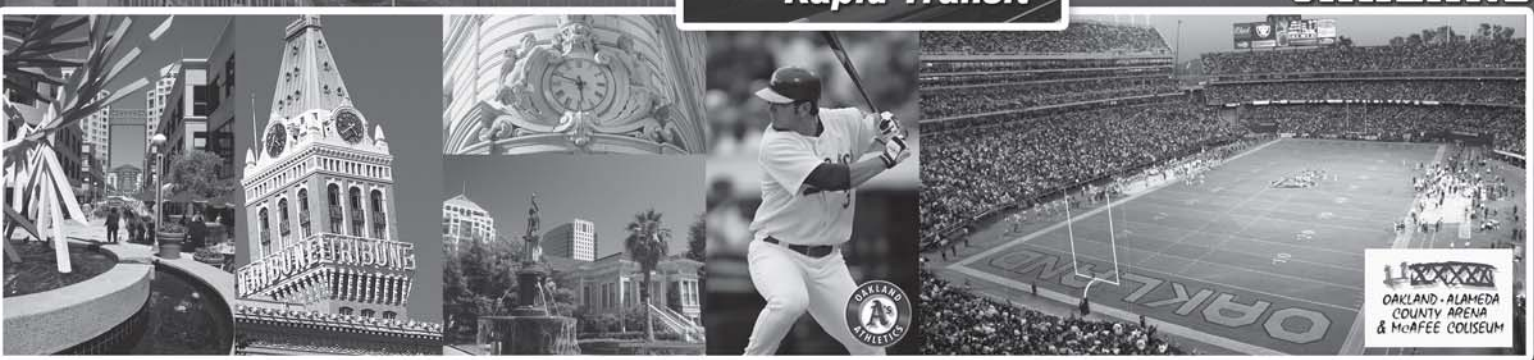
Everyone knows "The City" - San Francisco - from countless photographs, movies and television shows that capture its magic. It is a city built on a series of more than 40 hills, offering panoramic views of every kind. The hub of a nine-county complex and the financial and insurance capital of the world, San Francisco has a resident population of about 740,000. San Francisco is situated on a 46.6 square-mile peninsula bounded on the west by the Pacific Ocean, on the north by the Golden Gate strait, and from north to east by the San Francisco Bay. The City has been named the world's top city twice by readers of *Conde Nast Traveller* and the top U.S. city seven times since 1988.
