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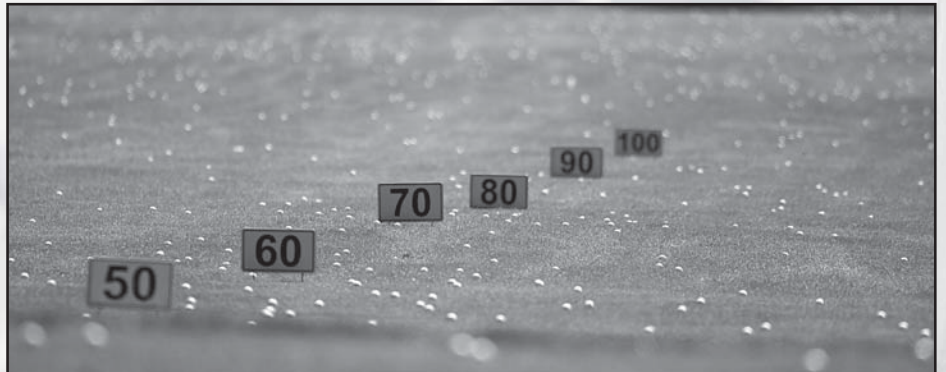

2009 SEASON OUTLOOK

NINE GOLFERS, ONE GOAL

Seniors Allison Goodman and Shannon Yocum vividly recall their freshman season of 2006, and in particular, the season finale, playing at the NCAA National Championships. Goodman and Yocum's memories of Nationals fuel the team's common goal: a top finish at the NCAA Championships.

The California Golden Bears women's golf team has competed in nine straight NCAA Regionals and has advanced to six NCAA Championships, but it's the 2009 NCAA's that matters to this squad.

The Bears were the preseason No. 15 team, according to Golf Week, after finishing the 2008 season ranked No. 23. Coming into the spring, they have two players ranked in the top-100, sophomore Pia Halbig at No. 45 and Goodman at No. 86.

The Bears played a very solid 2008 fall schedule, winning their first two tournaments of the year. The Bears dominated at the Ptarmigan Ram Fall Classic. The team not only defended their 2007 title, they shattered records for the lowest 18 and 36 hole team scores, tied the lowest under-par team score for 54 holes, and had two golfers tie for the record for lowest individual rounds with Yocum and Goodman each shooting 5-under 67's. Yocum also repeated as the tournament medalist, making birdies on her last three holes to finish with an eight-under 208.

"It was a huge confidence builder for us to know we can go out and shoot those numbers," said head coach Nancy McDaniel. "We played really free golf. We played with momentum. There was a confident air there you can't really put your finger on. It was the true definition of golf as a team sport with everyone feeding off one another."

The Bears followed up the success in Colorado with another victory, the 20th tournament victory in Cal history, with the first place finish at the Badger Invitational at the University Ridge Golf Course in Verona, Wisc., the first time since 2003 the Bears had won back-to-back tournaments. Halbig paced the Bears, finishing in fourth place with a three-over 219.

"Our opener at Colorado State was proof-positive that these guys have worked really hard over the summer," said McDaniel. "They left the NCAA Regionals last spring with a pit in their stomach, knowing that they wanted to come back and prove themselves this year. That was all very evident when we got to Colorado State. They looked like a group of mature individuals who knew what they wanted and how to get it."

Much of the hard work over the summer came from a team trip to Scotland last June. The team not only had the opportunity to play golf in the birthplace of the sport, they also played as individuals in the British Women's Amateur Golf Championship at North Berwick.

"The Scotland trip was the catalyst for how we came back this fall," said McDaniel. "The five players from our current roster who made the trip came back with new insight. They came back with different shots and so much creativity. To play in the wind, on different grasses, and to really play

with the terrain changed their game, it really is a different game over there. You must be prepared with a multitude of shots. To play where golf was born was also a very special element. The trip really brought these five together. There is a real common thread there."

No one was more affected by the trip than Scotland native, junior Roseanne Niven. Playing in her homeland, Niven made it to the semi-finals of the match-play British Amateur, eventually falling in the semis to Arizona State's Anna Nordqvist. Niven followed up her success at the British by finishing second at the Irish Women's Open Strokeplay and then winning the Ladies' British Open Amateur Championship in August at Malone Golf Club near Belfast, Ireland.

"Rosie is gearing up to have a great spring. I just know it," said McDaniel. "She was playing with such self-assurance and a fiery attitude this summer. The summer is an indication of what we'll see from Rosie throughout her last year and a half here at Cal."

The team's veteran leadership comes from the senior tandem of Yocum and Goodman, both honorable mentions for All-Pac-10 last season, and both posting career-best five-unders this spring in Colorado. Goodman comes into the spring ranked in the top-100.

"Allie came back this fall with fully prepared, fresh and ready to go, with a new lease on golf," said McDaniel. "She has so many new shots that she brought back from the Scotland trip. Her creativity will be key going into this spring as well as her determination to get the job done."

"Allie is not going to leave Cal without what she has her heart and her mind set on."

Yocum, a three-time Pac-10 All-Academic selection, comes into the spring riding the confidence of her solid play in the fall.

"Shannon had some great success at Colorado. More importantly, she was able to follow it up with some really solid play at the following three tournaments. She's playing more consistently than she ever has. We'll look to her for fire coming down the finishing stretch."

The spring season opens at Palos Verdes, Yocum's home course.

"That is a truly special thing for Shannon to be able to go back and play her home course at the Invitational. Starting on her home course will get her off on the right foot."

Sophomore Pia Halbig led the team in the fall with a 71.7 average. Halbig, ranked in the top-50 by Golfweek, was a second team All-Pac-10 honoree last season. Halbig missed the first couple of weeks of school to compete at the 2008 World Amateur Team Championships as a member of the German national team.

Senior Shannon Yocum

"Pia didn't shoot a round in the 80's last year. She provided steady play, coming from a freshman, it was pretty amazing what she was able to do to step in. She is a consummate student-athlete in her ability to organize her time and keep her priorities straight. Pia is our scoring leader and has welcomed this role whole-heartedly.

Sophomore Andrea Waters rounds out the returners from last year's team. Waters played in just four tournaments prior to having to step it up for the team at the end of the season, playing both the Pac-10 Championships and the Regional. Waters posted the two lowest rounds and the lowest overall score of her collegiate career at the NCAA Regional.

"We think the world of Andrea. She brings this really special attitude. She shot 77 and counted last year at regionals. It really says something about her that she played her best golf at regionals when we really needed her most."

The team also has three very talented newcomers, two of whom look to make an immediate impact on the team. Diane Kwon was named a Notable Newcomer by Golfweek. Kwon, a Bay Area local from Fremont, played nine rounds in the fall for the Bears, toughing through playing with an injured ankle.

"Diane brings complete and total laughter to the table. She breaks up a tense moment. On the flip side, she's coming at you with serious solid golf. I love the contrast in her. That she can be so entertaining, and then turn around and post a low round."

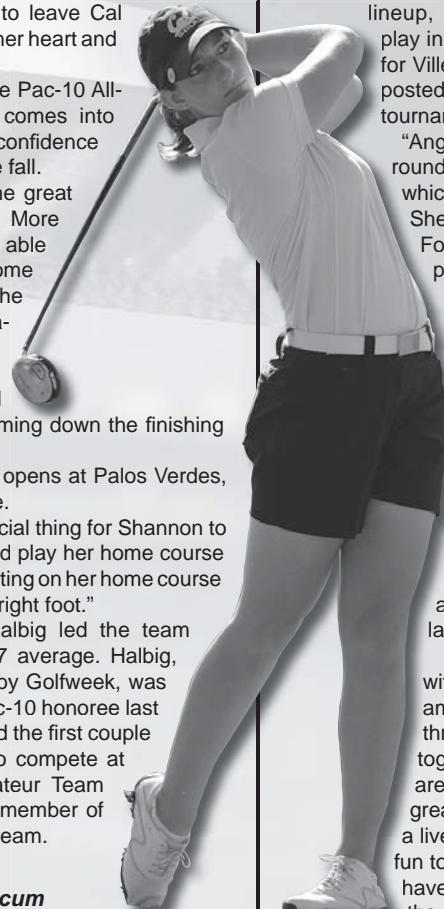
Angela Villela is vying for the fifth spot in the lineup, with her strong, consistent play in the fall making a strong case for Villela. She averaged a 74.9 and posted up a pair of 72's in the final tournament of the fall at Stanford.

"Angie posted a 69 in her second round of play at Colorado State, which helped us to that 15 under.

She continued to play consistently. For a freshman to come in and play well from the get-go, says something about that person. For the spring, we're looking for her to bring more consistency and solid play to our team. She's not afraid of anything."

Joanne Lee, a sophomore transfer from USC, will redshirt this season, but looks to be a big part of the Bear's future. Lee has played in three US Opens (2006-08) and was an All-Pac-10 selection last year as a freshman.

"Our future looks really bright with these three new players. I am really excited to have those three kids. Their love of the game together seems very real. They are balanced. They all have a great love of the game and bring a liveliness and playfulness that is fun to watch. I am really excited to have them as part of our future for the next 3 years."



CALIFORNIA HEAD COACH



NANCY McDANIEL
Head Coach • 14th Season

Nancy McDaniel, the founding coach of the California women's golf team, enters her 14th season directing one of the most nationally regarded golf programs in the country.

During Cal's rise to the upper echelon of the collegiate women's golf landscape, McDaniel has led the Golden Bears to six NCAA Championships, highlighted by three top five showings from 2004-06. Duke was the only other school during that span to register three straight top five national finishes. After the 2005-06 season, McDaniel was selected the LPGA Teaching Division Western Section Coach of the Year.

The Bears have seven NCAA regional berths to their credit under McDaniel, capped by 2004's program-best finish of fourth at the NCAA Championships. That year, Sarah Huarte won Cal's first NCAA individual title.

Following four top five 2007 fall finishes, McDaniel was recognized as *Golf World's* Midseason Coach of the Year. She looks forward to the Bears, who are on a school-record pace for team stroke average at 296.4, building on their early season success and challenging for the national title in the spring.

Huarte, a former first-team All-American who is now playing on the LPGA Tour, benefited from McDaniel's tutelage, as she posted a 76.8 stroke average as a freshman but capped her senior campaign with a new Cal record of 73.82.

In addition to leading Cal to national prominence, McDaniel has guided Cal to six consecutive upper-division finishes at the Pac-10 Championships, including claiming its first conference crown in 2003.

Cal finished 19th at NAAs in 2001 in its first appearance, 15th in 2002 and tied for 14th in 2003 prior to its best-ever performance

in 2004. In 2003-04, the Bears established a school record for season stroke average at 298.1 and finished the year ranked No. 3 by *Golfweek* (best ever by the publication.)

During the 2002-03 season, McDaniel directed Cal to a nation's-best seven tournament titles, including the Bears' first Pac-10 and NCAA regional (Central) crowns, propelling them to an all-time best national ranking of No. 2 by Golfstat heading into the NCAA Championships.

The program's 2002-03 accomplishments earned McDaniel a collection of prestigious awards - National Golf Coaches Association (NGCA) Coach of the Year, the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) Teaching and Club Professional Coach of the Year and *Golfweek* magazine's Coach of the Year. She also garnered her second Pac-10 Coach of the Year and NGCA Western Regional Co-Coach of the Year selections and was honored as California's Athletic Alumni Association's Big C Society Coach of the Year.

Under McDaniel's leadership, Cal has garnered 22 All-Pac-10, nine all-region and nine All-America honors. In 2002-03, the Bears achieved a program-high six all-conference citations and received their first-ever All-America picks. Huarte is Cal's only three-time first-team All-Pac-10 recipi-

ent, while Sofie Andersson is the Bears' only three-time All-American.

The 2001 Pac-10 Coach of the Year and 2002 West Regional Coach of the Year also has coached the Bears to first-place finishes at 17 tournaments, including 12 since the spring of 2002, and at least one in nine of the last 11 seasons, including this year.

One of the most successful players ever to compete at Washington, McDaniel was team captain as a senior in 1988 and earned one All-America and two Pac-10 All-Star team selections. During her career, she won individual titles at the 1987 Washington and BYU tournaments and finished in the top 10 at seven additional events. McDaniel recorded a 74.3 average her senior year with the Huskies, posting a personal-best round of 69 in the fall of 1987. She was named to Washington's Pac-10 All-Decade team (1986-96) for women's golf and received her bachelor's degree in speech communications in 1988.

McDaniel came to Cal with five years of professional experience on the Women's European, Ladies Asian and Players West golf tours. One of the top players on the Ladies Asian Tour, she finished 13th out of 153 participants in 1993 and ranked 20th during her final season in 1994.

Prior to that, McDaniel won the Players West title at the 1992 Las Vegas Classic and won the LPGA sectional qualifier in Mission Hills later that year. She currently is a member of the LPGA Teaching Division.

McDaniel spent three years as a touring golf professional, playing out of Brookside Country Club in Stockton, Calif., before accepting the position at Cal in October of 1994. Originally from Portland, Ore., Nancy and her husband, Jay, the head golf professional at Claremont Country Club, have a 12-year-old son, Tyler, and a nine-year-old daughter, Molly.

NANCY McDANIEL - HEAD COACH

IF YOU COULD HOP ON A PLANE TOMORROW, WHERE WOULD YOU GO?

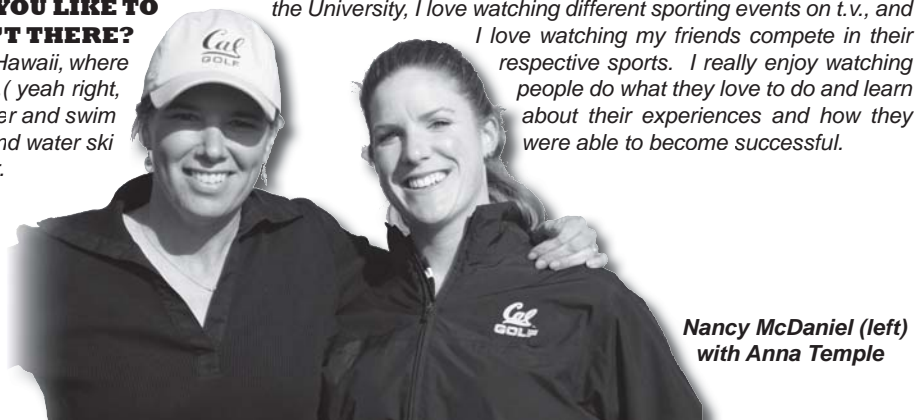

COACHING & OPERATIONS STAFF



ANNA TEMPLE
Assistant Coach • First Season

Anna Temple, a 2004 graduate of the University of California, returns to the Golden Bears as an assistant coach for the 2008-09 season.

Temple is an active member of the European Ladies Tour, playing in 31 events over the last three seasons on the tour. Her best finish came in 2007 when she finished 19th at the Nykredit Masters (Helsingor, Denmark). Temple played in three of the four

events of the 2008 Ladies African Tour '08 played in 3 out of 4 events. She tied for first at the WPGA Masters (Johannesburg, South Africa), falling in a playoff. She finished last season ninth on the Order of Merit for the Ladies African Tour.

Temple originally turned pro in 2005, playing the 2005 and 2006 seasons on the Durmaed Futures Tour, with her best finish coming in 2006 when she tied for 35th at the Louisiana Futures Classic.

As an amateur, Temple played in the US Women's Amateur Championship in 2000, 2001, 2002, reaching the quarter finals in 2000. She was a semi finalist at the Western Women's Open and finished third at the Canadian Ladies Open in 2004.

Temple also worked for 5 summers at the Nike Junior Golf Camps at Pebble Beach.

Temple was a Golden Bear golfer for three seasons after transferring from the University of Wisconsin after her freshman year. She earned All-Region honors her senior season. She is a fourth generation Golden Bear who was also born and raised in Berkeley.



CURT DAVID
Operations Manager • Fifth Season

Curt David is in his fifth year as Cal Golf's operations manager. David has been a golf club professional since 1991, gaining Class A membership with the PGA of America in 1995. Most recently, he was Head Golf Professional and General Manager at Cherry Island Golf Course in Sacramento, California from 1995-2003 and he was also Head Golf Professional at Ancil Hoffman in Sacramento from 1999-2002.

BAY AREA'S BEST, HOME TO CAL GOLF

CLAREMONT COUNTRY CLUB

This course is one of the oldest and most established courses in the East Bay. Located in Oakland, just 10 minutes from Cal's campus, it offers a test of putting and demands accuracy with irons on its tree-lined fairways. The Bears, which ranked No. 1 in the nation for total short game in the fall of 2002, developed their proficiency at the club's short game area.

GREEN VALLEY COUNTRY CLUB

Green Valley has served as host to the U.S. Women's Amateur Qualifier in recent years.

HIDDENBROOKE COUNTRY CLUB

Host of the Bay Area Classic for the fourth time in 2003, this course sits in a beautiful valley in Vallejo, 30 minutes north of Berkeley. A nominee for Golf Digest's 1996 Best New Course of the Year award, this Arnold Palmer-designed course incorporates 14 holes with water as well as true, fast, undulating greens.

METROPOLITAN

As would a classic links, Metropolitan has

a spacious and open feel, with a canopy of sky and long views to the Oakland Hills, the Bay, downtown Oakland, and San Francisco bracketing the horizon. Thirty yards of the plush grass range is set aside for Cal Golf. The Bears' new state-of-the-art scoring zone is on site. The facility features two extremely large greens - one for putting and chipping, and the other for the wedge game, including bunker play.

MIRA VISTA COUNTRY CLUB

Incorporated as the Berkeley Country Club in 1920, the course is located 15 minutes from campus in the Berkeley Hills. The panoramic view of the San Francisco Bay and Golden Gate Bridge makes this an exhilarating course to play. The club offers a driving range, full chipping area and putting green.

ORINDA COUNTRY CLUB

Established in 1926, this course demands consistent tee shots and long iron shots. Orinda Country Club played host to the 1988 and 1998 Pac-10 Men's Championship and is located 15 minutes east of campus in the city of Orinda.

ROUND HILL COUNTRY CLUB

This first class facility offers a driving range, chipping and sand area, and putting green.

The course is known for its slick greens and valley views.

RUBY HILL GOLF COURSE

This private club served as host of the 2005 Pac-10 Women's Golf Championships, the first that Cal has hosted. The 18-hole Nicklaus-designed course has 225-scenic acres and meanders through magnificent water features, natural arroyos, scenic vistas and elevation changes. The course has bent-grass greens and all-weather Bermuda grass fairways for year-round play. There is also a full practice area.

SEQUOYAH COUNTRY CLUB

Located in the Oakland Hills, the course features hilly terrain and small, sloping greens. There are no parallel fairways and no two holes are alike. The sweeping vistas and luxurious evergreen backdrop add to the enjoyment of the golfing experience.

TILDEN GOLF COURSE

This public course is nestled in the Berkeley Hills. Features include a state-of-the-art, three-tiered, outdoor lighted driving range, with 72 stalls, TV monitors and heating, a double-level putting green and short-game area.

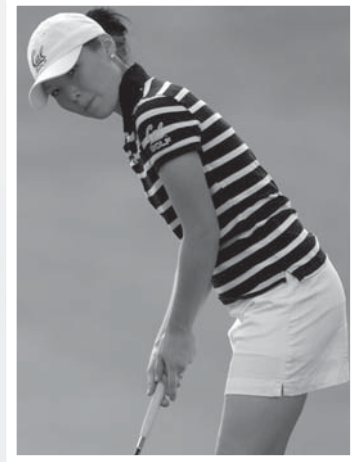

SOFIE ANDERSSON

Sofie Andersson became Cal's first three-time All-American during her sophomore through senior seasons (2004-06). Andersson recorded the second-best season stroke average in Cal history at 73.83 as a senior in 2005-06, just behind Sarah Huarte's record of 73.82. The product of Angelholm, Sweden, garnered three All-Pac-10 selections and second-team All-SEC honors as a freshman at Mississippi State. Andersson currently competes on the Futures Tour and won her first pro tournament at the Aurora Health Care Championship June 1-3, 2007. She also holds her LPGA conditional card.

VIKKI LAING

Vikki Laing (2000-04) secured the 2003 Pac-10 individual title by one stroke, becoming the first Cal women's golfer to win a conference crown. Her outstanding play propelled the Bears to their first-ever Pac-10 team title in 2003. The native of Musselburgh, Scotland, came to Berkeley after gaining valuable experience on the Scottish national team. Laing earned second-team All-America recognition as a senior and was a first-team All-Pac-10 choice in 2002 and 2003. Laing was the first Cal women's golfer to earn her LPGA card. She currently competes on the Futures Tour and claimed her first professional win at the Gettysburg Championship Aug. 24-27, 2007.

SOPHIA SHERIDAN

Sophia Sheridan (2003-06) teamed with Sofie Andersson to lead Cal to three consecutive top five NCAA finishes from 2004-06. A native of Guadalajara, Mexico, Sheridan is a two-time honorable mention All-America pick, a two-time all-region recipient and a four-time All-Pac-10 choice. The 2005 NCAA West Regional champion plays on the LPGA and Futures tours and competed in the 2006 U.S. Open. Sheridan holds the school records for 54 holes (205) and in relation to par (-8).

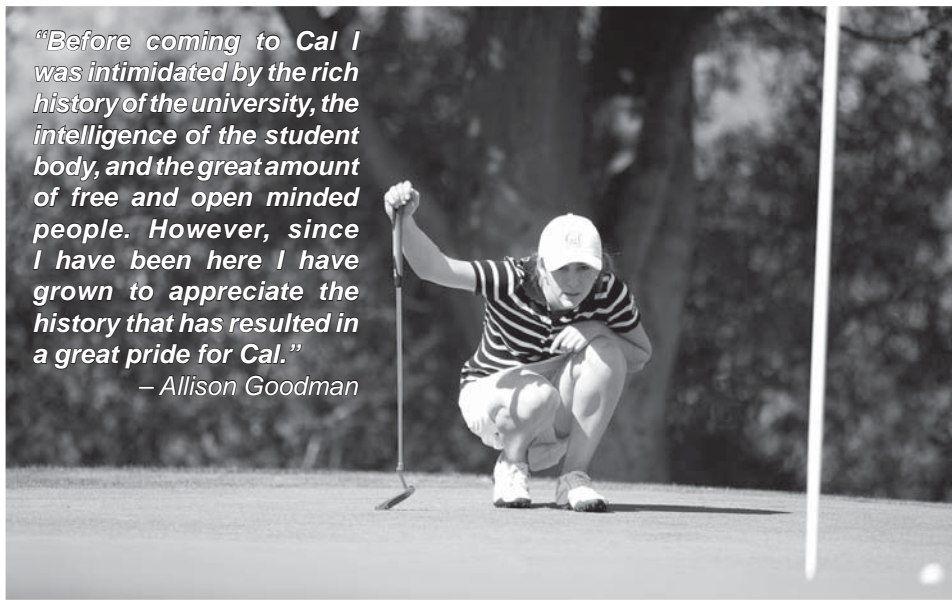

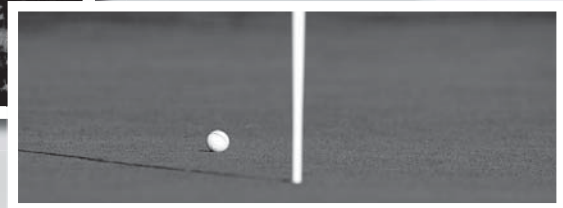

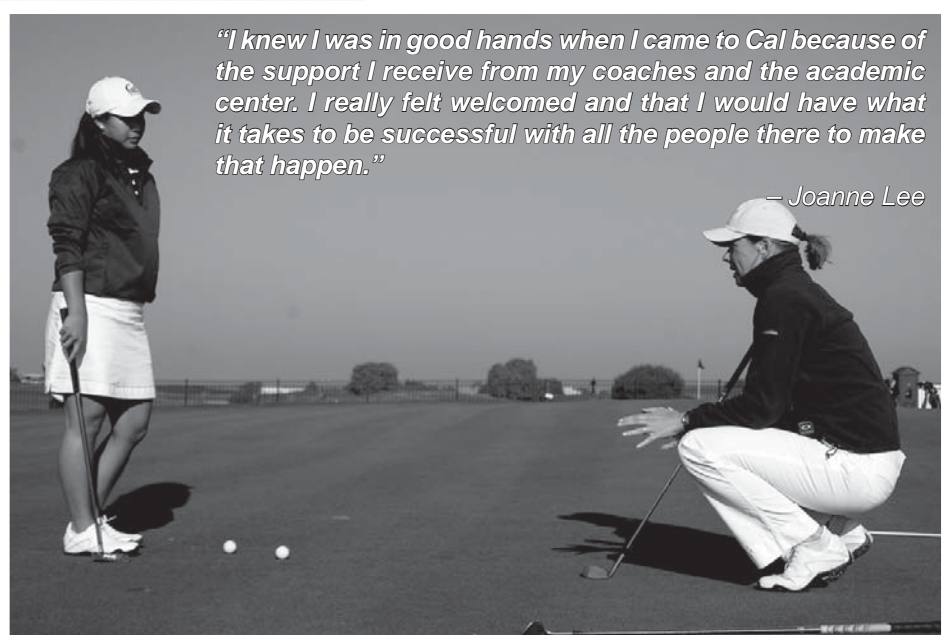

2008 SEASON IN REVIEW

The spring portion of the schedule started with great promise. After a tough start at the Wildcat Invitational, the team rebounded with a victory at the Spartan Invitational, finishing first among the 15 teams. They followed with a third place at the Duck Invitational. The Bears finished eighth at the challenging ASU Invitational before closing out the regular season with a fifth-place finish at the Peg Barnard Collegiate.

California kept their streak of appearances at the NCAA Regionals intact, qualifying for their ninth in a row. The Bears rallied in the final round of the Pac-10 Championships, entering the final day in sixth place, but coming out in fourth to secure the trip to the West Regional. Freshman Pia Halbig and sophomore Roseanne Niven each shot one-over 73's in the final round to fuel the Bear's late surge. Halbig finished 10th at the Pac-10 Championships, earning Second Team All-Pac-10 honors. Juniors Shannon Yocum and Allison Goodman were both honorable mentions.

For the second straight year, the Bears' season ended at the NCAA Regionals, with Cal finishing the 54-hole tournament at 897 (+33) after shooting rounds of 295, 301 and 301, in 12th place among the teams, four spots shy of earning one of the invitations to the National Championships. Goodman showed her veteran leadership by pacing Cal for the third time this season, tying for 17th at 220 (+4) after shooting a 74 Saturday, just missing the cut to earn a spot at the NCAA Championships as an individual.

For the season, freshman Pia Halbig led the squad, with a 74.5 stroke average, coming in as the top Bear in four of their seven spring tournaments. Juniors Allison Goodman and Shannon Yocum both had very consistent seasons, with Goodman posting a 74.9 stroke average and Yocum a 75.3.

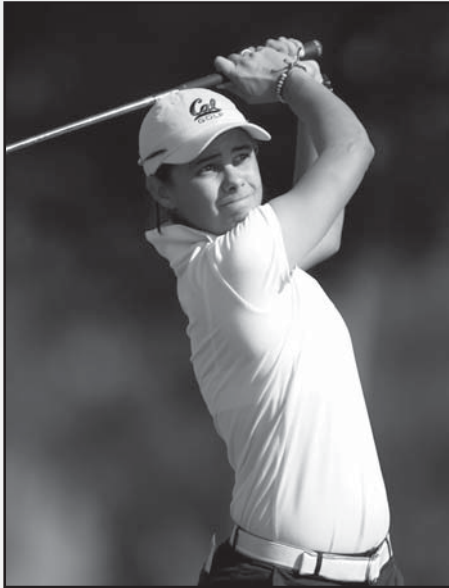

BEARS TEE IT UP

GULLANE NO. 1

The historic course, established in 1884, has dramatic views across the Firth of Forth to Edinburgh and Fife. The eighteen holes of Gullane No.1 Course were established in 1884. The 3rd hole was recently voted one of the top 500 holes in the world by Golf Magazine (USA).

NORTH BERWICK

This "true links" course starts in the town and stretching along the shores of the Firth of Forth returning to its origins. It is of the world's oldest, founded in 1832, with a continuous record of play over the original seaside turf. It was the course that the Cal players played when competing in the 2008 British Amateur.

HIMALAYA'S COURSE, ST. ANDREWS

The Himalayas is the historic putting green alongside of the Old Course in St. Andrews.

KINGSBARN

The Kingsbarns Golf Links origins date back to 1793. This unique part of East Fife has sandy soils, undulating ridges and hollows, Cambo burn running into the sea, all set immediately against the rugged coastline of the North Sea.

LUNDIN LINKS

Lundin, founded in 1868, on a Tom Morris course which was extensively redesigned in 1908-09 by five times Open Champion James Braid, is well known throughout the golfing world as a course of rare quality.

ELIE GOLF CLUB

Formed in 1875, only a handful of clubs in Scotland are older than Elie, and the course is a classic example of links golf. From the opening hole, where a blind tee shot requires the starter to use a 30ft periscope from HMS Excalibur to ensure the way is clear, the course's idiosyncratic charm becomes apparent.

CRIEFF

Ancient Druid Stones, the ruined stables of The Ferntower House and an ominous site, which witnessed the persecution of Kate Macnevin, accused of witchcraft in 1563, are strewn across the property; testimonies of human design and destruction, they create what is a profoundly historical course.

WESTERN GAILES

This natural links course offers undulating fairways, occasionally interrupted by three meandering burns. Greens that are cleverly located in naturally folded ground, some protected by burns whilst others guarded by sand dunes. The course is highly rated and is 38th in the Top 100 courses of the British Isles.

Among the many off-the-course memories enjoyed by the Golden Bears this past year were a golf clinic in Mexico, team building in the wilderness of the Lair of the Bear, a visit to Seattle's Public Market, a formal banquet, student-athlete recognition at football and men's basketball games, and a cheesehead moment with Shannon Yocum during their road trip to Wisconsin, which ended with a 2008 Badger Invitational team victory.



One of the real success stories for the University of California is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes: the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and athletic department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program tailored to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor on the field of play and as a student in the classroom.

STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAM

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed within the Division of Undergraduate Education, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials, and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.



Geared around the understanding of the amount of time student-athletes must devote to practice, training, physical therapy and team travel, the program creates an environment where students can cultivate strong study habits, receive individual or group tutoring and obtain counseling from academic advisors.

TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The tutorial program promotes and enhances student academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The Athletic Study Center has between 50-60 tutors on staff per semester to guarantee that students receive the best possible support. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night, enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when are able to devote more time to studying.

ADVISING PROGRAM

The advising program offers a broad range of services to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with university, college and NCAA requirements, developing time management skills and resolving personal academic issues unique to student-athletes.

During a student-athlete's freshman year, advisors provide assistance to ensure a successful academic transition from high school. In the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. Over the course of the final two years, advisors

take more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made towards graduation while referring juniors and seniors to areas on or near campus that can help with career planning and development.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

The Athletic Study Center offers a special service called *Summer Bridge*; an adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components of the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is peer advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus guidance for new intercollegiate student-athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes who assist in the development of programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.

SPORTS PSYCHOLOGY

The California women's golf team recognizes the benefits of implementing a specific mental training regiment. The Golden Bears work closely with Jeff Troesch, an internationally recognized expert in the field of mental skills training and performance enhancement, to ensure that they are performing at their best in their quest for an NCAA championship. He serves as the team's mental game consultant.

"Most athletes and teams acknowledge that the mental part of the game is significant when it comes to training and competition," Troesch said. "However, those that don't take the time or put the energy at purposefully working on that part of the game end up hoping something good will happen rather than knowing how to make it happen."

According to Troesch, teams that work at the mental side of sports are more confident, consistent and focused, and are clearer about their objectives and how to achieve them. The athletes are also more capable of dealing with adversity and frustration, and more likely to enjoy their sport.

The players and teams that have a mental training plan learn how to consistently create the internal environment that leads to successes. Other teams and athletes wait for successes to create a good internal environment, and then have a hard time figuring out how to repeat it.

Troesch believes working with a team differs from working with an individual largely in respect to the dynamics that exist between and among the team members, as well as the relationships between each team member and the coaching staff. These interactions make working with a team more complex and more challenging. There are additional aspects that come into consideration for a player when they are representing a university and are a part of a team. When athletes are playing as individuals, they are only responsible for and responsible to themselves. This relationship is different as a member of a team. That being said, the ultimate impact that Troesch can have for each player is done by customizing and individualizing his work with them. There is a lot of individual work done in the team context.

"My experience working with the Cal women's golf team has been among the most enjoyable and rewarding in my 20-plus years of consulting with athletic programs," Troesch said. "The openness on the part of the coaching staff to continue to grow and learn and do whatever it takes to get better

is a rare trait in NCAA Division I sports. The enthusiasm with which the staff and the players have embraced the mental training and their diligence in working the process of strengthening their mental games has been inspiring."

Troesch, MA, LMHC, has been involved in training athletes and other elite performers since 1988. Troesch served for several

years as director of mental training for David Leadbetters' Golf Academies worldwide, where he was instrumental in assisting in the development of their training programs and methodology. He currently is the director of West Coast operations for the International Junior Golf Academy slated to open in Central California in August 2008.



An integral part of California women's golf program and its success is the strength and conditioning program, led by Zach Conner and assistants, who supervise the comprehensive operation for the Golden Bear team. The program's philosophy is geared towards helping each student-athlete achieve the highest level of athletic development.

By teaching how all the components of strength and conditioning fit together, student-athletes understand how to maximize force production. This includes enhancement of speed, strength and flexibility, which results in improved power. Motivating, educating and helping to reach maximum athletic development is the primary focus of the Cal program.

The Cal weight room includes eight Olympic platforms and an array of aerobic and anaerobic equipment. The picturesque facility offers panoramic views of the entire region, including San Francisco and the Bay. The training regimen at Cal is a year-round process that emphasizes the speed, strength and flexibility. With closely monitored workouts that involve a great deal of individual instruction and attention, student-athletes are taught the correct techniques to increase their ability to perform at their peak during competition.

Cal's program stresses comprehensive training in order to improve both strength and speed. Flexibility is a key component because it is essential for proper lifting.

Athlete workouts are closely monitored by the conditioning staff who work in collaboration with the entire sports medicine team (doctors, athletic trainers, physical therapists, nutritionists, etc.) to ensure the health and safety of all of student-athletes.

In this way, Cal's strength and conditioning program is a vital component linking the "full circle" of a student-athlete's physical development from conditioning through rehabilitation and reconditioning.

The Golden Bears have embraced the Pilates Method of Exercise, integrating their Pilates workouts with their strength training. With their improved posture and increased body control and awareness, the Bears are carrying themselves taller on and off the course.

Pilates and golf have a symbiotic relationship. One of the predominant theories of Pilates is strength and awareness within the core muscles. With this newfound mind-body relationship, the golfers are not only relieved from back pain, but they are able to rotate their center with greater control and fluidity, which yields a more powerful and precise swing.

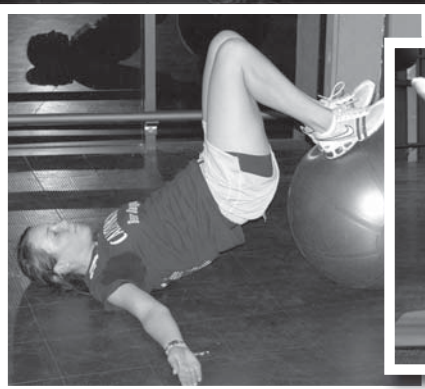
Joseph Quinn graduated from Cal in 2001 with a degree in music and a sore back from being hunched over his guitar. With the help of Pilates, his aches and pains dissipated quickly. So impressed with the power of the work, he got certified and opened a studio on Telegraph Avenue in Berkeley.

A dedicated Golden Bear, Joseph enthusiastically aided the Cal football team when he heard of their wide-spread back problems in 2004. With back issues looming for the golf team, Cal women's golf head coach Nancy McDaniel enlisted the help of Pilates and Quinn in 2007.

The Pilates Method of Exercise explores the art and science of human movement. The system was created by boxer and World War I hospital orderly, Joseph Pilates. He developed his concepts of precise and fluid movement with Martha Graham's modern dancers of New York in the 1920's. Since then, it has long been the conditioning and rehabilitation secret of the modern dance world. In the last 10 years, Pilates has been recognized by the medical community for its sound properties, and now the athletic world is taking note.



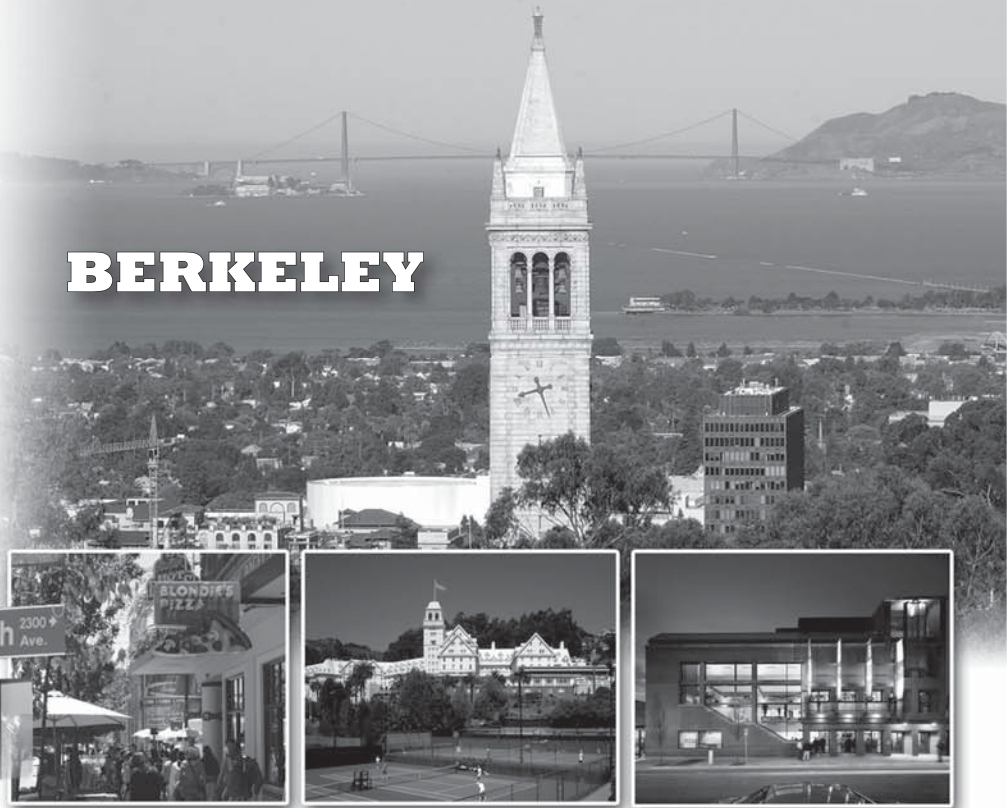
BERKELEY AND THE BAY AREA
